Nineteen Calls Are Answered

The Wheeler Ambulance Service answered a total of nineteen calls for the month of May.

The nature of these calls were: one rig accident, five auto accidents, one motorcycle, one infant, two DOS calls, two cancer patients, one respiratory, three cardiac patients, one mental patient, one dislocated hip, one neck injury. Other problems were, fractures of a foot, internal and abdominal injuries, two head injuries and two severe wounds. We also had two who called for an ambulance and then refused to be transported.

Of these calls, five were code 3 emergencies. Eight transfers were made. All eight transfers went to Amarillo hospitals.

The individual number of calls and hours given in patient care were: Louis Stas 7 calls, 16 hours, M.K. Christner 8 calls 27 hours, David Cross 5 calls, 11 hours, Lee Hibler 8 calls, 20 hours, Frankie Jackson 1 call, 3 hours, Lyndon Loyd 2 calls, 4 hours, Dwight Tipps 5 calls, 13 hours, Tommie Puryear 1 call, 4 hours, Frank Coate 1 call, 1 hour, Pam Hibler 2 calls, 5 hours





giving the customer too much of the product as were giving too little. Because of frequent checks, scales are not out of calibration very long," Brown

"Business owners are glad to see us come in because as often as not, they have been losing money if their scales were not accurate," Brown said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has inspectors assigned to every county. They are trained to check all different types of scales-from those for medicines in a pharmacy to those for livestock and grain.

The inspectors also spot check packaged goods, such as cereals and crackers, to make certain that the weight stated on the label is accurate. If on the average the weights of the packages are below the amount stated on the label, the shipment is put on a Stop-Sale order. The store owner then either returns the items to the processor or as is the case very often, gives them to charitable organizations. Meat packaged in the supermarket as well as processor packs are also checked by Department inspectors.



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
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General Telephone BVT Center

When it comes to paying bills with their hard-earned money, customers want their

billing questions answered accurately - and fast.

General Telephone has a center that not only answers questions and adjusts phone bills for residential customers, but also serves as a collection office for both residential and business customers who don't pay their bills.

Each month more than 24,400 calls are made to the firm's BVT Center in San Angelo, Texas. The BVT Center -- which stands for "Billing, Voucher and Treatment" -- serves about 218,000 General Telephone customers in West Texas and Mexico.

"We answer all types of residential billing questions, but the kind that our customers ask most often regard long-distance charges and whether we have received their payments," David Perez, the center's manager, said.

A lot of times, customers honestly don't remember placing long-distance calls, he said. In many cases the center can provide the names of the parties they called to refresh their memory.

wait, so 97 percent of the calls made to our center are answered within 20 seconds or less," Perez said. "If cuswill normally be on Mondays when the volume of calls is the heaviest at the center."

When residential customers think they have been charged for long-distance calls they did not place, they should call the center for a billing adjustment. If calling is not convenient, the charge and the appropriate tax can be deducted from the billing statement, which then should be mailed with the payment.

If customers don't pay their monthly phone bills on time, the center begins collection procedures -- which may lead to the temporary denial of telephone service.

"The only reason telephone service is temporarily denied to a customer is to protect company revenues," Perez "We know no one likes to emphasized. "We must protect those revenues because ultimately any dollars not collected are paid through higher rates by all other customers. tomers experience any delay it And that is who we are really protecting -- our other customers who pay their bills."

Perez pointed out that the center's collection section handles both residential and business accounts, while the center's billing section serves residential customers only.

The center is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Its phone number can be found at the top of each Gen. Tel. residential phone bill.


