J. Johnson, S. Lewallen Attend Orientation

Jennifer Dawn Johnson and Shea Lynn Lewallen, both of Wheeler TX, were among 177 high school seniors who attended the second of five freshmen orientation clinics on April 21 at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford.

A total of 420 high school seniors has enrolled at Southwestern for the 2000 fall semester with three more clinics coming up April 27, June 9 and August 18. High school seniors who are interested in the clinics can call Todd Boyd or Jena Skarda at (580) 774-3782 for additional information.

At the clinics, students spend the day on the SWOSU campus, meet individually with academic advisors and enroll in classes for the 2000 fall semester. The students, along with parents, hear presentations about services and activities at Southwestern Oklahoma State University.

Since then they have won nine Grammy awards, 27 Dove awards, cut 167 albums and toured 43 countries.

Their non-profit organization holds nearly 300 crusades a year and survives on donations. Admission to the concert is free.

Cecil Blackwood, current manager of the group, attended the same Sunday school as Presley in Memphis in 1948. Songs the Blackwood Brothers are most associated with include "Have You Talked to the Man Upstairs," "Swing Down Chariot," "My Journey to the Sky," "Paradise Island," "In Times Like These", and "The Old Country Church".

They appeared on shows during the early years of television with Dave Garro and Tennessee Ernie Ford and more recently on the "Barbara Mandrell Show" and "Hee Haw". They have made numerous appearances with Billy Graham and on weekly TV evangelist shows.

Wheeler's Boys Golf Team Wins First Place At Regional Meet

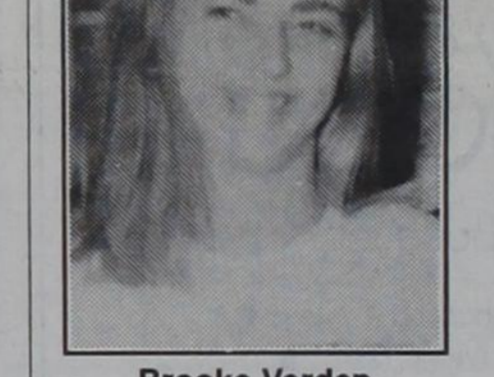

This luncheon was promoted by the Wheeler County Extension Agent, Kenny Brdecko with assistance from Texas Beef Council spokesman, Mike McCravy, Rob Maddox, a Ph.D. student in Meat Science at Texas A&M, and Ted McCollum of Amarillo, Beef Cattle Specialist of District I Extension Service.

The meat served at the luncheon was prepackaged, ready to serve products from Hormel Foods. Barbecue, beef and Beef Tips with gravy were the main course. These pre-cooked entrees were prepared in minutes by microwave or by dropping the sealed bag in boiling water. DEVELOPING LANDSCAPE TO CONSERVE WATER

With the recent rains it's easy to forget that many long-range forecasts still call for extended hot, dry weather throughout the summer. Homeowners and others involved in landscape development should focus on water conservation.

Water conservation can be practiced in all areas of landscape development and maintenance, including plant selection, irrigation practices and equipment, and soil preparations. The practices can be aesthetic as well as practical.

Homeowners can lower their landscape water usage in several ways:

- Using native and adapted plants. Native plants often have on existing growth conditions and reduce the need for extra irrigation. Many plants have been introduced that show adaptability to soil and temperature conditions.

- Taking advantage of innovations in irrigation practices and equipment. The landscape irrigation businesses experiencing a revolution with new timing devices, low pressure systems, drip irrigation and other highly specialized water devices focusing on more efficient water usage. Irrigation systems and small ponds and fountains also can effectively use water as an aesthetic addition to landscape.

- Using mulches for insulation. By providing an insulating layer between the sun and soil, mulches prevent rapid drying and lower soil temperature in hot weather, which keeps the top soil from crusting or hardening. Low-cost materials such as hay, grass clippings, bark and pine needles are excellent for mulching and can add appeal with texture and color.

- Properly preparing the soil. When soil has been loosened and improved with plenty of organic material, such as peat, pine bark or compost, it will hold significantly more moisture and release it over a longer period of time. However, organic materials break down over time and need to be supplemented. A compost pile can be a good source of these materials, allowing the homeowner to recycle leaves, grass clippings and other waste to improve the soil.

These are just a few practices that homeowners can use to significantly reduce water usage in their outdoor environment. For more information, contact the Wheeler County Extension Agent, Kenny Brdecko at 826-5243.

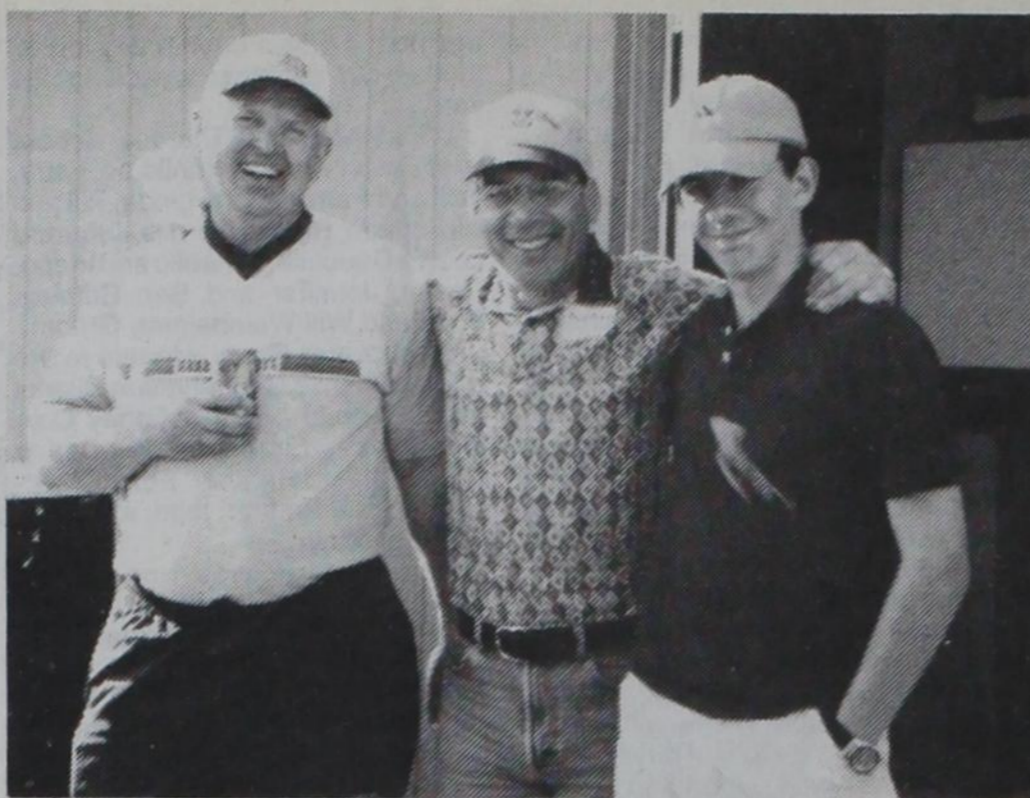

The Forgotten Faces of Medicare

A young woman with a promising career in high-tech lost virtually everything she had, including the company stock options, when the pressures of a 60 hour work week became too much, and she was hospitalized and diagnosed with mental illness. She wiped out her savings because no one bothered to tell her that she was eligible for Social Security and would become eligible for Medicare. But even after she happened to find out about her right to receive Social Security Disability Insurance, she was unable to get certain Medicaid benefits for low-income Medicare recipients because the state gave her information from which the only logical conclusion was that these benefits were solely for the elderly.

Indeed, when we think about Medicare, we think of our nation as an aging population of baby boomers in need of adequate health care. We think of the importance of having health care coverage for our grandparents and for our future. We think of how we have earned the right to Medicare by paying into Social Security throughout our careers. We think of Medicare as part of our retirement benefits package. We see our own faces with slightly noticeable wisps of gray hair and wrinkles setting in.

We invariably forget, however, that Medicare is not solely for the elderly, but also for hundreds of thousands of persons with disabilities under age 65. That's right, Medicare is a health insurance plan that we pay for through Social Security during our working careers not only for our retirement, but also in the event that we become disabled before retiring.

is that there is help available for low-income Medicare recipients to pay the costs associated with Medicare. These programs are known as QMB (Qualified Medicare Beneficiaries), SLMB (Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries), QI-1 (Qualifying Individuals), QI-2, and QDWI (Qualified Disabled Working Individuals). These programs pay for some or all of the various costs associated with Medicare, including the high premiums

and deductibles. They are designed for low-income Medicare recipients who have few resources. Some of these programs have been in effect for over 11 years but, like people with disabilities, have been forgotten or ignored. Millions of people across America are eligible, but not receiving the QMB assistance.

Very few eligible Texans are enrolled in the QMB programs. Hundreds of thousands of our citizens, persons with disabilities as well as the elderly, our neighbors, friends, and loved ones are struggling to pay for health care costs that are supposed to be covered through Medicaid. The U.S. Congress earmarked millions of dollars to help individuals with the expenses of Medicare, and our State should take a more active role in the disbursement of those funds.

We would like to think of Medicare recipients as only a gray-haired couple in a Norman Rockwell painting. The reality is that this is not the true face of many Medicare recipients. The forgotten but true faces of Medicare are of individuals, young and old, who cannot afford Medicare even though they need it the most because of their disability or because of deteriorating health due to age. The forgotten faces of Medicare are those of the middle-aged woman who is afraid to leave her house because of her mental illness, the young man in the wheelchair whose speech is slurred by paralysis, and the elderly lady on the street corner. They are our sisters, brothers, parents and grandparents. People with disabilities and the elderly have earned the right to Medi-
