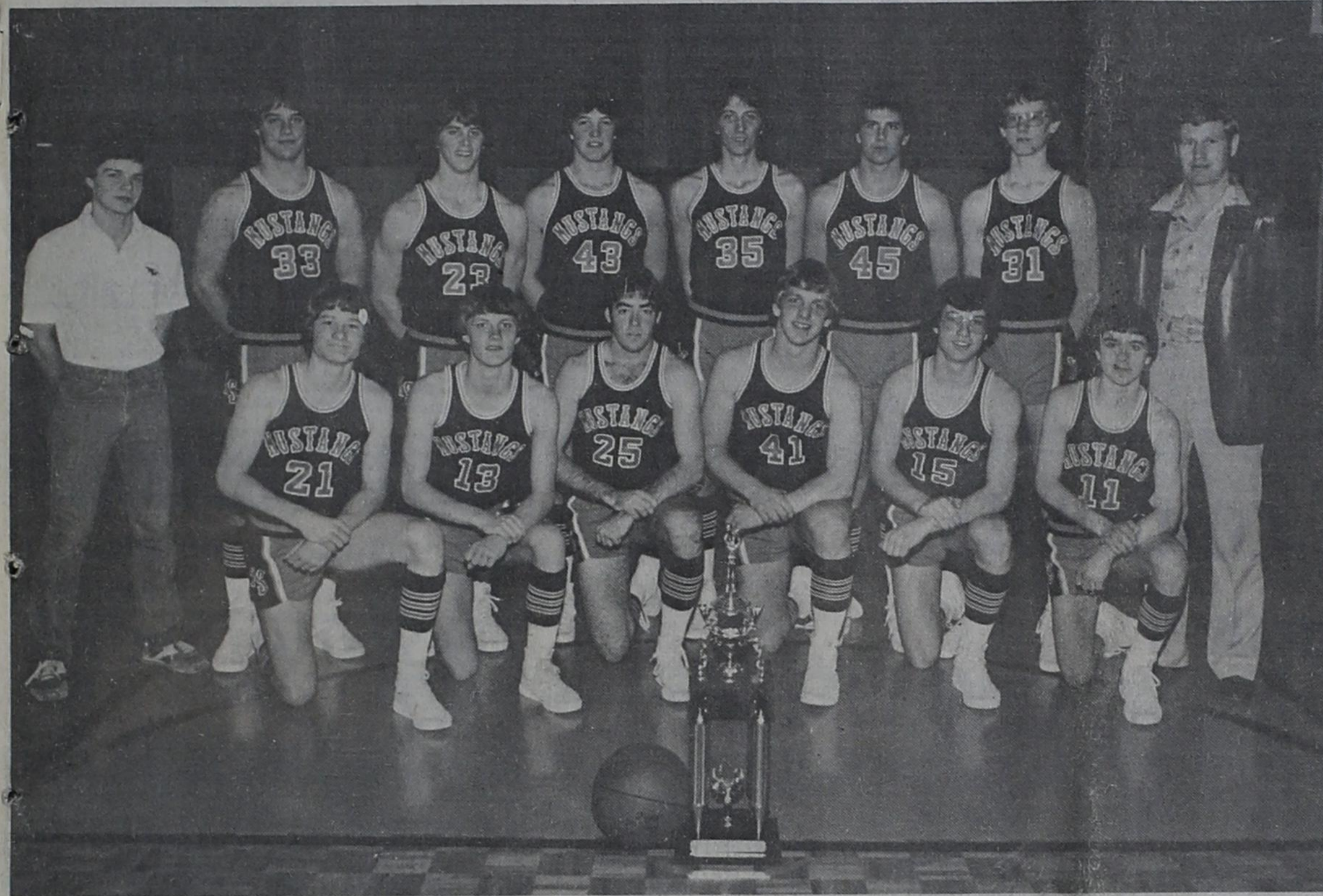

improve the quality of life of those who live here."

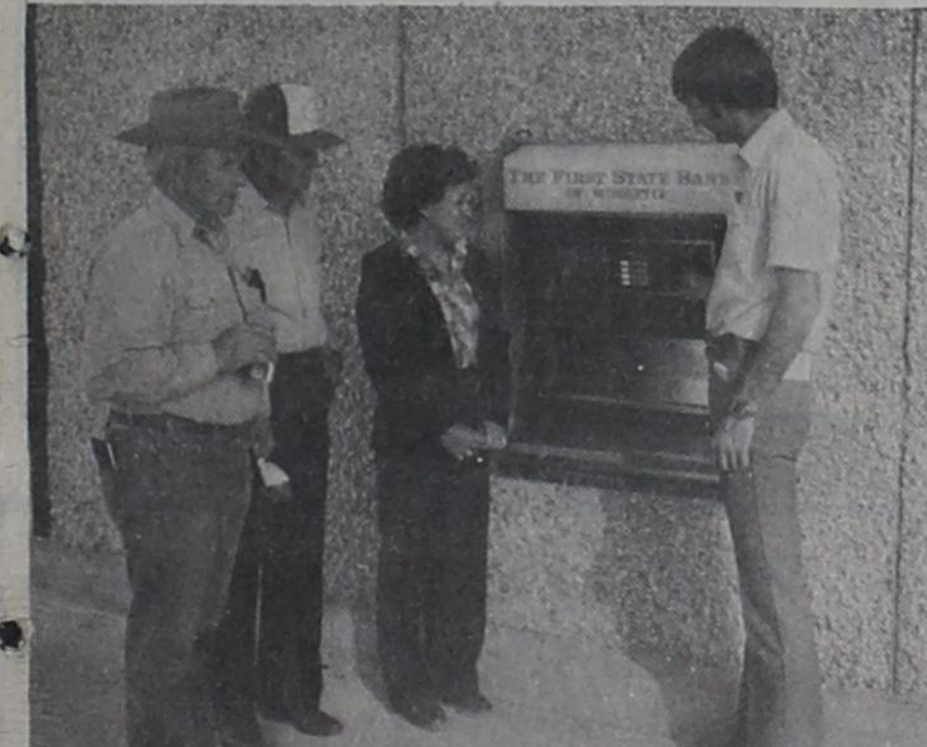

## RAPE CRISIS SEMINAR SCHEDULED FOR MAR 14

**Children's Program**  
March 14 7PM Wheeler School Cafeteria

"Speak Up, Say No!" is a 6-minute filmstrip, which teaches children how to avoid sexual abuse. The filmstrip features a delightful little character, Penelope Peabody Mouse, who in a positive, nurturing way teaches children not only to beware of strangers, but to recognize and avoid sexual abuse from trusted friends.

In America today, there is a one-in-four chance that a little girl will be a victim of incest, child molestation, or rape by the time she is 18. There is a one-in-seven chance for little

boys by age 16.

A high percentage of this sexual abuse comes from people a child knows (80% and more). Too many children will comply with inappropriate requests because they are uninformed, or because they are unlucky enough to be in the presence of an adult who takes advantage of the child's innocence, needs, or fears.

A child's best defense against sexual abuse is:

1. a sense of his/her own power as a person
2. knowledge of what constitutes child sex abuse.
3. resources available for support and protection.

The Rape Crisis and Sexual Abuse Service of Amarillo presents an hour long program for children and their parents. The program is designed to inform children on what to do if they are ever in a situation where they feel powerless or afraid about an adult touching their body. The program also tells children how to avoid being a victim, through games and role playing.

\* Children should be aware that sexual abuse is not their fault and that it's okay for them to report incidents to their parents, teachers, counselors, police, or a trusted adult.

\* Children need to be informed that they have rights, and that those rights extend to their bodies. Talking about these things takes away the helplessness that comes with being a child and that is multiplied by being a victim.

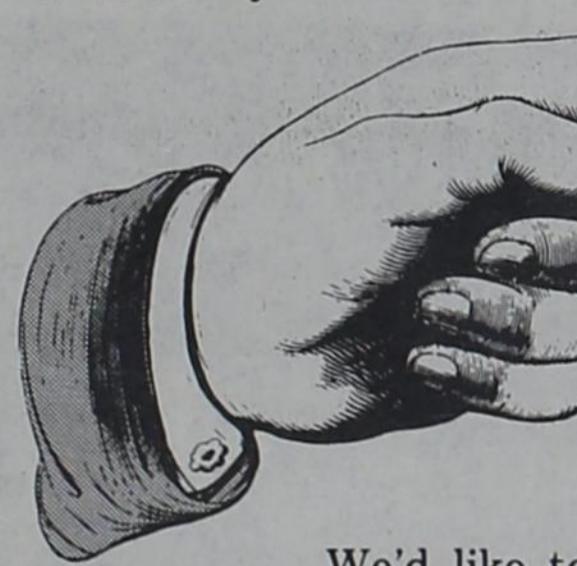

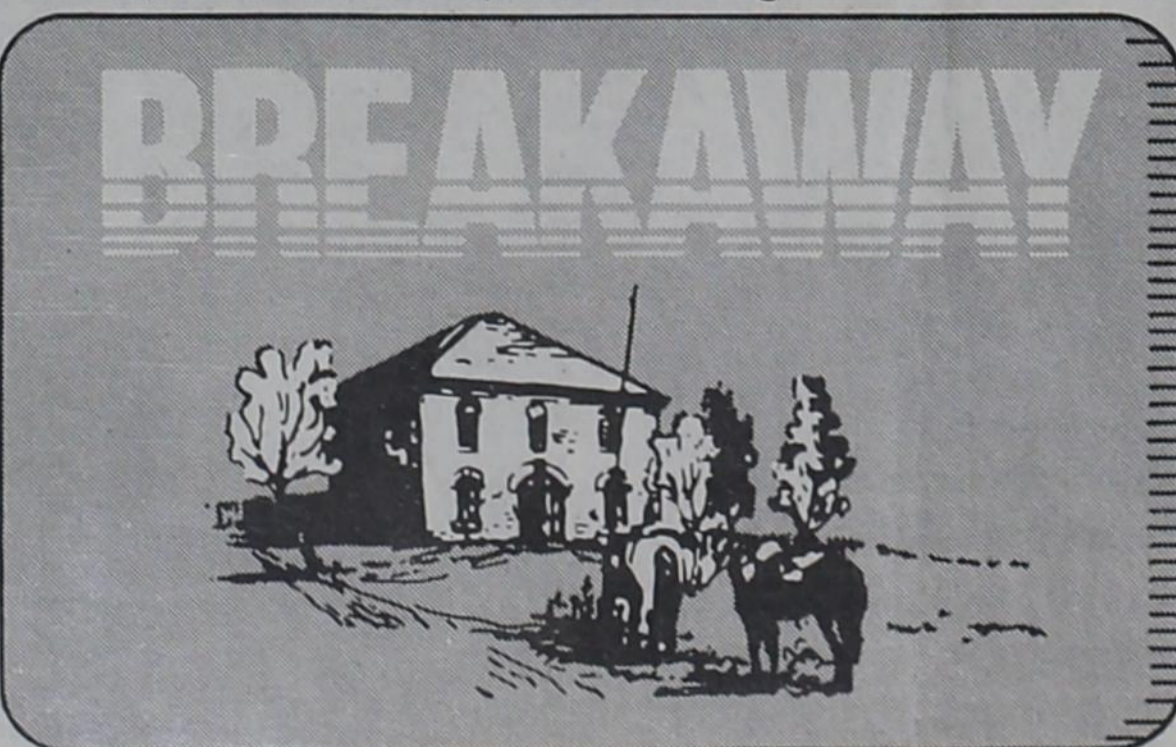

## PESTICIDE

**Joe Don King**  
Pesticide products containing the active ingredients 2, 4-D (2,4-dichlorophenoxyacetic acid); 2, 4-DB (4-(2,4-dichlorophenoxy) butyric acid); 2,4-DP (2-(2,4-dichlorophenoxy) propionic acid); 2,4, 5-T (2,4, 5-trichlorophenoxyacetic acid); MCPA (2-methyl-4-chlorophenoxyacetic acid); slivex (2-(2,4, 5-trichlorophenoxy) propionic acid); and dicamba (3,6-dichloro-o-anisic acid); propanil (3', 4'-dichloro-propionanilide) and arsenic acid (orthoarsenic acid), alone or in mixtures, when distributed in containers of a capacity larger than one quart for liquid material or two pounds for dry or solid material (if marketed using metric measures—containers larger than one liter or one kilogram, respectively) have been classified as state-limited-use pesticides by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA).

Specialty fertilizer mixtures containing one or more of these active ingredients packaged in containers of 50 pounds or less that are labeled for ornamental use and registered with the Texas Feed and Fertilizer Control Service for sale and distribution in this state are exempt from the classification as state-limited-use pesticides.

Products for home use containing one or more of these active ingredients requiring no further mixing or dilution before use and packaged in containers with a capacity of one gallon or less for liquid formulations or four pounds or less for dry or solid materials are also exempt from the classification as state-limited-use pesticides.

State-limited-use pesticides and restricted-use pesticides may only be sold to certified applicators, persons acting under the direct supervision of a certified applicator, or a licensed dealer. Wheeler County producers who anticipate use of a state-limited-use or restricted-use pesticide and who do not currently hold a private applicator certificate may wish to obtain a certificate from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

A person is a "private applicator" if the person uses or supervises the use of a restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity 1) on property owned or rented by the person or the person's employer or under the person's general control; or 2) on the property of another person if applied without compensation other than the trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities. Persons meeting these qualifications may obtain certification as private applicators from the Texas Department of Agriculture through completion of an approved training program conducted by the county Extension agent or through home study using materials available at the county Extension office. Those wishing to obtain a license through the home study method may contact Don King County Extension Agent for the study material.

Many persons holding private applicator certificates responded to a 1981 Texas Department of Agriculture request to "recertify" and in so doing received a current private applicator certificate which may be identified by a two-digit prefix—81, 82 or 83—of the certificate number (example: 81-17952). Initial issue certificates (certificate number not preceded by a two-digit number) are considered valid according to a TDA source, however, TDA encourages holders of such certificates to submit an "application" for renewal. A limited supply of TDA Application for Private Applicator Certificate Renewal is available at the county Extension office.

### COMPARE PRODUCTS BEFORE BUYING

Considering a major product—a car or appliance—that costs a significant amount of money? It's wise to search for information about the product before buying.

Gathering information about a product can be rewarding for several reasons.

1) You can increase your purchasing power by making the best buy for your wants and needs (not always the most expensive).

2) You can make an intelligent decision and be pleased with the consequences.

3) There is a social payoff. Not only will your purchasing power be increased but also your intelligent search for information may have a disciplinary effect on sellers, inducing them to offer better products on better terms to all buyers.

4) You may influence others to look for information.

### PRODUCT INFORMATION

For objective information concerning features, operating procedures, use and care, look at Extension Service FACT sheets on various products. Brand names and prices will not be included, but the sheets will give general guidelines explaining how the product works.

For price comparison, brand names, and ratings, consult "Consumer Reports," "Consumer's Research Magazine," and specialized publications such as "Popular Photography."

To determine if a product will do what you want—and whether you can care for it, read the use-and-care booklets available and labels attached.

If objective information is not available, answer these questions:

1) Are prices for the product fixed by the manufacturer or retailers—and is there any way to buy the products more economically.

2) Is the product the same at a discount store as it is in a specialty store or a more conveniently located store? It's possible that the SAME product may have different brand names and prices.

3) Have I made valid comparisons on prices and qualities of different brands.

### READ WARRANTIES

Other sources of information you may want to consider are the warranties of a product. Is the seller offering a full or

limited warranty? Obviously, a full warranty is a quick way you're getting a lot of protection.

### BUYING-TRIP

Deal in a market with the largest number of sellers, so you'll have a better chance to compare answers to questions, prices and quality.

When there is a trade-in, always ask the seller to make you a favorable price.

### ASK ABOUT DEALER

For information about the firm or business if you are in doubt, check with your Better Business Bureau. Their role is to combat unethical and dishonest business and advertising practices.

### CONSUMER 'MUSTS'

Complete and accurate consumer information about product prices and quality is a "must". When consumers have complete and accurate information on prices and qualities, the importance of price discrimination and product differentiation as sources of variations in prices and quality would be reduced considerably.

## MINIMUM TILLAGE FARMING

As the cost of production continues to climb, farmers are looking for ways to produce crops more efficiently.

One practice that can help cut cost is minimum tillage farming. By using chemicals to control weeds, farmers can reduce the number of trips over fields needed to produce a crop.

In addition to the obvious savings in fuel, labor and equipment wear, minimum tillage farming also conserves moisture and reduces soil erosion.

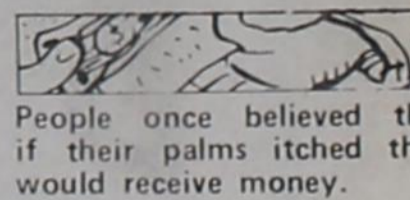
Dr. Frank Petr, Area Extension Agronomist, will be in Wheeler on Thursday, March 10, to discuss minimum tillage farming. The meeting will begin at 7:30 pm in the District Courtroom.

Dr. Petr will explain how to use minimum tillage in rotation systems with cotton, wheat and sorghum and with continuous wheat. He will also discuss the chemicals that can be used to control weeds.

All interested people are invited to attend this meeting. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to everyone regardless of race, color, socio-economic level, sex or religion.

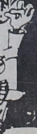
