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### DREW THOMAS PLACES FIFTH IN BREAKAWAY ROPING CONTEST

Lee McCasland, World Champion Junior Bull Rider for 1982 of the National Little Britches Rodeo Association, earned his title making a terrific ride on a tough bull named "Showdown" in the Saturday evening performance of the National Little Britches Championship Finals, at Penrose Stadium in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Lee is the 12 year old son of Kenneth and Glenda McCasland of Wheeler. Lee qualified for the right to participate for the short go by riding Monday night a bull named E.T. with a score of 60 pts. Lee split 3rd and 4th place with this ride. He rode his second bull Wednesday with a score of 49, which did not place, but assured him a spot in the short go on Saturday. Lee came into the short go with a score of 109 points, placing him 7th in the top 10 Junior finalists. The order of rides started with 10th place, making Lee buck out 4th in order on "Showdown", a bull with a history of few qualified rides. Lee's score of 66 moved him into 1st place. Tension mounted as he held his 1st place thru each of the following rides. Competition in the bull riding was tough from top placing cowboys from Colorado, Nebraska, South Dakota, Wyoming, Kansas, and Texas.

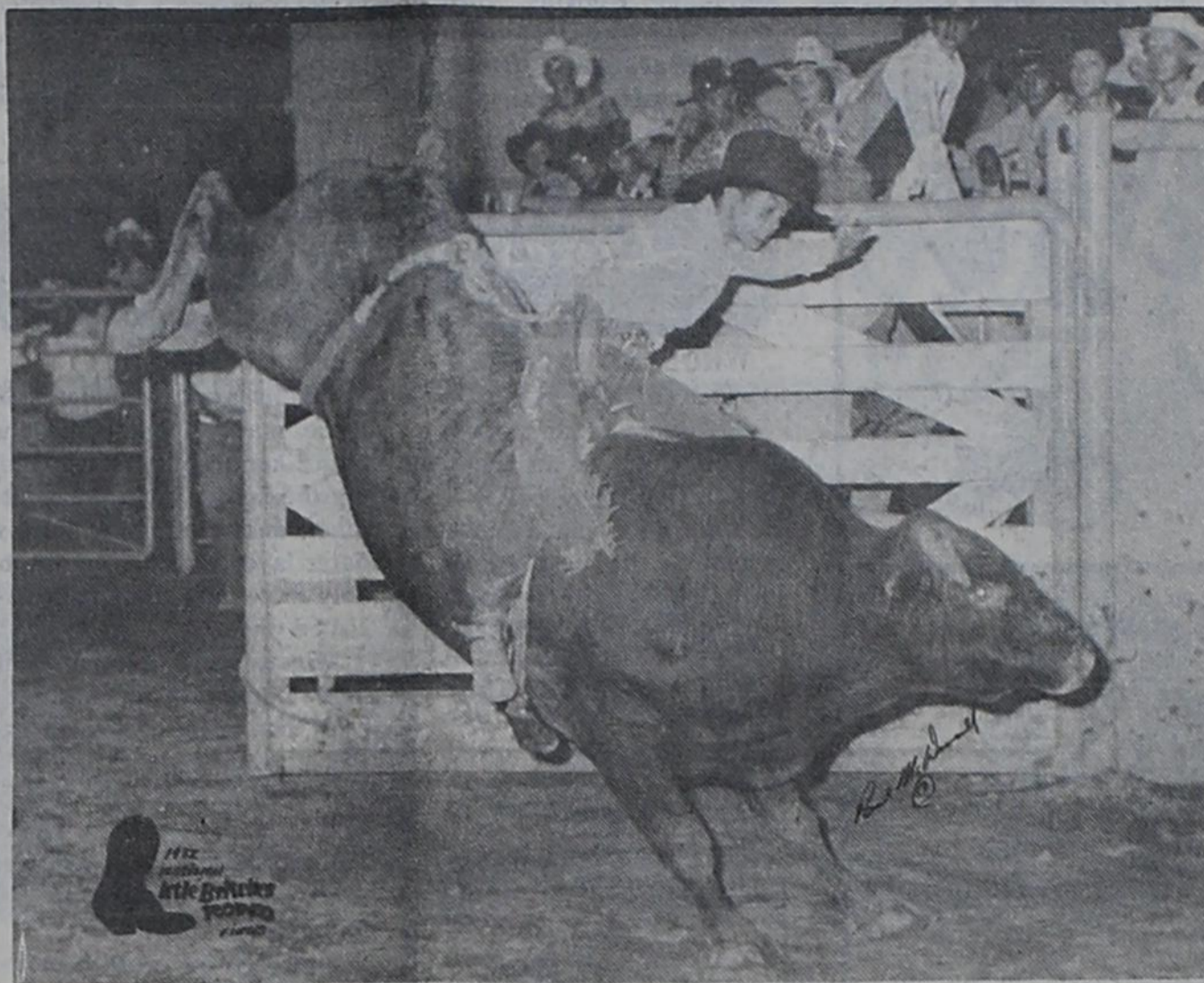
Lee's only comment was: "I can't believe I did it!"

### SPECIAL CITY COUNCIL MEETING

## CITY PURCHASES WELLS AND RIGHTS

Special meeting of August 23, 1982 opened by Mayor Louis C. Stas introducing Richard Wallace who in turn presented the 1981-82 Audit and explained same. Mr. Wallace also presented the 1982-83 budget. After discussing these matters, Kirven Roper motion to approve the budget as presented and to accept the Audit. Berniece Hall second, motion carried.

Mayor Stas reviewed Ordinance #108 relating to the governing of footage for lots of new dwellings. After discussing the matter it was determined paragraph 4 should be changed to read as: That, except for trailers, no more than four (4) residential dwellings under separate roofs shall be located within a 300 foot street frontage or highway frontage. (Lots to be no smaller than 75 feet in new residential developments). No structure or portion thereof shall be built closer than 10 feet to the boundary line. Berniece Hall motion the Ordinance # 108 be amended to so read, David Cross second, motion carried.

Jimmie Hill reported Kenady and Masters were willing to sell the existing water wells and water rights. The total purchase price is \$70,000.00.

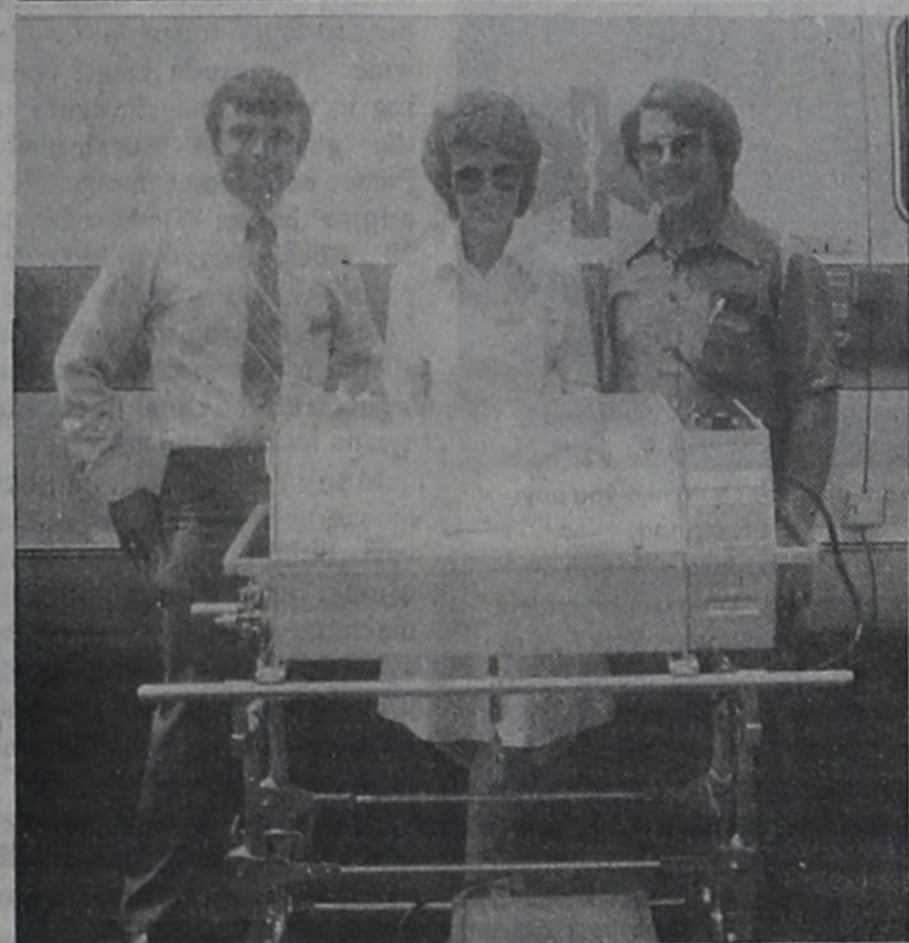
David Cross motion to purchase the wells and water rights. Kirven Roper second, motion carried.

**INCUBATOR:** An in-service portable unit cost was \$5,080.00. This leaves a balance of \$2,445.00 needed to purchase the additional unit.

Discussions among the ambulance personnel and nursing staff resulted in a decision to conduct a drive to purchase two incubators—one portable and one for Parkview Hospital. Fredricka Adams, director of nurses at Parkview, collected the information and the L.V.N. association which had recently disbanded, kicked off the drive with the contribution of the funds from their treasury. Through the generosity of the public and donations from the local ambulance service treasury, the \$10,000 goal is near and the incubator for Parkview will be ordered as soon as the money is available. The portable incubator is mounted on a cart which will fold for the entire unit to be placed in the ambulance in place of the cot; or the incubator can be taken from the cart and carried with the battery for hauling in case the mother must travel as a patient also. The unit will operate on house current or function for 4-6 hours on the battery pack. (If the battery pack should fail, the ambulance is equipped for the incubator to be plugged into 120 current.) The heat and humidity in the incubator is controlled and the openings in the front and end allow the attendant to work with the baby without exposure to the outside conditions. The unit is complete with its own oxygen supply which may be regulated as to how much, if any, outside air is filtered into the unit. Are you a whole-grain lover or do you prefer enriched bread, flour or cereal?  
You might want to consider which is the best source of nutrients, especially trace minerals, and which supplies

maximum roughage.  
Whole grain products, or those made by grinding the entire kernel of wheat including the sprout or germ, white inner endosperm and brown outer layer or bran, are probably more nutritious than enriched ones.

Minerals and vitamins are in higher amounts in germ and bran than in the endosperm of whole grain foods.

However, the high content of bran and phytate in whole-grain products may interfere with some absorption of minerals.

The high oil content in the germ could also become rancid and attract insects if stored incorrectly.

White enriched bread, flour or cereal have had fiber content and the outer layers of bran and germ removed in the milling process.

However, enriched flour, such as all-purpose, has been enriched with iron and B vitamins (thiamin, riboflavin and niacin) within Federal-standard limits.

White enriched bread may also contain less of the trace minerals, such as magnesium, chromium, zinc, copper and nickel, than does whole-grain bread.

The choice simply depends on personal preference since both enriched and whole-grain products supply your body with carbohydrates, protein, B vitamins and iron.

Whichever of the two you choose, remember to eat four or more serving daily from this necessary food group.

To store breads or cereals, place them in a cool, dry area. And if air is warm and humid, keep bread in its original wrapper in the refrigerator to prevent mold.

Seal bread tightly in light and moisture-proof paper and freeze at 0 degrees F for week to kill any possible insect infestation.

Baked breads and rolls can be stored for about six months in the freezer at 0 degrees F.

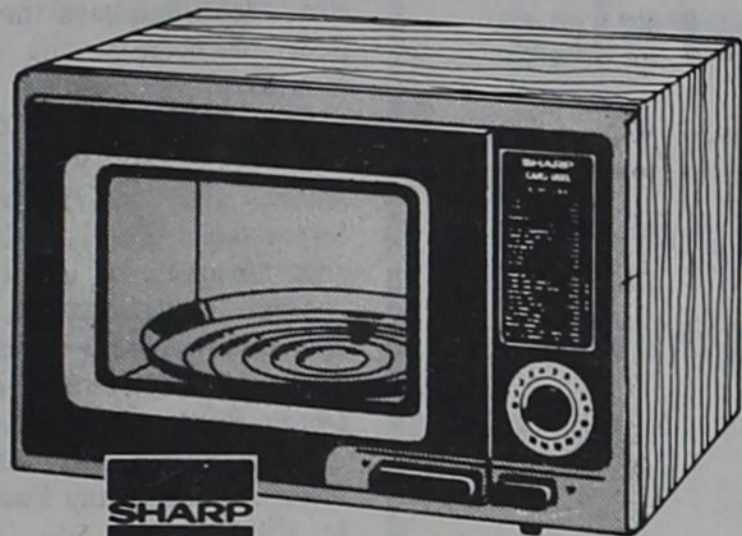

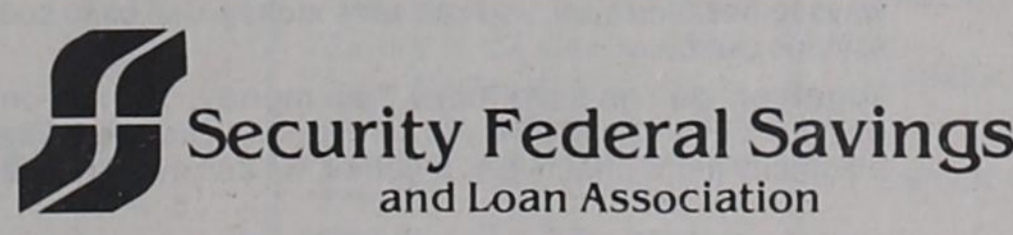

## CHANGING ATTITUDES ABOUT DWI

Few things in this country have changed as much during the past few years as public attitudes on drunk drivers. It is a change we can all be thankful for.

Most of that change, in my opinion, can be attributed to the organization of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD), and the attendant publicity and editorial support they have received from our newspapers. They have succeeded, where others have failed, in drawing attention to the tragedy that has claimed the lives of thousands of Texans.

It was not long ago, for instance, when some public officials who ought to lead by example were openly contemptuous of our laws against driving while drunk. Much of this problem started nine years ago when my opponent became Lt. Governor and helped pass the law reducing the legal drinking age from twenty-one to eighteen years of age. Now Mr. Hobby, feeling the heat of irate parents and loved ones, and perhaps personal remorse, has said he favors tougher drunk driving laws—another switch from a previous position.

Political promises, however, are easily made. If a politician can't get excited about an issue of this magnitude in nine years, it seems unlikely that he would get excited and pursue corrective legislation in another four years.

So I hope the Mothers Against Drunk Drivers will stick to their guns, and I hope they continue getting support from the people of our state. Their efforts to put an end to this carnage on our highways has my support, and I hope it has yours.

## Traffic Delineators

Have you given much thought to traffic delineators? Probably not, because you may not be sure you know what a traffic delineator is.

If we had said road reflectors, you would have immediately visualized the objects beside the road on metal posts that reflect light back to you from your car headlights when you drive at night. These reflectors send you messages to make your night driving easier and safer.

There are five basic traffic delineators. Each one signals its message to make you aware of potential driving hazards.

A series of single white delineators beside the road shows an upcoming curve and the extent of its curvature, as well as the width of the safety parking strip should you need to pull off the road.

A series of delineators with two amber reflectors one above the other sends a message to make you aware of an upcoming entrance or exit point.

These delineators extend the length of the entrance and exit ramps.

For your convenience and safety when approaching the double amber delineators, proceed with caution because vehicles may be exiting or entering the thoroughfare. If the entrance or exit is channelized, the first delineator will have three horizontal amber reflectors.

The same arrangement also warns of potentially dangerous objects in the middle of the road such as the beginning of a median strip or center island. You are to pass on the right of these.

They also are used to show the division point of a branching highway, channelized exit or entrance ramp, which you will pass to the right or left.

A delineator with three amber reflectors mounted one above the other appearing in isolated places marks roadside hazards such as interruption of shoulder pavement, bridge structure, light-pole traffic sign, tree, boulder, etc.

The fifth type of traffic delineator is a diamond shaped series of three parallel sets of triple reflectors arranged in echelon. This delineator advises of a dangerous situation in the form of an immovable object such as a massive bridge pier, dead end, or a 90-degree turn of the road.

The traffic delineators placed on the roads and highways by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation send distinct messages to aid you in your night driving, making it safer for you and your fellow motorists.

Laverne Tucker and Earlene Rose were there. Earlene has decided to quit teaching till the children start school. The road to Kelton got pretty long.


Talked to Elsie Leonard and girls. She said they have interests under several wells but no money yet.

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## Lady Longhorns Stronger With Hartman's Return

Cheryl Hartman, formerly of Nazareth, is back in action for the University of Texas women's basketball team.

Hartman, a 6-1 senior center, didn't play during the 1981-82 season due to a serious knee injury that occurred at the end of her junior season.

Nary a cog has been removed though, from the Lady Longhorns' fast-breaking, full-court pressing basketball machine which compiled a 35-4 mark a year ago and finished second in the AIAW national tournament.

Two potential frontline players return in Hartman and 5-4 point guard Kriss Ethridge. Both missed all of last season with injuries, but have made excellent recoveries.

Hartman was a starter as a sophomore and junior, and according to Conradt, is one of the most competitive athletes she has ever coached. She averaged 9.8 points and 6.6 rebounds per game, and is nearing the 1,000-career-point plateau. Hartman was also the leading scorer for the US Women's Select Team during its summer tour of Bolivia.

"Hartman will do whatever it takes to get the job done in the middle," she said. "She is not a prolific scorer and is not spur-quick, but when it comes to defense, we have few who are better."

Actually, Hartman's offense has been consistent — she is a 51% career field goal shooter, but her biggest contributions have been on the defensive end of the floor.

Conradt welcomes Hartman's return. She will complement the explosive Smith, one of the country's top freshman last year, the veteran Williams nad highly-regarded rookie Cara Priddy.

Due to unexpected delays, my youngest son and family, who is the leader of this expedition, cannot start until late the next afternoon. He tells us to go on to the camping area this side of Monarch Pass, Colorado. He will drive early and late and catch us either Saturday night or Sunday. Since my daughter and son-in-law only have a weeks vacation time, they will join us the following Sunday in Yellowstone, Wyoming.

We leave Texline in gay and adventurous spirits the next morning. The morning is beautiful, and we are soon in the cool foothills. Everything is so green it is hard to believe the grass is so high. Raton Pass is more beautiful than we have ever seen it.

Going up the mountain to camp Garfield, the pickup decided to be like its owner, its get up and go, got up and went. We crept along bearily moving at times, but finally made it to the camping area. I sure didn't know what was wrong, but thought it might be vacuum locked, it had done that once in Wyoming going up a mountain. All Punk knew was it was terrible to try to drive it up the mountain. The men decided it was just trying to vapor lock and forgot about it.

We had a beautiful campsite here near the river where some members of the party panned for gold. A neighbor camper was panning for gold and panned out a penny, which was the best luck anyone had. We fixed lunch for the other son and family, hoping they would be here by noon. They arrived a few minutes till twelve. Everyone is anxious to get on the road again. So we started, but the pickups rest didn't help at all. So the youngest son drove it around the camp, and announced its just the choke sticking. It had began to rain, but he gets his screwdriver and pliers and soon has it running like new. Punk kept asking the boys, will it be o.k. now. They assured her it would be, and we sailed over that pass without a bit of trouble. In fact, that was the only trouble any of us had. Going on up the pass, we saw lots of working mines, huge mountains were being torn down with machinery. Such beauty being destroyed by machinery. I don't know what they were mining. When we got over the pass, we are over the Continental divide and the rivers all flow westward.

We make it to the Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Monument to spend the night in another beautiful camping area. We see the Canyon the next morning. We also drove by the Mormon Temple, but it wasn't open to the public. Next we went to a beach on the Great Salt Lake. The boys, one of their wives and Punk went swimming. I skipped that, since I had went in it twenty-five years ago. I think if you've ever been in water that is twenty-seven percent salt, you never forget it. We started North early the next morning and were soon in Idaho. We camped in Camp Targhu, Idaho that night. The next morning we saw the lower and upper Mesa Falls. There was an old log hotel by the upper Falls, so we explored it and took pictures. We camped that night by Hobgen Lake in Montana. We went swimming here. Loud speakers were telling everyone to keep all food stuff put away, and keep a clean camp and not get out after dark. We didn't see it. It came back two nights later. Sure some camper up where food was left out on the picnic tables.

Next we camped at Pebble Creek. It's sure cold here, ice on the table tops in the mornings. We go to the top of Bear Tooth Pass while camped here. It seems we are on top of the world here. And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to the whole creation. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that disbelieveth shall be condemned. (Mk. 16:15-16)

In the commission that he gave to his apostles after he had risen from the dead Jesus instructed them to go everywhere, making disciples of every nation (Matt. 28:19). They would do so by preaching the gospel (Mk. 16:15). Those who heard that gospel and believed it were to be baptized in the name (by the authority) of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit (Matt. 28:19), and they would be saved (Mk. 16:16). Those who disbelieved, and he did not need to add "any refusal to be baptized:" for such a refusal would itself be tantamount to disbelief, would be lost, or condemned. Such were the marching orders of Christ, the Lord, for the establishment and building of his kingdom, which is his church.

We find the apostles on the day of pentacost commanding those to whom they had proclaimed the gospel of the risen Christ for the first time in history to "repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins." (Acts 2:38).

In the light of what we have covered in previous weeks about faith in him, repentance - determining to seek his will instead of sin, and confessing that he is Lord, these passages alone should be enough to convince any true believer that being baptized in his name for (in order to) the remission of our sins is necessary. It is essential for our soul salvation.

If I believe in Jesus as the Son of God, whom God raised from the dead, than all that he claimed for himself is true. He and God are one (Jn. 10:30; 17:20-23). Their wills are also one (Jn. 4:34). If I repent of my sins, then I determine to seek and do his will, not my own. If I confess that he is Lord, then I acknowledge his right to place conditions upon my salvation (Heb. 5:9). In these passages, he commanded his apostles to do it; they commanded those to whom they preached to submit to it in his name; therefore, baptism is necessary.

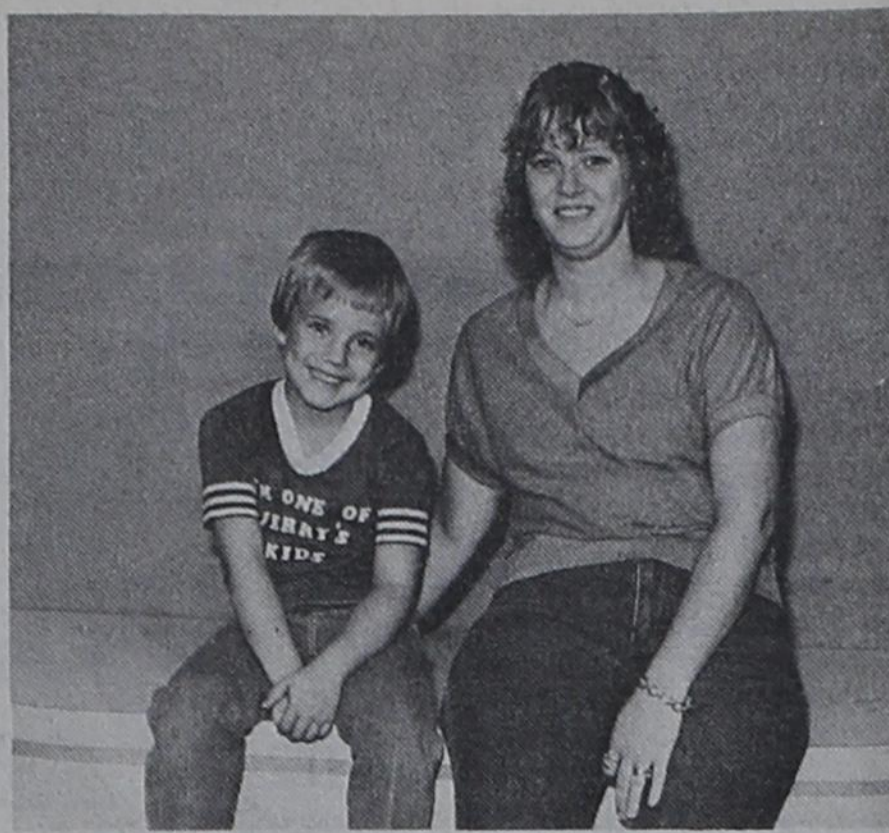

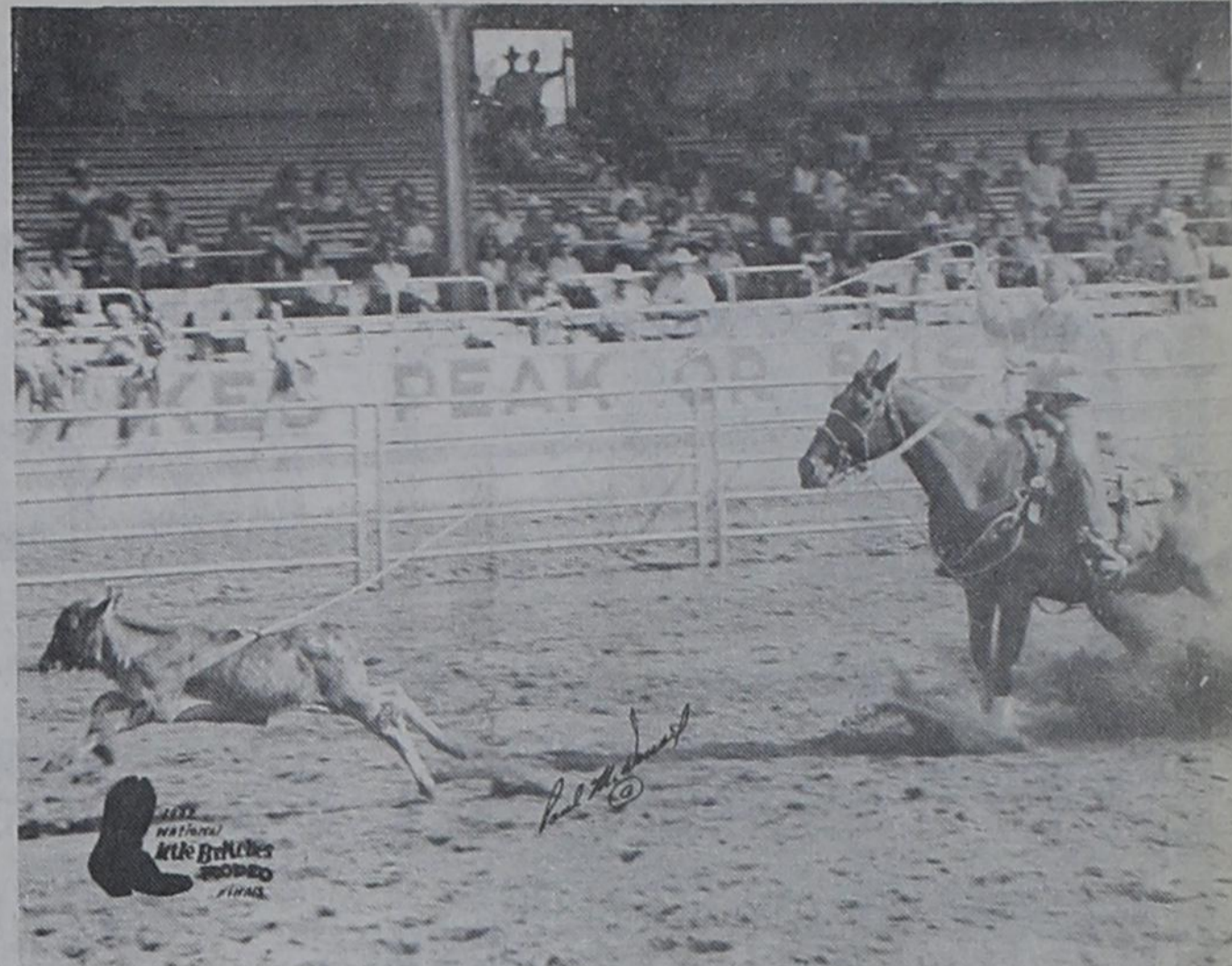
