How To Avoid Family Feud Is Topk of Estate Seminar

"How to Avoid a Family Feud" is the title selected by the Executive Board of the Wheeler County Program Area Committees for its next estate planning seminar. The committee felt that proper estate planning can help families avoid stress after a death of a loved one, and scheduled a seminar on this important topic.

The seminar will begin at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, February 6, 1995 at the Wheeler School Auditorium.

Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Professor and Extension Specialist will conduct the program. As an attorney, Dr. Hayenga has led Texas Agricultural Extension Service educational programs in estate and tax planning for the past 23 years.

"Everybody needs a will" is a comment that can be heard at every funeral and most lawyers offices. This may or may not be true, depending on a person's financial and family circumstances and the goals on how to pass property after death. Most estates are planned to use a will, but not all. Other ways to pass property after death are with trusts, by contract such as life insurance and annuities, and through the use of property and account titles.

A real issue in estate planning is do you have all the necessary decisions made. Estate plans do three things after your death: (1) pass your property to your heirs; (2) appoint the person to give your property to your heirs; and (3) give guidance on who should be the guardian of any minor children.

An estate plan can work for you during your lifetime also, because, if one cannot handle his/her business affairs because of a stroke or other physical or mental disability, an estate planning tool can avoid the necessity of the appointment of a guardian to manage his/her personal and financial affairs.

SANDHILL ESTATES UPDATE

The Board of Directors of Sandhill Estates held two very productive meetings last week. Both meetings were with Mr. Gary Stats, president of the Covenant Group, Inc., the management group retained by Sandhill Estates to oversee the development of a retirement community for Wheeler.

The Board and Mr. Stats discussed a timetable for the marketing, financial procurement, and construction of Sandhill Estates Retirement Community. The second meeting included Mr. Mike Chase, an architect from Tulsa, OK. Mr. Chase looked over the proposed site for Sandhill Estates, then met with the Board and Mr. Stats to discuss building plans. Representatives from High Plains Natural Gas Co., and Southwestern Public Service Company were also on hand to discuss the project.

Both meetings saw much progress made. Plans were finalized for a detailed prospectus with which to approach investors in this worthwhile project. A brochure detailing services, floor plans and rental rates will also be prepared for potential residents. Mr. Chase was retained as architect for the project and will have preliminary renderings in time to be on display at the Chamber of Commerce banquet on February 13. A Sandhill Estates representative will also announce a tentative timetable for construction of the retirement community at the Chamber banquet.

Potential residents should be aware that soon after the preparation of the rental brochure, they will have the opportunity to reserve an apartment unit at Sandhill Estates by making an initial deposit. This deposit will be placed in escrow and will be fully refundable. Early reservations will allow residents first choice of available apartment colors and location in the building. Early reservations also will help to show potential investors the viability of this project. More detailed information will be available following the Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The Board of Directors of Sandhill Estates would like to thank everyone who has contributed to this project so far. Sufficient funds have been raised to allow work to begin on architectural plans and on compiling and printing the prospectus and marketing brochures. Additional funds are still needed to complete this phase of project development. Community support is essential to make construction of Sandhill Estates a reality.

WTAMU Awards Diplomas To Winter Graduates

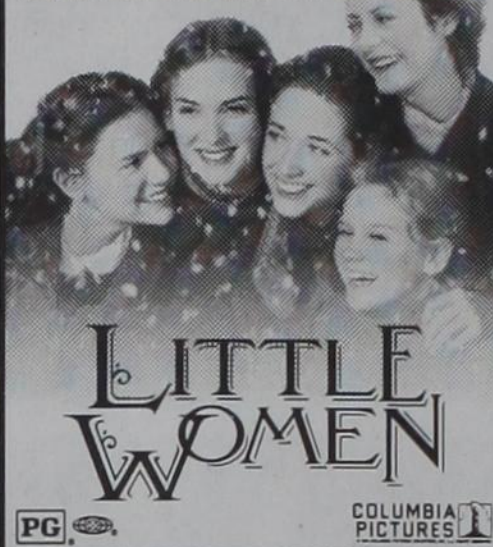

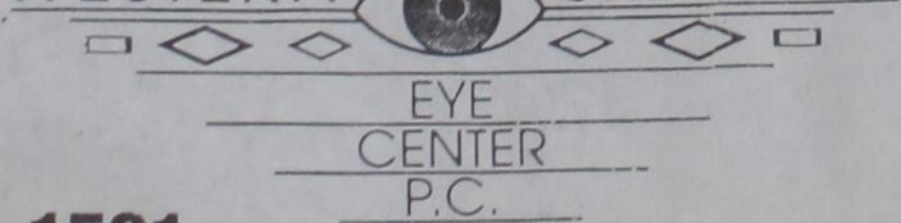

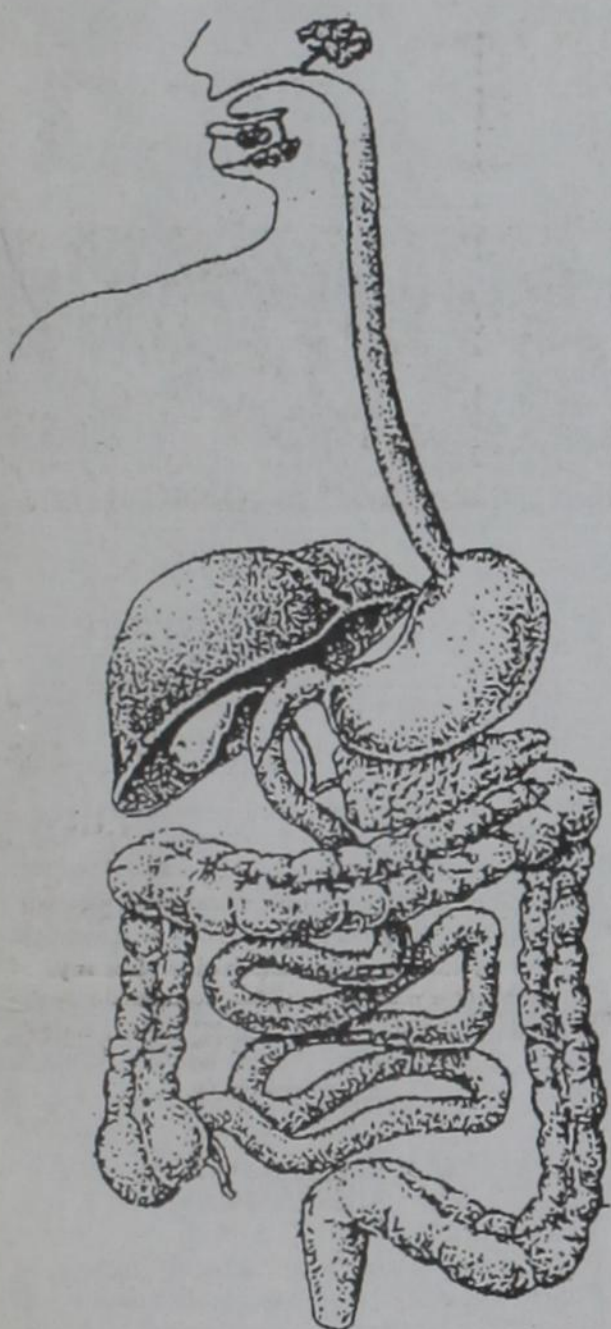
