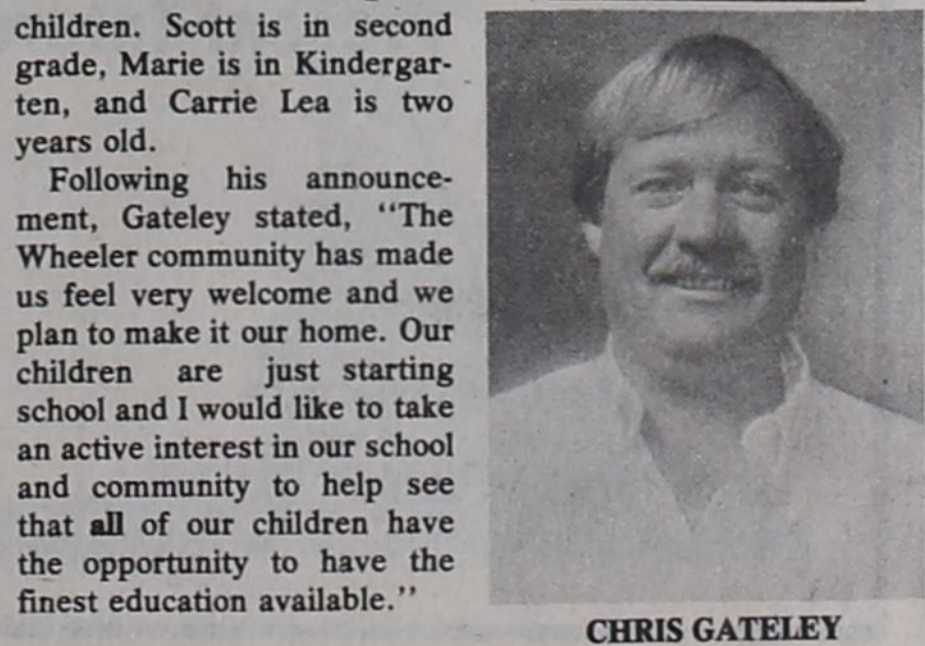
Introducing Chris Gateley

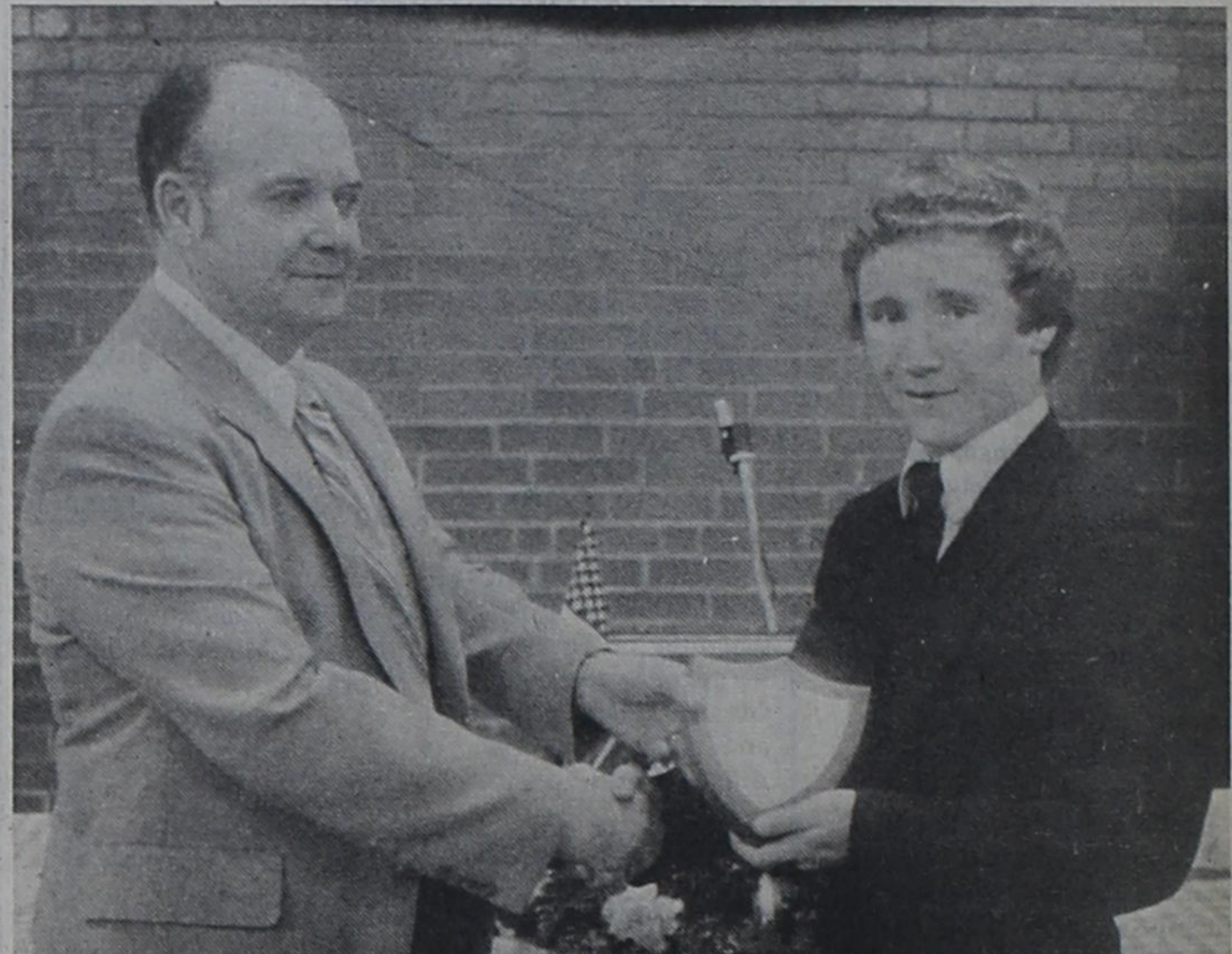
Rites Read For Frances Matthews

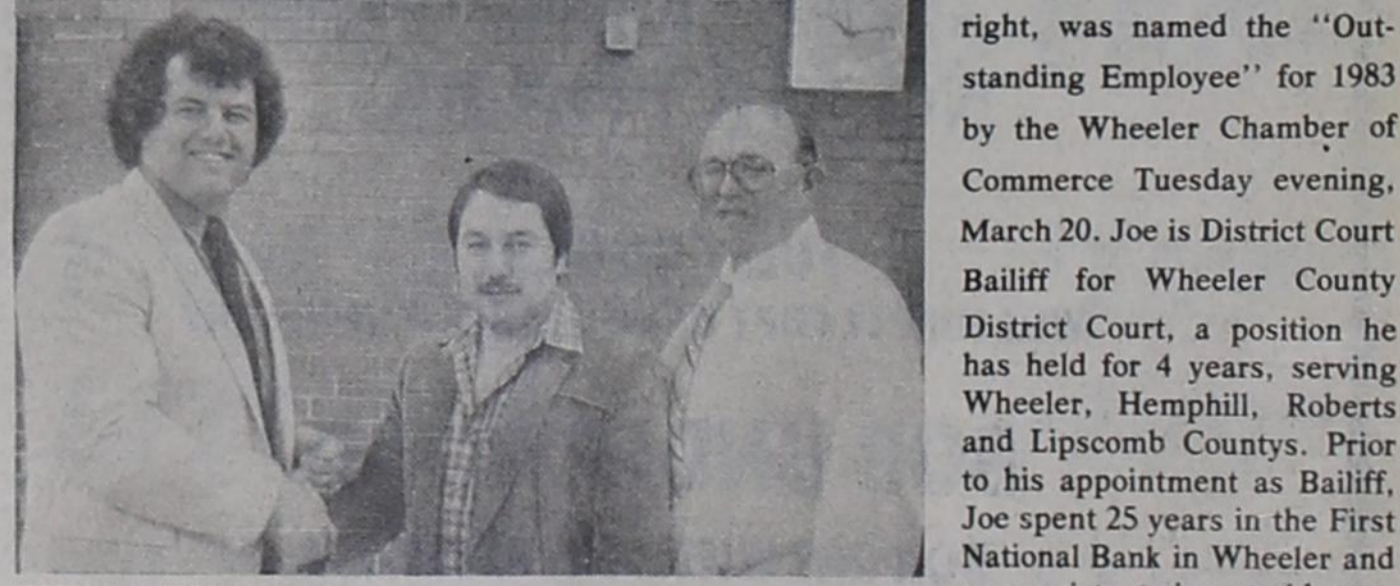

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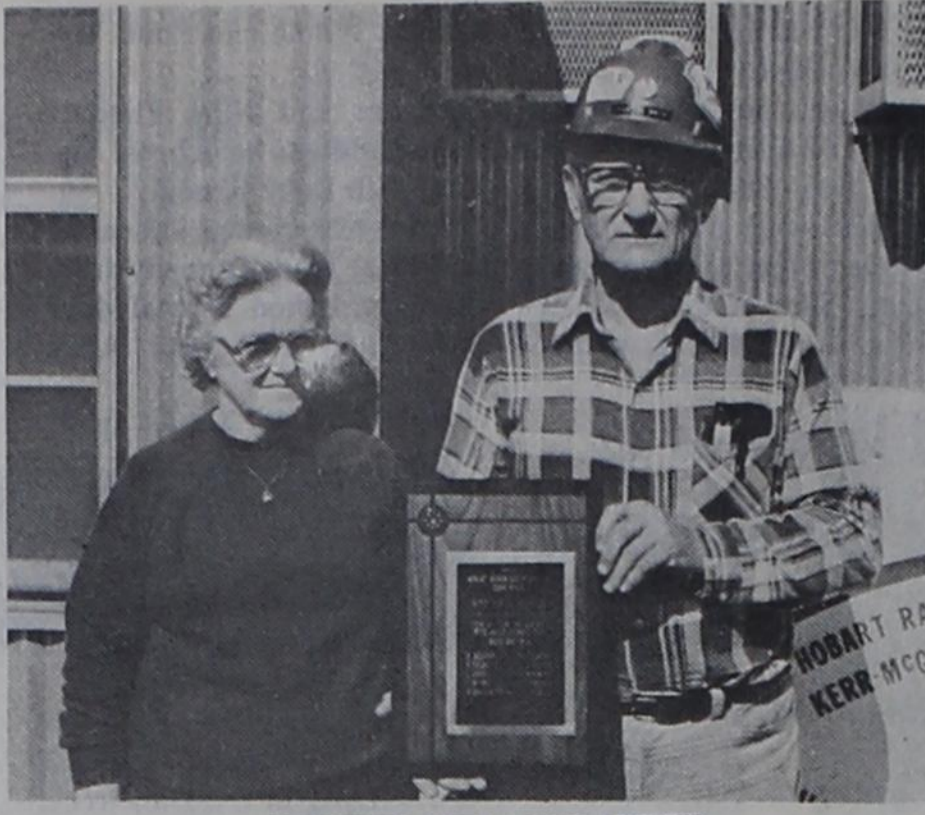
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DOREEN AND ROY BARKER Receives Forty Year Plaque

COUNTY AGENTS Report

JOE DON KING County Extension Agent

Dryland farming—that's what most farmers do in the Panhandle of Texas. In fact, dryland farmers outnumber irrigated farmers by at least two to one. Because of this, Research and Extension Specialists at the Texas A&M Center at Amarillo and the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland will present a Dryland Crop Symposium on March 28. Dr. G.B. Thompson, Research Director at the Amarillo facility, says the event will start at 9:30 a.m. at the Amarillo Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. "We invite farmers and agribusiness people to attend the symposium because dryland yields can be increased considerably by adopting the latest methods proven by research", Thompson said.

The program will start with a history of dryland research by Dr. B.A. Stewart, Director of the USDA Research Laboratory at Bushland. The keynote speaker is Arnold King from the Soil Conservation Service Technical Center in Ft. Worth, Texas, who will discuss "Controlling Erosion on Dryland". Dr. Paul Unger, USDA Soil Scientist, next on the program will discuss research showing the value of stored water for crop yields. Reggie Jones, another USDA researcher, will describe his recent research on keeping water on the land with economical systems of furrow dikes and mini-benches. The morning program will be well rounded out with a discussion of herbicides and machinery used for minimum tillage by Ron Allen, USDA Agricultural Engineer.

In the afternoon, Paul Gross District Extension Agent, will moderate discussions on producing dryland crops. Fertilization will be discussed by Dr. Harold Eck, USDA Soil Scientist. Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Wheat Breeder, who has developed Sturdy, TAM W-101, and TAM 105 will describe wheat varieties for dryland. Producing sorghum on dryland will be discussed by Dr. J.R. Quinby, the Texas A&M Scientist who developed hybrid sorghum.

Research with alternative crops will be discussed by Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Petr has been cooperating with other scientists to examine the feasibility of growing barley, peanuts, and sunflowers, potential new crops for the area. Insect and perennial weed control will be discussed by Drs. Carl Patrick and Allen Wiese. The program will be rounded out by Dr. John McNeill, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Livestock Specialist, who will discuss cattle management on dryland farms and Dr. Wyatt Harman

Research Agricultural Economist, will discuss the economics of dryland farming. The symposium will be sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, USDA Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and USDA Soil Conservation Service. Anyone interested in the

The measure concerns a plan for critical area treatment on 23 eroded areas in Wheeler County. Planned works of improvement include installing grade stabilization structures, constructing diversion terraces above eroded areas, shaping eroded areas, vegetating treated areas, and fencing areas where needed to protect vegetation. This will involve 48 acres of rangeland, 9 acres of cropland, and 46 acres of gullied land. Diversion terraces will be installed on 2 acres of the 9 acres of cropland and will not require a change of land use.

The Notice of a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) has been forwarded to the Environmental Protection Agency and to various Federal, State, and local agencies and interested parties. 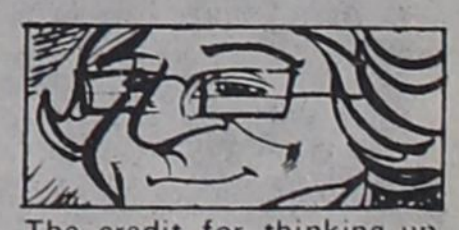
