

Shelly Pomroy will represent San Marcos Junior Miss. Shelly is the daughter of Nancy and Jamie Moore.

The Junior Miss Program is a nationwide program for senior high school girls designed specifically to grant scholarships to the winners at the local, state and national levels. Judging is based upon judges' interviews (35%), scholastic achievement (15%), creative and performing arts (20%), physical fitness (15%) and poise and appearance (15%). This is NOT a beauty pageant. There is no bathing suit competition nor do the girls have to raise money to enter. Just about any high school senior girl is eligible to enter at the local level. Local winners advance to the state finals and the state winners advance to the national finals in Mo-

bile, Alabama. In Texas, the Junior Miss Program is sponsored by the New Braunfels Jaycees. Zales and the Wurstfest Association provide additional funds for scholarships.
