APACHE CORP. TOLD TO KILL OR CONTROL WELL

The Railroad Commission has issued a new interim order directing Apache Corporation to kill or control its Key No. 1 well in Wheeler County's Key (Morrow, Upper) field by Feb. 10 or show cause to the Commission why it has not been able to do so.

The well blew out Oct. 4, 1981 and is now in a "controlled blow-out" condition, producing some 25 million cubic feet of gas per day.

In Aug. of 1982, the Commission had ordered Apache to control or kill the well within 60 days, the period the company estimated would be required for the effort. Subsequent mechanical malfunctions delayed the kill attempt and prompted the Commission to hold a hearing on Nov. 18 and 19. The new interim order is based upon evidence presented at that hearing.

The interim order also continues provisions of previous orders which require Palo Duro Pipeline Company to continue to take all the production from the Key No. 1 into its pipeline system and not curtail or shut-in other wells tied into the pipeline system solely because of the volumes of gas taken from the Key No. 1.

Apache must report to the Commission weekly on its progress in killing or controlling the well. In a recent report, Apache stated their Key No. 3 "kill well" had reached a depth of 15,452 feet, approximately 140 feet above the Morrow formation. They also

said they believed they were very close to the well bore of the Key No. 1 and estimated

they would be in a position to attempt to kill the well by Feb. 10.



QUICK WEIGHTLOSS DIETS THE FAD OF FADS
 Fad diets—they're becoming a "national obsession." Americans spend billions of dollars on fad diets, pills, supplements and books in hopes of losing enough weight to become more attractive, healthier, sexier and younger looking. But such desires to lose weight quickly actually can be harmful to your health. "What is a fad diet?" is the first question that comes to mind. A fad diet is any diet concept that remains unproven scientifically to successfully and harmlessly lose weight.

TYPES OF FAD DIETS
 One of the most common fad diets used by Americans today is the "crash diet." For example, the dieter may try to lose 20 pounds in two weeks. This is called the "yo-yo syndrome" because one quickly takes off the weight, returns to old food habits and regains the weight. Some people are successful at losing weight in short times but seldom are able to keep off extra pounds over the long run. Medical authorities now believe it's better to be a few pounds overweight than to put the body through the stress of losing and gaining weight over such a short time. The low-carbohydrate diets is another fad approach to losing weight quickly. These types of diets are dangerous because carbohydrate intake is limited in an attempt to rapidly take off body fat. Dieters, however, may go into ketosis—an abnormal condition which can lead to coma or death—on low-carbohydrate diets. Another area of concern in fad dieting is the use of megadoses of vitamins to improve health.

For best results, the AAA recommends that those with arthritis eat a balanced diet and maintain or attain a normal weight. **RECOGNIZING FAD DIETS** Food fads often may be difficult to identify. Consider the following facts about fads before deciding what diets are good to follow. The author or proponent of the diet will try to undermine your confidence in the American food supply. But don't worry, we still have the safest food supply of any nation. They may attack the Food and Drug Administration, The American Medical Association, The Public Health Service or any recognized authority on nutrition. They use "scare" tactics on health and play on emotions rather than issue factual data about their diet. They have something to sell.





Adams said the growing sense of public outrage has been fueled by the inability of the criminal justice system to deal effectively with problem drivers. "DWI arrests by the Highway Patrol are up, statewide traffic fatalities are down, and we've seen a gradual decrease in the top speeds on our highways," the DPS director pointed out. "Yet, people still feel anger and frustration

when one of their relatives or friends dies in an accident caused by a repeat offender, and the violator just get a slap on the hand. Each member of the Governor's Traffic Safety Task Force has sensed the public's interest about this life and death issue."

Adams chaired the 17-member task force which studied the Texas traffic safety problem in depth over an eight-month period before approving over 30 recommendations.

"Dealing with the repeat offender was our top priority," he said. "We proposed more stringent but reasonable laws designed to establish a certainty of punishment for the traffic scofflaw."

"Only 17 percent of the DWI cases filed each year by the Highway Patrol result in meaningful punishment for the offender and establishment of a record which could be used by prosecutors in the future," Adams explained. "We suggested treating DWI probation as a final conviction for more effective prosecution of subsequent drunk driving violations. The task force also proposed eliminating 'deferred adjudication' in DWI cases. This is a type of probation often given in which the final court judgement is delayed and frequently leads to dismissal of the charge."

Other task force recommendations include an automatic 90-day drivers license suspension for persons refusing a breath test, prohibiting open alcoholic beverage containers in moving vehicles, raising the legal drinking age to 21, increasing DWI fines and making jail terms mandatory for second and third DWI offenses.

"We also suggested tightening up the guidelines for suspending the licenses of habitual violators, and we endorsed the DPS request for 150 Highway Patrol troopers to be added over the next two years," Adams said. "That additional manpower is essential if we are to create an effective deterrent for violators."

The DPS director urged citizens to express their concern and continue offering suggestions for dealing with the traffic safety problem. He also asked motorists to review their own driving habits and take special care during the holiday season.







Tree Orders Are Being Taken

Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District is again taking orders for wind-break seedlings. As in the past, several species are available. Evergreen trees available this year are **Mondell Pine**, **Ponderosa Pine**, **Scotch Pine**, **Austrian Pine** and **Eastern Redcedar**. These trees will cost \$1.50 each with a minimum order of 30 trees. All evergreens, except **Mondell**, will be delivered in the styrofoam container in which they were grown. The **Mondell** will be in the plastic packets in which they were grown. This helps reduce the transplanting school and helps assure the tree will live. Deciduous trees available this year are **bur oak**, **green ash**, **honeylocust**, **native plum** and **Russian Olive**. These trees are all barerooted and cost \$0.50 each with a minimum order of 100 trees which can include two species.

The ordering deadline is Feb. 2, 1983 with delivery planned for March 11, 1983. Future planned news articles will explain care of the trees during the first critical years.

All trees sold this year will be purchased from the Texas Forest Service, except the **Mondell** which will be ordered from California.

PRIORITIES

Luke 14:26, "If any man come to me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple." 
