J. J. Johnson, Curt Smith Recipients Of Ja'Nae Goad Golf Memorial Scholarship





Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

* the market or special appraised value placed on your

* the unequal appraisal of your property

* the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll * any exemptions that may apply to you

* the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal

the taxable status of your property * the local governments which should be taxing your

* the ownership of property * the change of use of land receiving special appraisal * any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and

adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB)

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the

The law gives property owners the right to protest evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 402 S Main St. Wheeler.

> Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

The 2000 deadline for filing protests with the Wheeler County Central Appraisal District is June

If you believe the appraisal district, or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday

NOW IS A GOOD TIME TO SPRAY BAGWORMS IN EVER-**GREEN TREES**

There are some people that probably think that bags hanging from evergreen trees are some natural part of the tree since they are so common. around here.

However, the bags are the home for bagworms - one of the common ornamental problems that persist in

The bags come from silken threads interspersed with bits of foliage from the host tree and are spun around worms that feed on the trees, form the bags and lay eggs in the bags that overwinter until next year.

Late May is a critical time for bagworm control since it is now that the eggs hatch and worms crawl out from the ends of the bags - hanging on silken threads from the ends of the bags until a wind propels them onto a neighboring branch or tree where they land and start to feed and spin their bags. Catching the bagworms when they are small and newly hatched just as they are starting to spin their new bags - means you can control them well and easily. However, waiting until the bags are large makes control a lost cause

Actually, waiting until early June over most of the central High Plains probably is a good idea, since you can get most of the bagworms with one spraying. If the problem is severe and a tree is seriously damaged, two sprayings about three weeks apart is suggested. The feeding of bagworms defoliates the tree and enough of them will cause serious deformation of the tree and can even kill a tree, if their feeding is serious enough Bagworms are most common on junipers and cedars, but will feed on a wide range of other evergreens - as well as some deciduous species.

In controlling bagworms, a wide range of chemical controls can be used. The "natural insecticide" Bacillus thuringensis (BT) is sold under a wide range of brand names and may need to be applied several times for good control

Chemical insecticides such as diazinon, Seven, Dursban, Cygon and orthene - or brand names containing these active chemical ingredients can be used. There are some companies that formulate a brand name control called Bagworm Spray. Make sure you take your time and spray the tree completely and thoroughly - using plenty of water. Using a little wetting agent or "spreader sticker" with the water will help a lot. You need to get the water to penetrate the small silken bags and that takes some doing. However, it may mean the difference between excellent control and only getting a few of the young bagworms. Always read and follow label

instructions when using pesticides. You can pick off the bags in the off season; however, after the worms have hatched out, they are empty and it does little good to remove the

bags then. Make sure that when you removed the bags that you gather them up and get them away from the trees.

Brice and I planned a wonderful anniversary trip to Cozumel, Mexico. However the condition that was put upon me by Brice was that we had to get Scuba Certified before we could go! I agreed. We started in the middle of March taking the courses required in OKC. Our life has revolved around this. It took ALL of our spare time. We bought our own gear for the safety factor, which I now completely recommend.

Here are the travel tips to Cozumel, Mexico, based on our experience.

1) Packing a Scuba Bag under 44 pounds (a requirement per airline) impossible for two people's gear. Luckily they let it slide. Never, never be the first or sec-

ond in line to check your luggage. Possibly even the third, fourth, or fifth to be safe. 3) Never let them have your luggage if they are calling on the radio

asking if the carriers were ready. 4) Always be there two hours early, because of the LONG lines, and so on. You do not want to be the last one

to check your luggage. Have you figured it out yet? We left on Sunday with a return on the next Sunday. We received our DIVE BAG on Thursday? Something wrong?

The "Stas" name still follows me! The honeymooners (the first couple in line to check their luggage) did not receive anything. We were second, and sent our dive bag first, then

The airport transportation with the company we traveled with left the airport without us in Cozumel.

We got to the hotel and let the representative of our travel group know that we didn't get our bag. Strange the only thing we ever got from them was "You need to let the representative in charge of that know"-never called us back and "Did you go to orientation?"-NO, the van left us at the airport. "Don't miss orientation" (Whatever

that would have done to help us.) 5) I do recommend (can you be-

lieve it?) staying at the Allegro All-Inclusive Hotel. Wonderful—eat, drink (even alcohol) whenever you want and never have to pay. It was all included with our trip. It was a private beach for only hotel guests. You could become one big family with the other guests or stay secluded on the beach by the pool—your choice. You are at the hotel with the same people all week for the most part.

The staff was very nice (of course there are always a few not so helpful). They were our communication with the airport in Cozumel. They had to be. We were told they spoke English, but when we called the airport and ask if they spoke English, the answer was "No"

6) Everybody at the airport in Cozumel may speak English, but the people answering the phones don't. 7) Get the Corporate phone num-

ber of the airline you will be flying with, and call it to see that it a good number. NO 800 numbers allowed. Our dive bag traveled, as we fig-

lost claim before we ever got out of customs in Cozumel. DFW-Cancun. where it was to be on a fairy or plane to Cozumel, Cancun-DFW, Finally DFW-Cozumel. Dive gear is supposed to be under water, not in the air-go figure.

We met a wonderful couple (Kent and Sandy) with three kids (Lesli Jessica and Kelly) from Colorado in the van with another travel group that was kind enough to let us ride to the Hotel. No they never went to any orientation either. Oh well, I guess it

really wasn't that important either. Our "sob" story was good enough that they invited us to go on their chartered dive boat with them and their family. We enjoyed that with the exception of renting the dive gear. There is nothing like your own. Anyway anything was better than waiting for the phone calls, which were never returned; until we got a hold of the corporate office.

Kent and family are now new friends. and we hope they enjoyed us as much as we enjoyed the time we spent with them.

After we got our gear we had two days of diving available to us (five dives); our plan was 15 dives-three per day. Diving is beautiful there. Brice and

I will return, but we may send our gear to the hotel a week early. The trip was great, take lots of money. Everything there is cheap, but as always sometimes what you pay is what you get.
