

Cattle that develop an unexplained weakness could be in the early stages of a blackleg infection. Penicillin is usually effective at this stage.

All calves should be vaccinated at 4 months of age and then revaccinated at weaning. It may also be advisable to vaccinate adult animals that were not vaccinated as calves.

Consult your veterinarian for vaccination recommendations or for treatment if you suspect a blackleg infection.

Since animals that have died of blackleg are the primary source of soil contamination, dead animals should be promptly burned or buried.

the days of yore is welcome to come. There is a small charge at the door. Graduates of 1932 will be honored.


