Two Arrests Made In 1981 Robbery & Assault

Two arrests have been made and a third warrant has been issued in the two-year-old robbery and beating which shocked the Wheeler community on June 29, 1981. The first arrest was made Thursday afternoon, followed by the second arrest on Friday. Both arrests were made in Spearman.

Lester Douglas Williams was arrested Thursday by Hansford County Sheriff, R.L. McFarlin. The 25-year-old ex-convict was taken before the J.P. in Spearman and charged

with the robbery of the Koshare Shop in Wheeler and the beating of the clerk, Roxie Hanks. He was charged with Wheeler Thursday evening by Wheeler County Deputy Lonnie Miller. Williams is reported to have spent time in the Missouri prison system.

Arraignment was Friday morning in Wheeler for Williams; he was charged with the aggravated robbery. Bond was set at \$50,000. Williams remains in the Wheeler jail. Linda Barber, the ex-wife of

Lester Williams, was arrested at her Spearman home Friday; she was brought to Wheeler and arraigned Saturday morning. Barber was charged with aggravated robbery and bond was set at \$10,000; bond was posted and the suspect was released.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of the third person involved in the robbery and brutal beating of Mrs. Hanks. The name was not released.

The big break in the case came with the arrest in

Spearman of an individual who was aware of the Wheeler case. Information was given in a bargaining effort. Deputy Miller and Texas Ranger, Bill Baten of Pampa have been working on the case for the past two years.

An estimated \$56,000 worth of jewelry was taken in the mid-afternoon robbery of the local business. The beating and robbery was reported at 3:30 P.M. as potential customers entered the business and discovered the badly battered Mrs. Hanks.

Roxie Hanks had been an employee of the Koshare Shop at 1303 Alan L. Bean Blvd since it opened in 1974. She managed the shop in the absence of the owners Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker, Jr.

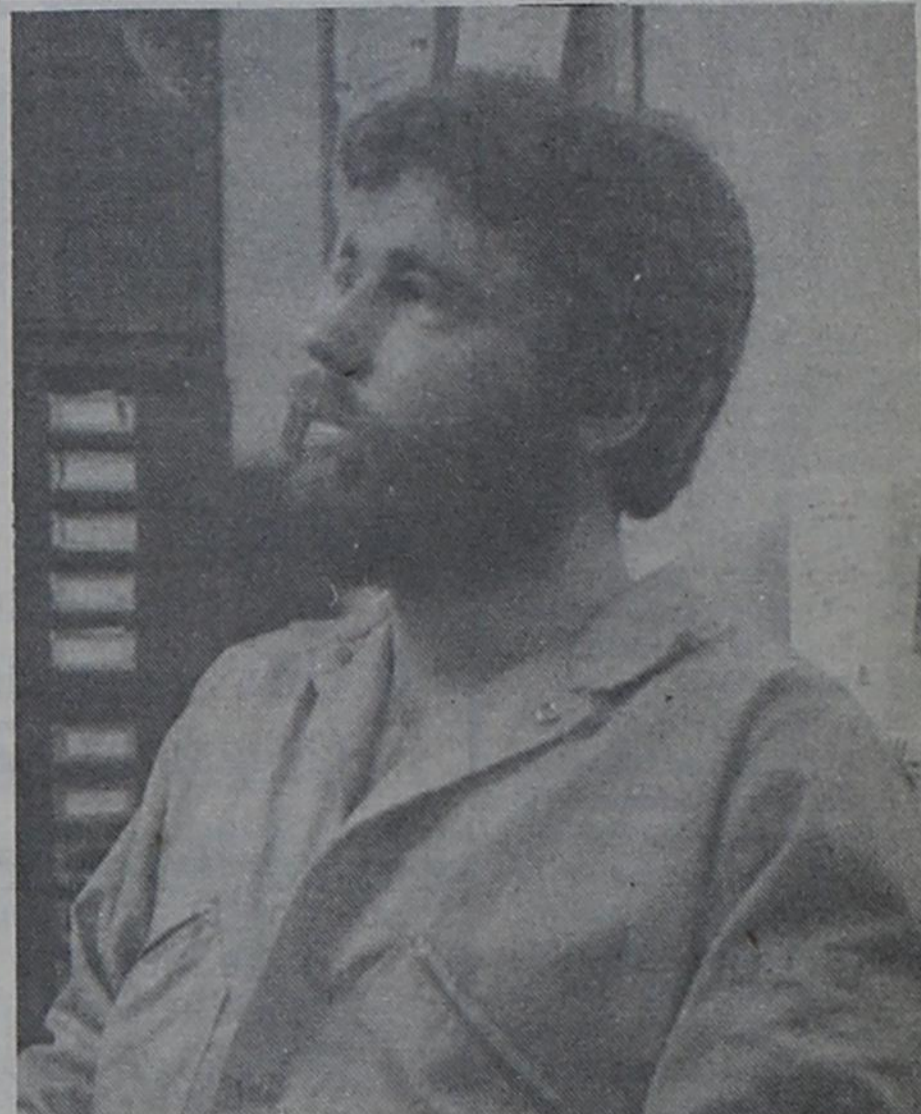
Roxie was taken by ambulance to Shamrock and transferred to Amarillo where she underwent surgery for a broken jaw and treated for bruises in the chest area.

After the robbery-beating two years ago, Mrs. Hanks was unconscious and estimated

the time of the event to be around 3. She described the last customer to enter the store and recalled pleading with her assailant or assailants not to kill her.

Under hypnosis Mrs. Hanks later gave a description of the last person she recalled entering the store and a composit drawing was made from that description.

Shortly after the shocking event at the business, the shop was closed and offered private showings by appointment only.

The tour will begin at 9:00 AM at the brush control demonstration plot on the Paul Macino ranch 3 miles north of 1-40 on the Pagan Road and will then visit two other sites where Graslan has been used to control shinnery.

The last stop on the tour will be fertility demonstration plots

on the Dexter Haws farm near Lela.

Plant Clinic Is Scheduled

This is the time of year when many home owners, as well as agricultural producers, are having problems with disease and insects that are attacking their plants.

In an effort to help answer the questions these people have, the County Program Building Committee has scheduled a Plant Clinic for Thursday, July 7 from 9:00 AM until noon in the Commissioners Court Room of the County Courthouse at Wheeler according to Don King County Extension Agent.

Three Texas Agriculture Extension Service specialists will be on hand to answer

question. They are Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Pathologist, Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist and Dr. Toland Roberts, Extension Vegetable Specialists.

King emphasized that the clinic is for anyone who has questions concerning plant growth problems, regardless if it is about the lawn, ornamental, vegetable or crops such as wheat, cotton, grain, sorghum or pastures.

The best approach would be for the person to bring a specimen plant or cutting of a leaf, limb, etc. to the clinic. If, however, the problem occurs at some other time of the year or a specimen is not available, the person should feel free to come visit with the specialists.

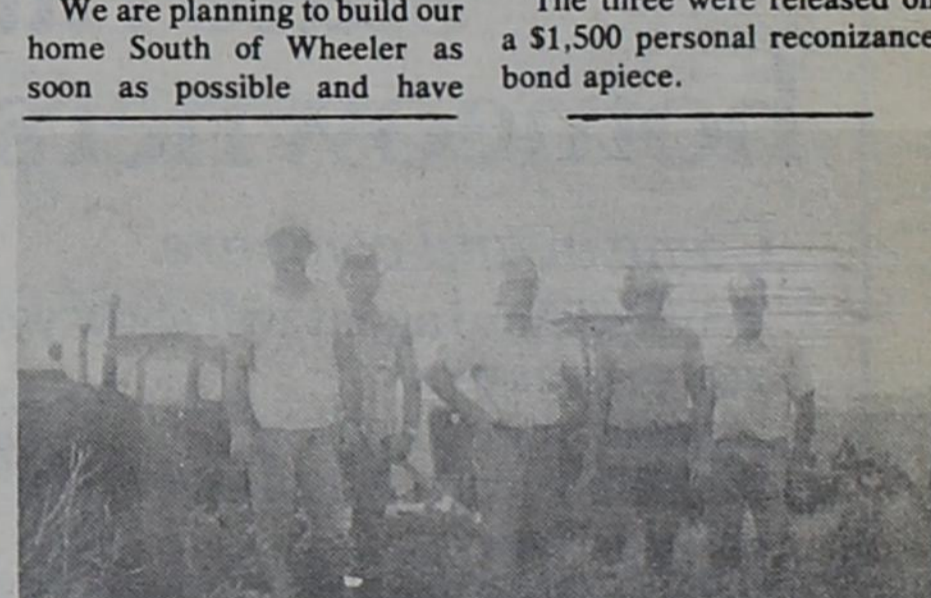
Three Indicted

The three were released on a \$1,500 personal recognizance bond apiece.

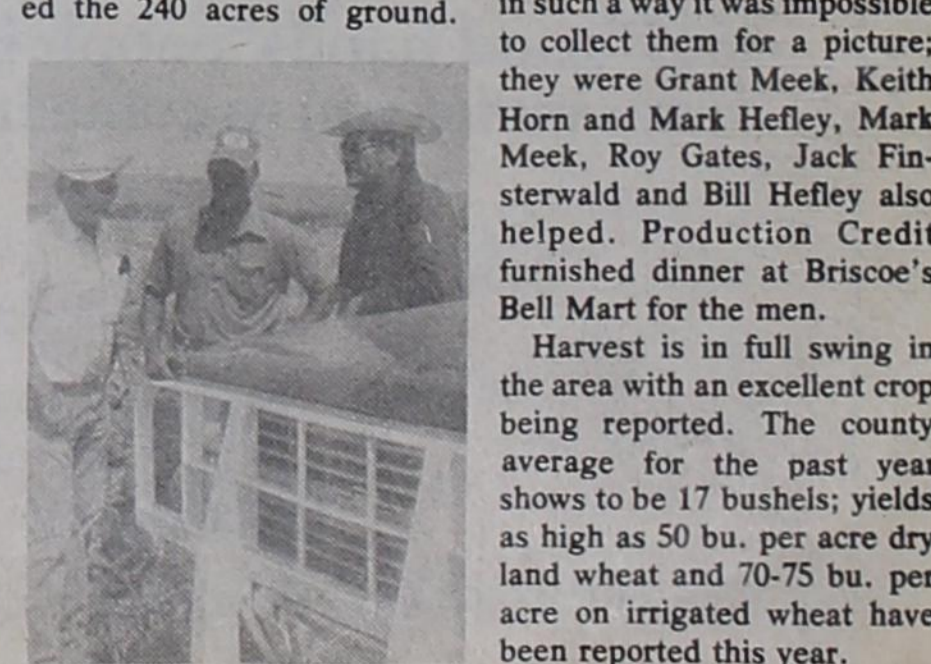

DRYING FRUITS AND VEG.

Drying food is one of the oldest and simplest methods of food preservation. For thousands of years, people have dried many foods to preserve them for leaner times. Preserving seasonal foods by drying is still useful and convenient and has the added advantage of conserving storage space.

In drying, water is removed yet the food is not cooked. Sufficient moisture is removed from a food to prevent its decay.

Drying does not replace canning or freezing, but it is an alternative method of food preservation. If the freezer is full and you've used all the

canning jars—try drying.

Characteristics of dried food are a shriveled appearance—the nutritive content is concentrated. Eighteen medium size apples weighing about 6 pounds dries out to about one pound. So, dried fruits go a long way. Bulk and energy are not affected. Some vitamin and mineral loss occurs. Natural vitamin C is lost during the drying process (but most of us do not depend on dried foods for Vitamin C).

Recipes may vary. Drying time vary according to the types of food, size of pieces and load on the drying tray. Tables giving approximate drying times can serve as a guide to judge proper dryness, experience is usually the best teacher. Some foods should be dried to the brittle stage; others should be pliable or leathery. (Recipes will help you determine this.)

Most fruits and vegetables and some meats and fish are suitable for drying. Popular fruits to dry in Texas include peaches, apples, apricots, berries, cherries, dates, figs, grapes, pears and plums. Popular vegetables to dry in Texas include peas, beans, green peppers, red peppers, corn, onion, pumpkin, squash and herbs. Drying does not improve the quality of foods, so only fresh, top quality foods should be used. Vegetables in prime condition should be selected and prepared for drying on the day they are harvested. Only fully-ripened fruits should be used. If the fruit is not suitable for eating fresh, it is not suitable for drying.

Successful drying depend on heat, dry air and air circulation. The methods of drying are kitchen oven (you will need drying trays, cheesecloth an oven thermometer and a small fan.); a portable food dehydrator (electric food dehydrator.); the sun (you will need drying trays, cheesecloth, temperature over 90 degrees F and low relative humidity).

Do not use galvanized screen on drying trays. There is an acid reaction that darkens food and may cause a dangerous reaction. Also, do not use fiberglass, vinyl and copper screening. Wood slats are excellent—these may be covered with cheesecloth.

Successful drying depends upon heat—sufficient heat to draw out the moisture, but not enough to cook the food material. You're working with very low temperature—120-150 degrees. Dry air to absorb the released moisture; and air circulation to carry off the moisture.

Foods need some preparation or pre-treatment before drying. Vegetables may be blanched with hot water or steam. This inactivates enzymes in the food. As soon as vegetables are picked, the enzymes start working faster and cause change in color, flavor, texture, sugar content and nutrients. To control these changes, prepare them for drying as soon as possible. Handle vegetables gently. Rough tossing or pouring can bruise them. Blanching causes some loss of nutrients through leaching. To keep leaching to a minimum, blanch only as long as required. However, do not under blanch or enzymes will not be inactivated and the dried vegetables will be of inferior quality.

Prepare only the amount of food that you can dry at one time.

Fruits may be blanched or sulfured. Sulphuring effectively maintains the quality and nutrients of the food during drying and storage. Oven drying is not recommended for sulfured fruits because of the objectionable odor of the sulfur fumes. Sulphuring should always be done outdoors away from close contact with plants, shrubs, trees and children.

Basic equipment for drying includes an oven thermometer that registers 120 F and an oven or dehydrator. If you use the oven, it will take trial and error. Test before preparing food. You'll need a prop to prop the oven door open at least two to six inches. (Wooden block or pot holder will work as a prop.)

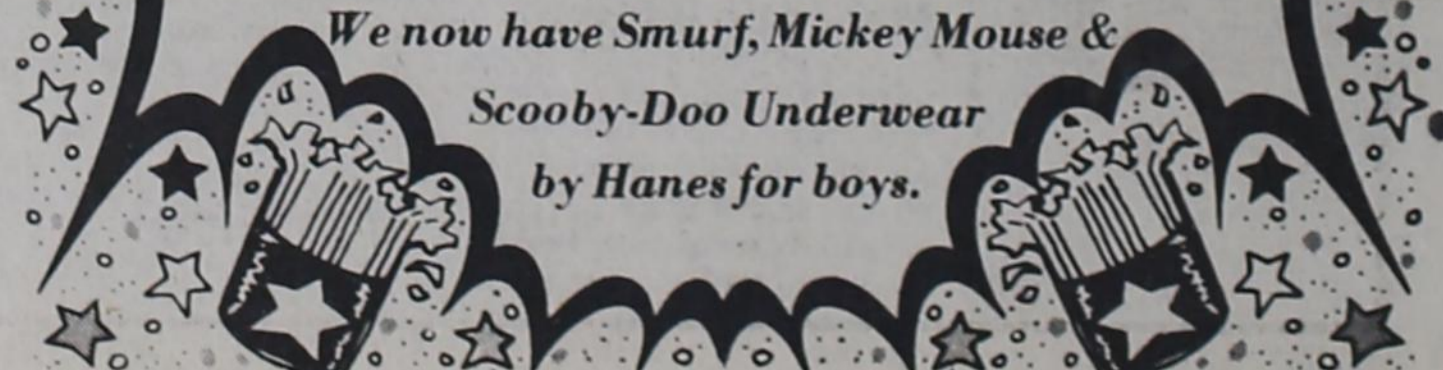

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers.

Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1, 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intralATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. Southwestern Bell is proposing changes in the structure of the present private line and foreign exchange services. Changes in these rates may affect customers of other telephone companies. Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of other telephone companies.

Many of our greatest national leaders—among them Presidents Washington, Jackson, Lincoln, and Wilson—have recognized the influence of the Bible on our country's development. The plain-spoken Andrew Jackson referred to the Bible as no less than "the rock on which our Republic rests."

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Minimum Tillage
 Today's farmers are in a tough spot. Prices for many of their products are down, while costs for fuel, labor, and equipment are up. Equally upsetting is the fact that this price-cost squeeze in not likely to improve soon.
 "The farmer's best bet to improve profits is to cut overhead. Reduced tillage trials show that one way a farmer can do this is to change the way he plows his land," said lavon Williams District Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler.
 Conservationists with the SCS reduced tillage the system of the future.
 "The fact is, many farmers plow too much. A lot of this has to do with tradition. But, reduced tillage methods can be the out they're looking for," said Williams.
 In some cases, seedbed preparation trips can be cut down, Williams continued. Many farmers are planting crops directly into the stubble of previous crops, without other preparation. Sometimes, this is the only way to successfully grow two crops in one year.
 Reduced tillage can be real money-saver when it comes to fuel and labor cost. Conventional land preparation and planting may take five to seven gallons of fuel per acre. But, when tillage are reduced, fuel use is cut substantially. Also, fewer tractor trips mean less labor. The time and money saved by shifting to reduced tillage system can be used for other improvements.
 "Leaving the stalks of sorghum, wheat or other crops on the soil is an effective conservation measure. Reduce tillage and you reduce erosion. It's that simple," Williams stressed. "And, residues on the soil help wildlife, took by providing food and cover."
 So, if you're looking for a way to beat the price-cost squeeze, here's a tip from the SCS. During the year, list all tractor trips across your land prior to harvest of your major crop. Estimate the cost of every operation. Decide whether each trip was made to increase production of if it was made because of tradition. By eliminating all the habit trips, you will develop a more efficient operation. And, you will find that it's better to switch than fight operating cost.

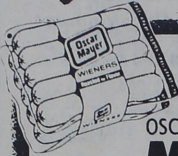
