quite successful in their attempts. Running from a slot and spread slot formation, the Bucks have used their exceptional quickness to overcome the defensive efforts of both



## COUNTY GRAND JURY RETURNS 7 INDICTMENTS

The Wheeler County Grand Jury met on Friday, Aug. 31, and returned indictments against 7 persons. Indicted for forgery was Lloyd Wayne Allen, address unknown, James Randall Gray, formerly of Wheeler was also indicted for forgery. James Throckmorton of Dozier Rt, Shamrock was indicted for theft over \$200 and under \$10,000.00. Leonard Vincade and Francis Harris, addresses unknown were indicted for the theft of a pickup, trailer and ditch-witch from East of Wheeler. John Markley, and Mike Grant were indicted for possession of marijuana. All have been arrested except Kincaid and Harris. Gray was arrested in Lawton, Okla., returned to

Wheeler County where he pled guilty and received 8 years probation and a \$750.00 fine. Lloyd Wayne Allen, who passed a \$1680.00 forged check on a Briscoe resident, has been arrested in Reno, Nevada and is in the process of being returned to Wheeler County by the Wheeler County Sheriff Dept. Allen is also wanted in Okla. and Kansas for the same kind of offense. James Throckmorton, John Markley and Mike Grant have been arraigned, made bond and are awaiting trial.

## Mobeetie Gets Phone Building

A new building is to be constructed for General Telephone's central equipment office in Mobeetie. It will house a digital electronic switch in the future, according to J.H. Davis, operations manager. "We plan to have the new building house an advanced, computerized switch that will process calls for Mobeetie," he explained. Construction of the 31 foot by 36 foot brick building will begin in October and should be completed at the end of December, 1982.

Besides handling calls faster and more precisely than previous electro-mechanical equipment, the switch will provide "Automatic Number Identification." This will mean that it will no longer be necessary for an operator to ask for the phone number of an individual line customer who places a direct-dial long-distance call, either by dialing "1" plus or "0" plus calls. "The switching equipment will also enable us to offer special Customer Calling features—such as call forwarding and call waiting—after the switch is in service," Davis said.

Tentative plans are set to have the new office serving customers by May, 1983. "This is just another step toward total communications for customers of General Telephone in Mobeetie," Davis said. Mobeetie is one of 399 exchanges in General Telephone's four-state service area.

The Wheeler Volunteer ambulance Service answered 9 calls for the month of August. The nature of these calls were: 1 OB, 1 respiratory, 1 cardiac, 1 rig accident, 1 construction accident, 2 house fires, 2 falls. Other problems involving these patients were, 1 arm fracture, 1 hand and fingers crushed, 1 hemorrhaging, 2 back injuries, 1 smoke inhalation, 1 kidney problem and 1 patient suffered 1st and 2nd degree burns of the face, neck, and forearms along with smoke inhalation.

Three of these calls were code 3 emergencies. There were 4 transfers, 1 to Pampa and 3 to Amarillo. The individual number of calls and hours given in patient care were: Louis Stas 5 calls, 11 hours; M.K. Christner 6 calls, 15 hours; David Cross 1 call, 1 hour; Lee Hibler 4 calls, 9 hours; Franklin Jackson 3 calls, 6 hours; Dwight Tipps 4 calls, 10 hours; Lyndon Loyd 2 calls, 2 hours; 54 hours were given in patient care. Bringing the total hours in 1982 to 953. 159 calls have been answered at the end of August.

## Comm., Hosp. Board Meets

The Wheeler County Commissioners met with the Board of Directors for the North Wheeler County Hospital District, Parkview Hospital, for the purpose of discussing the operation of the Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Service. Attending were County Judge Wendell Morgan, Comm. Bill Atherton, Comm. Elmer Ray Harrison, Comm. Clois Hanner and Comm. Ernest Henderson.

Curtis "Peanut" Davis, County ambulance co-ordinator, Louis C. Stas, president of Wheeler's ambulance organization, were also in attendance at the meeting. Judge Morgan presented a two-page report on the activities and problems of the "county operated" ambulance service. An average of 737 calls were made in the county for the past year; Wheeler answered 163 local calls and made 79 transfers, and Shamrock answered 180 local calls and 70 transfers. An average of 20 manhours per transfer are spent in transfers yearly; this represents 2980 hours or 372 8-hour days.

It was suggested that non emergency transfers be handled in such a way as to prevent transfers being made only hours apart. Dr. Barbour clarified the situation; when a patient is transferred, the receiving doctor states the time he will receive the patient.

At the time Wheeler County Ambulance Service was organized in 1976, the county of Wheeler was the only entity financially able to finance the operation. The budget for the ambulance for 82-83 is \$74,000 with \$18,500 expected from collections.

The county owns four ambulances, two station in both Wheeler and Shamrock. Wheeler and Shamrock each have an ambulance barn to house the ambulances and furnish a meeting room for the volunteer organizations. The hospital board expressed their appreciation to the commissioners for their financing the ambulance service and to the volunteers who man the ambulances. They agreed to work on co-ordination of the ambulance service.

Mr. Brookshire was just home from a two week stay in an OKC hospital after suffering a concussion in a fall.



**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote. Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

**PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

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## Strake Talk

SMALL BUSINESS—  
 A RESOURCE WE MUST PROTECT

You can look around the square of any Texas town and see the backbone of the state economy—and of the national economy. It's small business and it provides half of all jobs. By the current state definition there are 260,000 in our state—that's 97% of all Texas businesses. The small businessman and woman not only provide jobs and pay taxes; their independent tradition also helps explain the enduring quality of our democratic form of government.

The state of Texas recognizes the importance of small business and has programs to help it. But we can do better. For one thing, we can abolish the sales tax on utility bills which now falls basically on small business owners. Large manufacturing and processing firms don't have to pay the tax, but the grocer, retailer and florist do. It is not fair.

My opponent opposed doing away with this tax in the last session of the legislature. The tax will bring in an estimated \$220 million in 1984-85. But when you compare that with the extra \$5.1 billion the legislature will have to spend during that time, I feel we can do without the tax and the revenue it will bring. And, as Lt. Governor, I would support its repeal.

I would also support putting into effect recommendations of the small business task force initiated by the Governor. Two of these recommendations are especially appealing. One is to help small business borrow money at better rates. Most small businesses which fail do so because they are under-capitalized. To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses.

The other recommendation is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and universities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Administration, the state and participating schools. The centers would provide training, counseling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in the marketplace.

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### WTSU Shows Student Increase

One of the largest groups of preregistered freshman students at West Texas State University has contributed to an increase of 127 students during registration for the fall semester.

After the only day of regular registration, 5,414 students has enrolled for an increase over last year's fall enrollment of 5,287. The figure does not include late registration, thesis students or students who enroll only in evening or off-campus courses, said Lila Vars, WTSU associate registrar.

Final enrollment figures for the 1981 fall semester were 6,693 students.

During five summer orientation sessions, 804 freshman students preregistered for classes compared with 777 last summer.

The large freshman class is unusual, said Vars, because predictions had indicated that the high school graduating classes of 1982 would be among the smallest in several years since the "baby boom" period of post-World War II. "This class is the first effect of the pill," she said.

Late registration at WTSU began on Thursday, Aug. 26, the first day of class, and continues through Friday, Sept. 3.

Students may register each weekday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Registrar's Office in the Administration Building and pay \$5 late fee.

The fall semester at WTSU will continue through Dec. 15 following final examinations.

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

## Stamp Collecting Month

The second annual National Stamp Collecting Month will be observed during October, the U.S. Postal Service announced. "Discover Stamp Collecting—The Hobby of a Lifetime" is the theme again this year.

National Stamp Collecting Month offers the perfect opportunity to learn about stamps and the stories behind them. Stamps bridge the gap between yesterday and today by paying tribute to the people, places and events that have shaped the history of the United States, the Postal Service noted.

During October, the Postal Service will be selling an expanded line of philatelic products, such as eight new Collecting Kits, a new Postal Guide to U.S. Stamps, and an American Wildlife Stamp Album. The products, all priced between \$2.00 and \$3.50, are ideal gifts or starter kits for youngsters. Colorful commemorative stamps also will be available at most post offices, including those featuring Ponce de Leon, Jackie Robinson, the new American Architecture block of four and the 50 State Birds and Flowers pane.

Special emphasis is being placed this year on starting the hobby of stamp collecting at an early age (such as between the ages of 8 to 12), since stamp collecting increases awareness of geography, history, science and other educational area.

As one young stamp collector stated, the knowledge gained while collecting stamps "helps me in several of my classes, and helps in doing my term papers and class projects."

The Postal Service is sponsoring the month-long observance in cooperation with the Council of Philatelic Organizations (COPO), which includes more than 200 national, regional and local organizations involved in all aspects of stamp collecting. Selected
