Mustangs Open Season Against Mangum Fri.

It will be the Okies against the Texans, translated to the Mangum Tigers against the Wheeler Mustangs, Friday night at Nicholson Field as the 1982 high school football campaign gets underway.

The 8 PM kickoff will see the renewing of the Wheeler-Mangum rivalry that was last played in the 60's.

After hard workouts in the extremely hot weather and two tough scrimmages against the Stratford Elks and the Clarendon Bronchos, the Wheeler Mustangs will be anxious to start playing for keeps after

being reclassified into Class A for the next two years.

"The hot weather has sapped some of our enthusiasm but has enabled us to get in super shape", Coach Preston Smith said prior to the season's opener. "It is hard to assess our ball club at this stage because we are making mistakes that any young football team makes but these Mustangs are looking forward to Friday night", Smith added.

Both the Mustangs and the Tigers had identical 5-5 records in 1981 and both lost key personnel through graduation. Mangum graduated 18 seniors, one of which was one of the top running backs in Oklahoma.

The Tigers, if in Texas, would be a large Class AA school and even with the graduation loss have excellent personnel returning according to the Mustangs scouts who witnessed the Mangum

—Shamrock scrimmage. The Tigers are a big football team that run the I formation on offense and have speed at the skill positions. Defensively, Mangum will use a straight 5.

For the opening tilt, the Mustangs are in good physical condition with only Billy Westmoreland, injured knee, definitely out of action. The doctors have released Westmoreland to begin playing next week after he missed both of the Mustangs scrimmages.

Offensively, the Mustangs will start the following: TE, Ronnie Jones, Tackles, Wade Wills and Lance Reames, Guards, Manson Porter and Justin Miley, Center, Jamie Porter, SE, Curtis Johnson. In the backfield for the Mustangs, Scott Wright will be at quarterback, Darren Grimes at fullback, Mark Moore, run-

ing back and Greg Atherton at split back.

The front four on defense will have Wills and Jamie Porter at ends, Manson Porter and Bill Watson at tackles and the linebackers will be, Jones, Miley and Vince Koelzer, a transfer. At cornerbacks will be Moore and Toby Collins and the two safeties will be Wright and Atherton.

The Mustangs have been picked to fight it out with Phillips for the 1-A crown and that important battle will be fought in Wheeler on October 1st. A new ruling that goes into effect this year has both the district champion and the runner up advancing into the state playoffs but there is only one district champ and that is what the Mustangs are working hard to be.

David will take his State Examining Boards in September at Austin and will begin serving his apprenticeship at Rix Funeral Home in Lubbock.

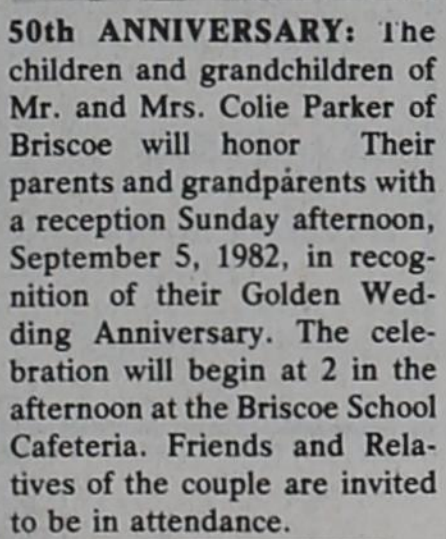
Tammy Cornell Gets Scholarship

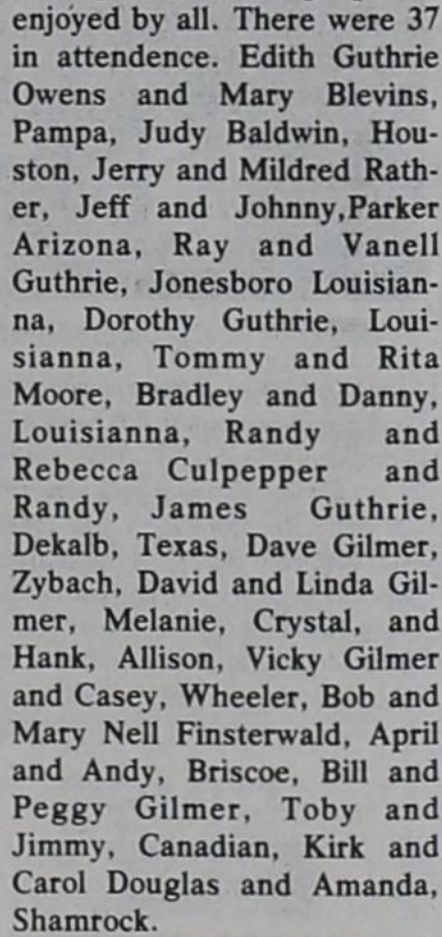

Charlie was picked the outstanding camper in his age group.

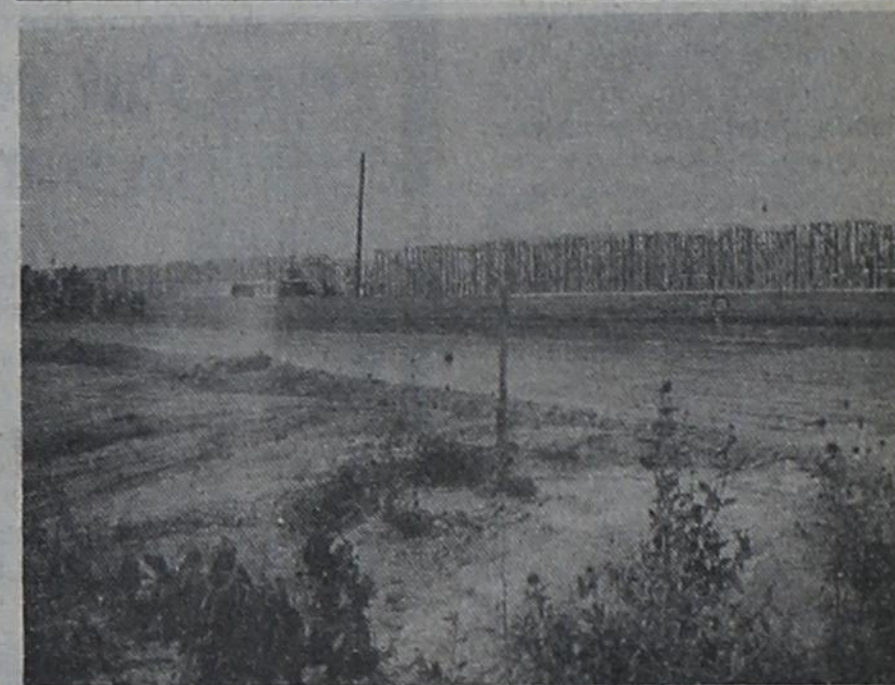
Charlie was awarded a certificate of recognition and has the honor of returning to West Texas for their first football game.

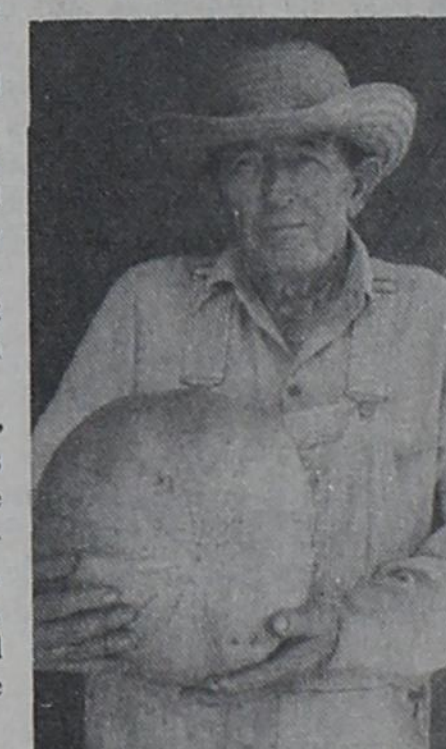


CONSTRUCTION: With the date for completion at January 1, 1983, work on the Wheeler Care Center is moving along with the partitions in place and

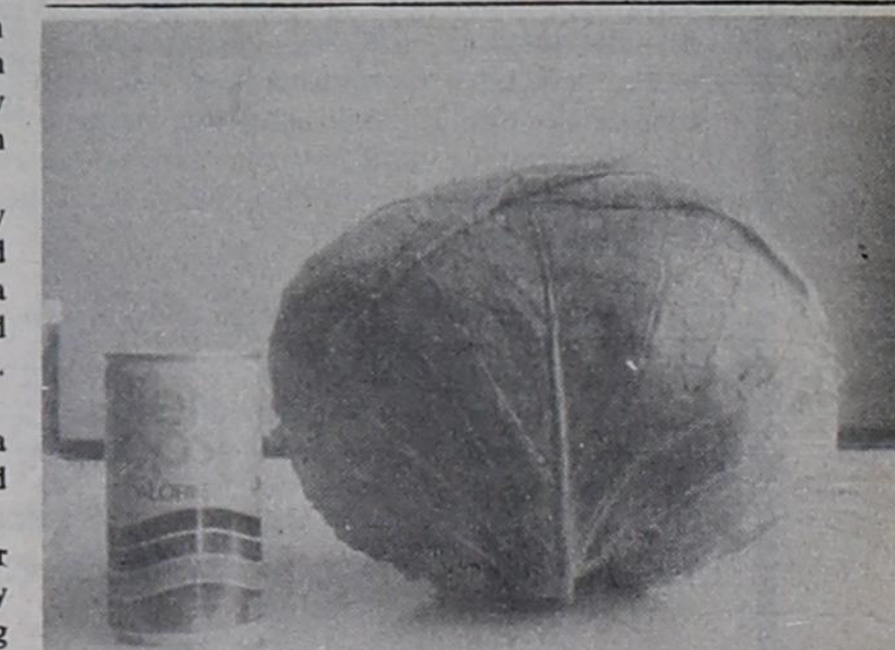

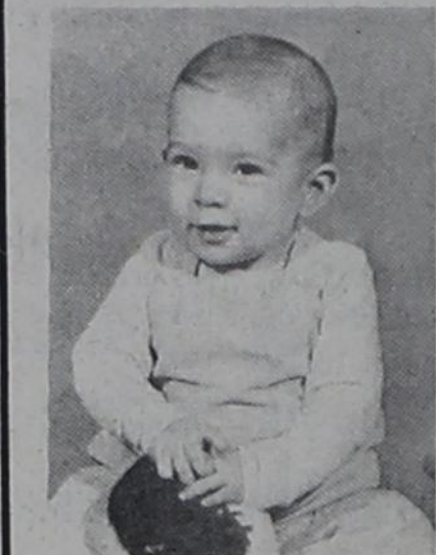

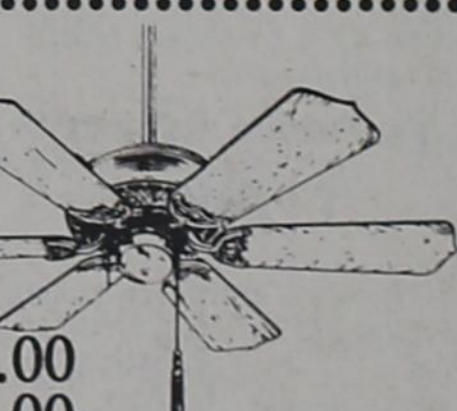

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him. God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship in spirit and in truth. (Jn. 4:23-24)

In spirit and in Truth - contrary to some modern religious thoughts, these two terms are not mutually exclusive. There are many who think that if you stress the strict adherence to the commandments and the teaching (doctrine) of the New Testament that your worship will inevitably become formalized and nothing except an empty shell. And while it may be true that some religious groups have turned their worship into a stylized set of formulas and rituals for most any occasion, others have gone equally far in the opposite direction. They have emphasized the "spiritual", which to them is the emotions. If I feel good, or if it causes my heart to jump or skip a beat, then it must surely be acceptable to God.

But take a close look at what Jesus told the samaritan woman at the well in John four. The true worshippers shall worship in spirit and in truth. The samaritans worshiped God, and I'm sure that the belief of many to them was sincere. But Jesus told the woman that she worshipped that which she did not know. Their worship was also mixed with worship to heathen Gods as well as the God of heaven. The Jews, on the other hand, had the oracles of God. Yet through their traditions their worship, in many instances, had become an exercise in seeing how far they could go in keeping the law, even to the point of keeping the letter while subverting its true purpose. In one instance, Jesus accused them of setting aside God's law in order that they might keep their traditions (Mk. 7:9).

The real truth of the matter is that in order to worship acceptably we must have both. We must be completely dedicated and sincere in our worship to Him. And we must at the same time seek in accordance to the truth, which is His word (Jn. 17:17). It is not a matter if it makes me feel good then it must be right. Rather, I feel good because it is right; according to the word. There is a lot of difference in the two.

TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long—or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."

My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need

to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our highways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms—eight years. That is enough time for anyone. Too great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

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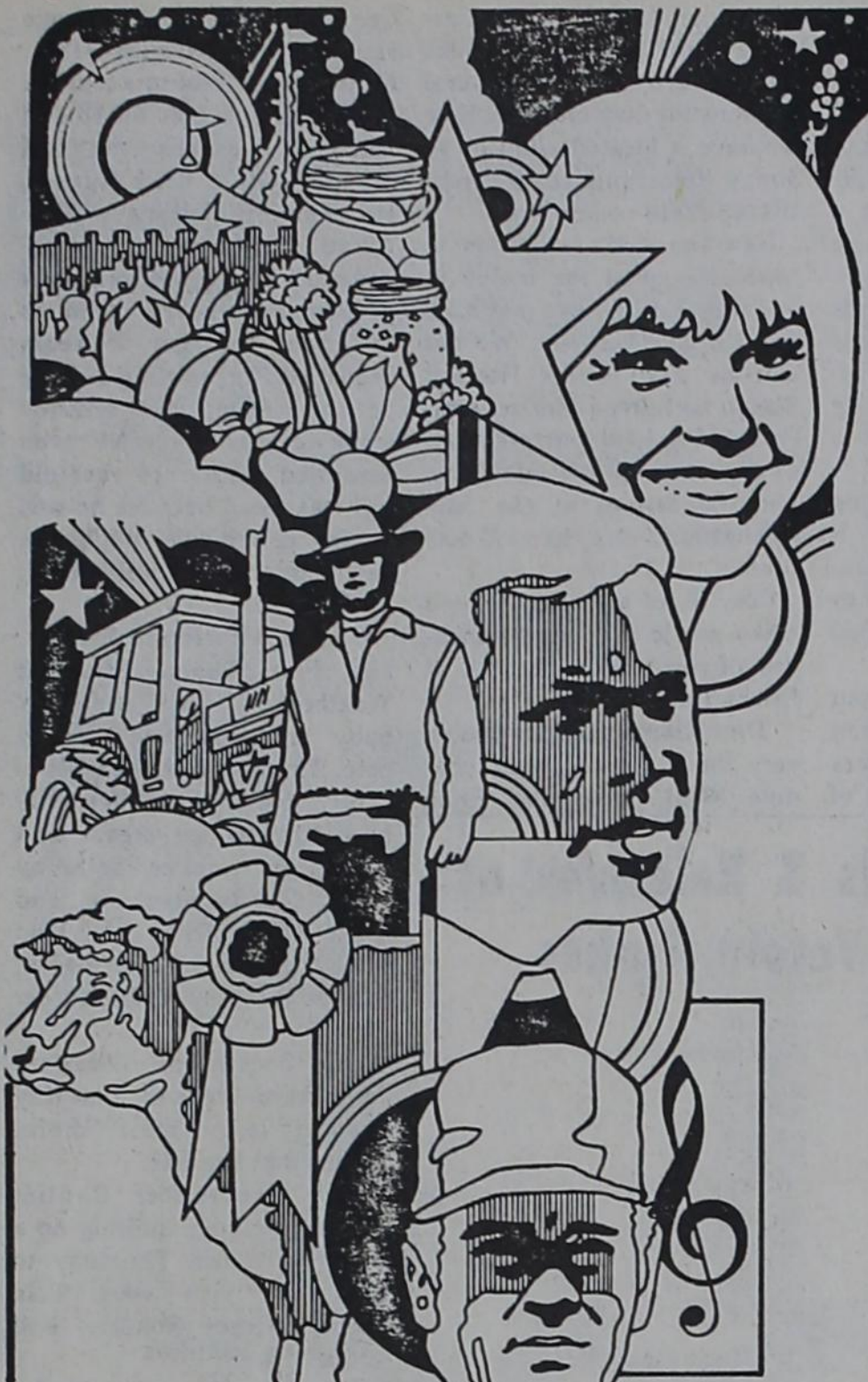
