## CIRCUS SCHEDULED WED. EVE.

## AREA ELECTION RESULTS ARE LISTED

Wheeler. A heavier voter turn-out than in recent years saw the re-election of Wheeler

Mayor Louis C. Stas, and Councilmen Bobby Vanpool, David Cross, and Joe D. Montgomery. Number of votes tallied were as follows: Stas, 214; Vanpool, 239; Cross, 217; and Montgomery, 216.

Newcomer Chris Gateley won a 3 year term on the Wheeler School Board over incumbent Don Whiteley, 221 to 114 for Position 1. In Position 2, unopposed Betty Hennard received 305 votes. Dr. Mike Smith retained Position 3, with 229 votes, over Lonnie Shelton's 106.

Re-elected to his position on the Wheeler Hospital Board, was John C. Vise, who was unopposed.

According to workers at the polls, many citizens thought that elections for sheriff and other county offices were being held Saturday, and this accounted for the large number of voters which was more than three times the usual number.

KELTON. Eleven voters re-elected Gary Clemens and installed Linda Calcote as trustees on the Kelton School Board.

Also elected was T.G. Puryear, who will serve as the Kelton community's representative on the North Wheeler County District Hospital Board.

BRISCOE. Briscoe voters chose Barbara Meadows and Leonard Powledge, Jr., to fill two three-year terms on their school board. Meadows had 86 votes, and Powledge (incumbent), 76. Also receiving votes were Ray Hudson with 46 votes, and several write-in candidates.

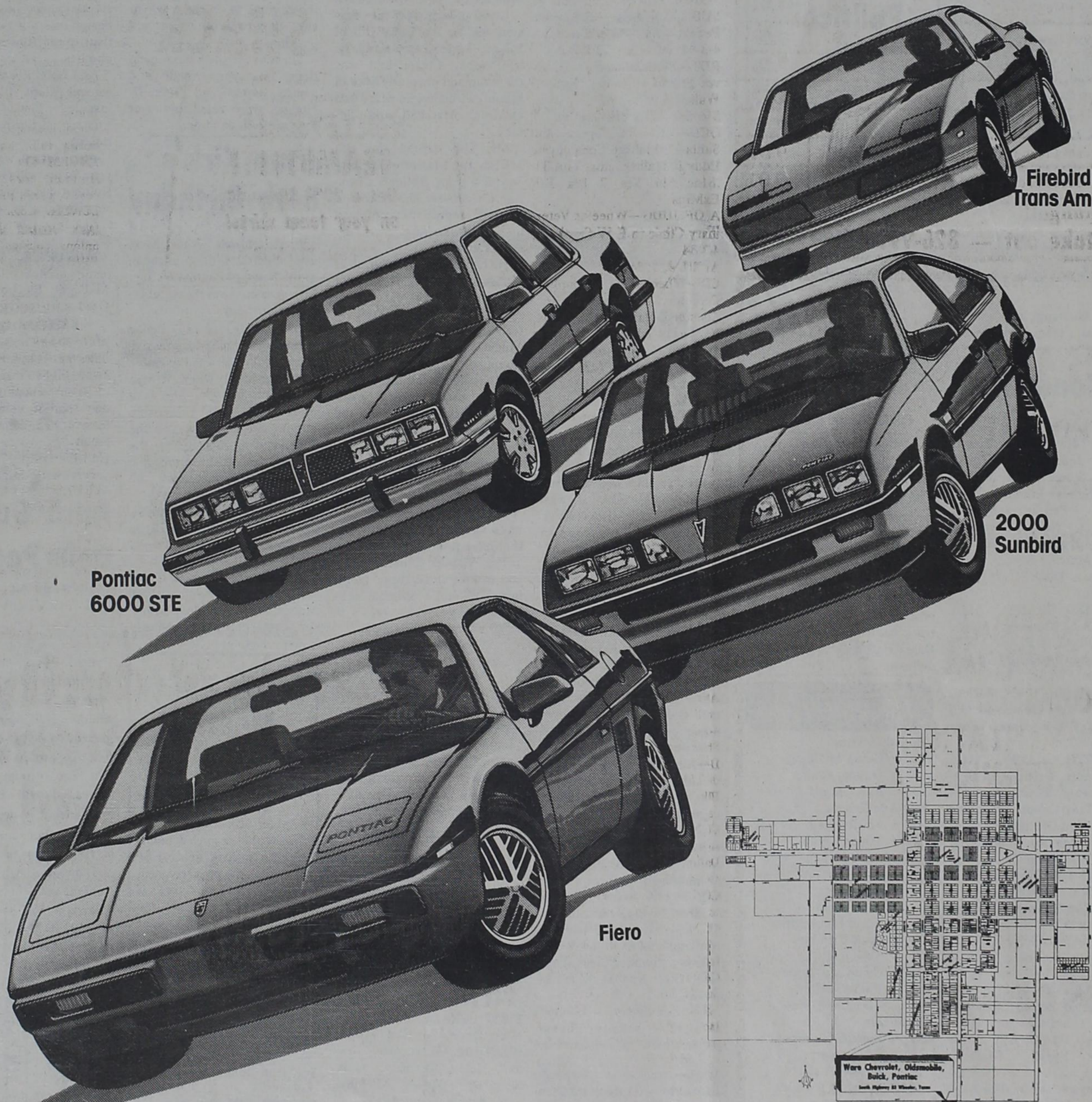

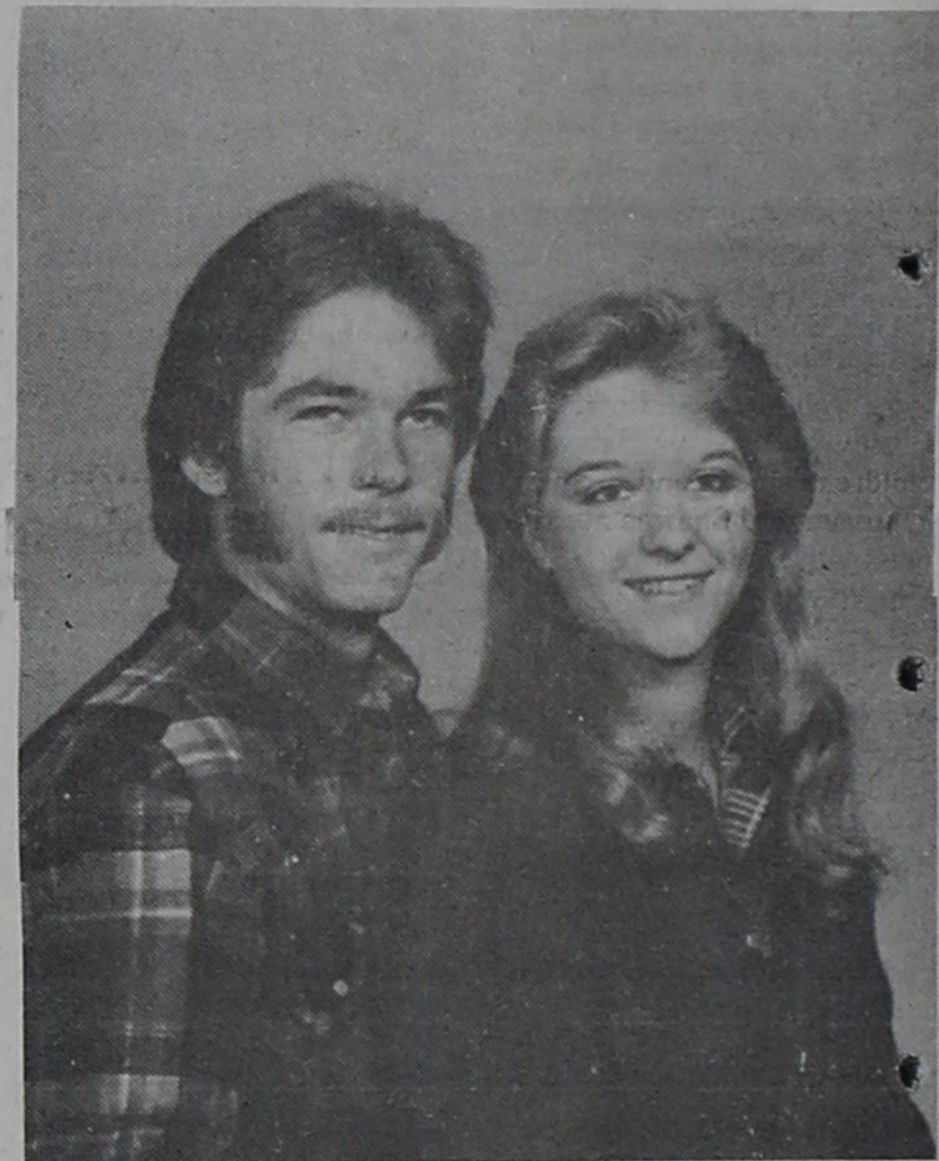

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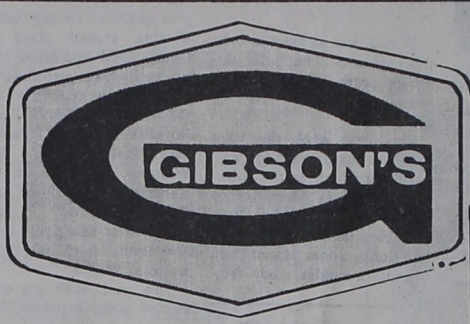

### Are Frozen Foods As Nutritious As Fresh?

Fresh produce is wonderful, but not necessarily better than frozen fruits and vegetables.

For some reason, many people have the idea that frozen food is nutritionally inferior to fresh produce.

It's true that some vitamins and minerals will be lost in processing, but they are also lost by storing fresh food too long and poor cooking methods.

All "fresh" foods, for example, are not equally fresh. If you picked a fresh vegetable from your garden, brought it directly to your kitchen and served it immediately without cooking, it would probably be higher in vitamins than its frozen counterpart.

But the "fresh" vegetable that traveled by truck across the country, sat at room temperature in the grocery store for several days, spent more days in your refrigerator and then was overcooked, probably would not measure up to a frozen product.

Among all methods of food preservation, freezing is one of the least destructive to nutrients.

However, some vitamins can be lost in the processing that occurs before freezing, such as washing, slicing and blanching.

Keeping the nutrients in frozen foods is largely a matter of making sure the temperature is cold enough. Supermarket freezers are designed to maintain temperatures below 0 degrees F. You should keep your home freezer equally cold.

At this temperature, vitamin C in foods will remain virtually the same for a year or longer.

Vitamins are actually lost far more rapidly at temperatures above freezing. The fresh broccoli and leafy green vegetables you keep in the refrigerator will lose half of their vitamin C in five days. At a room temperature of 68 degrees, fresh spinach will lose half of its vitamin C in two days.

Frozen orange juice concentrate is very stable and has only about one percent less vitamin C than fresh orange juice. But one study of refrigerated orange juice sold in cartons found they contained 30 to 64 percent less vitamin C than fresh.

Overcooking food will also cause high nutrient loss. In most cases, the greatest loss occurs during the cooking at home, rather than the storage or commercial processing.

To minimize the loss of vitamin C, folic acid and other heat-sensitive vitamins, don't cook vegetables any longer than absolutely necessary.

It's also best to cook in very little water or steam foods to reduce the loss of nutrients that dissolve in water. If you must cook directly in water, use the cooking water or canning liquid to prepare other foods such as soup or gravy, rather than throwing it away.

Freezing leads to some minimal nutrient loss, but it also provides us with year-round supplies of foods that are close to fresh and sometimes even more nutritious.

### How Nutritious Are Processed Foods?

How do processed foods compare with fresh in terms of nutrient content?

To find out, the National Food Processors Association Research Laboratories has been testing the nutrient content of canned, fresh, and frozen foods prepared for the dinner plate. This research shows that differences in nutrient contents of fruits and vegetables are small regardless of processing or preparation methods.

In a few instances, certain nutrients are present at higher levels in cooked fresh vegetables. In the NFPA study however, fresh vegetables were analyzed within a day or two of harvest. No attempt was made to determine nutrient losses associated with shipping, handling and home storage of raw produce.

The study also shows that when prepared, there is little meaningful difference between the nutrient contents of canned and frozen vegetables, including vitamins A and C.

Other studies have shown that canned or cured meats are as good nutritionally as comparable cuts of fresh meat cooked at home. Two nutrients that are in short supply in the American diet—iron and zinc—are well retained in commercial processing in the form most readily used by the body.

Seafoods prepared for the table also have few nutrient changes. In general, frozen and canned seafoods retained from 75% to 100% of the nutrients found in raw seafood.

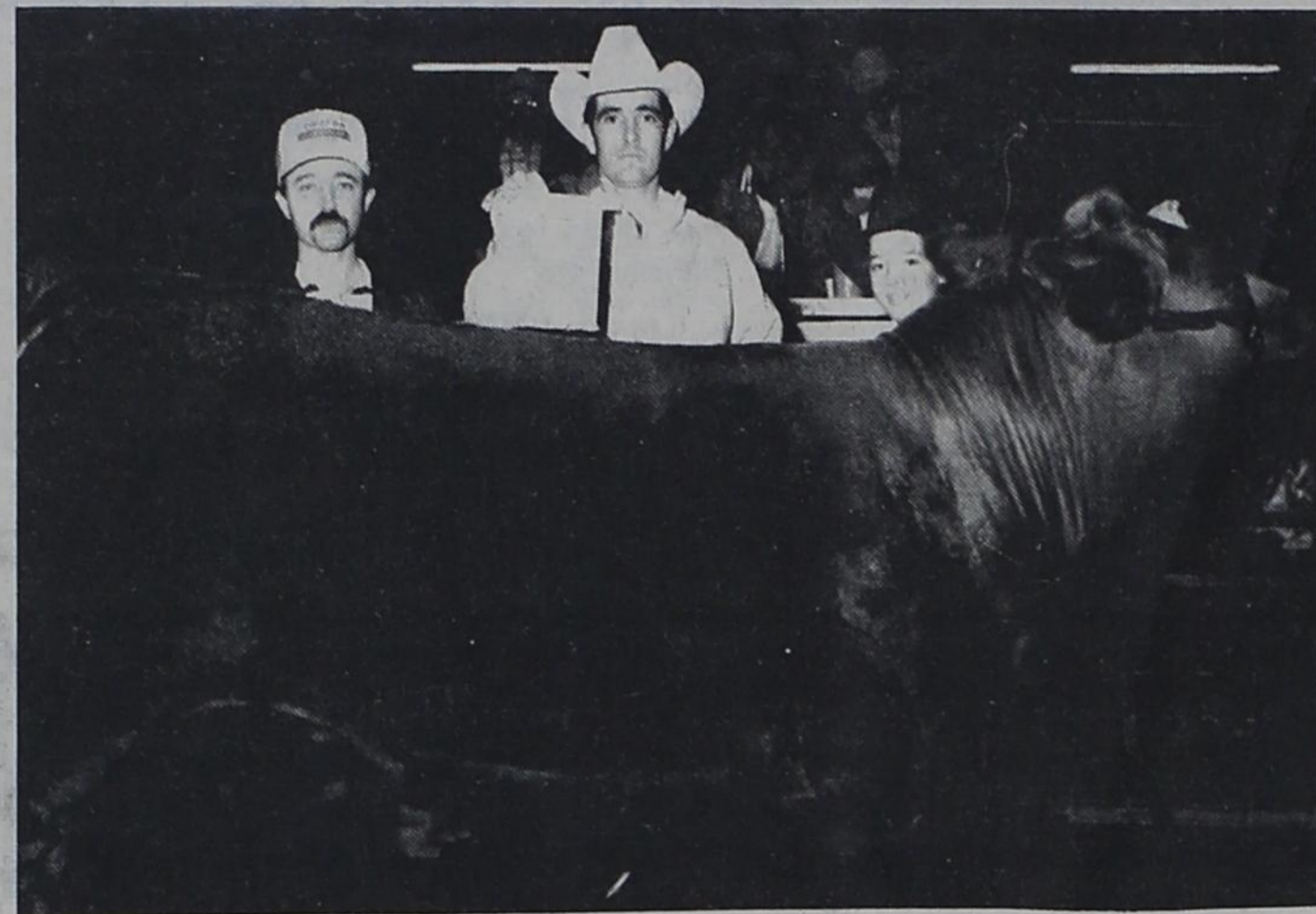
