\$400 TO BE AWARDED SAT.

The second \$400 of the \$2300 Christmas Drawings will be given away Saturday, December 10, 1983, the third and fourth drawings will be Saturday, December 17, and Saturday 24. The drawing will begin at 2:30 p.m. on the west side of

the square. The Annual Christmas Drawing is again being offered by the progressive merchants of Wheeler. Certificates will be given away during December to the tune of \$2300. The merchants of Wheeler feel this

is one way they can say "Thank You", their customers, for the support you have given them during the year and are giving you a chance to share in the profits.

Participating merchants began giving the drawing tickets on Friday, November 25. Again this year, some of the sponsoring firms will not be giving drawing tickets.

Four drawings will begin each week at 2:30 P.M. the December 17 and 24 drawings will be divided; after a portion of the envelopes are handed out, an intermission will be called and the drawing will resume at 4:30.

TREASURE HUNT

A "treasure hunt" will be underway during the intermission of the drawing. Beginning at 1:00 P.M. on the afternoon of December 17 and 24 members of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce will hand out special numbered tickets. There is no age limit; anyone wishing a ticket may come forward.

At 2:30 each merchant, participating in the "treasure hunt" will be notified of the number to be placed on their gift. From that time until 4:30

DRAWING WINNERS ARE ANNOUNCED

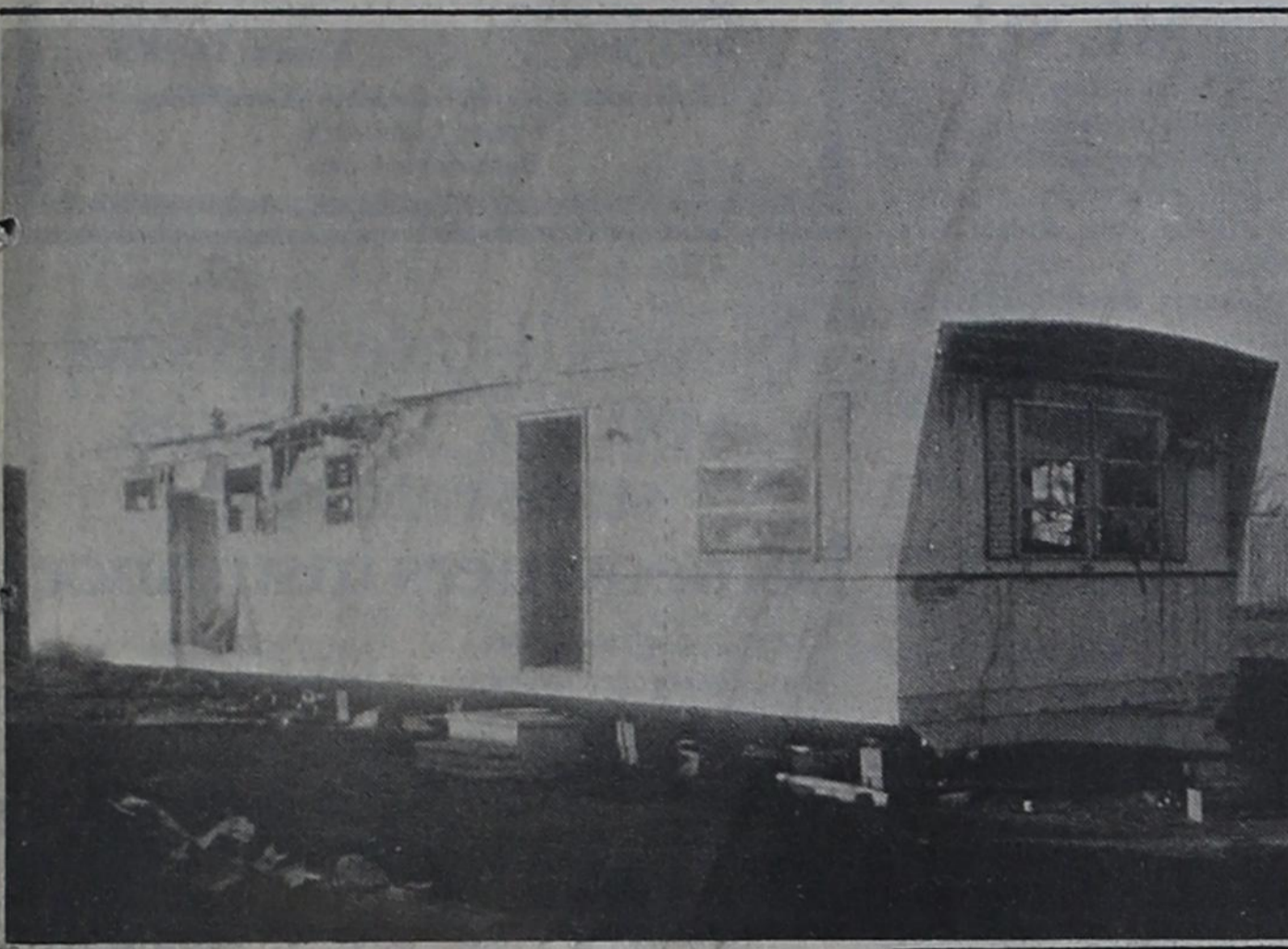
his \$25 "cash" when his name was called.

USDA To Sell Corn

TO DROUGHT AFFECTED FARMERS

Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Richard E Lyng today announced an emergency feed assistance program to distribute Credit Corporation-owned lower grade corn to livestock producers whose feed harvest suffered because of drought, hot weather or related disaster.

To be eligible to buy corn, livestock producers must be located in a county designated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a disaster area due to drought and must have received an emergency Farmers Home Administration loan or be eligible to receive one.

There are approximately 27 million bushels of U.S. No. 4, U.S. No. 5 and Sample grade corn that will be sold to eligible livestock producers. The bulk of this corn is located in Texas, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska and Illinois.

The cost to eligible producers will be 75 percent of the current basic county loan rate for the average quality of available corn in the county where the corn is stored. Producers are responsible for transportation costs to move the corn to their farms.

Producers also need to show that their feed production is inadequate to maintain foundation livestock and poultry during the remainder of the current 90-day feeding period, which begins the day a farmer applies for assistance.

A signup period will be held from Dec. 6 through Dec. 14 at county offices of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, which also will provide producers a list of counties where they may choose to pick up their grain.

Producers should contact ASCS offices for program details and applications for assistance, beginning Dec. 6. At that time, they should present authorization of Farmers Home Administration loan eligibility, if approved, when making application, or provide the county ASCS office with production evidence necessary to make an unofficial eligibility determination.

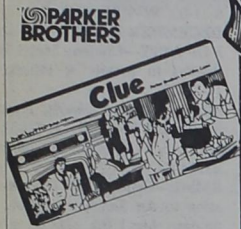

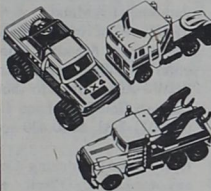



Membership dues are an initial \$25.00 to join, and \$17.50 per month to be paid by draft. #3. Key deposit of \$25.00. Keys to be stamped with a number. #4. A guest may use the facility only in the presence of a member whom he is the guest of. #5. All members and guests must sign the register when they enter the facility, and the guests must register as a guest of a member. This is necessary for insurance purposes. #6. A member who brings a guest is responsible for the guests fee. #7. All guests must pay \$3.00 for each visit. #8. High school students (who are members or guests) may use only on Monday and Thursday, 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. and Sunday, 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. #9. High School students can use the facility on an individual basis by paying \$2.00 on each visit. #10 High school students (Graduates of 8th grade) may belong as members by paying \$10.00 per month by draft only. #11. No one below the age of a high school graduate will be allowed in the center except under high school rules and under family night rules. #12. Saturday night between the hours of 7:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. is designated as family night and a member can take any of his family (of the same gender) as a guest. #13. Reservation of handball courts to be made by personally going to the health center, and entering their name on the board. #14. A court will only be held for a time limit of 10 minutes past a person's reservation time before others are authorized to use it. #15. Time limit in connection with handball courts, if people are waiting, to be one (1) hour. #16. Each member is personally responsible for his key to the facility and shall not loan that key to anyone. #17. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed on the premises. Ninety percent of these rules are broken daily, some members have never followed the rules. Several members have allowed their keys to be copied. Consequently, several non-members use the facility.

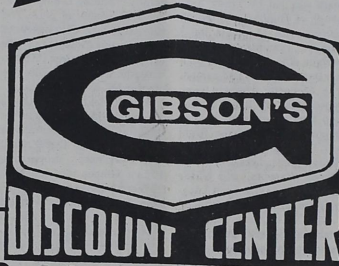

Street shoes are worn by the same ones complaining of dirty courts. While trash cans are placed in prominent places, trash is still thrown all over everywhere. Those who frequent the health center complain about how dirty it is, but do they try to pick up after themselves? Do they go by the rules? Do they really understand the privilege they have?

Wheeler is very fortunate to have a facility such as this. Most communities of this size do not have health centers. True, it is not the best in the world, but why? Because the people who go there do not try to go by the honor system. Members are free to come and go at any hour day or night. If the members go by the honor system, they will protect their privilege of having a health center while at the same time protecting the center itself.

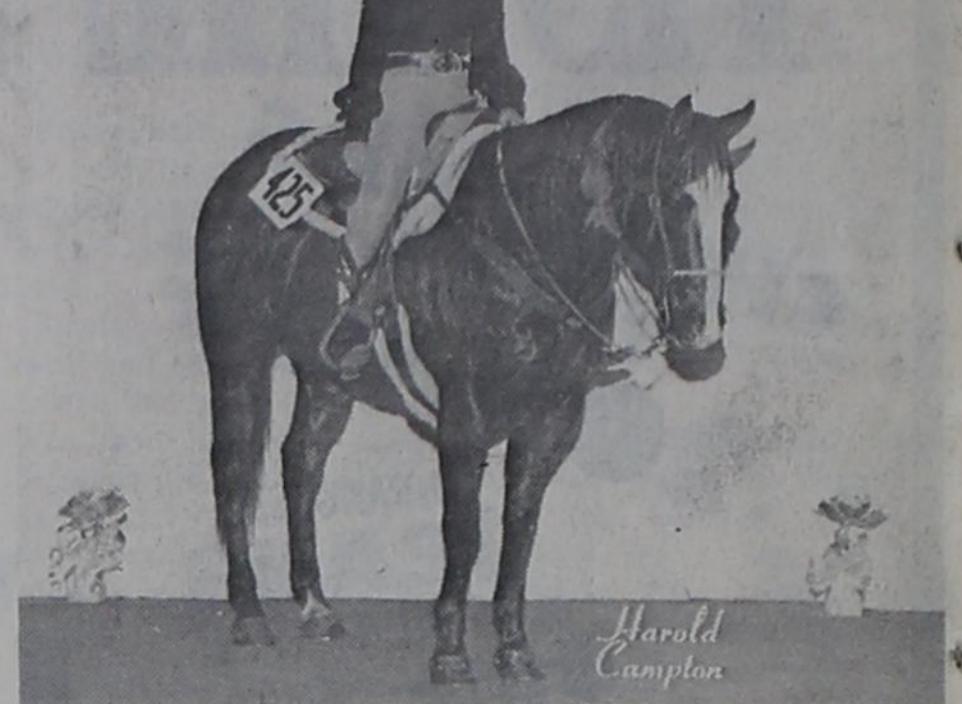
