SWEETWATER DAM IS TOPIC OF MEETING

Jeff Black To Be WTSU Wrangler

Jeff Black, a junior at West Texas State University from Wheeler, will be among the 50 "wranglers" for Buffalo Branding '82, a fall retreat for beginning freshman students. Black, who is majoring in computer information systems will be one of the Student counselors for the retreat scheduled for Sunday through Tuesday, Aug. 22-24.

Beginning freshman students are eligible to participate in the unique retreat, but must make reservations by Sunday, Aug. 1. A fee of \$25 for each freshman student will include the Sunday evening meal, workshops and seminars, entertainment and a T-Shirt.

"We usually bring the freshman in and the information we tell them is basic, but we don't tell how to adjust to college life or how to cash a check and build pride," said Cindy Pearce, coordinator of residence hall programming. "If we teach them from the very beginning, they'll be better students in our organization and better alumni later."

The fall retreat will be hosted in conjunction with an orientation session on Monday, Aug. 23, for beginning freshman students who did not attend any of five summer orientation sessions hosted by the University Counseling and Testing Center to pre-register for fall courses.

The students do not have to be pre-registered to participate, said Pearce.

The new students will learn about WTSU history and traditions, student organizations and activities, church centers, university operation and participate in campus tours, meet members of the administration, faculty and staff and organize the Class of 1986.

Workshop topics will include discussion on campus and community resources, career decisions, study skills, money management, "how to make your room like a home," time management, library usage and adjusting to college life.

Activities will be devoted to dances, mixers, outdoor movies, picnics and an "Almost Anything Goes" competition.

A student life committee received 80 applications for the "Wrangler" positions.

"They will serve as information persons for the freshman to identify with," said Pearce.

Black, whose Wheeler address is Route 1, will serve as an assistant director for his residence hall for the 1982-83 academic year.

A meeting was held Thursday, June 24, in Shamrock for the purpose of discussing the construction of Sweetwater Creek Dam. The meeting was conducted by Seibert Worley, mayor of the City of Shamrock.

Fred Parkey with Red River Authority presented cost figures and sought a decision by the group on whether or not to continue. The group expressed a desire to continue the project and ask additional information.

Wheeler County Commissioners, Wheeler and Shamrock Mayors and council members from Shamrock and Wheeler were present at the meeting. The luncheon meeting was held at the Maverick Restaurant at Shamrock.

At a meeting on May 3, Fred Parkey was requested to check into the possibility of creating a water district for Wheeler County and building the dam with Wheeler County money, which would give the people of the county full control of the distribution of the water. Mr. Parkey presented figures at

the meeting Thursday, showing the project could be financed by a county water district. He recommended including Hemphill County in the project to lower the overall cost of the project.

The project will cost \$21,500,000 for the providing of water for Wheeler and Shamrock. This price includes the cost of the dam and reservoir, treatment plant and

transmission line. The dam and reservoir will cost \$16,300,000. The treatment will as \$3,000,000 to the overall cost and transmission lines to Wheeler and Shamrock will cost 12,200,000.

The figures showing the cost of the project if Hemphill County were included were not available at this meeting, but will be presented at a later date. The additional cost

would be the transmission lines; this would mean the cost of the dam and treatment plant would remain the same and shared by the two counties.

Additional figures will be compiled and a question and answer meeting for the general public will be called. At this time with access to the actual tax appraisal figures it will be possible to show individuals their actual cost.

HUGE GAS WELL BLOWOUT IS NOW IN PRODUCTION

The following article was taken from the June 24, 1982 edition of "The Shamrock Texan."

The largest gas well in Texas is a blowout, but it is producing. That's according to a report released by the Apache Company, the well's operators.

Key number 1, located 2 miles southeast of Allison, blew out in October of 1981, and has since been controlled to the point of producing 17 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Several months ago, Apache installed 11 Christmas trees in an effort to control the seemingly uncontrollable flow of

gas. With installation of a series of mechanical scrubbers and compressors, have converted the gas into usable quality product that can be transported via pipeline without damaging the pipeline itself.

The company, however, indicates that there is no telling how long the well can continue producing at its current level.

The well was completed in mid-1981 from the Upper Morrow formation below 16,000 feet with a flow rate of twenty four and half million cubic feet per day. Flow tubing pressure was set at more than 8,000 pounds per square inch.

Apache says that since the blowout occurred, there has been no explosions, accidental fires or serious injuries.

The most stringent safety precautions have been taken.

Apache's Chairman of the Board, Raymond Plank, said that this was the first ever blowout for his firm in the over 25 years they have been in business.

The company said that the Texas Railroad Commission is allowing operators to produce wells in the Key Upper Morrow field at a high rate of deliverability until Key Number 1 can be brought under control.

Wheeler Boys At Workshop

Two members of the Wheeler High School chapter of Future Farmers of America were among the 82 FFA boys, and one FFA girl, who successfully completed a course in farm electrification at a Southwestern Public Service-sponsored workshop in Amarillo.

Robert Meadows and Joel Dodd attended the three-day workshop, the 20th sponsored by SPS.

This was the SPS-FFA workshop ever in which a girl was a student. She was Kathy Karber, a Booker, Texas, high school senior.

The students learned how to wire buildings, how to build and use electric controls, or how to build electric motors. They also were taught how electricity is made, and first aid and safety tips.

Five students were selected by the workshop faculty as winners of trips to the National FFA convention in Kansas City, Mo., in November. SPS will pay the students' expenses. The top students were Max Hector of Frenship High School, Dennis Stuart of Mobeetie High School, Kelly Kunka of Follett High School, David Abell of Ralls High School, and Kynan Sturgess of Dumas High School.

Berl Springer, Chairman of the SPS Board of Directors and Chief Executive Officer of the Company, presented awards Wednesday to the five trip winners and to the other students who successfully completed the workshop.

The students from 42 Texas communities, from Guthrie, Okla., and Clovis, Roswell, and Tucumcari, N.M. Workshop administrators were assisted by three students: FFA Area One president Tom McDonald of Texline, and Area One vice presidents Bret Whitten of Bovina and Patrick Railsback of Idalou.

Five vocational teachers paid by SPS taught the three courses. They were assisted by 21 adult FFA advisors and by SPS personnel.

The 'Farm Wiring' course emphasized safe and efficient wiring of two-and three-way switches, proper wire splicing, and how to make a meter loop. The skills can be used in homes, barns, sheds, or other

IT COSTS LESS TO LIVE IN TEXAS -- STILL

It still costs less to live in Texas than in other states, according to the newest family budget figures (from last fall) released this April by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

Intermediate Level of Living
To maintain an "intermediate" level of living, the average U.S. family had to spend \$25,407 per year based on last fall's figures.

But Dallas families could buy that same level of living for \$22,678 while Houston families paid \$23,601.

These budget figures are what it would cost an urban family of four (a 38-year-old husband employed full-time, a non-employed wife, a boy of 13, and a girl of 8) to buy a certain marketbasket of specific goods and services for a whole year at Fall, 1981, prices.

Dallas and Houston are the only two areas in Texas for which specific data are collected.

Texas costs are less at both the lower and higher levels of living, too.

Lower Budget Levels
At the lower budget level, Dallas families would have to spend \$14,392, and Houston families \$14,810, while U.S. families spend \$15,323.

Upper Budget Levels
At the upper end of the economic scale, it would take U.S. families \$38,060 to buy the same goods and services that cost \$33,769 in Dallas and \$34,728 in Houston.

Why Cheaper in Texas?
Why is it cheaper in Texas? A major reason is the absence of a state income tax.

Other Family Styles
But what if you are not part of a four-member urban family? BLS makes other estimates, too. For example, it would cost a single person under the age of 35 in Dallas \$7,937 to maintain an intermediate level of living. In Houston, the cost would be \$8,260.

A one-parent family with two children would need \$8,203 for the lower level of living in Dallas and \$8,442 in Houston.

These figures don't tell us how Texans really spend their money, but they do tell us what a standard marketbasket of goods and services (from food and housing to toothpaste and taxes) costs in various regions of the United States and in Texas.

Figures such as these give consumers a way to compare budget costs across the United States.

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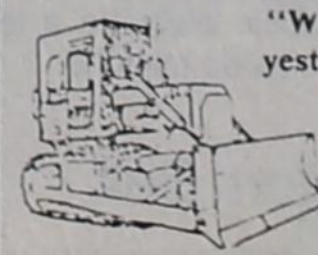
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Jack Morgan Is Instructor

Jack Morgan, Briscoe vocational agriculture teacher, was one of the advisor-instructors this week (June 14, 15, 16) at a Southwestern Public Service-sponsored Future Farmers of America electric workshop in Amarillo.

Eighty-two FFA boys and one FFA girl studied farm electrification at the Monday-through-Wed. workshop. It was the 20th sponsored by SPS, and the first ever in which a girl was a student. She was Kathy Karber, a Booker, Texas, high school senior.

The students learned how to wire buildings, how to build and use electric controls, or how to build electric motors. They also were taught how electricity is made, and first aid and safety tips.

Five students were selected by the workshop faculty as winners of trips to the National FFA convention in Kansas City, Mo., in November. SPS will pay the students' expenses. The top students were Mac Hector of Frenship High School, Dennis Stuart of Mobeetie High School, Kelly Kunka of Follet High School, David Abell of Ralls High School, and Kynan Sturgess of Dumas High School.

Berl Springer, Chairman of the SPS Board of Directors and Chief Executive Officer of the Company, presented awards Wednesday to the five trip winners and to the other students who successfully completed the workshop.

The students came from 42 Texas communities, from Guthrie, Okla., and Clovis, Roswell, and Tucumcari, N.M. Workshop administrators were assisted by three students: FFA Area One president Tom McDonald of Toline, and Area One vice presidents Brét Whitten of Bovina and Patrick Railsback of Idalou.

Five vocational teachers paid by SPS taught the three courses. They were assisted by 21 adult FFA advisors and by SPS personnel.
