

Wind Erosion Is Very Costly

Large amounts of valuable topsoil are lost each year because of wind erosion. The basic cause of this loss is the lack of vegetative cover. This loss is most evident on cropland.

After the crop has been harvested the best method of control of erosion is through good use of the crop residue. To do this the residue should be disturbed as little as possible. If enough residue is present it can be shredded, mowed, or knocked down with a stalk cutter.

Added benefits of this crop residue is conservation of moisture, increased infiltration of moisture and improved soil tilth.

The best crops that afford control of wind erosion are ones like small grains, forage sorghums, and grain sorghums because of the vegetative growth they produce.

If you have a wind erosion problem, the technician of the Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler will be glad to help in any way possible.

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SPS Reports Earnings For '82

Southwestern Public Service Company today reported 1982 earning of \$2.02 per common share, representing a 5.8% increase over the \$1.91 figure for the previous year.

The electric utility reported \$588.9 million gross revenues for the year ended August 31, 1982, up \$55 million or 10.3% over 1981. The year's earnings applicable to common stock totaled \$67.3 million, a 19.8% increase over the \$56.1 million posted in 1981.

Net operating income for the period rose 10.0% to \$84.9 million.

Berl M. Springer, the company's board chairman, said the revenues gain resulted primarily from increased cost of fuel recovered through revenues and increased base revenues. He said base revenues for 1982 were \$278.3 million, an increase of \$18.1 million, or 7.0% over 1981, reflecting rate relief and a moderate increase in KWH sales.

He also said construction expenditures for fiscal 1983 have been budgeted at \$131 million, which includes outlays on Tolk Station Unit No. 2, a 561,000-KW coal-fired unit, scheduled for completion in the summer of 1985.

Tolk Station Unit No. 1, also a 561,000-KW unit, recently went on-line, raising the Company's electricity generating capacity from coal-fired power plants to approximately 45% of total capability.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of more than 1 million in a 45,000-square-mile area of the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

A big 36 yard gain on guard eligible trick play with Bill Watson doing the rambling kept the Mustangs going for the end zone for what would prove to be their final touchdown of the game.

Wright did the honors from 10 yards out as he went up the middle and Wade Wills was good on his third pass attempt for the Mustangs 7 point cushion at the half.

Before Mills' killing run, the Kiowas earned a tie by driving 63 yards in the fourth quarter with quarterback Ammons keeping around his right end from the 11.

Follett is going into the game with a perfect record and more importantly is that they are all alone on top of District 1-1A with a 4-0 record.

By winning the last three games, the Mustangs would still need help from their district foes as the Mustangs hold down the fourth spot in the standings with a 2-1-1 record. Phillips and Booker are tied in second place with 3-1 marks.

There is no need on dwelling on who has to beat who if the Mustangs don't win and the Follett Panthers are first on the list.

Led by four year starter as quarterback, Galen Kunka, the Panthers pose a major hurdle as six foes can attest. Kunka runs the Panther's slot T formation and is a major running threat himself with great quickness and speed.

"We can't worry about what had already happened or might happen" Coach Smith said, "We have to beat Follett first and it boils down to that."

The Mustangs will be in good shape for the Follett contest and no changes and anticipated in their starting lineup.

Three years ago, a win at Follett propelled another group of Mustangs into the playoffs that ended in a state championship and just maybe a win Friday night for Wheeler will get them into the coveted playoffs once more.



Annette Strake, the wife of former Texas Secretary of State George Strake, Republican candidate for Lt. Governor of Texas, spoke on a campaign swing which included stops in Potter, Carson, Hutchinson, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemphill, Wheeler, Childress, Gray, Armstrong, Donley, Hall, Cottle, Collingsworth, Randall and Moore counties.

Mrs. Strake stressed that she was not speaking just as the wife of a candidate, but as the mother of six children, one of whom, eight-year-old Melissa is still in school.

"I know," said Mrs. Strake, "that a good education is critical for a child to prosper as an adult. I also know that a good education doesn't necessarily mean a college degree. He is for paying teachers more, to get better teachers and keep them. But he also believes that we need to reduce the paperwork that teachers say just wears them out. He is for strong local control and reduced red tape from Austin and Washington. And he is against collective bargaining for teachers because he doesn't think it is in the best interest of our kids."



10:00 A.M.—Monday, October 11th, 1982
The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas met in Regular Session with the following members present: Elmer Harrison, Bill Atherton, Ernest Henderson, Wendell Morgan and T.J. Daughtry, County Clerk. (Clويد Hanner was unable to attend due to illness)

The Court was opened with a prayer by Judge Morgan. The Minutes of the Special Session dated 9-27-82 were approved as corrected.

Regular Business and Approval of Bills and J.P. Reports: Commissioner Atherton motioned, seconded by Commissioner Henderson to approve the payment of bills listed in Volume 9, Page 258, dated October 11th, 1982, and the following Justice of the Peace Reports: Lisa Jernigan \$277.00 M.D. Nobles \$4,092.00; Charley Whiteley \$1,687.50. Motion Carried.

Wheeler Fire Department: Daryl Snelgrooves requested the Court to assist the department in the cost of a 1977, four-wheel drive, two ton fire truck, explaining that the total cost will be approximately \$35,000.00 Mr. Henderson motioned, seconded by Mr. Atherton to grant \$6,000.00 to apply on the cost of the truck. Mayor and City Council Members of the City of Wheeler, Meets with Court:

Louis Stas, Mayor, Jamie Hill and David Cross, Councilmen, discussed with the Court the request of the Wheeler Fire Department to build a storage building for the department vehicles. Following a discussion between the two governing bodies, County Judge Morgan suggested that some type of an arrangement could be worked out to utilize the Wheeler County Show Barn

for vehicle storage, with the County assisting in the payment of the gas bills. All agreed this to be a reasonable solution to the request. Members of the City government agreed to work toward this suggestion.

Wheeler County and the City of Shamrock, Dispatch Service:

Mr. Henderson motioned, seconded by Mr. Harrison to approve the following resolution. Motion Carried.

Dispatch Service Contract
This agreement this day made and entered into by and

between the City of Shamrock, Texas, acting by them through its Mayor and City Council, hereinafter referred to as City, and the County of Wheeler, Texas, acting by the through its County Judge and Commissioners Court, hereinafter referred to as County, WITNESSETH:

Section I

That for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises herein contained, city will operate and furnish 24-hour dispatch service system for the County.

Section II

In compliance with State Laws and the regulations of the Department of Public Safety of the State of Texas, the management control of the dispatch system shall be vested in the Chief of Police of the City of Shamrock.

Section III

The dispatch system shall be separated on the account records of the City as an individual department of the City.

Section IV

The City shall be responsible for providing all radio equipment, the maintenance and upkeep of such equipment, suitable for the operation of the dispatch system as such system is presently operating.

Section V

It is further agreed and understood that the County shall receive dispatch service for all County Officers, Department of Public Safety Officers, Texas Parks and Wild Life Officers, and all other County and State Officers operating within Wheeler County, Texas.

Section VI

The County shall pay unto the City of Shamrock a portion of all personnell services along with fifty percent (50%) of telephone and teletype expenses, such combined not to exceed \$29,237.54 (personnell payments—\$25,737.54—Communication—\$3,500.00), without prior approval of the County, as billed by the City with such billings to be submitted on a monthly basis as nearly as possible to the first day of each month.

Section VII

The County shall provide housing for the dispatch system and shall be responsible for all utility billing with the exception of telephone service. All long distance calls shall be logged by the persons placing such calls and both parties hereto shall be responsible for payment of all such long distance calls logged by the representatives of such parties. Each party hereto shall be responsible for fifty percent (50%) of the "base" telephone and teletype charges and unidentified long distance calls. The City shall be responsible for insuring the communications equipment of the dispatch system.

Section VIII

This contractual agreement shall be for a period of one year beginning October 1, 1982, and ending September 30, 1983. At or before the end of such period the Parties hereto shall meet together for the purpose of re-negotiating a similar contract for the ensuing year. This contract may be terminated by either of the parties hereto by the giving of a written notice of intent to terminate with such termination to be effective not less than thirty (30) days from date of such written notice.

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

FURNISHINGS FOR MAXIMUM ENERGY USE
Squeeze a few more pennies—or even dollars—out of your energy money. Try doing some simple and inexpensive

things with our furnishings, floors and windows.
How you upholster and arrange your furniture, insulate and cover floors and shade and drape windows can be major factors in determining how far those pennies can be stretched into dollars.
FURNITURE PLACEMENT AND COVERINGS
Probably the easiest and simplest way to begin saving is by arranging furniture away from radiators, registers (heating and cooling vents) and cold-air return vents.
This will allow warm and cool air to circulate more freely throughout your house.
For warmth in the winter, place furniture away from windows and outside walls, especially if walls are poorly insulated.
When upholstering your furniture, consider a few guidelines for warmth and coolness.
Wing chairs covered in soft fabrics give protection from winter drafts and feel warmer than un-upholstered furniture of leather, plastic or wood.
For those "sticky-feeling" non-absorbent surfaces—leather, plastic or wood—use slip covers or fabric throws.
Remember that fabrics in blues and green give the best feeling of coolness.
FLOOR COVERINGS
Floor insulation—carpet is the most popular—protects against winter heat loss.
Wall-to-wall carpeting with a cushion or pad insulates floors much better than room-size or area rugs.
Furthermore, the thicker the carpet, the greater the insulation values.
Hard, smooth-surfaced materials such as vinyl, terrazzo, brick and quarry tile will stay cooler year round than wood or carpeting.
WINDOW TREATMENTS
The most important home furnishing factor to consider for energy conservation is window treatment.
Since most heat loss and gain takes place through windows and glass, plan window treatments to maximize energy use.
One excellent insulator is light-colored opaque roller shades mounted inside window frames.
Shades can be made of quilted fabric with a vapor barrier layer of material such as 4-mil plastic or reflective insulating film, for further insulating quality.
Another alternative is lined drapes which are also good insulators.
Mount draperies, curtains, shades and other window hangings above the head and to the side of window frames.
This allows for the greatest amount of sunlight in winter: your own solar heating.
To prevent cool drafts, fit

closed cornices and valances over the top of draperies.

The landowner or his agent may apply for his permits by mail or he may come to the Austin office in person to obtain his permits. Field personnel may fill out a permit receipt and instruct the person to mail it to Austin to facilitate processing of his request. If receipts with this information are not furnished, the requestor must include his name, mailing address, county in which the tract is located, acreage of the tract, and a description of where the tract is located, acreage of the tract, and a description of where the property is located with his request. In either six counties he should also advise us of the number of tags he wants.




