MUSTANGS CRUSH BOOKER, 34-7

The Wheeler Mustangs and the Booker Kiowas were undefeated when they met last Friday night but the Mustangs left little doubt in the minds of

the 600 fans who has the best team in District 1-A as they easily whipped the Kiowas 34-7.

Building a commanding 19-0

lead at the end of the first quarter, the Mustangs saw two pass interceptions and a lost fumble kill three drives in the second quarter that could have turned the game into a rout by halftime.

Once more it was the relentless ground game of the Mustangs and a smothering defense that was the difference as the Mustangs rolled up 311 yards rushing on the soggy turf and they held the

Kiowas to only 157 yards total offense.

Following a short quick kick that carried only to the Booker 32, the Mustangs quickly scored their first touchdown in six plays with quarterback Steven

Snapp sneaking the final yard. Rodney Bond booted the Mustangs into a 7-0 lead at 7:43 of the first quarter.

Wheeler drove 56 yards for their second six pointer and Ronnie Jones got credit for the

TD as he pounced on a loose ball in the end zone. Darren Grimes fumbled the pigskin at the Booker 2 when hit following a 17 yard run but Jones wrapped around the ball as it

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Canadian's Annual Fall Foliage Festival October 30

Canadian's annual Fall Foliage Festival has been set for Sunday, October 30, and will include a Hobby Show, a tour of two historic homes, food at the Kountry Kitchen, as well as the ever-popular drive at Lake Marvin through the colorful cottonwoods and other foliage.

The annual Hobby Show will

again take place at the City Auditorium, 6 Main Street, and will feature a wide variety of handcrafted goods for sale by the exhibitors; and hobbyists from throughout the Panhandle will display their collections.

Also at the City Auditorium, members of the Women's Service League will be selling hot beef brisket sandwiches, brownies, and beverages, beginning at 11:00. Proceeds will go to the League's various community projects.

Unescorted tours of the drive to Lake Marvin through colorful foliage will draw many visitors all during the weekend. A nature trail at Lake Marvin will be marked, identifying twenty-one of the more conspicuous plants with numbered plaques. There will be no charge to visitors.

Two of Canadian's oldest and most unique homes will be featured in the Tour of Homes. The Abraham Homeplace, at 6th and Cheyenne, is owned by Dr. and Mrs. Malouf Abraham and was built in 1902, one of the first of Canadian's large old homes. Over the years, this three-story structure has been remodeled in Mediterranean style, with graceful arches and verandas, flagstone walks, and walled gardens. The interior boasts an open central staircase, which rises to the second and third floors, and unique carvings on the first floor window and door frames.

Also to be shown is the home of Dr. and Mrs. Teddy Darocha at 6th and Main. Built in 1910, this house is a Colonial Revival of the Edwardian Period, with massive front columns, a veranda, and balcony. Recently, the natural wood has been restored in the interior, replacing carpets, and windows have been decorated with glass curtains of the 1900's style, allowing a light and airy appearance. This home has recently been designated a State Historical Building.

Tickets for the Tour of Homes will be \$2.00 per person, children under 12 free, and will be available at the City Auditorium from 1:00 to 5:00 Sunday afternoon.

Wheeler County Water Supply District Calls

SPECIAL ELECTION NOV. 8

The voters of Wheeler County will be asked to voice their opinion at the polls on Tuesday, November 8. An election has been called by the Wheeler County Water Supply District for the purpose of voting on a "Maintenance Tax for the water district."

The proposed tax is not to exceed \$0.05 per \$100 evaluation. Property valued at \$20,000 would cost the tax person \$10 in water district taxes.

Since the August 13, 1983

election which established the Wheeler County Water Supply District, the authority has been meeting with the Red River Water Authority in the discussion of the Sweetwater Creek project. As the project has been presented to the people, Red River Authority would have full control of the dam, water treatment plant and surrounding area; the local water district would have control and access to the water in the reservoir. The county group requested the oppor-

tunity take full control of the project.

A special meeting of the Red River Authority board of directors was called and a proposition was made to the Wheeler County Water Supply District. The pending water use permit on Sweetwater Creek—if issued by the State of Texas, will be assigned to the county district if they agree to reimburse the Authority for all costs incurred to date.

Indebtedness of the Authority dates back to 1963. Cost include engineering, studies, test drilling and legal fees resulting for the continuing legal actions brought by local landowners against Red River Authority.

The amount is not to exceed \$300,000 according to O.B. "Pete" Burton, president of local board, the Red River

Wheeler was visited by a celebrity on Tuesday, Oct. 25. Dale Robertson, star of the Wells Fargo and other TV series, ran out of gas east of Wheeler and was brought into town. While at Speedi-Mart he was recognized by Duane Baker of Baker Automotive. Robertson purchased his gas and continued his trip to Borger.

The county's voters and taxpayers will be asked to increase their taxes in a special election on Tuesday, Nov. 8. The Wheeler County Water Supply District has decided it would be better to take full control of the Sweetwater Creek Dam project and needs capital to pay Red River Water Authority the money they have been out on the project.

Red River has not set the dollar amount, but is expected to be less than the \$300,000 limit set by the local water district. The expenses will have to be documented.

After visiting with Pete Burton and Kent Sims, I can understand the reason for the election. This vote will determine who has the control of the dam, treatment plant and recreation on and around the lake. A "no" vote will not stop the efforts to obtain the permit and complete the project; it will leave the project as it has been since 1963—Red River will control everything except the water.

I also learned the Greenbelt Lake was built and has operated in the way proposed by the local board.

If you have a question, ask one of the board members, or let the Times know and we will see that the question is answered.

Wheeler and the surrounding area received some much needed moisture last week. The rainfall over a five day period measured 3.67" for Wheeler. Shamrock reported 4.53" for the same period. We were more fortunate than our neighbors to the east floods were a problem in several parts of Oklahoma.

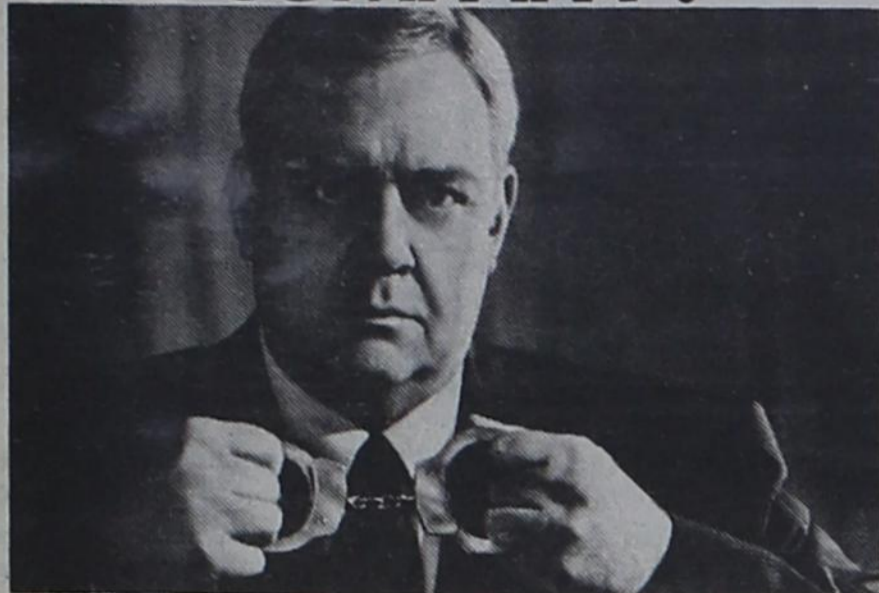

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with rules and orders of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of its intent to re-file evidence and appropriate tariff(s) in support of a request to establish rates for the use of certain complex inside telephone wiring in the amount of \$54.5 million annually. This request was previously a part of the considerations in Docket 5141 and now has been re-docketed as Docket 5420.

Customers who do not own the Complex Inside Wire associated with their Customer Premises Systems (such as PBX and Key Systems), and who utilize Southwestern Bell's wiring after January 1, 1984, could be affected by this request. On January 1, 1984, all of the Customer Premises Systems presently provided by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company will be transferred to a subsidiary of AT&T and that subsidiary of AT&T will be almost exclusively responsible for the charges pursuant to the proposed tariff on January 1, 1984. After January 1, 1984, customers who purchase their Complex Customer Premises Equipment and do not purchase, but continue to use, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's inside wire will be subject to the charges proposed in the tariff.

The proposed effective date for these new rates is January 1, 1984.

Persons interested in intervening in this matter should file a written motion expeditiously with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757, as the Hearing on the Merits in Docket 5420 is set for November 21, 1983.

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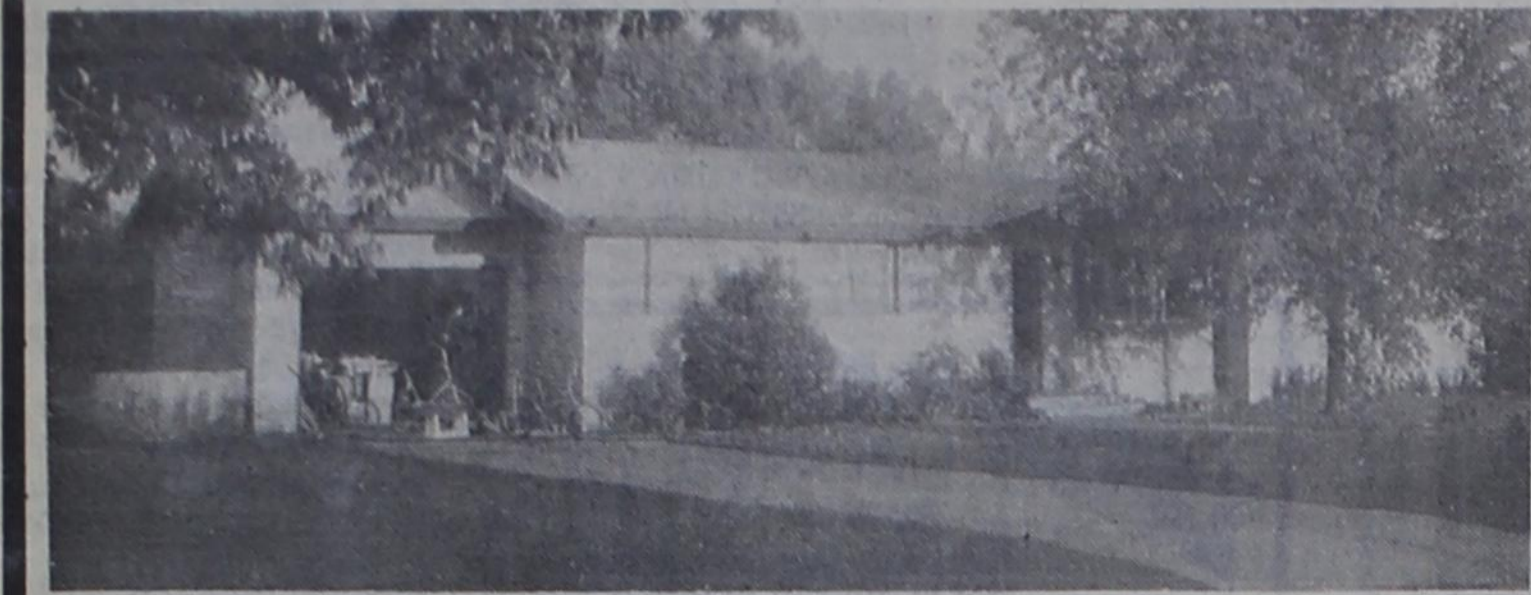

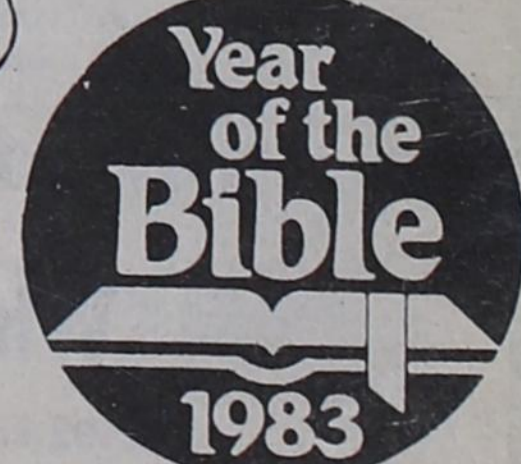

Authority is only to include those expenses which they have "been out" and are not to count the engineering and studies obtained within the Authority. The figure will include 15 percent of the total cost of the project to date as the Authority's administrative

expenses.
If the voters approve the action of the local men by voting for the "maintenance tax", the permit is issued and the dam is built, the local authority would have total control of the project. Wheeler County Water Supply District would be responsible for issuing contracts, levying water rates, and managing the re-

creational areas created by the lake.
If the voters "vote down" the tax, the Red River Water Authority will continue their effort to obtain a permit to build the Sweetwater Creek project. If successful, they will retain control of the dam, treatment plant and recreation on and around the reservoir.

The "Maintenance Tax" will not be any additional expense to the taxpayer, as this amount will be paid to the Red River Authority—if not at this time, it will be figured into the overall cost of the project.

Your questions will be answered. If you have a question concerning the November 8 election, you are asked to deliver or mail a query to the Wheeler Times at 110 E. Texas, (P.O. 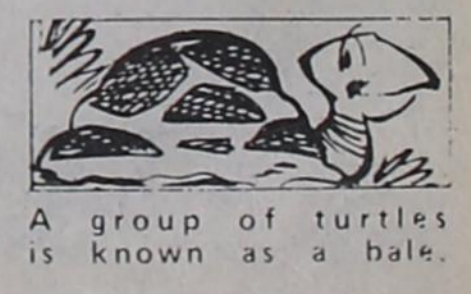

PRUSSIC ACID POISONING IN LIVESTOCK

From Don King

Frost has already hit part of Wheeler County and will be affecting the rest of the county before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forage, points out Don King, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt, emphasizes King. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth

usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, King outlines these steps:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.
2. Feed animals hay or a

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Oriental Vegetables For Cool Weather Crops

Many home gardeners like to try growing something different. Have you ever given thought to growing a few Oriental vegetables? Try some of these cool weather vegetables in your fall or early spring garden.

Oriental vegetables generally grow best using lots of organic matter together with a balanced fertilizer. Make sure you have good drainage; in areas of Texas with high rainfall, working the soil into ridges will help. Luckily, there are generally few pest and disease problems for these vegetables.

Paak Ts'oi is the white crunchy vegetable stem so often found in Oriental dishes. Its crisp texture makes it indispensable in

Chinese cooking. It grows best as a fall crop. A closely



related form known as Choi Sum is valued for the yellow-flowering shoots it produces, which can either be eaten whole or chopped up, flowers included.

Just about everyone has heard of Snow Peas, those flat edible-podded peas that crop up in so many Oriental dishes. In addition to the flat variety, a relatively new variety, the Sugar Snap, is picked after the mature pods have become fat with peas. These fat pods are crisp and sweet, whether eaten raw or

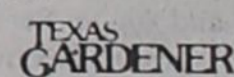
stir-fried.

For a fall garden, Snow Peas must be planted in midsummer to ensure enough time to mature before they're killed by the first hard freeze. Otherwise, they should be planted in late winter—January through March, depending on where you live in Texas—for an early spring harvest. Hot, dry weather rapidly takes its toll on this vegetable, which is why it's so expensive in the store.

Chinese Cabbage is another of the more common Oriental vegetables. The popular Wong Bok type forms stout cylindrical heads with thick crinkly leaves which grow upright like romaine lettuce leaves. Some types of Wong Bok

that grow especially well in the South include Tropical Prince and Tip Top hybrid.

Oriental radishes become favorites even with gardeners who are not that acquainted with Oriental cooking. There are several types. Daikon is a very long, white radish 1 to 2 inches in diameter at the shoulder and tapering to a point like a carrot. The Chinese radish is short and stubby, though quite large around. These radishes are easy to grow in the fall and appreciate a deep, loose soil. They store well for months.



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SWEETWATER CREEK WILDLIFE STUDY

(Editor's Note; Tommy Puryear brought this letter to the Times. It was written to Beade O Northcut and Erwin Leaverton, Watershed Work Plan Staff leaders for the SCS in Waco, Texas, and Chickasha, Okla. The letter has to do with the Sweetwater Creek wildlife.)

On August 8-9, 1978, we worked with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists Richard DeArment and David Sierra of Wheeler, Texas. We traveled along Sweetwater Creek and its tributaries through much of the watershed in both the Texas and Oklahoma portions. DeArment, who is a long-time resident of Wheeler County, is very knowledgeable regarding the economic, social, and biological aspects of the watershed and was quite helpful in pointing out many features of the vicinity. He was especially helpful in the identification of the many plant species associated with the Rolling Plains Land Resource Area and the wetlands therein. The more valuable wetlands were found in the Texas portion of Sweetwater Creek watershed along Murtaugh, Williams, Coburn, Goodin, Jenkin-Jones, Osburn Draw, Russell, and Silver Creeks. A small area of sedge

meadow (Type II Wetland) and areas of wooded streambank were the most notable habitat types found in the Oklahoma portion of the watershed.

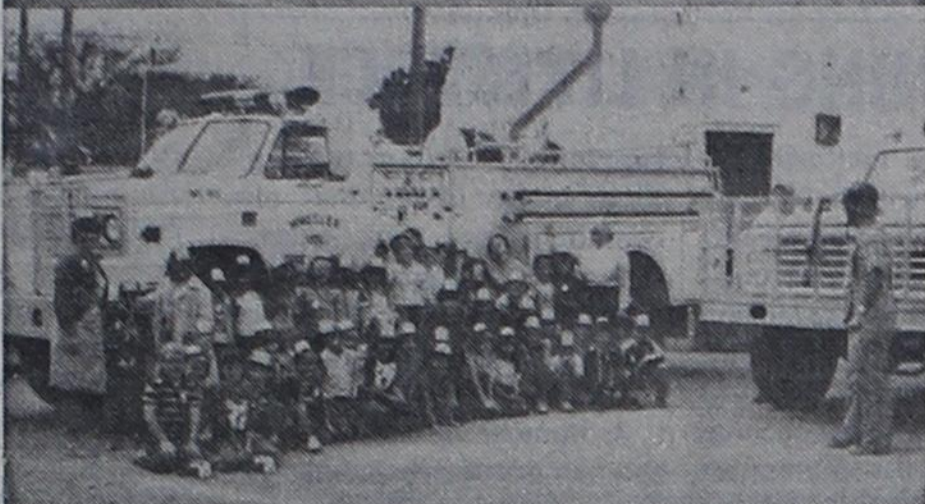
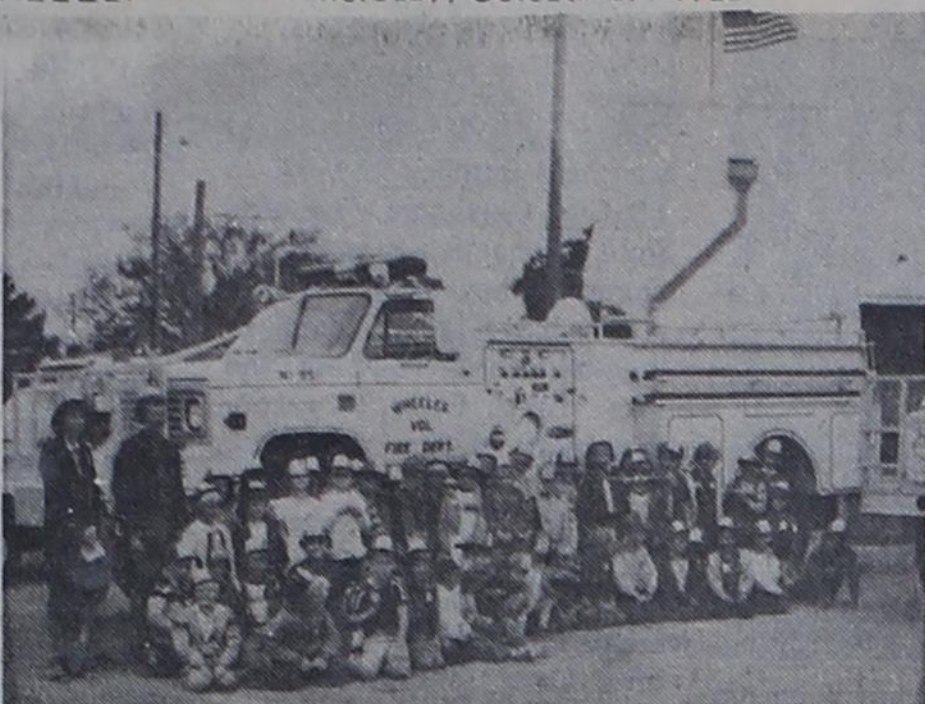
After returning to the office, we imposed the situations we had seen in our field reconnaissance of the Texas portion onto USGS quadrangle sheets and measured the amounts of each wetland type. These coarse measurements show 1,310 acres of subirrigated native meadow (Types II, III, and IV Wetland), 330 acres of open-fresh water (Type V Wetland), 200 acres of bogs (Type VIII Wetland), and 1,455 acres of wooded streambank. These wetlands and wooded areas do not precisely conform with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Circular 39, but represent the types mentioned in parentheses. Please find attached the descriptions of the four types inventoried. The USGS maps showing these areas are available in Waco in the office of the watershed planning staff. It is our opinion that these areas and their hydrologic setting are very unique. The plant communities found there are maintained by spring flow and/or a high water table in general conjunction with soils of the Sweetwater series. Ar-

reas such as these occur in limited acres within the watershed and are rare elsewhere. Mitigation for these sub-irrigated native meadows and bogs would be very difficult, if

not impossible. Therefore, all proposed project measures should be structured as to avoid interference, disruption, or destruction of their water regime. Such involvements

would adversely affect these beautiful, unique areas of high bioenergetic productivity.

Area Citizens In Accident

The Wheeler County Terminal Fed Heifer Program will get under way with a meeting on Tuesday, November 1, 1983, at 7:00 p.m. in the Wheeler County Show Barn.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the various frame sizes of heifers that may be used for the feeding program. Mr. Doug Cooper of the Britt Ranch will discuss each of the small, medium and large-framed heifers and will explain what might be expected from each in rate of gain, efficiency of gain and carcass characteristics. All interested youth, parents, beef cattle producers and the public is invited to attend the meeting.

Mr. Van Baize of the First National Bank in Wheeler will present cost and return estimates and break even projections.

The Terminal Fed Heifer Program is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association to teach the 4-H and FFA members the fundamentals of beef cattle selection, feeding, and evaluation. The program has been designed to be as close to a commercial cattle feeding operation as is practical. Entries will consist of a pen of two heifers.

The 140 day feeding period will begin on December 29 and end on May 17. The cattle will be slaughtered and the carcasses will be evaluated and sold on the rail. Final placings will be determined by rate of gain, feed efficiency, carcass placings, record book and a quiz.

According to Doug Cooper, program chairman, every effort has been made to enable the participants to make a profit from their project. Wheeler Coop will mix the feed especially for the program and

sell it to the participants at cost. The cattle will be processed at Beef Cattle Co. and processing supplies will be furnished by several businesses. Drs. Ben Ed and Lee Ann Hillhouse will serve as veterinary consultants.

Anyone between the ages of 9 and 19 that is interested in the program can get more information from the Vocational Agriculture teacher in their community or from the County Extension Office at 826-5243.

Safety Alert for Metal Chimneys

Each year over 22 thousand house fires are directly associated with metal factory-built chimneys that are used with wood and coal burning stoves and free-standing fireplaces.

With the heating season just ahead, the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is urging consumers to be aware of the potential fire hazards related to these chimneys.

Fires caused by factory built chimneys usually result from one of the following:

- Improper chimney installation which causes nearby wood framing materials to ignite.
- Burning creosote, a combustible tar-like substance that forms in the chimney when wood is burned, which causes structural damage.
- Chimney corrosion which exposes wood framing to excessive temperatures and possible ignition.
- The buckling and collapsing of inner liners in chimneys which creates too hot a fire, especially in high-efficiency stoves and fireplace inserts.

Consumers should make sure their chimney's interconnections were installed according to manufacturer's instructions and local building codes.

The chimney should also be checked by a competent chimney sweep at least once a year, and more frequently if the chimney is heavily used or is the primary heat source for the home.

The CPSC has approved a federal safety rule that will require the manufacturers of wood and coal burning stoves and free standing fireplaces to provide a label with information on the safe installation, operation, and maintenance of their products beginning in 1984.

Consumers who want to report a metal chimney fire incident may use the Product Safety Commission's toll-free hotline by dialing 1-800-638-CPSC.
