Serious, single stressful events and pile-up situations call for creative planning to master family stress. Experts in family relations have identified three steps in mastering stress as recognizing the symptoms, finding the sourdeal with the stress.

Family members display warning signals when they experience stress. Among them may be sleeplessness, irritability or physical symptoms, such as headaches, fatigue, or backaches. Symptoms show up in the family. To recognize that your entire family is under stress rather than thinking that only one
