WINTER STORM PRODUCES .77" MOISTURE

The winter storm which lasted Monday through Thursday of last week produced a good amount of moisture but very little snow. Wheeler may have had an inch of snow at one time, but most of the moisture fell as sleet or freezing rain. The fine rain which accompanied the storm served to polish the already slick ice

and added weight to the power lines, TV towers and shrubs. Wheeler's electricity flickered only a few times, however people in the country had periods of time without electricity. The damage would have been worse if the wind had not remained calm. Moisture amounted to 0.77 inches. Measured Tuesday morning, January 18, was

0.11. An additional 0.27 was measured Thursday morning; this was the combined moisture produced Tuesday and Wednesday. The amount measured Friday morning was 0.39 inches. The moisture, snow, or rain—is collected in the gauge and measured at 7 a.m. each morning after the snow and ice have melted. The measurements therefore re-

fect the moisture fell for the 24 hours prior.

Wheeler citizens were apparently very cautious on the ice. All the finder benders were minor and the falls apparently did not result in broken bones. The Wheeler Ambulance was only called out one time during the storm and it was not an accident.

February 2, 1983 is the deadline for ordering wind break trees from the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. Several species are available with the overgreen trees costing \$1.50 each with a minimum order of 30 and the deciduous trees costing \$0.50 each with a minimum order of 100 (two species can be included.) Orders can be placed with the Wheeler County SWCS at the Soil Conservation Service office at Wheeler. Payment is required when placing the order. Delivery is scheduled for March 11, 1983.

KEEP HOT WATER AT "SAVE LEVEL"

Prevent hot-water burns and save energy, at the same time—in two easy steps. Keep your water heater at a "SAVE LEVEL"—to save lives, energy and money.

Remember most burn victims are older adults, preschoolers and the mentally and physically handicapped. Tap-water scalds cause 40 times more deaths than other types of scalds.

Two easy steps can keep family members out of hot water and result in significant energy—and money—savings. **TURN IT DOWN**

First, turn down your water heater, whether it's gas or electric.

Gas water heaters are easy to turn down because the temperature control is on the outside of the heater.

Most gas water-heater control dials are marked "hot" and "warm."

The safest place to set your dial is in the middle of the word "warm."

Most gas water heaters are preset at the factory between "hot" and "warm" at 140 degrees F.—a temperature that can cause a third-degree burn in only five seconds of contact.

Electric water heaters take a bit more effort for the turn down, but it's worth it. Control dials on electric water heaters are inside the cover plate of the heater.

To lower this thermostat, turn off the electric power, remove the cover plate, adjust the thermostat—to 120 degrees F. (or 48 degrees C.), replace the cover plate and turn the power back on.

TAKE WATER'S TEMPERATURE

Second, Measure your water's temperature to make sure it's safe.

Water temperature can vary within any tank by as much as 15-25 degrees regardless of the setting, so just turning the thermostat down does NOT guarantee safe levels.

The surest way to measure water is with a water thermometer, a candy thermometer or a meat thermometer.

Run hot tap water for three to five minutes before letting water run on the thermometer tip. Then let it run on the tip until the mercury stops rising.

If water temperature is 121 degrees F. or more, it's TOO HOT.

Turn down the water-heater control and test again a day later. Keep doing this until the thermometer shows a safer 120 degrees F.

COOLER STILL SANITARY
Cooler temperatures are still sanitary as there are no household needs that require water temperature greater than 120 degrees F.

Dishwashers clean adequately at 120 degrees F., although occasional spotting of glassware may occur.

STAY PUT FOR KIDS' BATHS

Finally, stay put for kids' baths—NEVER leave a child unattended in the bathroom.

Check water temperature before placing your child in the bathtub, and turn off the hot water BEFORE you turn off the cold water.

and faculty. The screening process consists of a very simple procedure. After a urine sample is produced in a paper cup a dip stick that works on the same principle as litmus paper is used to indicate PH, glucose, protein and blood in the urine. If a student show tendencies towards infection or kidney disease the parents will be sent a notice informing them that there is a need to be seen by a physician.

The early detection of kidney disease is extremely important. According to Dr. Miguel Rios, Chief Nephrologist at the Amarillo High Plains Dialysis Center and chairman of the Medical Advisory committee for the Kidney Foundation, 50% of all patients currently on dialysis could have been diagnosed during childhood. Some kidney diseases can be present for 20 years before any symptoms are present, by then 80% to 90% of the kidney function can be lost necessitating dialysis & kidney transplant. Dialysis involves being attached to the dialysis machine 3 times a week for up to 4 hours at a time, a restricted diet and fluid intake as well as medication. All this is just to live a reasonably normal life.

Currently we have approximately 200 people who are on dialysis from the Panhandle. Kidney transplants are 75% successful from a related donor. There are several successful kidney transplants from this area.

Kidney and urinary tract diseases affect more than 13 million American men, women and children and continues to be one of the major causes to work loss and school absenteeism. The mortality rate due to kidney disease is 54,000 nationally each year, as many people as died in the Vietnam War and more than die in traffic accidents annually.

The Beta Sigma Phi, and Alpha Mu Alpha sorority in Wheeler is a strong supporter for the kidney foundation. They have assisted with volunteers in helping the urinalysis screening project work smoothly. They sponsor a candy sales project for the kidney foundation which helps to make the urinalysis screening possible and provides for patients with kidney disease, as well as research for the cause, prevention and cure for kidney disease.

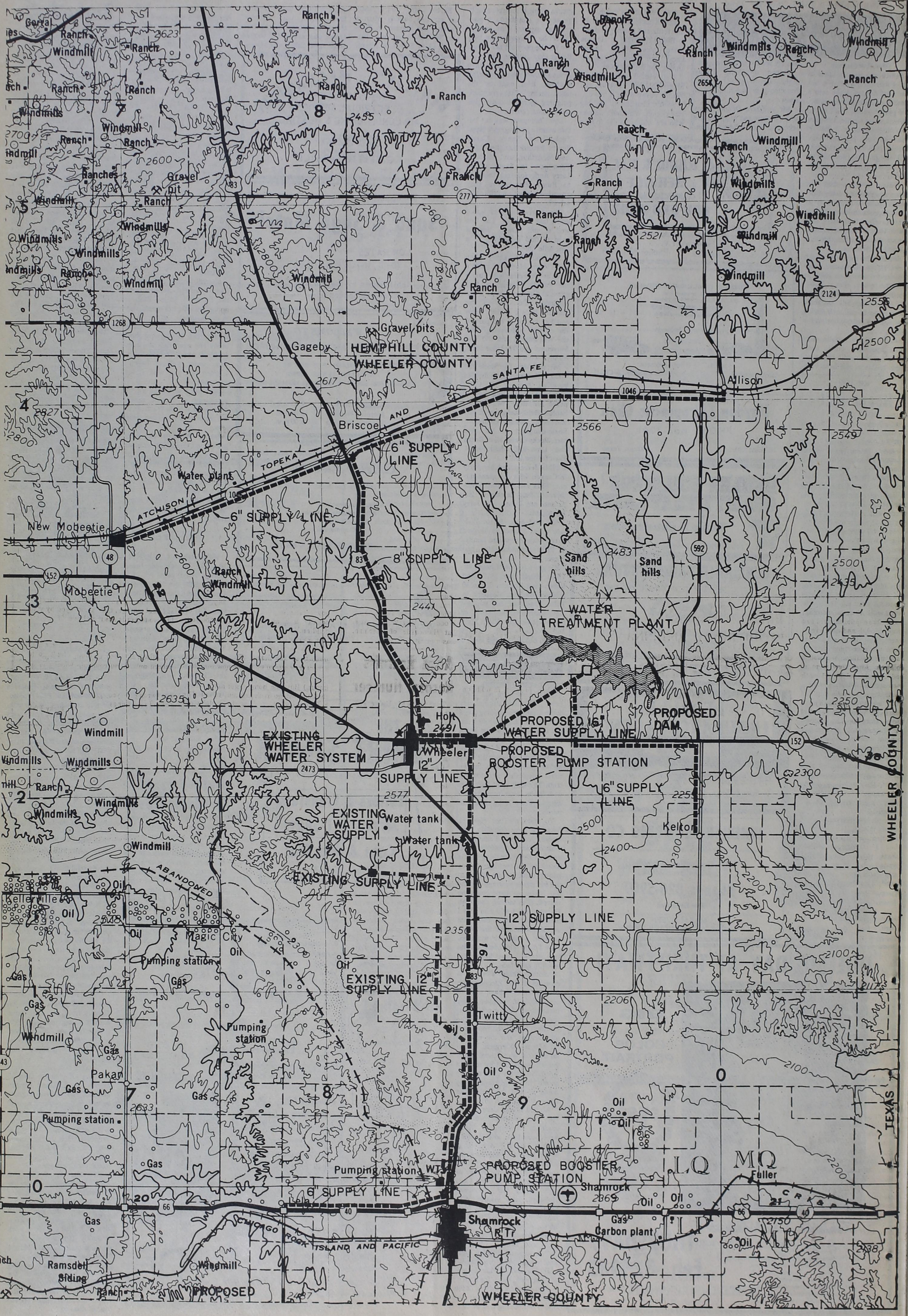

Tuesday morning, 18th, around 4 o'clock it started to snow. By 8 o'clock we had around 2 inches on the ground. We were to get freezing rain. I am glad we missed that. The news said Cheyenne, Okla., and south of there was having freezing rain. It snowed off and on all morning.

I was talking to Mattie Jackson and the man near Sweetwater that wrecked his truck and was almost scalped 2 weeks ago was Irene (Matthews) Signors' boy. He is in Sore Hospital. It also hurt his chest. He is doing fair it seems. We wish for him a speedy recovery.

Monday afternoon, 17th, my sister Hoyle Helton came home and came up to see us. Her first night at home in almost 5 weeks. She came out once and ate supper there, but did not get to stay. We are waiting for her a speedy good health.

Saturday is when we saw 2 sun dogs in the sky. A sign of change in weather with moisture so it must be so.

Talking to Mattie Jackson the other night. She said, "Well, maybe a chinook wind will come tonight and melt all our snow." Now I never heard of the chinook wind, its a warm wind and is also a warning wind Mattie said. So you never get to old to learn.

I enjoyed C.W. Vinson write up on the depression days. He seemed to have it better than we did. He didn't say we had to put or hang quilts and blankets on our west doors and windows to shut the dust and dirt out so we could breathe. Colie and I married in 1932. Colie's dad gave us 40 laying hens. We paid him back in young pullets when we got them hatched and raised to pullets size. We sold our first eggs at 4 cents per dozen. We had 11 cents worth and was proud of that big sale. You would wake up in the morning, one of those quite dusters had come through and dust everywhere. You could write your name on everything and on each others face. We had 8 children. After they went to bed I would patch and wash their school clothes and sock. I made their overalls and all until the boys got around 8 years old. Were they proud of those store bought clothes.

Mr. Parker sold his eggs, he bought chicken mash. What saved the day, was they started putting that mash in cloth sacks. But you had to soak them in soap suds, rub and rub to get all those big pictures of when and big writing on the sacks, to get this out. So the material could be used. We made sheets, pillow cases, cup towels, towels, underclothes. We bleached some out white, then dyed for dresses and shirts, till out came some printed cloth sacks. When Mrs. Parker would get all and more than she could use, they gave us some. We made shirts, dresses, bed spreads. That printed material saved the day. You did not have to wash out all that printing. It was pasted on, wrote on paper.

We made a garden, watered from windmill, and had our eggs, chickens, milk and butter. We put up a lot of wild plums for jelly and jams.

We would buy baby roosters 3 and 5 hundred at a time, raise for our meat. We would pay 4 and 5 cents per baby chick. Had our hogs also for meat. Ground corn for meal, when we were fortunate to raise the corn.

Now when Roosevelt got in as President, and started the W.P.A., we plowed up 10 acres of good cotton to get some of his money. He would not let us plow up sorry cotton with johnson grass or weeds or poor stand, it had to be good cotton. We did not kill any hogs or cattle like some did. Now I say raise all you can. Let there be a surplus. There are plenty of hungry people in U.S.A. now. Mable Parker says we are going to suffer for food. One way will do. Get land laid out.

I don't like to look back on the 1930's. Our boys are having their checks cut. One has had his cut twice. One has been told his job folds in July. All these oil rigs are stacking. I don't think our kids and grandkids will see times like we use to or have witnessed. But they could hope not, and

do you know to listen to grandpa and grandpa tell how they had to do sounds worse than our 1930. No electricity, had to make their soap, they even had to spin their thread and weave their material to make their clothes. I think that would be about the hardest thing to do. No cars, only horses to plow with and go places sounds bad. Where there's a will there will be a way. The Bible says live for God today, not worry about tomorrow. Now I didn't intend to write all this, Clyde just go me wound up.

Another thing maize was 4 and 5 dollars a ton. You mortgaged your houses if you needed cash. You would pay them out in the fall, then mortgage again in spring. We seldom did this. We raised this maize, fed it to the horses. We

would thrash out the heads and wash and dry to plant again. We never bought garden seed of horse feed or seed very often.

Along comes this tractor, and butane and gas so cheap. Price has gone up and up. Than along comes our electricity and telephone, cars. We tried to get everything we could on electricity and gas. They would run everything once. Its gone up and up. I tell them all if it will only rain we can eat and survive. That's ones that have land to plant and gardens.

Another thing our grandparents had to do that I think was a chore, if you got up in the morning, all your fires were out and the coals all out, they had to do to a neighbor and borrow a coal of fire. They did not have matches.

They and we were as happy then, maybe more so, than now. Seems I don't like the good old days, I like this up to date stuff.

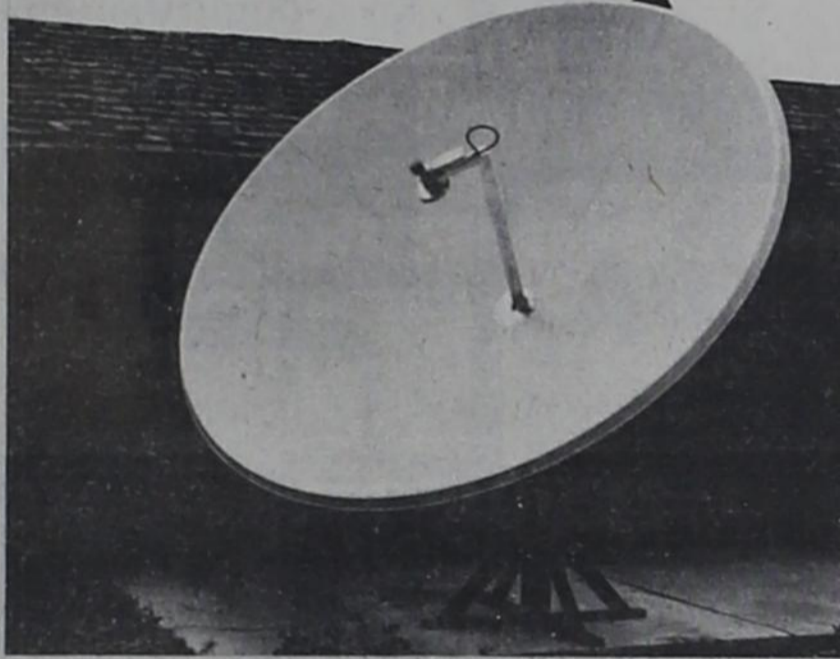

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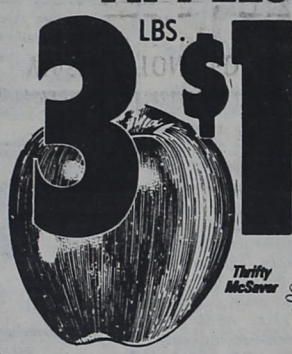
