FIRE SAFETY FROM WHEELER COUNTY **FIRE SERVICE**

All residents using butane for heating in structures must be absolutely certain the regulator on the butane tank is protected.

During the 36 hour period [beginning 12:01 AM, 11-27-82, Ending 12 Noon, 11-28-82] the Wheeler County fire Departments [Allison, Briscoe, Kelton, Mobeetie, Shamrock & Wheeler] responded to five structure fires, four of which were private residences. One person was severely injured and approximately \$200,000.00 worth of property was destroyed, leaving four families homeless.

The "possible cause" of of the fires was an "iced over" butane regulator. These regulators MUST be protected from freezing rain and other inclement weather to assure their proper and safe operation.

Also, a smoke detector properly installed possibly could have prevented any injuries to the residents of these homes; and provided for earlier response of the

fire departments involved. If you discover a fire, GET OUT! Then call the fire Department! Then take other action as neccessary to assure the survival of





Sarpalius of Hereford recenlty addressed a group of Wheeler citizens on November 23, at the Wheeler County Courthouse during a symposium sponsored by the Thursday Review Club. Senator Sarpalius emphasized several issues that will be considered by the Texas Legislature when it convenes in January that are of vital interest to the people of Texas and of particular importance to the residents of the Texas Panhandle.

Senate Bills 1,2, & 3 relating to mandatory penalities and a rehabilitation program for the arrests made of driving while under the influence of drug and/or alcohol will be actively pursued by advocates which hope to tighten the laws concerning drunk drivers.

Sanator Sarpalius will continue to work on crop insurance legislature which will be sponsored by the federal and state governments. It is his hope that by more farmers in several states joining the programs, that the premiums will be the lowest premiums available. Dr. Bob Riley **Accepts Position**

Dr. Bob Riley has accepted the position of Vice-President for Howard College effective the Spring semester 1983, according to Dr. Charles D. Hays, President of the Howard County Junior College District.

Dr. Riley, presently a professor and administrator at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford, Oklahoma, was born and raised in the Panhandle of Texas, receiving his high school diploma from Wheeler High School. He earned a bachelor of science and a masters of education from West Texas State University and an Ed. D. from East Texas State

University. Dr. Riley began his career in higher education at Sul Ross State Univeristy at Del Rio as an assistant professor of education and aministrator of the branch campus. From there he moved to Clarendon Junior College as Dean of Instruction and then to his present position at Southwestern Okla-

homa University. Along with his administrative duties, Dr. Riley was served as a consultant for the Office of Civil Rights in Washpartment in Nacogdoches, the Professional Development Center Network in Oklahoma, and various public districts in Texas and Oklahoma. In this capacity he has dealt with a variety of topics. including Equal Opportunity in Education, Personnel Evaluation, Title IX in Texas, Classroom ment, and Teacher Stress.

Among his publications are a handbook on Federal Court Cases dealing with Teacher and Student Rights, a research study on the Impact of Title IX in Texas, and a research study on the Status of the Four-Day College Week in Texas.

Dr. Riley is a member of Kiwanis International, Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, Texas State Teachers Association, National Education Association, Oklahoma Education Association and Oklahoma Association of Teacher Educa-







ical, emergency trauma center The EMI 5005 C.T. Scanner is basically a type of x-ray machine that scans your body with approximatly 100 x-ray beams. A computer allows your physician to view the scan on a television. Newman Memorial Hospital will go a step further into modern technology because it will be connected to its consulting radiologists, the Springs Radiology Group in Enid, Oklahoma, by a slow scan television system that will allow the doctor in Enid to view the telephone/video scan by transmission of images. So, as the patient is being scanned, his/her physician at NMH and the consulting rediologis in Enid will be viewing the procedure together in continuous radiologist in Enid will be viewing the procedure together in continuous visual and verbal communication. Scanning services and benefits, which the National Health Institute recenlty states as a significant patient need, previously have not been available to patients in this basically rural area.

The second service and benefit involves the immediate construction of a helipad as a Phase I heliport project. As a specialty and emergency trauma center, NMH receives many emergency patients, as well as patients with more complex health problems. Occasionally these patients must either be transferred to NMH from other hospitals or out to even more specialized care centers. In a continuing effort to safely accomodate current helicopter evacuation of these patients, Shattuck's hospital will soon construct a FAA approved helipad.

Construction of the helipad is to be completed on December 15, 1982, and installation completion dates have been projected as March 1, for the C.T. Scanner.
