TWO ARRESTED FOR BURGLARY; WILLIAMS TRANSPORTED TO PEN

Two men were arrested and charged with burglary of the Jessie Lee McMurry residence

located 10 miles east of Shamrock on Interstate 40 on September 3, 1983 during the early morning hours.

Arrested were: Tommy Lee Dorrell, a white male, 25 years of age and John Wesley Essay a 22 year old white male. Both are from Texola, Okla.

Dorrell arraigned on Sept. 3, and is presently out on \$4000 bond.

Essay was arraigned on Sept. 6, and is in jail at the present time under a \$4000 bond.

The subjects entered the home of the elderly Mrs. McMurry while she slept. She awoke and called for assistance. The case was investigated by Wheeler County Deputy Sheriff Joe Stewart.

Lester Douglas Williams who was sentenced to 45 years and fined \$10,000 for the robbery of The Koshare Shop and Beating of Roxie Hanks was transported to the Texas Department of Corrections on Wednesday, Sept. 7.

Jack Kenton May, white male, whose probation had been revoked was also transported. May had been granted probation on a felony theft charge.

The other subject charged in the robbery of the Koshare Shop has been extradited from the state of Missouri and will be in the Wheeler County Jail by Thursday night, Sept. 8.

Trial date has not been set for Michael Ray Barber.

For the past two months the Wheeler County jail has been crowded, but at this printing, the population is down to four. Anything over 8 prisoners means an overcrowding problem for the county jail.

NEW BEEF PRODUCTION PROGRAM TO BE OFFERED

A new beef cattle production program for Wheeler County youth is being initiated by the Wheeler Co. Livestock Show Association.

A meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the meeting room of the First National Bank in Wheeler. The purpose of the meeting is to explain the program and get an estimate of how many will be interested in the program.

The Wheeler County Terminal Fed Heifer program is designed to teach the basics of beef cattle selection feeding and evaluation. Several educational activities have been planned to accomplish this goal, according to Don King, County Extension Agent. The program will stress the economics of beef cattle production and should allow participants to make a profit from the cattle they feed.

Entries in the program will consist of a pen of two heifers and each 4-H or FFA member may enter up to two pens. The member will select and purchase his heifers as a commercial feeder would. However,

the same feed will be used by all participants.

The heifers will be feed for 140 days. They will go on feed December 29 and come off May 17. All of the heifers will then be slaughtered and carcass data will be collected and the carcass will be ranted. Final placings in the program will be passed on carcass quality, rate and cost of gain, and on a record book a quiz taken by the feeders.

The cattle will be sold on the rail at market price.

The program was planned to be as close to a commercial enterprise as possible. The heifers will not be fitted and shown as show cattle, however they will be put on exhibit May 17 to give the feeders recognition for their work.

An effort was made to develop a program that will enable participants to make a profit. Feed will be mixed especially for this program and supplied by Wheeler Coop at their cost. Premium money and other awards will be presented to those participants with the top placing entries.

All youth interested in the program and their parents, are encouraged to attend the meeting on September 13. Anyone interested in the program but unable to attend the meeting may get additional information through the county extension office at 826-5243 or by contacting the vocational agriculture teacher in their community.

AUGUST AMBULANCE REPORT

Twenty-three ambulance calls were made in the month of August. Seven calls were transfers, four to Amarillo hospitals, one to Abilene, one to Perryton and one to Pampa.

The nature of these calls were: five sick calls, five cardiac problems, three hip fractures, one auto accident, one rig accident, 1 fire call, one forklift accident, one motorcycle accident, one respiratory, one choking child (no pick-up) one call to Wheeler High School (no pick-up) and two falls.

Other related problems were, two rib injuries, one back injury, both arms injured, and oxygen to three local firemen.

The number of calls made and the number of hours spent in patient care are as follows: Louis Stas, 12 calls, 20 hours; M.K. Christner, 17 calls, 41 hours; Lee Hibler, 13 calls, 22 hours; Pam Hibler, 1 call, 1 hour; Dwight 2 calls, 12 hours; Lyndon Loyd, 6 calls, 7 hours; Noveline Loyd, 2 calls, 2 hours; Frankie Jackson, 2 calls, 8 hours.

The number of hours given on patient care for August was one hundred and twelve hours. The total hours for the year stands at nine hundred and thirteen. The Wheeler Ambulance has responded to one hundred and eighty calls in the year to date.

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Lines from Linda

ATHLETES ASK QUESTIONS ABOUT NUTRITION
 Many high-school athletes — and their parents — are increasingly concerned about nutrition. For better athletic performance and better health, athletes need sound nutrition information. The following are questions that athletes regularly ask of Extension foods and nutrition specialists. Let me share with you their answers to these important questions.
 Q: "I run track and I feel like I need more energy. Should I go on a high-protein diet?"
 A: Athletes need small increases in their protein intake during vigorous training because additional muscle may be produced. Just eating a well-balanced diet should be sufficient, however. Eating more protein than provided by the average diet will not increase muscle size and strength. In fact, research shows that once protein fulfills its primary role of body building, the excess is either used for energy or converted to fat and stored or passed out of the body.
 Q: "What should I eat before a football game?"
 A: Pregame meals for football players often include a large portion of meat, such as beef steak. This can result in an excessive intake of protein and fat. It's better to eat a small, lean hamburger patty. Ground meat is digested faster than bite size pieces of beef. Fat leaves the stomach in about five hours, protein in about three hours, and carbohydrate foods, like those from the bread-cereal group in about two hours. That's why a light meal with higher amounts of carbohydrates rather than large amounts of protein, fat and cellulose is recommended.
 Q: "My coach says I should take B-vitamins for extra energy."
 A: Daily requirements for vitamins do not depend upon physical activity. Taking in more vitamins than you need does not help and could harm the body. It's true that some members of the B-vitamin complex help chemical reactions to occur which produce energy when carbohydrate, protein, and fat are burned. But you can get all the B-vitamins you need from a nutritious diet. Taking vitamin supplements without a doctor's prescription is not advisable.
 Q: "I want to take diuretics so I can qualify for a lower weight class in wrestling, but my parents won't let me. What's wrong with diuretics?"
 A: Diuretics can cause water loss and dehydration which directly inhibits the production of energy. Also, along with the water, your body loses potassium. Since potassium is needed for muscle function, doing anything to decrease your potassium level is not a very good idea for an athlete.
 Q: "What is 'carbohydrate loading' and can it really make me perform better?"
 A: "Carbohydrate loading" is a short period of fasting followed by a high level of carbohydrate consumption. Carbohydrate loads seem to be of benefit only for athletes involved in endurance events such as marathon runners or distance swimmers. This is a controversial procedure, and it does have side effects. A teenage athlete should not engage in carbohydrate loading without consulting a physician.
 Most of the question athletes ask concern special diets, vitamins, and nutritional supplements. Yet the best method of insuring that an athlete's nutritional needs are met is to select a diet based on moderation and variety.
 Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

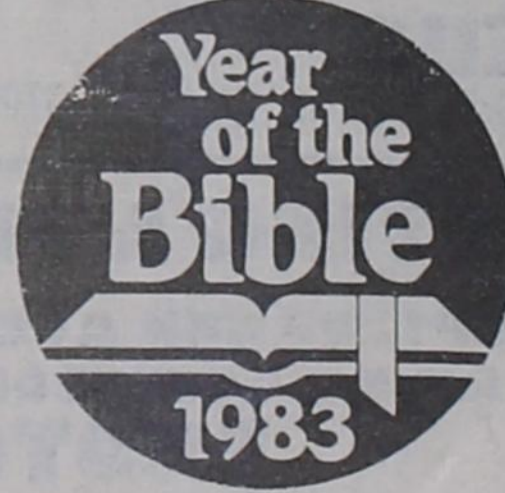
decendents. The universe was made for the earth, and the earth was made for God's man.
