Motorcycle Accident Fatal For Jackie Lee Melburn

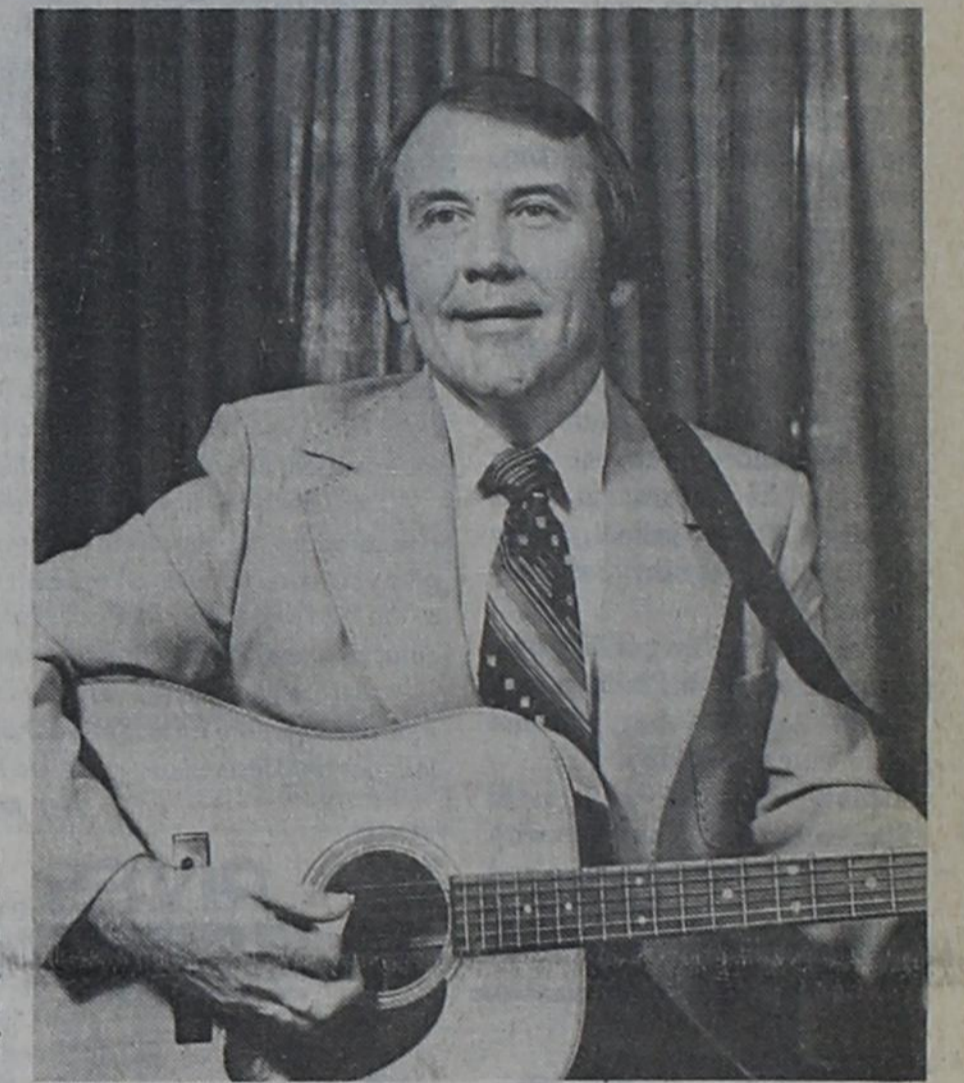
Jackie Lee Milburn, 28, of 716 E. Brunow in Pampa, died at 7 P.M. Sunday, June 6 in a motorcycle crash 20 miles southeast of Perryton. The Ochiltree County Sheriff's Department said Milburn was eastbound on Lake Fryer County Road when he went off a curve in the road. The motorcycle traveled 272 feet off the road and struck a barbed wire fence. Milburn was killed instantly. Services for Milburn were at 10 a.m. Wednesday in First Baptist Church of Canadian. Rev. Ralph Chapman officiated. Burial was in the Canadian Cemetery under the direction

of Stickley-Hill Funeral Directors. Milburn was a drilling foreman for Diamond Shamrock Corporation. TABS RESULTS RERPORTED TO WHEELER BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Results of the third Texas Assessment of Basic Skills tests taken by Wheeler third, fifth, ninth, and tenth grade students last February will be presented at the June 10 meeting of the Wheeler Independent School District board of trustees.

The 7 p.m. session will be held at the Wheeler Board Room. Bynum Smith, district superintendent, will present the results and a detailed analysis of what they may mean for future planning and programs.

"While district and campus aggregate scores will be reported to the public, individual results will be released only to the students, parents or guardian, and school personnel directly involved," Smith points out.

Over 700,000 third, fifth, ninth, and tenth grade students participated in this third statewide assessment required under Senate Bill 350 passed by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 session.

Detailed analysis of the test results will include scores compiled according to ethnic background, sex, and whether or not the student is enrolled in migrant or other programs for the disadvantaged.

"Our purpose is to develop more effective ways of teaching children," Smith says. "We believe the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills results will give us the specific data we need to better meet student needs."

Materials to be presented at the Wheeler School Board

meeting will include a written report of the test findings, summary reports, and other information designed to better inform school patrons concerning the district's needs for improvement. The data was collected by Dewey Shepard, counselor. Shepard was not available for the board meeting due to prior business.

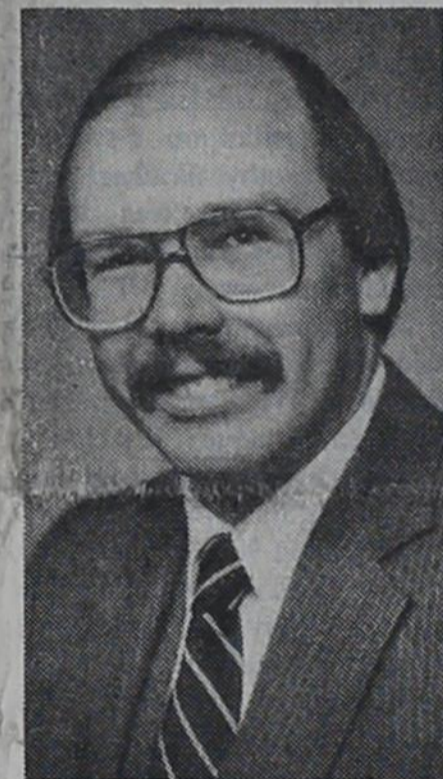

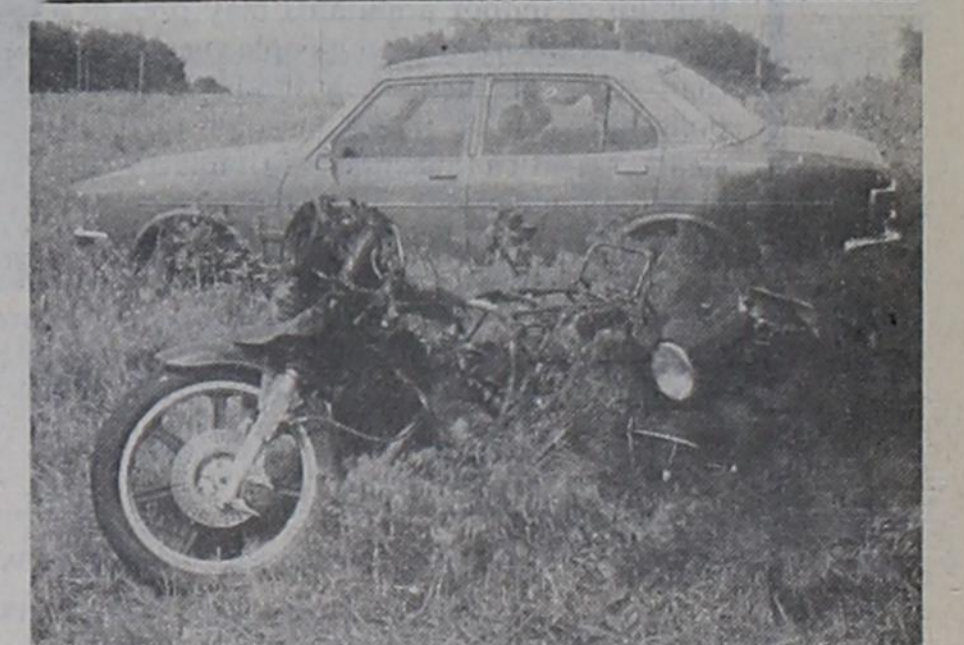
no hitch when time came to leave. Wasn't that a thoughtful idea?

There have been cattle deaths due to blackleg (Clostridium chauvoei) reported in Wheeler County recently. The Clostridium chauvoei organism can exist in the soil for up to 15 years or more before it is picked up by the animal. The spores usually enter the animal through the digestive tract and are spread throughout the body by the blood stream. It is usually cattle 6 to 18 months of age that are affected. Younger animals are rela-

tively immune and cattle over 3 years of age are not usually affected. However, one of the animals that died in Wheeler County was a mature cow. Symptoms of blackleg are acute lameness accompanied by fever and depression. Swelling develops in the muscles of the hip, shoulder, chest, back, neck, tongue and pharynx. The disease is usually fatal in 12 to 48 hours. Cattle that develop an unexplained weakness could be in the early stages of a blackleg infection. Penicillin is usually effective at this stage. All calves should be vaccinated at 4 months of age and then revaccinated at weaning. It may also be advisable to vaccinate adult animals that were not vaccinated as calves. Consult your veterinarian for vaccination recommendations or for treatment if you suspect a blackleg infection. Since animals that have died of blackleg are the primary source of soil contamination, dead animals should be promptly burned or buried.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO ISRAEL?

Russia and the others will all be involved. And what will happen? Will Israel finally be destroyed? After all, the odds against her are overwhelmingly great. Ezekiel 38:18 (and following) say that at that time when they come that God will be

God will send an overflowing rain, and great hailstones, fire, and brimstone. Ezekiel 39:9 says that Israel will use the weapons and stuff they capture for fuel the next seven years. In verse 10 it says Israel will spoil those that spoiled them and rob those that robbed them. It also says in this passage (Ezekiel 39:12) that it will take Israel seven months to get all the dead bodies buried even though they hire people in continual employment (Ezekiel 39:14). It is easy to see that these things are upon us. God's Word is true. The seven year period following (during which time Israel will be using the spoil they captured for fuel) will be the Tribulation period. 

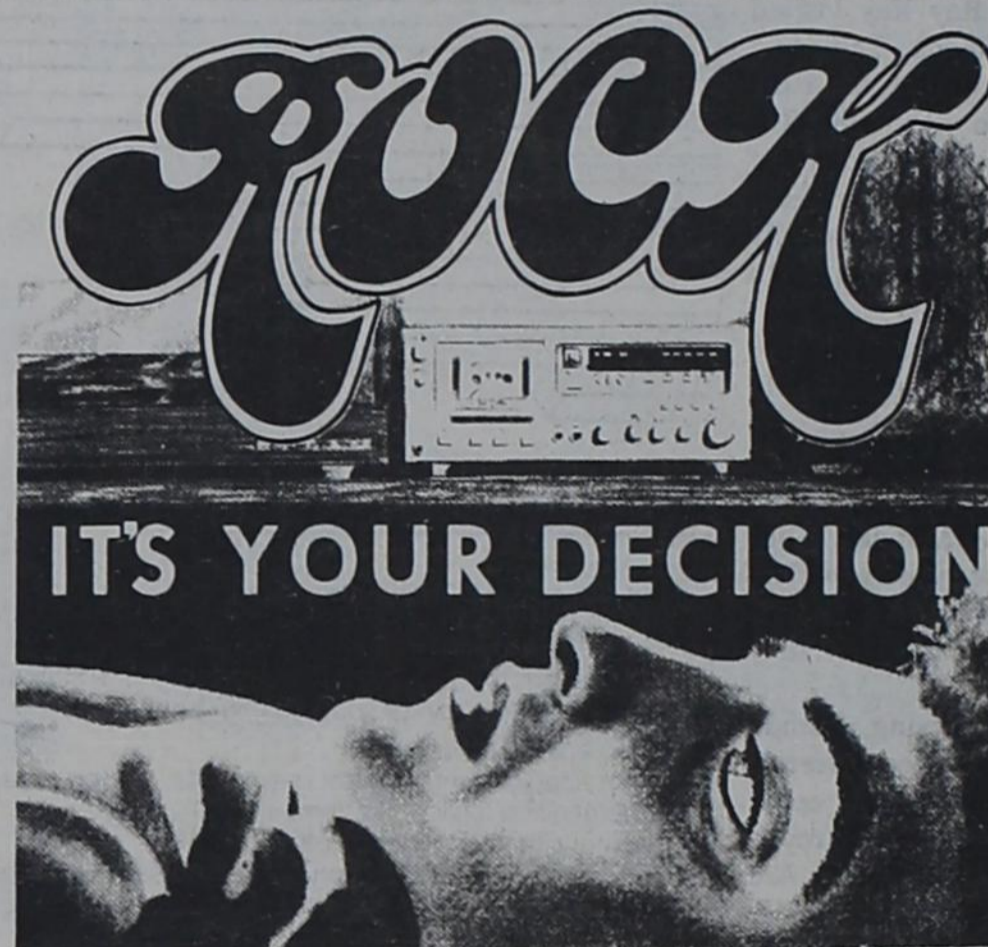

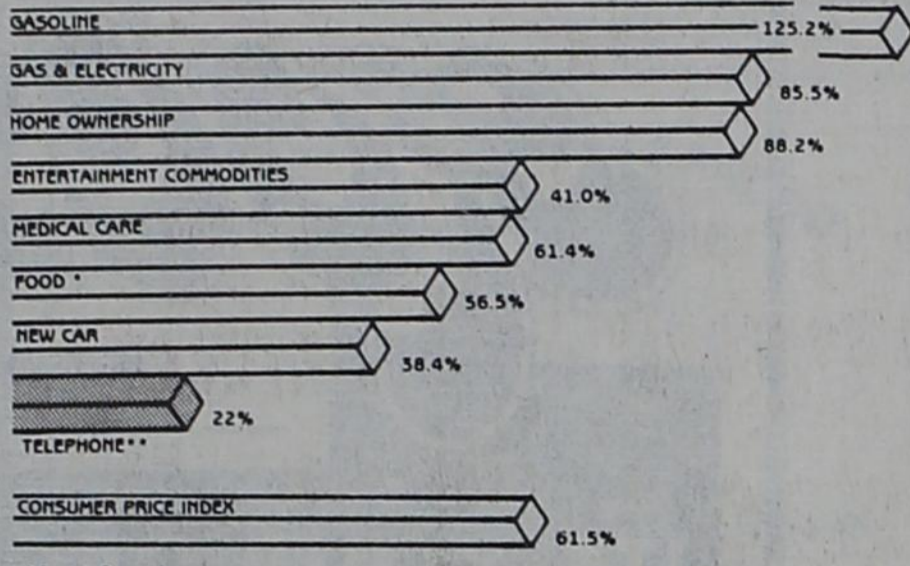
