"You would have nad to have been there to believe it!". Note: I am not saying, "You should have been there".

I am, of course, making eference to the weather and road conditions of last Sunday, February 26. It is surprising the number of local people who found themselves on the roads that particular day.

A call early Sunday morning informed us of broken radio aerials at the Sheriff's office and a possible problem in dispatching the ambulance. It could not have been more than 10 minutes before Shamrock

and delivered him to Sham-Anthony's in Amarillo.

The weather in Wheeler and Shamrock, following 70 degrees Saturday, was chilly with a little moisture falling. As we left Shamrock at 8:50 we were told that it had started to srew in Amarillo, but the roads were in good shape.

Sitting in the back of the ambulance, one is not necessarily aware of changes in driving conditions. I did notice the ground was a little whiter as we traveled further west.

I informed our patient of our progress-we had passed through Groom. Lying on a board on a narrow cot in the back of the ambulance, it is natural to inquire as to how much longer. I began to notice the mile markers did not seem to be passing very fast and looked out front to see WHITE!—visability was zero.

At times we were alone; other times we had a truck in or "front door". Visability was so poor at one point, we could see the top of the truck in front, but could not see the car between.

We considered stopping at the rest stop for the worst to pass. We pulled into the rest area and noticed drifting around the cars already stopped and decided parking was the wrong thing to do. We pulled back onto the main highway behind a truck and several cars and made it the remaining miles with only occasional "white-outs".

We delivered our patient at

St. Anthony's around noon.

The original plans were to leave Lee in Amarillo and I was to bring the ambulance back to Wheeler; in her effort to meet Lee in Amarillo, Pam and kids had gotten stranded at Groom. When we realized how bad the road conditions were, we had no radio contact due to power failures and could not radio back to stop

We killed some time in Amarillo for the worst of the road conditions to pass before starting back. The return was slow, often having to stop and wait for some unknown reason before we could continue. Not to worry, at 7 mph it would only take somewhere around

14 hours to get home. We made the distance to Groom and located Pam and the kids. The parking area at the Brittain U.S.A. was full and the building and drive was full of people. We picked up our three with vehicle and started on home. I do not know what those travelers and truckers did for the night, but I am sure they did not make it

on to Amarillo. The west bound lanes of I-40 were solid trucks and carssome crossways, some jackknifed, a few on the sides and a few in the median.
