"Everybody needs a will" is a comand most lawyers offices This may or may not be true, depending on a person's financial and family circumstances and the goals on how to pass property after death. Most estates are planned to use a will, but not all. Other ways to pass property after death are with trusts, by contract such as life insurance and annuities, and through the use of property and account titles.

A real issue in estate planning is do you have all the necessary decisions made. Estate plans do three things after your death: (1) pass your property to your heirs; (2) appoint the person to give your property to your heirs; and (3) give guidance on who should be the guardian of any minor children.

An estate plan can work for you during your lifetime also, because, if one cannot handle his/her business affairs because of a stroke or other physical or mental disability, an estate planning tool can avoid the necessity of the appointment of a gaurdian to manage his/her personal and financial

WHAT IS LOW-FAT MILK? Two percent is advertised as a lowfat food when, in fact, no definition classifies it as such. Milk labeling is deceptive.

Most people assume that a food labeled "2 % fat" is 98 percent fat free, but this is not the case. The percentages of fat on milk cartons are by weight, not by percentage of total calories, which is what counts. Whole milk actually averages only 3.3 percent fat by weight but has 51 percent of its calories from fat. "Low-fat" or 2% milk has 35 percent of its calories from fat. If you want a low-fat milk, stick with skim which has only 4 percent of its calories from fat.






