

Conservation Use Acres

These acres must have been planted to a small grain or row crop in 2 of the last 3 years or have been CUA to be eligible. You must protect these acres from wind and water erosion. The non-grazing period is from May 1, 1983 thru October 31, 1983.

Production Evidence

As you finish harvesting, your production needs to be brought in within 15 days to determine if you are eligible for a low yield payment. We can accept a late filed ASCS these thoughts were crowding 574 (application for disaster credit), but it will cost a small fee, as we will need to determine the acres too.

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
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THE WORLD HAS IT REVERSED

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
