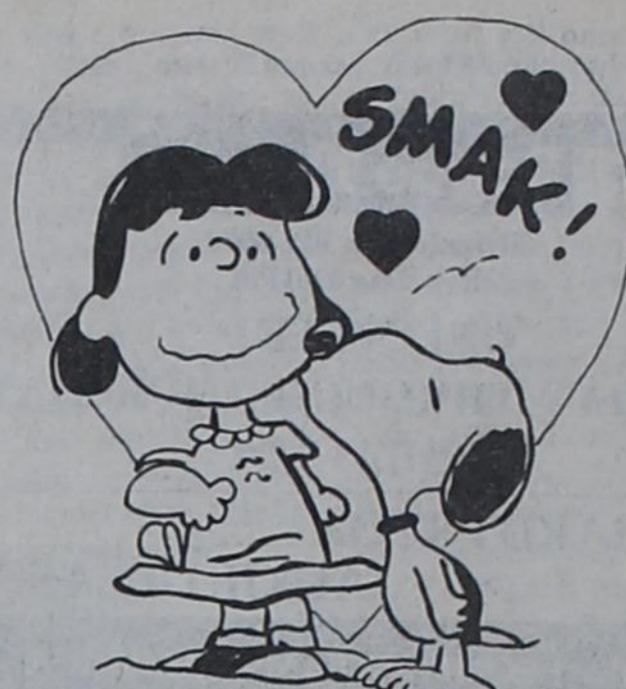

## County Wide "Stress Management" Seminar

Are life's day to day hassles getting the best of you? Do you find it hard to cope with the stress of your job, personal and family relations? If so, come to a County Wide "Stress Management" Seminar to be held Thursday, April 21, from 7-9 p.m. in the Wheeler School Auditorium.

The program is being sponsored, free of charge, by the Wheeler County Extension Homemakers Council and Family Living Sub-Committee. Speaker for the evening will be Patsy Ramsey Britting, R.N.,

M.S.N. Mrs. Britting is currently Assistant Professor of Nursing at West Texas State University. She is a native of Wheeler County having grown up in the Briscoe Community and graduated of Briscoe High School. She received her diploma in nursing from Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, her B.S. in Nursing from Tex. Woman's University. She has been a member of the W.T.S.U. nursing faculty since the School of Nursing began, 1972. Prior to that she held various nursing positions in medical-surgical nursing and psychiatric nursing in the Amarillo area.

The two-hour program she will present on "Stress Management" is based upon the content of a 3 semester hour course she teaches at WTSU. Her presentation will begin with data on the stress response, both physiological and emotional responses. She will discuss how we create our own stress and how we can learn from our stress. However, the major focus of her program will be upon techniques of stress management, such as, progressive muscle relaxation, imagination and visualization, assertiveness, laughter and play as adults, relabeling, and saying "no". Her presentation will include some lectures but most of it will involve group participation and discussion.

The problem of stress is one that affects many men and women and this program is directed toward both.

Programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all persons regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

## Ambulance Mar. Report

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Report Service answered thirty-two calls for the month of March.

The nature of the calls were: five sick calls, one respiratory, ten cardiac patients, two cancer patients, four internal problems, one fall from a windmill tower, two rig injuries, two auto accidents, one patient from a volleyball game, one brain aneurysm, two knee injuries, one burn patient. Other problems encountered were: one severe internal injuries, one amputation, one severe wound, three hip injuries, two hand injuries, one chest injury, one burn from gasoline, two CVA's and one cardiac arrest.

Eleven of these calls resulted in code three responses. One was DOA at Parkview. There were eighteen transfers to Amarillo and one to Oklahoma City.

The number of individual calls and hours spent in patient care were: Louis Stas 16 calls, 38 hours; M.K. Christner 27 calls, 74 hours; Lee Hibler 12 calls, 35 hours; Pam Hibler 4 calls, 7 hours; Dwight Tipps 4 calls, 10 hours; Lyndon Loyd 5 calls, 7 hours; Frank Coates 5 calls, 9 hours; Panna Jones 1 call, 4 hours; Jim Jackson 1 call, 4 hours; Noveline Loyd 1 call, 4 hours; Debbie Davis 5 call, 18 hours; Norma McLemore 3 calls, 10 hours; Sherlin Reed 4 calls, 9 hours.

Two hundred, twenty-nine hours were spent in patient care. Seventy six calls have been answered in 1983 and a total of four hundred and fourteen hours donated.

## Ambulance Donations

New donations have been made to the Wheeler Vol. Ambulance Service. Some of these donations will help pay for supplies to test diabetics for sugar at the Senior Citizens blood pressure clinic which we conduct each month.

We have also started a new fund for a compact heart monitor and defibrillator for our Briscoe paramedic and first responder, Dwight Tipps. This will give Dwight at least a fifteen minute head start in treating a heart patient as opposed to waiting for the heart monitor in the ambulance.

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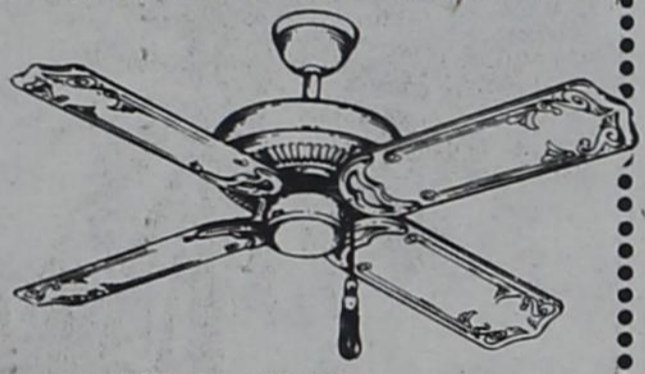

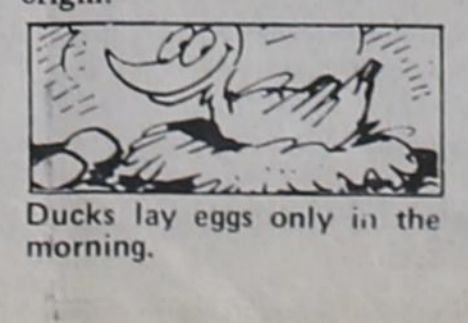

## WHAT IS TAX RENDITION?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains the process.

Rendition is the method through which a taxpayer reports or lists the taxable property he owned or managed and controlled on January 1 of the current tax year. It is also the means by which a taxpayer is allowed to record his own opinion of what the value of that property should be.

Not every taxpayer is required to file a rendition, but there are important reasons why a taxpayer may wish to do so.

Renditions must be filed: (1) for all tangible personal property used for the production of income; or (2) on any other taxable property if required by the chief appraiser.

Renditions may be filed by any taxpayer who wishes to preserve certain valuable rights.

Even if you aren't required to prepare and file a rendition on your property, there are several good reasons why you should do so:

- As previously noted, by filing a rendition, you have placed into the record your own opinion as to the value of your property.
- You create a responsibility on the part of the chief appraiser and the appraisal review board to notify you if they intend to increase the value of your property by any amount over what you have rendered. Further, you have the right to protest to the appraisal review board either the increase in value or any other decision affecting the taxability of your property.
- For property that is not rendered by the owner, the chief appraiser makes his own

decision on the property's value and places that value on the appraisal roll.

In addition to a rendition, you also may file a special report called a report of decreased value if the value of your property decreased during the preceding tax year for any reason other than normal depreciation. The appraisal office will view the property and verify any reported change in appraised value and its cause and nature.

Renditions and other property reports may ordinarily be filed with the county appraisal district office at any time from January 1 through April 30. This year, since April 30 falls on a Saturday, the deadline is extended by law to May 2, 1983.

Rendition forms for various types of property, as well as other property report forms, are available from the appraisal district office. Your appraisal district can also give you a free copy of the Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities pamphlet which explains exemptions, appeal rights, and other details of the local property tax system in Texas. Or, contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

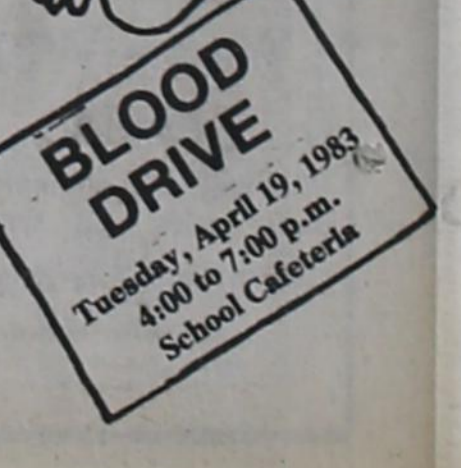

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# RUN AWAYS

When you hear someone speak of runaways now days, they are usually speaking of teenagers running away from home or a wife running away from her husband. No such thing years ago. It was animals running away. They were usually hitched to plows, wagons, buggies or something, or sometimes just a saddle horse. I never saw a saddle horse run away. All of them usually run from fright, a few from just plain meanness.

When I was just a small child, our neighbor had his little boy driving a team hitched to the cultivator plowing cotton at the end of the cotton rows that came almost to our house, so I saw that run away real good. It was the first one I ever saw. We kids were playing in the yard when we saw Roberts' team jump and tear out across the field as hard as they could run. Robert simply spun around on the cultivator seat, dropped the lines and took a flying leap off the back of the cultivator. When the dust settled where we could see, Robert was getting up from the cotton stalks, rescuing his straw hat and looking to see where his team was going. They just ran to the back side of the field and stopped. Would have been grazing on the cotton stalks if it hadn't been for the bits in their mouths, by the time some of the neighbor men reached them. A dog was chasing a rabbit and it ran under their feet, was what had scared them. Nothing was hurt except a few stalks of cotton.

Maybe this wouldn't be classified as a run away, but that half broke mule sure did run anyway. I think its worth mentioning here.

Dad always kept young teams of mules when I was growing up. I remember one large beautiful mule named Blue. She was of a very nervous disposition and just about half broke when this happened. Dad had gone to town one Saturday. Mom and my older sister was busy in the house. I was playing with my doll under the shade tree. Buddy was left to entertain himself which he sure did, by crawling out in the mule lot and throwing his straw hat under Old Blue. I was watching the thing as it happened. Blue jumped completely over the small boy, went right through the board corrals and took off for places unknown. All this commotion brought mom and sis on the run.

Buddy was almost as pale as death, but mom finally got the facts of what had happened and kept saying, "I don't know what your Daddy will do if anything happens to that mule. She is his favorite. Besides being the best mule

on the place." I don't know why she kept saying that, Buddy knew it, and was scared senseless anyway. Finally he, along with mom and sis got a hammer and nails and patched the fence up so the other mules couldn't get out. Late in the afternoon Blue ventured back. Maybe she missed the other mules or the feed trough

or maybe both. Mom slipped out and opened the lot gate and between her and sis they got her back in the lot before Dad got home.

I've always heard it said a mule never forgets. I believe that. At least Blue never forgot or forgave Buddy. When he was a grown man and she an old mule, she still wouldn't let him walk up to her and put a bridle on her. It took years before she would let him get in the lot with her.

A Saturday afternoon spent at the movies would be a lot safer, but not half as exciting as that one was.

Not long after we were married, C.H. was listing the fields in the Spring, getting the ground ready to plant. All our horses were young and skittish except one, Old Button. He was never in a hurry but was always looking for a booger. He found it one Monday morning. I think it was a big bull snake that buzzed close to him. So he took off and the three other young brinks, were so ready to go with him. It was unexpected, and my young husband was thrown off the lister. Luckily he wasn't hurt. The team took off across the field till they came to the highway then headed down the road. A neighbor who happened to be on his saddle horse saw them and took off after them. He headed them in the first driveway they came to. They lost the lister long before this. It was bottom side up back on the highway somewhere. They tore around the neighbors house tearing down yard fences and everything else that got in their way before the horseback rider roped one of them and finally got them halted. They were still hitched together. C.H. spent the rest of the day gathering things up and putting them back together. Nothing was broken to bad, and only one horse, Old Button had a gash cut in his leg. Not too bad. C.H. had his team in the field the next morning by daylight, and after sundown when he quit that night. "They are so full of energy I'll just use it," he stated as this went on the rest of the week. I was sure glad when Saturday night rolled around. I wasn't sure who was going to give out first, the team or my husband. I can say one thing, that was the fastest that field was ever plowed.

The second year we were married we lived twelve or fourteen miles from C.H.s' parents. Having no way to go but in the wagon, we didn't get to visit them very often. We decided one Saturday afternoon to go visit them on Sunday. We planned on starting about four o'clock the next morning so we could have a nice long visit with them. The moon was shining and coyotes were howling when we left the next morning. It is pleasant to travel in a wagon at night in the summer time. A faint breeze was stirring when we got to the Sweetwater Creek. The team was stepping off pretty fast with their heads held high as they crossed the first old wooden bridge. The huge cottonwood trees were casting spooky shadows across the road in the moonlight. The breeze was blowing in the breeze so therefore the shadows were moving. C.H. was talking to his horses trying to reassure them. I was sitting on the high spring seat with my hands in my lap, palms up, enjoying the ride and hearing the night sounds when suddenly a green worm, fell from the trees above me, splat! Right in the palm of my hand. At that time I was terrified of worms. I simply let out a blood curdling scream and we were off like a bullet. I never did know what went with that worm. I was busy trying to hold on to the spring seat to keep from being thrown off as we were flying down the road swaying from side to side. Everything held together and C.H. finally got the team under control after they had ran a couple of miles. I learned, there are some things that are more terrifying than worms on that mad ride.

C.H. told me later about his first run away. He invented a harness out of cords and twine for their milk pen calf when he was a little boy. He hitched the calf to his little wagon and got in the wagon. Everything was going fine till the dogs got after the calf and away it went. The cords and string broke so no harm was done. But he was scared he said.

My little brother had heard I men talk about tying a tin can

with rocks in it on dogs tails so he decided he would tie a gallon syrup bucket with a few rocks in it on our milk pen calf tail and see what it would do. He got it all fixed, then scared the calf. It ran across the pen with all the strange racket behind it. It started running around the pen and the little boy laughed with glee, until

the dogs were attracted to all the strange things going on. They crawled in the pen and started running after the calf and biting its heels. The poor little calf was terrified and broke through the fence, tearing it down and took off as fast as it could go to the back side of the pasture to its mother. Luckily the string broke and he

lost the tin bucket before he got there or the whole herd would of stampeded. The scared little boy stood by the torn down fence with tears rolling down his cheeks saying over and over, "I didn't know he would have a runaway like that." I had turned out far more frightening than funny to him.

I still think the runaway story my Grandmother told me years ago that happened when she was a little girl is the most interesting I've heard. She was living way back in the woods in Parker County at the time this happened. Neighbors were few and far between. Everyone was, like them, as poor as church mice, trying to clear enough land to make a living for their large families. The one thing all the families from far and near always tried to do was go to the brush arbor out in the woods every few months when a visiting preacher came through the country and preached. It was wonderful for all the families to get together. Some lived so far away they came one day and camped overnight to be there for church the next day. Then the long drive home after they had all spread their lunch together and ate after preaching. There were far more ox teams than horses at these gatherings.

One hot, summer day after one of these get togethers, they started home. Pa was driving the yoke of oxen and Ma was sitting in the floor of the ox cart on a pallet with the baby in her arms, with all the other small children gathered

around her. Grandmother was the oldest, a child of eight or ten years. The day was hot and sultry. The oxens were prodding along peacefully when suddenly the heel flies got after them. They threw their tails over their backs and with a loud bellow they went tearing all into the woods. It was impossible for Pa to hold them. The cart was bouncing this way and that as it went over rocks, logs and down in chug holes. Ma was trying to hold the baby to keep it from being hurt, and also trying to hang on to as many of the other little ones as possible to keep them from being thrown from the cart.

Grandmother was also trying to hold on to as many little ones as she could and to hold on to the cart to keep from being thrown from it herself. They were expecting the cart to start flying to pieces any second, but everything held together and no one was lost from the wagon. The oxen ran through the trees till they came to a pond and simply waded out in the water and stopped.

After standing in the water awhile, Pa, with his Gee or Haw or whatever they say to oxen to get them to go, drove out of the water and went on home without further trouble. This run away happened ten or twelve years after the Civil War, where Pa was a Confederate soldier.

It seems one of the most exciting things that could happen on a farm long ago, was a run away. Even in Grandmother's childhood.

**IS WIND EROSION IMPORTANT?**

Is wind erosion important? Ask any housewife that has to clean up the after effects of blowing dust and pay high prices for food produced on worn out land. When one considers the proven fact that on a day when a slight haze is in the air there is enough soil suspended in the air to a height of one mile over a section of land to cover an area of 60 acres to a depth of one foot. This soil would weigh 126,000 tons. The allowable soil loss from one acre for a year in order to maintain fertility and adequate depth for lasting production is five tons. This would mean that 25,200 acres have, in one slight dust storm lost the allowable five tons per year.

We also know that the dust that is suspended is made up of smaller particles and is very high in organic matter. When we lose our organic matter and smaller soil particles we change the texture of the soil, reduce the fertility and the ability to produce. This can be seen in the dune areas in our sandy soil.

In reducing wind erosion we cannot control the moisture and temperature of our natural climate. We can control the roughness and ridges in our fields with emergency tillage in dry seasons. The best way for land users of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District to control wind erosion is to prepare a means of control before the wind starts. This can be done by having our land protected by wind breaks, close spaced high residue producing crops and leaving large amounts of residue on the land.

The next time the wind is blowing visualize the amount of soil being carried away and ask yourself, "Is there anything I can and should do to prevent this wind erosion?"



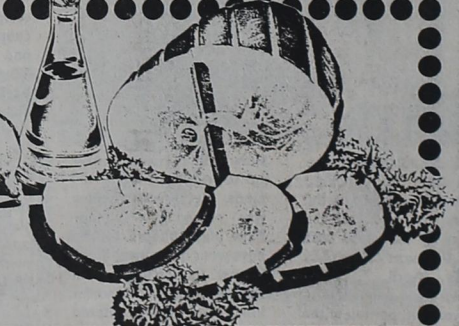
