

Pre-enrollment counseling will be provided for all students entering high school next fall. Implications of the mandated law 19 TAC Chapter 75 curriculum will be discussed and explained to all prospective 9th graders.

Productivity Valuation of Agricultural And Open-Space Is the land you own being or "1-d-1".

used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser of the Wheeler County Appraisal District, landowners have the option of applying either for agricultural-use valuation or for open-space land valuation on their property.

Applications should be filed before May 1 this year for any property to receive agricultural-use valuation, of for openspace land valuation on property that did not receive that type of appraisal in 1983. Applications received after May 1 and until the appraisal records are approved are subject to a penalty for late filing.

Two constitutional amendments permit taxation of land on its agricultural use, or productivity, value, Copeland said. "This means that taxes would be assessed against the productive value of the land instead of what the land would sell for in the open market" she explained.

Copeland noted that the legal basis for special land appraisal is found in the Texas Constitution in Art. VIII, Secs 1-d and 1-d-1. The two types of land and valuation are commonly called "ag-use" or "1 -d" and "open-space" or "1-d -1", the chief appraiser added. In Wheeler County, all qualified land is on "open-space"

"The requirements for application and for qualification of both the land and the owner are different," Copeland said.

For 1-d-1 open-space, the land may be owned by an individual, corporation or partnership, and the agricultural business need not be the principal business of the owner. Agricultural and timber lands and ecological laboratories are eligible for 1-d-1 appraisal. However, the land must be

involved in a qualifying agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area; it must have been devoted principally to a qualifying use for at least five of the past seven years; and, again, the chief appraiser must approve the application.

Once an application for 1-d -1 valuation is filed with the chief appraiser and approved, a landowner is not required to submit another application as long as the land qualifies, unless the chief appraiser requests another application to confirm current qualification.

Copeland also explained that the possibility for a "rollback tax" exists under special land valuation.

Under 1-d-1, a rollback is triggered by a change in use to a nonagricultural purpose that would not qualify for productivity valuation. Taxes are recaptured for the five years preceding the year of the change.

The additional tax is measured, Copeland said, by the difference between taxes paid under productivity valuation changes for 1984 and hopefully provisions and the taxes which would have been paid if the be up some due to fuel cost land had been put on the tax changes". roll at market value. whose agricultural lands are lcoated in more than one county must apply for productivity valuation with each county's appraisal district. Failure to do so could result in one or more taxing units taxing the property on its ful market value.

More information and application forms are available from the local appraisal office. Personnel there will be able to assist landowners with the information necessary for de-



Code Permits the Elderly To Postpone Delinquent Taxes

Taxpayers aged 65 or older to collect a delinquent tax if he may take advantage of a or she is 65 years or older and special type of property tax owns and occupies as a resirelief-deferred payment of delinquent taxes on their homesteads. To obtain the postponement, however, an elderly taxpayer must file a sworn affidavit with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district or, if a suit to collect the taxes has been initiated, in the court where the suit is pending.

Under Sec. 33.06, Property Tax Code, "An individual is entitled to defer or abate a suit

dence homestead the property on which the tax subject to the suit is delinquent." After a tax deferral affidavit

is properly filed, a taxing unit may not press or initiate a delinquent tax suit on the property as long as the over-65 taxpayer owns and resides at that homestead.



The affidavit which the elderly property owner files at the appraisal office must include, according to the State Property Tax Board, Rule 155.41, name and address, date of birth and a statement that proof of age may be required, legal description of the homestead, names of taxing units in which the homestead is located and for which the deferral is filed, signature of the applicant, date of filing and an acknowledgement to be completed by a notary public "or other competent official".

Four specific statements must appear on the application, affirmation of age and understanding of the circumstances of the deferral. The applicant must be made aware through these affirmations that a tax lien remains on the property, that penalty and interest continue to accrue during the deferral period and

that taxing units may sue and foreclose on all accrued taxes, penalty and interest when the specified property is no longer owned and occupied as the applicant's homestead.

If a delinquent tax suit has already been initiated, the over-65 taxpayer may halt the suit by filing a similar affidavit with the court, asserting age and ownership of the property. The taxing unit may file a controverting affidavit, but if, after a hearing, the court finds







(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the second in a series of articles on H. Ross Perot, the Chairman of the Select Committee on Public Education. The articles are taken from the February 1984 issue of Texas Lone Star, a publication for the Texas Association of School Boards.)

Perot strongly believes that changes have to be made quickly in light of projections that the present 3 million school population will increase to 4.5 million by the year 2000.

He is particularly concerned about those children from deprived backgrounds and feels we have two choices in that regard.

"We can either move heaven and earth to help them learn how to learn, or we can be prepared to support them as welfare recipients in an advanced technological society. The cruelest form of segregation is to socially promote these children.

"We give them high school diplomas. They don't know anything. They won't ever have a job, and taxpayers will support them the rest of their lives. Is that giving them a fair shake? Their only ticket out is knowledge and they're going to have to work to get that knowledge. There is no easy

Perot suggests one solution might be little neighborhood schools that serve no more than 60 or 70 students.

"I don't care what the school building looks like," he says. "It's got to be adequate. It's got to pass fire code standards. "Sooner or later we've got

to get over to the people of Texas (that) building fancy public schools does not give you fancy knowledge and education...

"When you go back to those deprived areas of Texas where the little guys and girls don't have a chance, a fancy school won't make the difference," Perot said.

"You don't need facilities to make a great elementary education. You need teachersteachers who are warm, loving, caring, sensitive per-

accumulated about how to make children feel good about themselves."

Instead of one principal for each school, a principal could oversee 10 or 12 of these schools, Perot said.

"Because each school is small, each child is somebody. Now that's terribly important," Perot stressed. "We can play to the child's strengths and measure the child's readiness to learn. We've got this thing about starting children in school at age 6. Instead of having that 6-year-old forced into the system whether he or she is ready or not, start them when they are ready to learn. That may be at age 4 or at age

"This is a way to make winners in the school stystem. By the time these children go to middle school, they can go anywhere," he noted.

Perot admits making such a drastic change would probably cause quite a hassle because of all the court decisions concerning desegregation.

"But if you really love these little children and if you really want to help them", he says, "vou don't take a child with a 50-word vocabulary, who doesn't know his last name, who is wearing his brother's hand-me-downs, and put him on a bus when he is 6 years old-whether he's ready to learn or not-and ship him to the richest school district in the area and plunk him down with children who have been to Europe, who have beautiful vocabularies, whose parents have taught them to read nd write, and who wear designer clothes. At the end of the first day, that child will be so
