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

Strengthening Families: Dealing with Family Stress

Stress is a family affair. One family member experiencing stress sends ripples through the entire family.

Often the most stressful times occur when a family experiences the pile-up of many stressful events. One farm family experienced a day piled high with stressful happenings—the farmer's hay was rained on for the third time, his truck's transmission went out, and his prize Holstein got sick. The entire family was affected by these events.

Serious, single stressful events and pile-up situations call for creative planning to master family stress. Experts in family relations have identified three steps in mastering stress as recognizing the symptoms, finding the sources, and then taking action to deal with the stress.

Family members display warning signals when they experience stress. Among them may be sleeplessness, irritability or physical symptoms, such as headaches, fatigue, or backaches. Symptoms such as frequent parent-child conflicts, breakdowns in communications, fault-finding and sarcasm, or hostile behaviors among family members, also show up in the family. To recognize that your entire family is under stress rather than thinking that only one member has a problem is an important first step.

You will often have trouble finding the source of family stress, since it can come from both expected and unexpected sources. You might not consider events that you look forward to or plan for as stressful; yet they can bring change and disruption to your life. The long-awaited birth of a baby, for example, can be a source of stress for a family.

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Texas Roses: Where, When And How To Plant Them

Roses add beauty and elegance to any landscape and are easier to plant and grow than most people think.

Locate your rose bed where it will receive at least 6 hours of full sun per day. Heavy shade will produce weak, spindly bushes with few flowers.

Good air circulation is essential, because it aids in the rapid evaporation of morning dew, thereby aiding in disease control. Avoid planting near trees and shrubs having vigorous root systems, since roses are poor competitors against this type of intrusion.

Good drainage is essential, because roses do not like "wet feet." In areas of high rainfall, raised beds may be the best way to provide sufficient drainage.

Panhandle area, planting should take place in mid- or late-February.

If you are planting bare-root roses, soak the roots in a bucket of water for several hours before planting. Dig a hole at least 12-14 inches deep and 16-18 inches wide, depending on the root system's size.

Replace the soil in the hole so that it comes to within 8 inches of the top. Firm the soil with your hands into a cone shape, so that the top of the cone is about 3 inches below the bed level.

Cut off all damaged or broken roots, and trim off the tip of all other roots about 1 inch to encourage new feeder root development. Place the base of the plant on the mound of soil so the roots spread naturally down its slope.

Cover the roots with soil, packing the dirt firmly in place. Fill the hole with water and allow it to drain; then fill it with water again and drain again. Finally, fill the hole with soil, mounding it slightly above the bed level to allow for settling.

When planting is complete, the rose canes should be cut back to 10-12 inches above the ground, though this may already have been done by the nursery.

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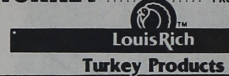
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
