MONA JENNINGS WINS STATE GOLF TOURNEY

The Class 1A State Girls Golf Tournament was held at the Lions Municipal Golf Course in Austin, Texas on May 5 & 6, 1983. Every fairway is lined with large cedar, oak, and mesquite trees and back nine holes has five treacherous water holes. The Class 1A schools competing were: Overton, Paredise, Salado, Sundown, Throckmorton,

Lago Vista, Rankin, Crossroads, Saint Jo., & Wheeler. There were 38 girls representing these schools which were vying for medalist and team honors.

The schools winning team honors were: 1st Sundown, 389-382=771, 2nd Salado, 384-393=777; and 3rd Rankin, 400-420=820.

The first day of stroke play left three players in contention for medalist honors. Mona Jennings of Wheeler with a 39-39=78, Kay Linda Shive of Lago Vista and Janet Frost of Salado each posted an 84. The final day brought Panhandle winds, sun, & pressure to each with Shive & Frost scoring a 83 each with a total

of 167. Frost defeated Shive on a one hole sudden death playoff to receive second place medalist honors. But our Panhandle girl, Mona Jennings scored a 43-42=85 which gave her a total of 163 to win the Class 1A State Girls Golf Medalist to be the first girl to bring home to Wheeler a gold medal in UIL Sports competition.
