garment? The Key to Keeping Warm

While no one fabric, finish, insulation or construction alone will give you complete warmth, the key to keeping warm is how the fabric, insulation, finish, construction, garment design and fit all combine to trap "still air" next to the body. This trapped or "dead air" space provides the necessary thermal insulation to keep you warm.

Many new fabrics-along with the more traditional ones -are used to make outerwear garments.

Fabric finishes also affect a garment's performance and your personal comfort.

Body warmth is best maintained by a protective fabric layer, a layer of insulative fabric, and a "breathing" fabric layer. Regular daytime garments worn under coats serve as the breathing layerand provide comfort to the wearer.






