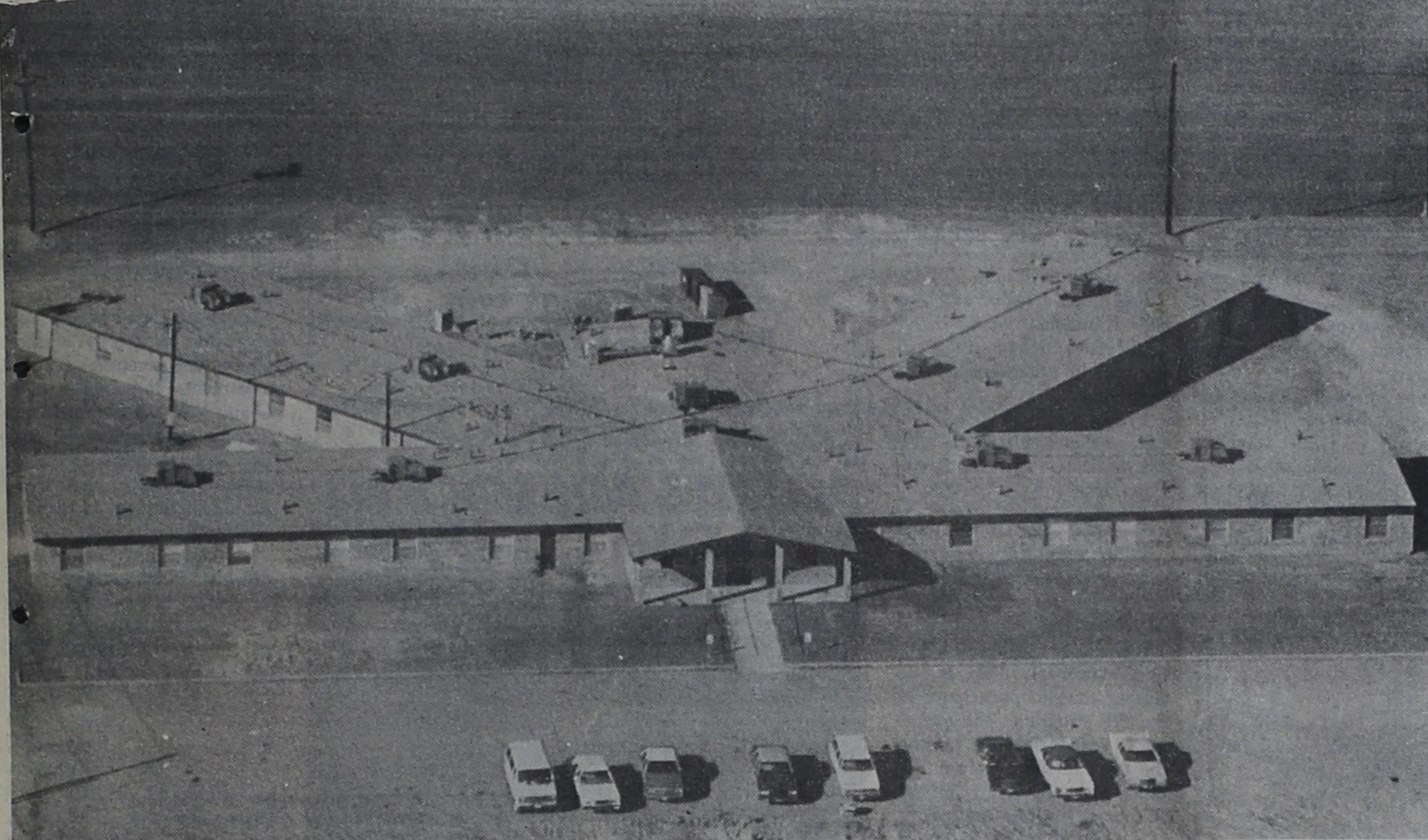

Wheeler Care Center is an example of Wheeler working together for the good of the community. When Roy Robertson came to Wheeler he was met with enthusiasm; after visiting with Lyndon Loyd, then president of the Chamber of Commerce, and Charles Hix, Administrator of Parkview Hospital, Robertson decided Wheeler needed and wanted a rest home. This was only the beginning.

A suitable location was found on the paving in the Parklane Estates addition in the southwest section of Wheeler; this land was later purchased. The late Jay Thompson was the president of the Chamber of Commerce at this time and he joined the crusade to make the home a

reality. Wheeler was well represented at two hearings in Amarillo, the first steps in obtaining the certificate of need. When it came time to go to Austin, John C. Vise furnished the plane; Allen Hix served as pilot for Vise, Charles Hix and yours truly. They were met in Austin by Jay Thompson and his wife Gretta. Pete Burton was unable to attend the meeting, but furnished the car for Jay and Gretta to make the trip.) In making these meetings, we knew we had the approval of the "folks back home."

I'm sure Jay Thompson would have enjoyed seeing this project completed. Gretta, Thanks for sharing your husband with his community.

The Formal Opening and Dedication for Wheeler Care Center is scheduled for Sunday, February 13, 1983. The services will begin at 2:30 at the facility located at 1000 South Kiowa Street.

The 90 bed, 22,000 square foot structure was completed in December and the final approval was given for the admission of patients on Monday, January 3. Residents are making their home at the center as of Tuesday, February 8.

Listed on the program are B.A. Hyatt, administrator, Louis C. Stas, Mayor, and Roy B. Robertson, co-owner. Musical entertainment will be provided by Linda Cooper and the Wheeler County Quartet. Rev. Ricky Pfeil, Rev. David Cooper, Rev. Ernie McGaughy and Father B.A. Erpen will have a part on the program.

The public is invited and encouraged to attend.

Hostesses for the affair will be Zi Upsilon Eta, a Wheeler Sorority; these ladies will also be in charge of the refreshments. Thursday Review, Wednesday Study and Progressive Study, Wheeler's Federated clubs, are in charge of the welcome line and decorations. The first, second and third grade students at Wheeler Elementary have been asked to help with door and table decorations.

Builders of Wheeler Care Center were Robert T. Helton and Roy Robertson, both of Burleson, Texas. The nursing home business is not new to Helton and Robertson; they

are involved in other nursing homes in the state.

Thirty beds in the operation are reserved for Personal Care. Personal Care can be compared to a boarding house situation, in that individuals not requiring constant nursing will have housekeeping, prepared meals and fellowship of their friends. In many cases older citizens are able to care for themselves, but do not eat properly and maintain a "hermit" type existence due to their inability to get around. Personal Care in the nursing home type atmosphere is relatively new to Texas and promises to fill a need in our society.

In a speech made at Kiwanis Monday, February 7, Mr. Hyatt reminded the group that nursing homes are not limited to caring for the elderly; the infirm (cripples or afflicted) also make a home in nursing homes.

Wheeler has recognized its need for a nursing home and efforts have been made to obtain such a facility for a number of years. Each time some obstacle stood in the way—the proper location could not be found, the price

was too high or financial backing could not be found. In 1973 Dale Walker, a partner of Robertson's, was interested enough in a resthome in Wheeler to get a certificate of need.

Roy Robertson came to Wheeler in 1979 to see if the need still existed. He met with Lyndon Loyd, then president of the Chamber of Commerce, and Charles Hix, Administrator of Parkview Hospital. Robertson found the local support he needed and persuaded the project. After much work and support on the local level we see the completion and operation of Wheeler Care Center. The home operates under the name Roy B. Robertson and Assoc., Inc., DBA Wheeler Care Center.

Rehabilitation Road Program

Wasting no time in deploying the recently appropriated Federal Highway funds, the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission approved a \$140 million Bridge Replacement and Rehabilitation Program January 27, 1983.

Wheeler County's share of this total is \$720,000, which will be used for replacement of rehabilitation of the bridge at Sweetwater Creek, 4.2 miles east of Gray County Line on State Highway 152 and at Sweetwater Creek, 8.0 miles east of Gray County Line on State Highway 152.

Childress District Engineer Lewis H. White said that the \$7,143,000 approved for the Childress District will be used for bridge improvements in five counties.

The two-year program will upgrade 245 bridges in Texas. Last year TRIP (The Road Information Program) published a national survey showing Texas leading the nation in deficient bridges.

"This two-year program will get a number of bridges on our system up to standard," said Wayne Henneberger, State Bridge Engineer of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT).

 Friday morning, January 28, it's raining out of the South and pretty cool.

Where did this week go. Corrections; we mortgaged the horses not houses. We did not own our house. Roosevelt started what they called New Deal. This W.P.A., he put unemployed to work on roads. There was a hoe come out called the W.P.A. hoe. It cut from both sides. One way to get short on food is let this land lay out. In 1930 we let land lay out, drilled grass on it, received a little government check. We really enjoyed this government check. (\$5.00 a month would pay all our electricity bills. At first, our grandparents had to go to a neighbor or they came to them and borrow coals of fire. Their most worry was a prairie fire.

Scotty Parker bought him a pig and lamb for his FFA school project about a month before their show time. His lamb started to pull her fur off and eat it. He had to put her in a straight jacket.

Scotty took her to the Show Barn last week. He sheared her, gave her no water, and when he did, she bloated and died. We sure hated to hear of this bad luck. All that expense and labor.

Colie Parker visited Claude and Mable Parker Friday. Our ground has had large cracks in it. I think due to not enough moisture and so cold. You see it in the hot dry summers, large cracks.

Saturday, January 28 is a real nice day. Just about right in every way.

I have pulled cotton bales for 25 cents per 100 pound and chopped cotton for 75 cents per day. The way the owner worked us was, he said he would pay us 75 cents a row. The rows were 1 mile long. We jumped at this and do you know, it took us all day to hoe on one row and we had to really slaughter those weeds to do it in a day.

In the 1950's the rabbits got so thick, they had rabbit drives. I went to one west of where Doc Wilhelm lives now. I went to several in Jackson county Okla., before we came up here. One of my brother-in-laws came down from Amar. The boys and Mac would go rabbit hunting, one weekend they killed 75. Now that really thinned them out.

One of my cousins married a boy, his nick name was Hoover. I asked her why nickname Hoover, she said his father said, when he was little boy, most of the people only had bisquits on Sunday, cornbread rest week. This boy hid enough bisquits to last him during the week. So his dad nicknamed him Hoover. His dad said he bet president Hoover did not eat cornbread all week.

PIK PROGRAM

We would remind you again that March 11, 1983 is the closing date to participate in the PIK Program. The operator is responsible for placing the farm in the program. All producers who share in the PIK must sign the contract.

It takes quite a bit of time to complete these contracts so please don't wait until the last few days. If you have not signed into the program by the above date, you will not be eligible for any program benefits.

The final date to file a base or yield appeal is February 15, 1983.

To be eligible for the PIK Program a producer must also participate in the Acreage Reduction Program. The PIK Program allows a producer to leave an additional 10-30% of his acreage base idle in 1983. For leaving the land idle. A producer will receive the following compensation in bushels or pounds:

Wheat—95% of the farm established yield times PIK acres

Grain Sorghum & Corn—80% of the farm established yield times PIK acres

Cotton—80% of the farm established yield times PIK acres

Compensation for accepted whole base PIK contracts will be the bid percentage times the farm program yield times the PIK acres.

Producers who sign a PIK contract are bound to do what the contract states.

The non-grazing dates for Conservation Use Acreage will be from March 1, 1983 thru August 31, 1983. This is still another change from what we had in our last newsletter.

4-H IS 75 YEARS OLD IN TEXAS

 This year marks the 75th anniversary of 4-H in Texas.

Since 1908 when County Agent Tom Marks organized the original Boys Corn Club in Jack County, 4-H has grown

into a dynamic organization of some 125,000 youths in Texas and more than 5 million throughout the nation, points out Linda Daughtry, county Extension agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Out of the land-grant college system begun in 1962, a need evolved to educate young people who might be interested in following agriculture for a career. Thus the corn clubs of the early 1900s became the foundation for 4-H. These clubs were designed to teach the latest principles of agricultural production to youth who would, in turn, demonstrate their new-found knowledge and skills on their family farms.

With its roots in agriculture, 4-H has since expanded and broadened its scope and now offers more than 60 different project opportunities for boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19.

The mission of 4-H TODAY is to help youth acquire knowledge, develop life skills and form attitudes that will make them self-directing, productive, and contributing members of society.

Today's 4-Hers are active in such areas as energy conservation, environmental improvement, community service and food production. They participate in programs that aid youth employment and career decisions, health, nutrition, home improvement and family relationships.

4-H clubs and projects are offered in virtually every community in the U.S. today, with local volunteer leaders providing their time and energy to insure that 4-H'ers have a chance to grow and develop to their full potential.

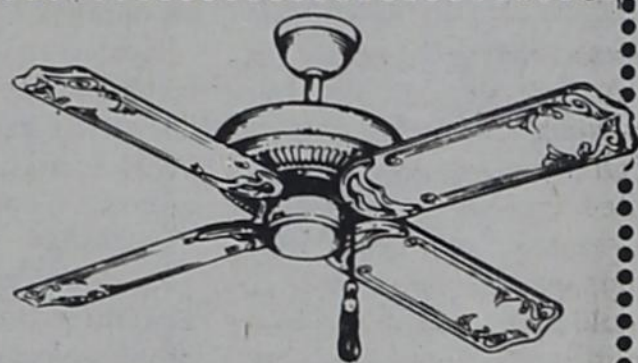

capitol comments
 A few teachers have expressed their concern about a proposed drop in the percentage of the teacher and the state pays into the Teacher Retirement System. There is no need for concern. A well-known actuarial consulting firm recommended the state's contribution be dropped from 8.5 percent to 7.1 and the individual teacher's contribution drop from 6.65 percent to 6.00 percent. This will save the State \$200 million. It will save Texas Teachers almost \$100 million. The good investments by the board, the extremely high earnings due to high interest rates and good management were cited as reasons why the contributions could be lowered. This will save each individual teacher about \$120.00 annually. This should be considered good news in view of the tight budget in which we are facing.
 For many years prior to the 1981 Legislative Session, teachers pay was considered after most of the other items had been built into the budget. During the 1981 session, teachers were considered along with all other segments of the budget. As a result of hard work by the Education Committee and the Appropriation Committee in 1981, teachers were given some of the best raises in years. Some of these raises were accomplished by the Education Committee cutting out fat items in areas not needed. I feel this same process will occur again. We do not need to be pulling any items out of the budget for last or first consideration. We must consider each item, along with others, like placing a jigsaw puzzle together. To do otherwise will cause divisiveness among different groups and factions affected by the State budget.
 Governor Mark White endorsed the election of the Public Utility Commission. I see an appointed commission as being a much wiser route to follow. Appointees get screened through the Governor's office with exhaustive checks made. They are interrogated for days in the Senate. Sometimes to the point of total invasion of privacy. How intelligent was your vote on the Supreme Court or Civil Appeals Court judges? How are you satisfied with the rate and regulatory decision of the

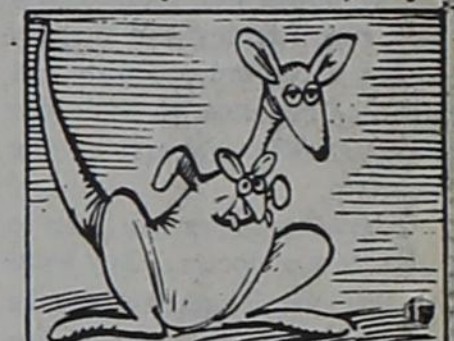

WHITE SETS PRIORITIES

AUSTIN -- Governor Mark White recently told the 68th Legislature that he has been hearing voices -- your voices.
As he explained in his State of the State address, the voices have come from

overcrowded school rooms, unemployed farmworkers and laborers, victims of crime, taxpayers and many others.

You have not been shy about telling us what you want -- safe streets, quality schools, reasonable utility rates, fair and open government, decent job opportunities and a fair profit for your goods and services. We believe your expectations are reasonable, and we are encouraged by White's positive approach to the problems at hand.

The new governor says education is his first priority. In fact, he has even declared teacher salaries an emergency issue so the Legislature will consider it first.

In the past, education has been at the end of the line, taking whatever "leftover funds" it could get. This session, it looks like education may get one of the first slices of the pie.

We think that's important when you consider that the population of Texas has increased more than 25 percent in the last decade. Experts say that the state should maintain an annual 5 percent increase in the number of new teachers to keep up with the number of students enrolling in Texas schools. Unfortunately, the state has seen a decrease of 7 percent instead, as those who might have become teachers accept higher-paying jobs in business and industry. That is disturbing news, and we are well aware that the steps we take today toward improving education may well determine the success or failure of our future.

Governor White was also positive in his attitude toward agriculture. We realize that not all agriculture problems can be solved by the state. However, we can do more, and White addressed that very issue.

The governor indicated his willingness to work with various commodity associations. He said he wants to promote on a state level more foreign markets for Texas agricultural products, as well as allocate more state money for agricultural research and development. He further supports increased emphasis on water recovery technology.

That certainly sounds like good news for our district. In addition, Governor White promised to work with both the Legislature and you by maintaining an open, responsive and courteous administration.

Sunday, Feb. 6, sun came out and melted some. Sure looked-like a different world with that sun out. Colie got a tractor started, and broke little snow drifts down.

Enjoyed Reda Mae Turner's write up on Dust Bowl Days. Now how do I remember those dust bowl days. I remember that dust rolling and all of the dust that Sunday afternoon. We had spent the weekend with Colie's folks. Mr. Parker went out to gather his hen eggs. He came in and mentioned a cloud coming out of the North. We went out and began to watch it. We could never get Mr. Parker in the cellar. Mrs. Parker would get scared and cry. She would go now and then. I always gathered the kids and went. Mr. Parker asked me time and again, what I had done so bad, I was afraid to die. I would tell him God gave the chickens and geese since to run for cover from a bad cloud.

Now as it neared, you could see it as far West and as far East it was rolling. Mr. Parker was breathing hard. He was the first one in the cellar, giving orders for all to get in the cellar quick. They all went down in the cellar. I stayed up to see. That sight I had never seen anything like that before and I have never since.

We missed church Sunday. Our pickup was stuck in a snow drift in our road. I doubt we could have made it out. Joe Dukes wanted to come get us. I was afraid he would get stuck. Most all the churches had church.

I talked to Maybell Childress' daughter Fern Reed. She said Maybell came home from the hospital Thursday. Was feeling fairly well Sunday.

Our mail carrier made it to our box Thursday, Friday, and

Saturday. Don't know how.

Monday morning. Don't think we got any more snow last night, but our trees are frosted over pretty good.

Now I think Irene Zybach is pretty good on weather. Some years ago, we were having drought. She told me one day

we are to have 3 more years of drought and we did. Just after Christmas she told me we are to have a snow and ice that we never had in history. Well, Amarillo is saying their worst in 50 years already. They are saying we are not to get any more snow. I wonder. Just to look out we are far from seeing the ground.

My news sounds like a diary. I didn't get any news called in.

Roads have been blocked and hazardous so there was no school at Briscoe four days and traffic at a minimum. No church at Gageby Church Sunday.

Willis and Verna Fillingim drove a tractor to Briscoe Sunday and ate lunch with the Dale Stinnett family and played 72. They ate supper with the Bob Ratliffs.

CAPITOL UPDATE

When the President sent his new budget to Congress last week, he was taking only the first step of a process which may, regrettably, last the entire year. Approving legislation which collectably becomes the federal budget has become an unwieldy process that Congress in recent years has found impossible to complete, much less spend needed time on other kinds of legislation.

Throughout our legislative history there have been two steps to approving the expenditure of federal money -- authorization and appropriation.

Authorization legislation comes through "authorizing" committees, such as the Armed Services Committee for national defense spending, the Agriculture Committee for spending in that area, and so forth. Since these committees are experts in their assigned subjects, they evaluate requests from the Administration and report legislation to the full Senate for consideration.

The authorization bill sets spending ceilings, specifies how money can and cannot be spent and generally outlines a congressional guide map for the direction government should be taking in the area in question.

Once that legislation has been passed, the next step is appropriation. The traditional emphasis for this second bill -- considered through the Appropriations Committee -- is on the amount of money to be spent rather than on issues of policy. Typically, appropriations legislation sets specific spending ceilings for those categories covered by the authorization bill, and it is this figure which sets the actual spending limit.

In 1974, Congress added yet another step to the approval process when it enacted legislation requiring a series of budget resolutions to be passed. The idea behind the legislation was sound. Congress was considering funding for each area of federal responsibility separately, never looking at the overall total. No one had ever had to make tough decisions as to what area to cut in order to make room in the budget for increases in another.

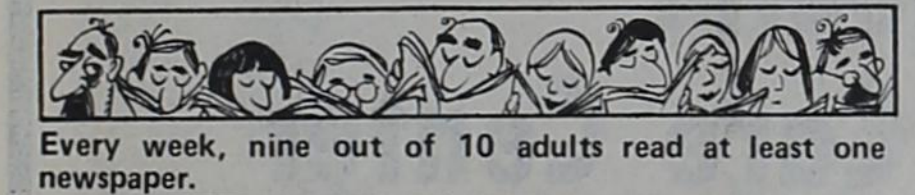
In the course of passing the First and Second Concurrent Budget Resolutions, an overall ceiling on federal spending is established, with target maximums for each budget function. In theory, at least, once the total is established Congress cannot increase funding for one area without decreasing it in another. In this way, Congress retains control on overall federal spending.

During the first years of congressional budgeting, the process was largely ignored. Congress continued to act as before, passing waivers to the requirements of the Budget Act as a routine matter.

In 1981, however, the budget process was brought to life as a serious tool in the effort to control federal deficits. Since then, the spending limits set in the First Concurrent Budget Resolution, passed in the spring, largely govern what can be included in both authorization and appropriations legislation.

Again, the goal of limiting federal spending is one which we must seek to attain. But in practice, superimposing another procedure on the existing ones has slowed down the business of government. The Budget Committee, on which I serve, in many cases has sought to go beyond establishing a reasonable total for federal spending to attempt to impose specific direction for each area -- a task already handled by the authorizing committees. Governing today requires tough budget decisions, decisions which inevitably are hotly contested by special interest groups. Since we now must pass three pieces of legislation instead of two before funding decisions can be considered final, there are three opportunities to fight each action.

We must begin to think of ways to streamline the process so that we can more ably examine carefully each proposed expenditure, keep an eye on the overall spending total and still act expeditiously to keep government running.

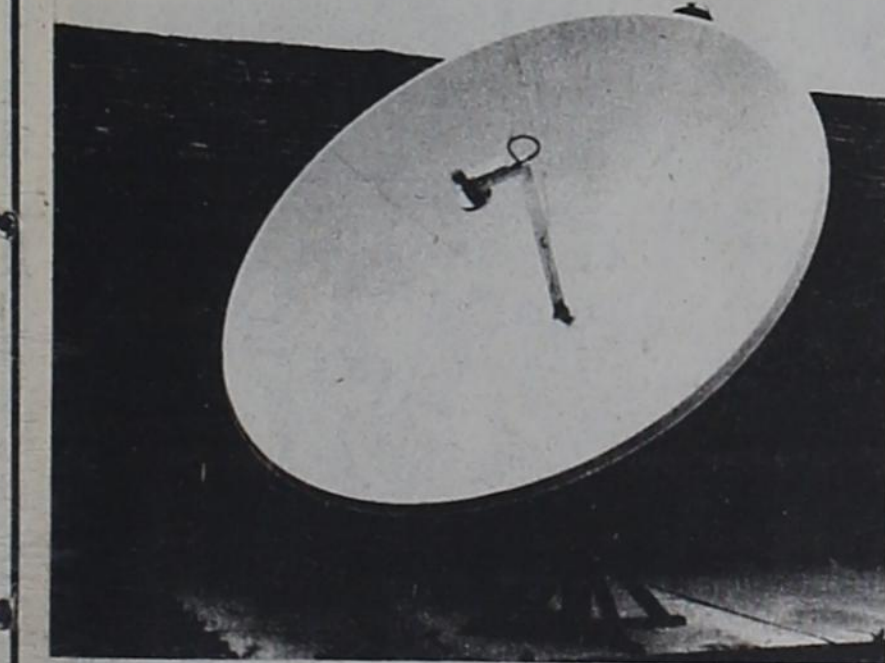

TEXAS FARM BUREAU NEWS

The new president of the Texas Farm Bureau believes the American farmers and ranchers will survive the current economic crisis facing agriculture because, like himself, they share an optimistic attitude about the future.

S.M. True Jr. of Plainview, elected in December at the Texas Farm Bureau convention in Dallas, recalled that he faced three options as a young man just returning home in 1945 after service as a Navy officer fighter pilot in World War II.

True could have become a civilian pilot, finished his college education at Texas Technological University which he began prior to the war, or followed in his father's footsteps as a farmer in Hale County on the South Plains.

He chose farming, a business which blossomed for him in the succeeding 37 years.

True produces cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans, wheat on his 960-acre farm near Plainview.

A native of Goree in Knox County, True was one of eight children. The family moved to Hale County in 1933. He graduated from Plainview High School. After returning from World War II, True entered farming. He joined the Texas Farm Bureau in 1952, rising to the ranks of secretary-treasurer, vice president and president of the Hale County Farm Bureau.

True was elected to the TFB Board of Directors in 1975. He served two years as secretary-treasurer and was in his third year as vice president when elected president.

True serves on the Cotton Board, a quasi-government body empowered by Congress to administer the cotton's research and promotion program. He is a member of the boards of directors of Southern Farm Bureau Life and Casualty Insurance companies.

As TFB president, he is president of the Texas Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Company, Texas Agricultural Marketing and Development Association, Texas Agricultural Service Company and the TFB Rural Health Association, Inc.

Locally, True serves as chairman of the Hale County Program Building Committee of the Extension Service, secretary of the Hi-Plains Hospital Board of Directors, president of the Hale County Fair Board and as a member of the Plainview Federal Land Bank Association. He is a past member of the Board of Directors of United Farm Industries, a local grain cooperative.

Just as his own farming career has proven highly successful, True believes the future of the family farmer remains promising. True sees the incentive inherent in family farming as a clear advantage over corporate farming operations.

Whereas corporate farm employees merely seek a salary, the family farmer seeks for both a profit and the challenge of outdoing his neighbor, True observed.

The competitiveness of a free enterprise system remains the stimulus for the family farm, True believes.

A challenge facing True as he begins office is maintaining Texas Farm Bureau's newly-achieved number one status

among state Farm Bureaus with 306,359 member families.

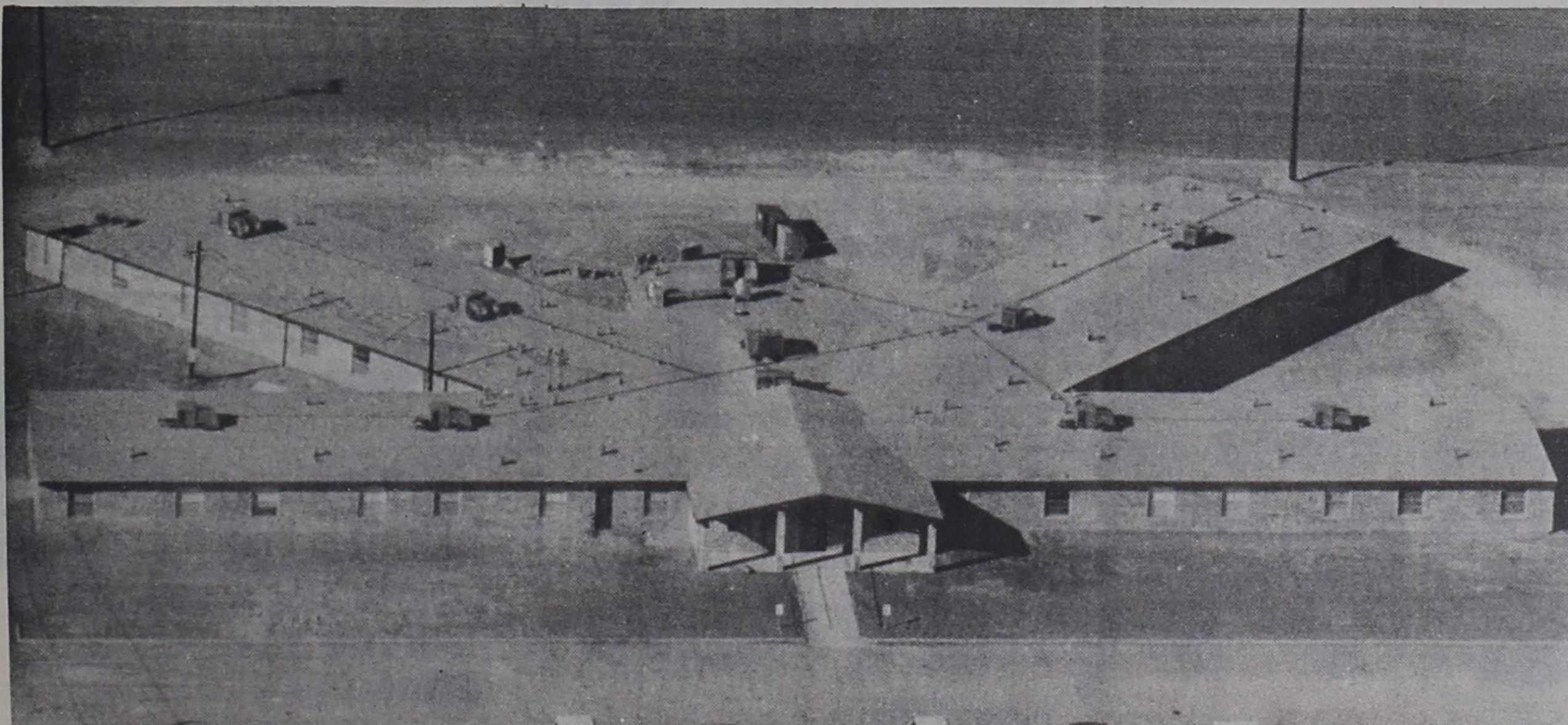

The United States Congress recently passed a law that will adversely affect you and most other savers in the nation. Under this law, all banks, savings and loans, money market mutual funds, credit unions, mutual savings banks, and other payers of interest or dividends will be required to automatically withhold 10% of the interest and dividends earned by their customers and transmit this amount to the IRS. You already have to pay income taxes on your interest earnings—but now the IRS wants to take 10% of your total interest in advance.

This rule is wrong for the following reasons:

- 1) Withholding will cut the amount of cash you have available during the year from your interest income.
- 2) The amount withheld may not be correct for your tax bracket. If overwithholding occurs, you will have to file for a tax refund to get back your own money.
- 3) Your total interest earnings will be reduced because of less income from reinvestment and compounding.
- 4) Elderly persons and low income individuals (including children) will have to file an exemption certificate for each and every account they have in order to avoid withholding. If the exemption is not filed in time, a tax return must be filed the next year — or the withheld money will be forfeited to the government.

Unless Congress acts to stop the withholding rule, it will go into effect on July 1, 1983. This bank is working to do away with the rule, but we need your help. IT'S YOUR MONEY.
