DENNIS STUART WINS TRIP TO CONVENTION

Dennis Stuart, 16, of Mobeetie High School Chapter of the Future Farmers of America Wednesday won one of five Southwestern Public Service-sponsored trips to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, in November.

Dennis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin E. Stuart of Mobeetie.

He was a top student in the 'Electric Controls' course at a three-day farm electrification workshop sponsored by SPS in Amarillo. Eighty-two FFA boys-- and one FFA girl--attended.

The workshop faculty chose the five trip winners. Others were Max Hector, 16, of Frenship High School; Kelly Kunka, 15, of Follett High School; David Abell, 17, of Ralls High School; and Kynan Sturgess, 15, of Dumas High School.

The workshop was the 20th sponsored by SPS. It was the first ever in which a girl was a student. She was Kathy Karber, a Booker, Texas, high school senior.

The students learned how to wire buildings, build and use electric controls, of how to build electric motors. They also were taught how electricity is made, and first aid and safety tips.

Berl Springer, Chairman of the SPS Board of Directors and Chief Executive Officer of the Company, presented awards Wednesday to the five trip winners and to the other students who successfully completed the workshop.

The students came from 42 Texas communities, from Guthrie, Okla., and Clovis, Roswell, and Tucuman, N.M. Workshop administrators assisted by three students: FFA Area One president Tom McDonald of Texline, and Area One vice presidents Bret Whitten of Bovina and Patrick Railsback of Idalou.

Five vocational teachers paid by SPS taught the three courses. They were assisted by 21 adult FFA advisors and by SPS personnel.

The 'Farm Wiring' course emphasized safe and efficient wiring of two-and three-way switches, proper wire splicing, and how to make a meter loop. The skills can be used in homes, barns, sheds, or other places electricity is needed.

Students in the 'Electric Controls' course learned how to tie in three-and four-way switches, how to set up photoelectric cells for automatic lighting, and how to set up two- and three- pole relays.

The 'Farm Motors' course taught students how to operate, repair and build small electric motors.

Tuesday afternoon the students toured SPS'S Harrington Station, a giant coal-fired power plant at Amarillo which has a generating capacity of 1,122,000 kilowatts.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than 1 million in a 45,000-square-mile area of the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

WHEAT LOANS

Farmers who have signed up to participate in the acreage Reduction Program are eligible for loans. Wheat regular loan is \$3.54 per Bu. Reserve loan is \$3.99 per Bu. with protein premiums added and minus grading factor. Reserve is for 3 years and loan may not be redeemed until the market price averages \$4.65 per Bu. Storage payment of 26.5 per Bu. a year will be paid. Producer must have a signed receipt from the elevator on storage then we will reimburse you. Interest will be changed for only one year on the loan and this will be due when the loan is repaid.

We are asking that each producer at the elevator put the farm number on the ledger sheets and other producers names. This will help us disburse the loans.

For farm stored loans we will need to measure the bins before we can make a loan. A fee of \$10.00 per bin plus \$4.00 a bin after one will be charged the producer. Please do not put wheat from 2 different farms together without having each measured first. Please allow a few days on these loans.

Interest rate for loans disbursed in June is 13.625. Interest rates will be adjusted Jan. 1, 1983.

Come by the office and visit us on this if you have any questions.

We are offering measuring service for spring seeded crops. If you are wanting to be sure of the certified acres we will guarantee them to be correct. A charge of \$9.00 per farm plus \$3.00 per plot after one. Don't guess at your acres as 5% tolerance is very small. Final certification of spring seeded crops and Conservation Use Acres is August 1, 1982.

ALL FARMS. A full certification of each farm is needed so that your bases for coming years can be made and protected.

CITY ADOPTS NEW POLICY ON COLLECTION OF PAST DUE BILLS

A tougher stand on delinquent water bills will be taken by the City of Wheeler. On the fifteenth of the month, water meters will be

turned off at the residence or business whose bill has not been paid. The cost for having the service restored

will be \$25. The policy was voted into effect Monday evening by the Wheeler City council.

It has been the policy of the city employees to notify the customer of their intention to turn the water off; this gave the customer the opportunity to pay the bill without the charge for returning the service. The employee will now be given the list of past due bills on the fifteenth of the month and service will be discontinued without further notice.

Service will be returned when the bill plus the \$25 connection fee has been paid.

Water customers receive their bills on the first of the month. The cards state the policy of the Water Department. The card reads, "If this bill is not paid by the 10th, a penalty of \$1.00 will be added. If not paid by the 15th, we reserve the right to discontinue service and a

fee of \$25.00 will be charged to return service." The action has been taken because the list of those individuals and businesses who are chronically late with their payment averages in the neighborhood of 50 each month. This results in extra work and additional time on city employees.

Prior to the meeting Monday, June 21, the water customers were given until the 20th and the connecting fee was \$5. The "soft approach" seemed to have less and less affect as the list grew longer each month, so the policy was adopted.

To those individuals who intend to use the excuse, "we don't get paid until the fifteenth", it would be advisable to "pigeon hole" the money when you get paid the first. You will be inconvenienced by finding you have no water and it will cost you an extra \$25 if the bill is not paid by the fifteenth.

CITY METER DEPOSITS ARE INCREASED TO \$100

The deposit for new water meters in the City of Wheeler has been increased to \$100. The increase is necessary to lessen the loss of money by the Water Department when water customers move without paying their bill.

Water meters are read each month between the 15th and 20th. At the time the bills are mailed, the customer has an additional bill for the last 10 to 15 days since the meter was read. If the customer leaves on the fourteenth of the month without paying their bill,

the city loses the two months of water used by the customer; in most cases this will be close to the \$100 which will now be required as a deposit.

It is realized this will work a hardship on some people, but a continued loss of money on the part of the city works a hardship on everyone.

The deposit of \$50 which had been required for the past year, is no longer sufficient. The decision was made at the regular meeting of the city council Monday, June 27.

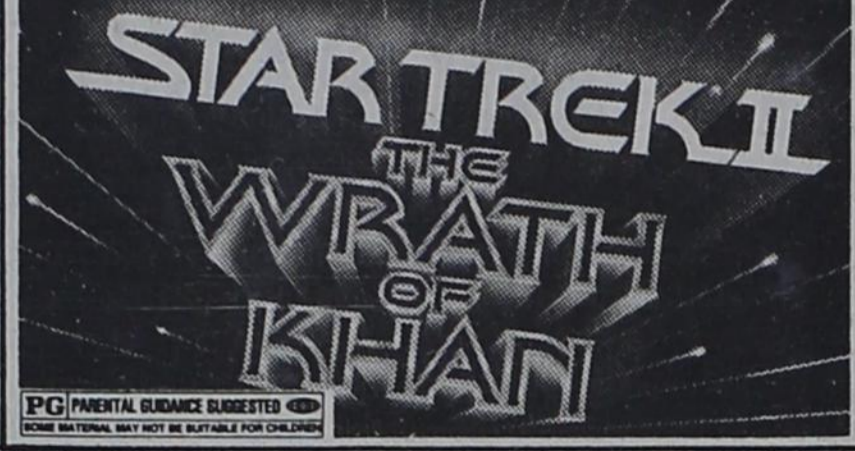

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective July 27, 1982, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 13.4 percent increase in the company's intrastate revenues.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

Notice to El Paso Area Customers

Effective January 1, 1982, Southwestern Bell adopted the Mountain States tariffs in effect for El Paso County. Southwestern Bell proposes to merge the separate El Paso tariffs with its tariffs applicable to the rest of Texas. The resulting new rate schedule is on file with the PUC and the El Paso area municipalities served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection at our El Paso business office.

Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

The filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for interexchange private line and foreign exchange (FX) service. Changes in such rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies because such companies provide interexchange private line and foreign exchange service in accordance with rates specified in Southwestern Bell's tariffs. While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in long distance rates, any change in those rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies.

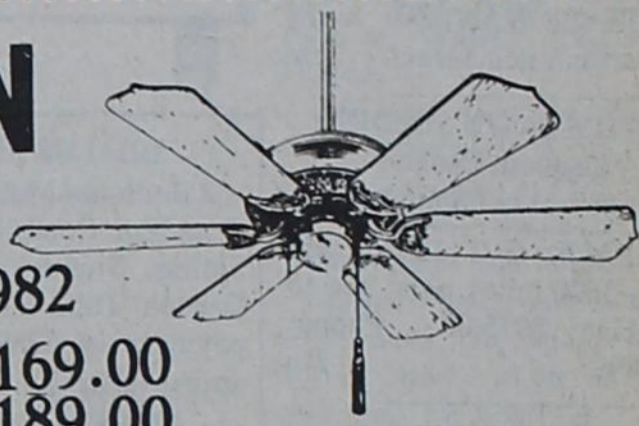

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

CANNING TIPS OFFERED
With gardens flourishing, many consumers are attempting food preservation at home to save on food cost. While home canning may look simple every detail requires careful attention.

If you do choose to can some vegetables, the Food Quality and safety committee of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System, offers these important points:

-Before starting, contact your local county Extension office for the latest information.

-Use only high quality produce for best results.

-Be sure to have the pressure gauge on your pressure canner checked. Your local county Extension office usually has the equipment to provide this service.

Also check gaskets and seals on your pressure canner.

-Follow directions to every detail; do not use your own times or pressures.

-All low-acid foods such as green beans, corn and potatoes must be processed in a pressure canner. Water bath methods are not adequate for proper preservation of low acid foods, firm, fresh tomatoes which are not overripe may be processed in a water bath.

-Use only approved canning techniques; processing in a microwave oven or conventional oven is not an approved method.

-Use only standard canning jars with lids and rings; old mayonnaise or peanut butter jars are not designed for home canning.

-Do not re-use lids.

-Do not use jars that are chipped or cracked.

-Be sure tops of jars are wiped clean before sealing.

-Avoid sudden pressure drops; wait until the pressure gauge is at zero before opening the lid.

-Be sure to check all lids for a depression which indicates a good seal; products in jars without a good seal may be eaten immediately but should not be stored for later use.

Pressure cookers can be brought to the County Extension office (2nd floor of courthouse) for testing free of charge. Please bring the entire cooker and allow one-half day for testing.

Metal in Microwaves

There's something new in microwave ovens today: a bit of metal here and there. And it MIGHT be OK -- if you STRICTLY follow all manufacturer's directions and understand them.

Some microwave cookware now has metal or metallic coating, and there are a growing number of frozen-food items packed in metal dishes. Also, makers of aluminum foil say to use it in your

microwave oven. Manufacturers of the different ovens provide specific instruction for using metal, as

do the makers of microwave accessories and aluminum foil. Utensils containing metal elements IF DESIGNED FOR MICROWAVES should pose no threat to the microwave oven, utensils themselves or food. Their form or shape allows them to direct the microwaves in an energy-efficient manner.

Don't Operate Without Food
Something old in microwaves still holds: do not operate a microwave without food.

A microwave oven's walls are made of metal and that metal reflects the microwave energy. So, to prevent damage, there MUST be some sort of FOOD 'load' in the oven to absorb the energy.

Operating the oven empty -- or with a metal container and NO FOOD -- can cause great damage: fusion of the materials inside the oven and, in some cases, damage to the magnetron tube. If a metal container is put in the microwave oven alone -- without food -- it acts as a 'second wall' inside the microwave oven, rather than an object to absorb the microwaves.

Keep Metal Away From Walls
One reason it's so important to follow directions STRICTLY is 'arcing.' This can happen if a metal utensil touches the microwave oven wall. It may cause an unsightly defect to the oven rather than actual damage to the oven.

To prevent metal from touching oven walls or door, place any utensil made from or including metal IN THE CENTER of the oven.

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Summer Travel Not Fading

Among out-of-state auto visitors who came to Texas during 1981, Dallas, San Antonio and Houston proved to be the state's most popular destinations according to a profile of auto travelers released today by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"That may be no surprise," said Tom H. Taylor, director of the department's Travel and Information Division, "because those cities are always among the top visitor destinations in Texas. But where last year's highway travelers came from was a bit of a surprise.

"While it's logical that neighboring Oklahoma was our number-one supplier of auto visitors," said Taylor, "our figures show that distant California and Illinois were right behind.

"We thought cross-country auto travel might have faded after the shocks of oil embargoes and dollar-a-gallon gasoline," Taylor explained. "But at least for 1981, the long-distance drivers were back on the highways."

Auto visitors from other states who spent less than 30 days in Texas drove an average of 1,046 miles; those who stayed in the state longer than 30 days drove 2,624 miles. Those short-term visitors stayed an average of 6.92 days; long-term visitors stayed 84.51 days in Texas.

The variation between the long- and short-term visitors was as wide in average expenditures as in the length of stay.

Short-term expenditure per person per day was \$26.67; long-termers spent \$11.96 per person per day.

Data for the report are from survey cards distributed at the Department's 12 tourist bureaus that served more than two and-a-half million travelers last year.

To give a clearer picture of the visitor to Texas, the profile also gives data on the accommodations used, the size of the group, purpose of the trip, visitor age groups, income, and how they spent their travel dollars. Although no totals are given in the report, the percentage figures provide a representative profile of the state's highway visitors.

"The more we know about our visitors," Taylor said, "the better job those who serve tourists can do."
