## PORTABLE INCUBATOR HAS BEEN ORDERED

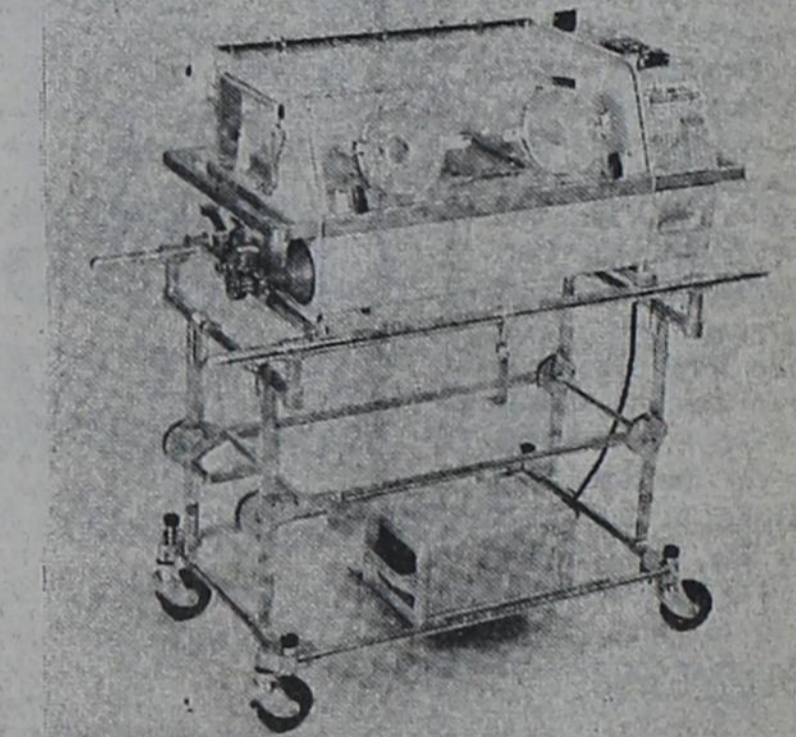
DONATIONS CLIMB TO \$7000.00

The transport incubator is a self contained intensive care incubator, fully equipped with all life support systems for maintaining infant body temperature, a properly humidified and oxygenated atmosphere, continuous observation of and immediate access to the infant. This unit provides a complete, mobile intensive care environment in which to transport those who need care to the point at which they can receive it via ambulance, helicopter or aircraft. This unit will be kept at Parkview Hospital to be used when needed.

The fund is still open for the second incubator which is also needed. This unit is not portable and will remain at Parkview Hospital. This unit would be a wonderful addition to the new nursery which is in the building plans for Parkview Hospital.

### Cycle Accident Victim Dies

A 54 year-old Amarillo man died Wednesday, August 5, in a Topeka, Kansas hospital, as a result of injuries suffered in a motorcycle accident two months ago.

The accident occurred North and East of Allison on the Reardon highway.

The Wheeler Amb. was called to the scene. The victim, J.K. "Red" Conaway was rushed to Parkview Hospital with severe head injuries. A short time later he was transferred code 3 to High Plains Baptist Hosp. in Amarillo. He was wearing a helmet at the time of the crash.

Mr. Conaway lived most of his life in Waynoka, Okla. He moved to Amarillo in 1977. He was a brakeman for the Santa Fe Railroad.

### Services Held For Carol Higley

Services were held Friday, August 6, for Carol Vassar Amacker Higley, 65, of Childress. Mrs. Higley died of an apparent heart attack Tuesday shortly after checking into South Community Hospital in Oklahoma City; she was scheduled for cataract surgery Wednesday.

Mrs. Higley was born Sept. 16, 1916 in Wheeler. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Amacker. She completed high school in Amarillo. After a brief career as a model with White and Kirk in Amarillo, she was married to Morris T. Higley on June 28, 1935 and moved to Childress.

Mrs. Higley worked with her husband, owner and editor of the Wheeler Index, and wrote an award winning column, "pot pourri" and served as Women's Editor. Mrs. Higley was active in community work and was named First Lady of Childress in 1951.

Rev. David L. Jeffery, pastor of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Childress, officiated at the 2 p.m. service in the First United Methodist Church of Childress.

Survivors include her husband, Morris T. Higley; one son, Thomas Carlton Higley, news director for radio station KIXZ in Amarillo; one daughter, Mrs. Bill Blackburn of Amarillo and four grandchildren.

The representatives from the Rape Crisis office in Amarillo will be presenting the program. They will be showing a film so only adults or teenage girls able to handle it need to be in attendance.

Rape is not only a crime, it is a crisis. It is a violent and explosive interruption in a female's life. It is painful. It is frustrating. It is humiliating. It is the epitome of helplessness. Victims of rape are frightened, angry, humiliated, insulted, and guilt ridden. Rapists prey on victims regardless of age, race, religion or socio-economic status.

### Sweetwater Dam Is Discussed

Fred Parkey of the Red River Authority met with the City Council of Mobeetie to explain the proposed Sweetwater Creek Dam and determine their feelings concerning the project. The proposed project would make water available to each of the Wheeler County towns and municipalities.

The revised drawings for the Sweetwater Creek Dam Project are being completed and will be made available at the time of completion. With the use of tax bonds to build the dam, filtering plant and water lines, it would be possible to pipe treated water to each of the communities. Their use of the water would furnish the revenue necessary to maintain the project.

Accompanying Mr. Parkey at the meeting were his wife; Louis C. Stas, Mayor of the City of Wheeler, and Jim Hill, Wheeler City Councilman.

Mr. Parkey had met with the mayors of Wheeler and Shamrock earlier in the day.

### Black Awarded \$200 Scholarship

Tina Black, a graduate of the Allison Independent School District and the daughter of a Wheeler couple, has been awarded a \$200 Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarship to attend West Texas State university for the 1982-83 academic year.

More than 350 students who will enter WTSU as freshman for the fall semester which begins with registration on Wednesday, Aug. 25, have been designated as Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars.

The Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarship program has grown since 1979 with five gifts each of \$200.00. The Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo added the fifth gift in June to bring the scholarship fund total to \$1 million.

Of the 328 Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars in 1981-82, 87 percent will return for this year and 51 percent of those who will return have maintained a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale to be eligible for a scholarship the second year, said Keith Winter, director of development. The latest gift expanded the program for students to be eligible for the third year.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars who score a 28 of a possible 36 on the American College Test and 1,220 of a possible 1,600 points on the Scholastic Aptitude test college entrance examinations also are designated as President's Honor Scholars and receive an additional \$100 scholarship each academic year.



### FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

## Knoxville World's Fair Successful

More than five million people have passed through the gates of the 1982 World's Fair thus far, making it the most successful U.S. Fair, both in popular and financial terms, since the New York World's Fair of 1939. By comparison, the attendance for the entire run of the '74 Fair in Spokane totaled 5.2 million.

The Fair's national popularity has been attributed in large part to word-of-mouth enthusiasm. Exit surveys of visitors' reactions to the Fair show that 85 percent would recommend the Fair to friends and relatives at home.

In spite of the turn out in Knoxville, city officials say, the major problems anticipated by the public have not materialized. There have been no traffic jams or back-ups, police report; and parking spaces are plentiful, resulting in reduced rates.

Visitor services to make booking accommodations easier and to reduce waits on exhibit lines have been stepped up by Fair management.

Scattered complaints regarding housing and reservations have been addressed and increased staffing, a new streamlined telephone reservations system and customer service division have eliminated housing problems.

Even with attendance running 35 percent ahead of projections, there is good availability of quality rooms in and around the city, according to Property Leasing and hotel-Motel Management, the Fair's newly retained housing agency.

"We expected our millionth visitor at the end of May, but we hit the first million mark in the first two weeks," S.H. Roberts, Jr., President of the Fair, reports. "Our four millionth visitor arrived late in June, and earlier this month we greeted the five millionth."

"The World's Fair is obviously surpassing our wildest hopes," he claims. "We anticipated from 20-40,000 visitors daily during May, but between 50-99,000 people passed through the turnstiles daily. June projections were 40-60,000 daily, and we've ended up averaging 75,000. The Tour and Travel Department, expecting 250-300 buses a day, saw that figure reach 600 and up to 800 buses on some days."

"We've also been proud to see the number of exhibiting nations grow to twenty-seven with the recently announced participation of five eastern Caribbean nations," Roberts states. The state of St. Christopher and Nevis, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Montserrat, St. Lucia, and Antigua and Barbuda will exhibit in a 4,700 square foot pavilion opening early in August.

"Because of these Fantastic crowds, we've added water fountains, benches, canopies and restrooms," Roberts says. "As the Fair progresses, it is growing and changing to accommodate the turn-out—steps like a second level of the French pavilion, expansion of the Philippine pavilion, and more space in front of the Korean Pavilion have been taken in this regard. An additional 3.5 million dollars have been allotted since Opening Day for Fair-site improvements."

One of the most powerful drawing cards to the Fair has turned out to be the impressive roster of entertainers and celebrity-studded shows. Crowds have already viewed such luminaries as Rudolf Nureyev, Bob Hope, Glen Campbell, the cast of "Ain't Misbehavin'," Jerry Lee Lewis and Johnny Cash. On tap for the coming weeks are Loretta Lynn, Carlos Montoya, Red Skelton and the Grand Kabuki Theatre of Japan. On-site, full-scale musical productions are being staged daily in the Tennessee State Amphitheatre and on the three Folklife Festival stages. The latter and the largest such festival ever presented, features country, bluegrass, gospel, folk and blues performed throughout the day. Two new theatrical venues—the Court of Flags and the Garden Theatre, have recently been established to help accommodate the ap-

proximately 35 daily on-site productions. All on-site entertainment is free.

In addition, jugglers, magicians, dancers, clowns, mimes, and marching bands entertain queues throughout the Fair grounds.

Visitors have also been on hand to greet such visiting dignitaries as Jordan's Crown Prince Hassan and Philippine First Lady Imelda Marcos, Vice Premier of Australia Douglas Anthony, and of course American leaders, including President and Mrs. Reagan, Governor Alexander and Senator Baker of Tennessee.

Rooms in hotels, motels and a great variety of supplemental housing are plentiful. Campsites, condominiums, and Bed 'N' Breakfast arrangements in private homes.

## Proctor & Gamble Files Suits For "Libeing The Character"

The Proctor & Gamble Company filed suits July 20, 1982, against four additional individuals for circulating "false and malicious" statements about the company and calling for a boycott of P&G products. Today's actions are the latest in a series of steps initiated by P&G to stop the spread of stories associating the company and its "moon and stars" trademark with satanism and devil worship. The company filed similar suits against a Pensacola, Florida, couple and an Atlanta, Georgia, man on July 1. Suits were filed against Guy Sharpe of Atlanta, Georgia; Elma Ed Pruitt of Clovis, New Mexico; and Sherman and Margaret McCord of Tullahoma, Tennessee. All four are charged with "libeling the character" of Procter & Gamble by making statements or distributing literature which stated that P&G supported satanism and that its trademark is a symbol of satanism or devil worship. They also encouraged others to stop buying P&G products, the company said. The suits were filed in Federal District Courts in Atlanta, Georgia; Albuquerque, New Mexico; and Greeneville, Tennessee. P&G is asking the courts to stop the individuals from circulating the rumor and for unspecified monetary damages. Former U.S. Attorney General Griffin Bell of the Atlanta law firm of King & Spalding will represent Procter & Gamble in the Georgia suit. Charles Larrabee of the Albuquerque law firm of Rodey, Dickason, Sloan, Akin & Robb will handle the New Mexico suit. Richard Speight of the Nashville law firm of Speight & Parker will represent the company in the Tennessee suit. P&G announced on June 24 that it was taking aggressive steps to stop the rumors after calls from consumers escalated sharply in April, May and June. The company received more than 15,000 calls about the rumor in June and more than 12,000 in April and in May. The rumors typically report

## THE BIBLE SPEAKS

I tell you, Nay, but, except ye repent, Ye shall in like manner perish.

When a man truly believes the gospel of Christ he stands fully convinced of one paramount fact; that he is, before God, a sinner. (Romans 3:23) He desperately needs salvation. And, if he really wants to be saved, he is ready for the next step, which is repentance. It seems so simple, and yet, there are a number of mistaken ideas floating around about what repentance really is.

For example, contrary to some people's opinion, biblical repentance is not sorrow for sins. Yes, I must be sorry for my sins. One must be truly sorry for his sins before he can repent of them. But, on the other hand, I can be sorry for my sins and yet not repent of them in the biblical sense of the term. The apostle Paul tells us this in 2 Corinthians 7:8-10:

For though I made you sorry with my epistle, I do not regret it (for I see that that epistle made you sorry, though but for a season), I now rejoice, not that ye were made sorry, but that ye were made sorry unto repentance; for ye were made sorry after a godly sort, that ye might suffer loss by us in nothing. For godly sorrow worketh repentance unto salvation, a repentance that bringeth no regret; but the

sorrow of the world worketh death.

Paul had upset the Corinthians with a previous letter, but their sorrow had caused them to repent of their sinful behavior, and for that Paul said he could be grateful. A good example of the other kind of sorrow is that of King Saul in 2 Samuel 15. Samuel convicted Saul of disobeying God. Yet Saul, although he begged Samuel to stay with him that he might disguise the fact of God's displeasure, refused to repent of his wickedness. Consequently, God took away his kingdom, and even tormented him with an evil spirit.

And repentance is not the reformation of ones life. Rather the reformation of one's life is the natural consequence of his repentance. It must take place because if it doesn't, it means that we have either not truly repented, or we have repented of our first repentance. To repent unto salvation means that a person must come to a decision, must make up his mind, that from now on he is going to quit following after and practicing sin, and is going to seek the will of God.

Question: Have you repented, yet?
