
Livestock Water


women whose children failed to return books worth more than \$120 from the Veterans Memorial Library and its branch in the nearby town of Shepherd.

BOOKS BY MAIL

Is there anything more welcome than the postman bringing a package to you? And is there anything more rewarding to occupy your time on a cold winter day then curling up with a good book?

The Wheeler Public Library and the Texas Panhandle Library System are cooperating to bring you books-bymail, a service free of charge to residents of the top twentyfive counties of Texas. The service, funded through a grant from the Texas State Library, is designed as a supplement to regular library service for people unable to use their libraries on a regular basis.

Throughout the Panhandle, many people who live in nursing homes or are homebound, ill, geographically isolated or otherwise unable to regularly visit their own libraries are taking advantage of books-by-mail.

Catalogs containing lists and descriptions of five hundred paperback books are available in all public libraries in the area. Types of books include mysteries, romances, westerns, adventure stories, how-to-books, best sellers and books for children and teens. Books from the catalog are ordered on a special postagepaid card mailed to the Texas Panhandle Library System in Amarillo. Books are set to



Hartman, C.E.D To participate in the PIK program, the farm must be enrolled in the 1983 acreage reduction and paid land diversion programs and have a PIK contract submitted by March 11, 1983. However, all producers must sign a copy of the contract by no later than March 17. Also, upland cotton producers participating in PIK may elect to voluntarily divert any amount up to 5 percent of their crop acreage base for cash payment. Each base

stands on its own. PIK participants with outstanding price support loans as of March 11, 1983 or loans obtained on 1982 crops after March 11 for the commodity in the county in which the PIK is earned must make enough of the collateral for such loans available for use in satisfying their PIK compensation. In addition, at CCC's option, producers may be required to use 1983 production for this purpose if an adequate quantit is not otherwise available. Wheat, corn, sorghum, and rice producers with more than one outstanding loan may choose which loan(s) for use in satisfying their PIK compensation.

Wheat, corn, and grain sorghum producers having no outstanding price support loans for the commodity within the county in which the PIK is earned will receive their commodity as payment-in-kind from CCC stocks which are located at an approved warehouse. Likewise, any producers having an insufficient outstanding amount of a loan quantity will receive their balance of the PIK commidity from CCC.




