WHAT ARE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains exemptions.

A homestead exemption is a reduction in the taxable value of your residence homestead. Various types of homestead exemptions are available in Texas and, if you qualify, they can reduce your total property tax bill. Read on for details.

What Exemptions Are Available? Are Available?

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are disabled or over 65.

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market or flood control tax rate, and may offer optional exemptions to the disabled and elderly.

Cities and other taxing districts may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly.

All local taxing units offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property. Additionally, many taxing units offer a local option, percentage homestead exemption to resident

TTow Do I Apply?

homeowners.

Applications for the disabled veterans' exemption must be filed annually with the county appraisal district office.

For other exemptions, if you received a residence homestead exemption on your present homestead in 1982, it will not be necessary for you to make a new application for 1983 in this appraisal district.

If you were 65 or disabled on January 1 and have not previously filed for the over-65 or disability homestead exemption, you will need to make application this year.


Or, if you have never received a homestead exemption on your present home, an original application should be filed in 1983.

Applications should be made to the county appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available from the appraisal office.

Ts There a **■** Deadline?

For 1983, applications should be filed on or before May 2. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in certain instances, you can fully protect your rights by applying before the May 2 rendition deadline.

The State Property Tax Board has a pamphlet, Taxpayers' Rights. Remedies, Responsibilities!, to help you understand your local property taxes. Get a free copy at the appraisal district office or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

This risky cooking method may cause the can to overheat

and explode, says Sweeten. According to Sweeten, several popular cookbooks recently published by clubs and organizations in Texas contain recipes that recommend heat-

ing condensed milk in the can. Numerous inquiries and reported problems have prompted Extension Service home economists to warn against the use of this method.

To avoid burns as well as spattered stoves and sticky clothes, Sweeten recommends preparing the caramel custard from condensed milk as fol-

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. and pour one can of sweetened condensed milk into an 8-inch glass pie plate. Cover with aluminum foil. place in a shallow pan of hot water and bake for one hour until the milk becomes thick and lightly caramel colored. Remove the foil, cool and use as the recipe recommends. STIR-FRY TO SAVE TIME.

ENERGY AND NUTRIENTS Save time, energy and nutrients-cook stir-fry style!

Stir-fry involves cooking slivers or cubes of vegetables, meat, fish or poultry in hot oil at 425 degrees using a wok or skillet.

This form of rapid cooking over high heat originated in China and was used when fuel and food were scarce. The Chinese emphasized preparation and variation of their cuisine.

In addition, the Chinese philsophy of beauty dicated their guildelines for combining colors, flavors and textures of

foods to create contrast and harmony in all dishes.

Stir-frying retains the natural flavors of the food as the hot oil preserves the color flavor and crispness of the vegetables and seals in natural juices of poultry, meats and seafood.

Vegetables and meats stay bright, crisp, nutritious and flavorful with stir-fry cooking. Of course, each food has its own cooking time. Thick or

ing time while tender foods need less time. To ensure that ingredients are sufficiently cooked, add each food to the pan separately

dense foods need more cook-

in a recommended sequence. Add a small amount of liquid efficient in both human

and fuel terms. One seeming drawback is that Chinese styles of cooking take more preparation time beforehand than American methods.

For example, preparing hamburger patties for frying the American way requires little time, whereas chopping beef into pieces for the Chinese stir-fry method takes about five minutes.

But the Chinese stir-fry method "redeems" itself during actual cooking since it requires only one or two minutes of cooking time while hamburgers generally cook about 10-12 minutes.

For maximum energy conservation in stir-fry cooking, use small electrical appliances such as a wok or a frying pan rather than the range or over

Also, use small amounts of liquid, seldom more than onehalf inch, and cover pans tightly. These procedures enable liquid and foods to reach and maintain boiling temperature with less fuel. In addition, cooking will be faster, and foods will have an improved appearance while more nu trients will be retained.

taxpayers in Wheeler County Appraisal District who take advantage of various residence homestead exemptions available in Texas, but some homeowners may need to file initial applications with the district appraisal office by May 2 this

According to Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser for the district, provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code now permit a one-time initial application for residence homestead exemptions rather than requiring annual application as previously.

However, taxpayers who have never received a residence homestead exemption on the homes they now live in, and those who became 65 years old or disabled during 1982 must make the one-time application this year in order

A residence homestead is a structure, together with improvements and land up to 20 acres, used by the owner for residential purposes. Copeland said that, to qualify for homestead exemptions, a property must meet four tests:

It must be owned by the person or persons claiming the exemption; it must be designed or adapted for human residence; it must actually be used as a residence, and it must be occupied as the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the

exemption. A moblie home, if it fills the requirements, can be claimed as a homestead, even if it is on leased land, Copeland said. She added, "A taxpayer can still qualify for the exemptions if a portion of his residence is used for other purposes, such as a business in the home. And the home will not lose the exemption if the owner moves away temporarily, provided he intends to return and does not claim a home-stead somewhere else."

Among the various types of homestead exemptions provided by Texas tax law are two which must be granted by a school district to taxpayers who qualify. School districts offer a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all homeowners and an additional \$10,000 exemption to those who are 65 years of age or older or who are disabled.

An advantage associated with the over-65 school exemption is that elderly homeowners receive a "tax freeze", or "ceiling", on the school taxes they are assessed in the first year of qualification. Although the appraised value of these homesteads may fluctuate with the market, taxes due the school district will not increase. An exception to the ceiling is the addition of an improvement, other than repairs or general maintenance. In this case, the value of the new improvement will be taxed at current market value and tax rate and the taxes due will be added to the previous tax amount to create a new

The burden of property tax- has to apply for the over-65 es for 1983 can be reduced for school tax exemption in order to get the ceiling. The homeowner must be 65 years old or more on January 1, 1983 to qualify for the elderly exemp-

> tion and tax freeze. Any taxing unit's governing body may vote to offer an exemption of a minimum \$3,000 on the homesteads of disabled and/or elderly taxpayers. Only in school districts however, is a tax freeze established for taxes on over-65 homesteads.

In addition, many taxing units may be offering a localoption homestead exemption based on a percentage of the home's value. Because of a constitutional amendment passed in 1981, any taxing unit may exempt up to 40 percent of the value of all homesteads in the unit. No matter what the percentage, the dollar amount of exemption must be at least to received exemptions for \$5,000. This exemption is granted at the option of each

child abuse are: as a parent, know where your children are-who they're with and what they're doing. Accept responsiblitity for their safety. Ask your child what happens when they're alone with babysitters, friends, etc. Pay attention to your children-take time to be an understanding listener. Encourage your children to talk to you about any problems or questions they have, and not to keep secrets. Discuss the subject of sexual child abuse with your children frequently.

As a member of the community efforts of social agencies and police to deal with the problem. Encourage and support specialized treatment for the abuser and the child when incest is involved. Encourage treatment of abusers, in or out of prison. Support children's rights to accurate information about sexual child abuse.

You can help protect children from sexual abuse. Find out about the causes, extent, effects of sexual child abuse. Teach children about sexual abuse and how to take precautions. Be alert for signs of sexual abuse in children you know or come in contact with. Give emotional support if your child or a playmate is sexually abused. Give your support to programs that are working to prevent sexual child abuse.
