

MUSTANGS WIN FINAL GAME, 41-0

It is all over for the Wheeler football fortunes but the Mustangs of '82 closed out their season last Friday night on Nicholson Field with an easy 41-0 triumph over the hapless McLean Tigers.

Hoping for a reprieve from either the Phillips Blackhawks or the Lefors Pirates that would vault the Mustangs into the playoffs, the Mustangs saw their hopes dashed as the victorious Booker and Follett elvens won handily and finished in a tie for the District 1-1A championship.

The Mustangs finished the district race in second place a half game back and had a 6-2-2 season record and Friday night's win over McLean was the final game for eight Mustang seniors.

Leading by 28-0 at half, the Mustangs were able to move the ball at will against the visiting Tigers and the final 41 point margin could have been

much worse but coach Preston Smith emptied his bench in the final half and the Mustangs of the future were on the field for the most part in the final quarter.

Carrying the ball only 12 times, senior tailback Scott Wright once more led the Mustangs to victory by racking up 3 touchdowns and 154 yards on the ground.

Nine different Mustangs ran the pigskin against the Tigers

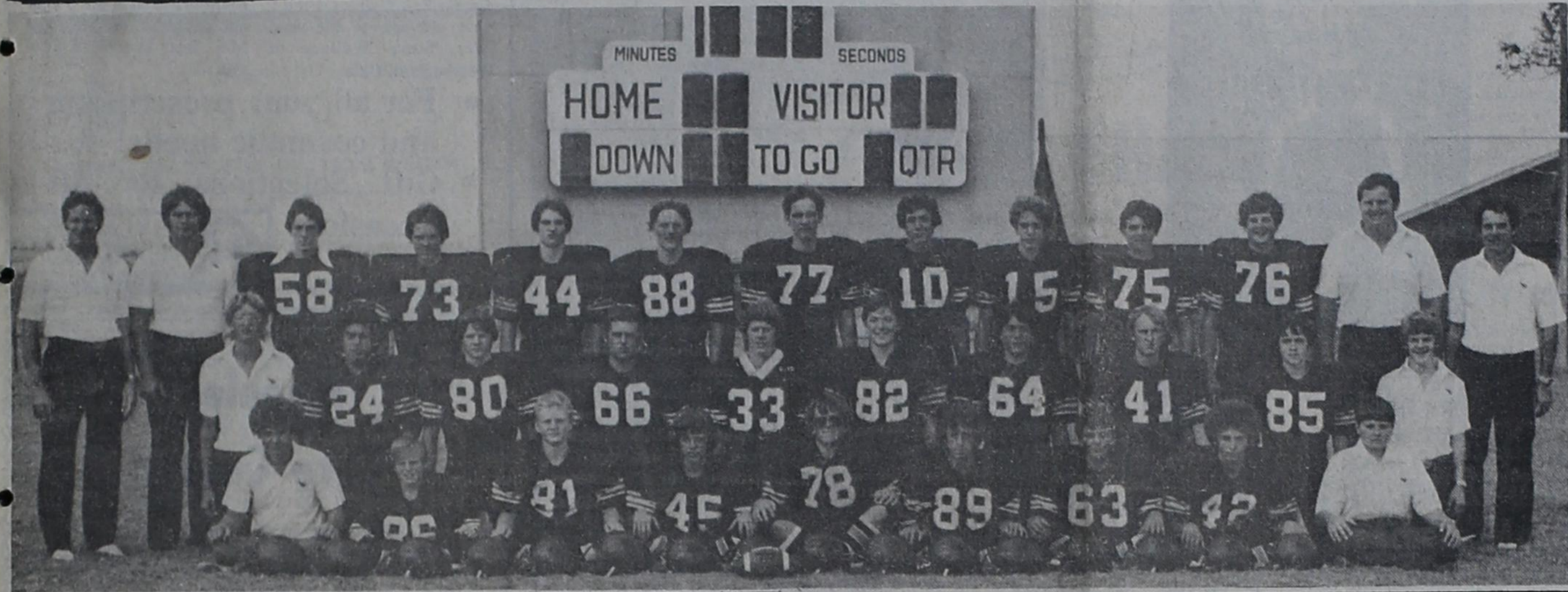
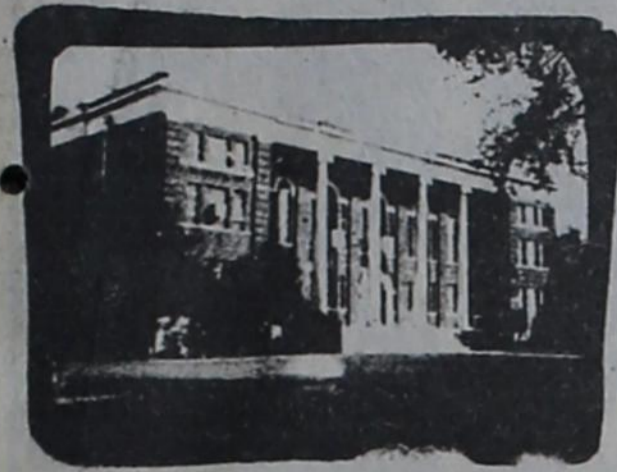

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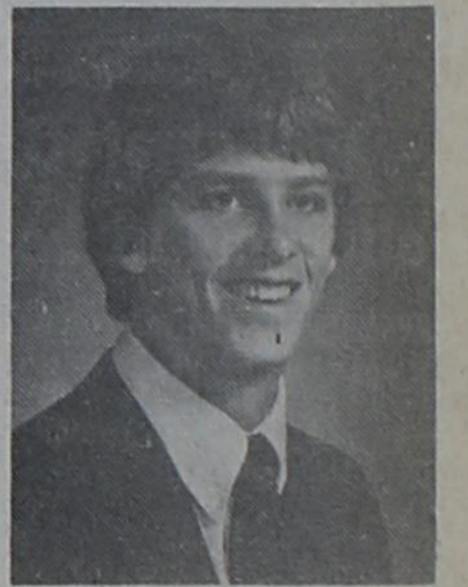

SCOTT WRIGHT WILL TOUR U.S. & EUROPE NEXT SUMMER

Scott Wright has been chosen to travel with the Continental Singers and Orchestra during their 1983 summer touring season. Continental Singers annually sends over 600 outstanding young musicians across the U.S. and around the world during the summer months to proclaim the Gospel through contemporary Christian music.

Scott is the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wright and is a senior at Wheeler High School. He is first chair trumpet in the Wheeler Mustang Band and is a member of the First United Methodist Church where he sings in the choir and is serving as president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The tour on which Scott will be traveling is one of 15 Continental Singers tours that will cover the U.S. and several foreign countries in the summer of 1983. All tours will meet in Los Angeles in June of an intensive ten-day rehearsal before beginning their 75-day tour of nightly concert performances. Scott's tour will travel to many states, and Holland, West Germany and France.

On August 25, all 15 groups will combine in Los Angeles for a "grand finale" concert.

The ministry of Continental Singers, a non-profit Christian musical corporation, was founded in 1962 by its executive director and president, Cam Florida, one of America's most popular and outstanding

Christian musicians. It has grown from a single tour that covered five north-western states to 15 tours that cover much of the world. The corporation has its U.S. headquarters in Los Angeles and a European office (Continental Singers Europe) in Rotterdam, Holland. Over the past several years, Continental Singers groups have toured extensively through all fifty states and nearly sixty foreign countries.

Each member of the Continental Singers summer tours is responsible for raising approximately one-half of his individual cost for the tour. The other half is raised through offerings and record sales during the tour. For Scott's individual tour sponsorship, the amount to be raised is \$2,995.00. Next meeting will be Dec. 9. Please come.

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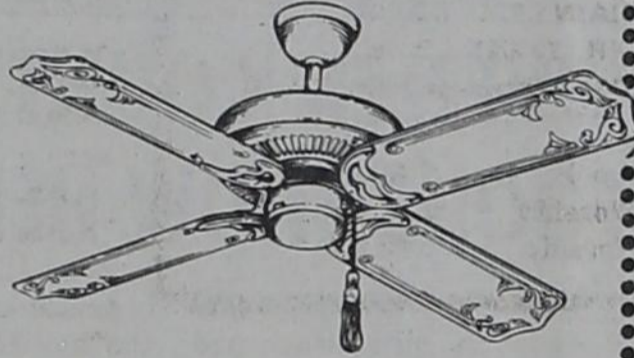
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SHELLY POMROY WINS

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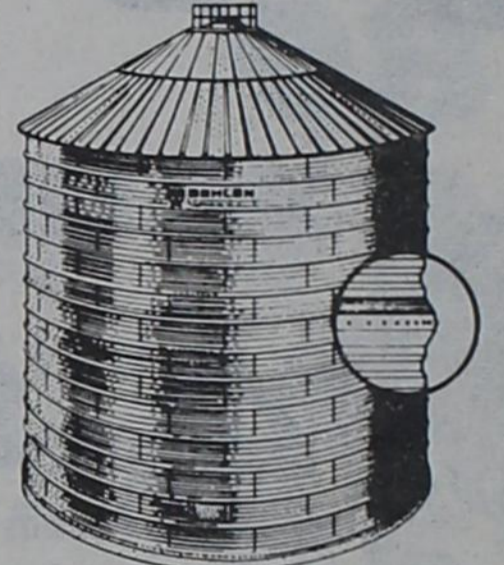

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, that killeth the prophets, and stoneth them that are sent unto her! How often would I have gathered the children together, even as a hen gathereth their chickens under her wings, and Ye would not! Behold, your house is left unto you desolate. For I say unto you, Ye shall not see me hence forth, till ye shall say, Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord.

(Matt. 23:37-39)

These words constitute some of the saddest ever spoken by our Lord, Jesus. It is called his lament over Jerusalem, but actually it is a lament over not just the city of Jerusalem, but the entire nation of the Jews.

Of all the peoples of the world, the Jews had been most privileged by God throughout their history. And yet we find them in rebellion against him time and time again. Once he delivered them into captivity for more than seventy years because of their wickedness and rebellion; but, even then, he refused to utterly destroy them. He brought them back and caused them to dwell in their land once again.

But, now, he had sent his Son, Jesus of Nazareth, and the rulers of the Jews had rejected him and his teachings, as their fathers had so many of God's prophets before. Within just a few days they would have him killed by the hands of unbelievers, the most horrible and degrading form of death ever devised by the mind of men, in an effort to rid themselves of him and his influence.

But it was to be their own ultimate downfall. Because they rejected Christ, God would repudiate them as his covenant people. As Jesus said in one of his parables, God took away the kingdom from them, and gave it to another, to those who would come to him through the faith of Jesus Christ, his Son. The Jews soon became a nation of outcasts and wanderers, and have largely remained such, because of their rejection of Jesus Christ, at least in large part.

In 1 Cor. 10:11 Paul tells us that these things happened for our learning. In Romans 11 we are warned against thinking that such cannot happen to us if we reject Jesus and his revelation of God's will for our lives. Think about it!

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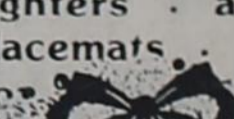
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Here & There

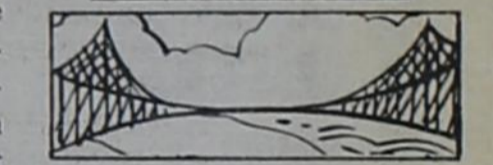
Writing Pals Project Started

King School in Yonkers, New York and they're finding out that writing assignments are fun.

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Wheeler's movie war

Every once in a while a clash comes along that catches our attention because it shows one of our freedoms running smack up against another of our freedoms.

We can shilly-shally around these little conflicts for years, with both sides of the various arguments compromising and agreeing to disagree, but eventually the situation comes to a head and it takes the courts of the land to set precedent.

Such a case appears to be the confrontation between a Bible-toting preacher and a businessman in Wheeler.

Ed Nall, owner of the Vogue Theater in Wheeler, had been showing family movies and going broke. The theaters in Pampa and Amarillo and other towns showing movies rated R were getting all the business. To his mind, he had to show R-rated movies or go out of business. So he did.

Then a local preacher, Ricky Pfeil of the Wheeler Christian Center, decided it was God's work to keep people from attending Mr. Nall's movies. Pfeil has spoken publicly to the effect that Nall is working for the Devil in showing films that are not suited for children, and should be stopped. He has gone about this by standing in front of the ticket window praying for the souls of those who dare to enter, picketing in front of the theater, buying advertisements in the Wheeler Times accusing Nall of demonic connections, and taking every opportunity to tell a waiting news media of his hand-to-hand battle with the forces of evil.

Mr. Nall, to try and save what customers he has, had to go to court and get an injunction against Rev. Pfeil's preventing people from entering, but it allows him a total of four peaceful picketers out in front of the theater whenever he can find that many volunteers.

Pfeil was recently pelted by rotten tomatoes (but not by Mr. Nall or his

employees, we hasten to add) which only increased his zeal.

And the latest shot in the battle is Nall's accusation that Pfeil is using his tax-exempt church as a base for political activities, which is against the law.

This case will come to court, and it will be an interesting one, and we'll be there when it does.

As we see it, there are two rights at stake here, or which need some more definition.

Does the freedom of religion give a person the right to inflict that religion on others? And does the right to conduct business include the right to conduct a business that is legal, but that might offend a portion of the population?

Of course, the entire thing might be settled if both parties agreed to simply mind their own business.

There are a lot of churches in this part of the world, and no law says any of us have to attend the Wheeler Christian Center or believe as Pfeil does.

By the same token we can go to a movie house other than Ed Nall's, stay home and watch television, or take in the late sermon at the Wheeler Christian Center for entertainment. No one says we have to watch an R-rated movie at the Vogue.

Rev. Pfeil, for whatever personal reasons he may have, chooses to make his hatred for modern films a media event, and maybe eliminate a source of entertainment in Wheeler at the same time, has only to stay away from the movies himself.

If you don't like a movie, don't go down and pay Ed Nall to go in and see it.

Reverend Pfeil might take a lesson from the Bible and clean up his own house before spending too much time down at the Vogue. Besides, as he admitted to our reporter, he's never seen an R-rated movie.
