Library Offers Books-By-Mail

Catalogs for a tax-supported books-by-mail service are available at the Wheeler Public Library.

Books by mail service is again being offered to all twenty-five counties of the Texas Panhandle. The popular service was discontinued two years ago due to decreasing federal funding; it is being made possible at this time because of an increase in state funding for libraries appropriated last year.

The program is provided by the Texas Panhandle Library System and is intended as a supplement to regular library service for people unable to use a library on a regular basis, due to illness, lack of transportation, or distance to the library. People who are geographically isolated, home bound, or otherwise unable to visit their libraries regularly will be served by mail during the next year.

The service is provided without charge to the user. Books are sent to individuals from the Texas Panhandle Library System office in Amarillo and return postage for the books is included.

Five hundred paperback book titles are listed in the Mail-a-Book catalog. The choice of books include mysteries, romances, adventure stories, westerns, how-to books, and recent best sellers, as well as a variety of books for children and youth.

The catalogs are available now at the Wheeler Public Library. Persons interested in receiving books-by-mail service need to contact the library and ask the librarian if they are eligible to receive a catalog.

A Donor may give either for: An Established Donor Club: Which is used to help pay for blood charges incurred by any member of that church, com-

munity, school, hospital, or business club.

Family Blood Insurance: Which insures the donor and his immediate family for 100% of any blood charges that the family might incur for a full year. Only one donation by any family member is required.

Personal Credit: To be used at your discretion during the next 12 months.

Replacement Credit: To receive a \$10.00 credit for each pint of blood donated in the name of another individual to assist him or her in paying for blood charges during hospitalization.

The Wheeler swimming pool will open for the summer season Saturday, May 29. Insect Scouting Workshop Set

COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Wheeler County are receiving a special invitation this year to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The workshop will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, June 1-2, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Don King, County Extension agent, said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension. In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators, and others as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield and hold down production costs, King said.

The June 1 session opens at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. Pat Morrison outlining the scope of the workshop and explaining pest management concepts. Also on the morning program are Dr. Dale Pennington, Extension soil chemist, Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist; Dr. Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist; and Dr. Jim Leser, cotton Extension Entomologist. The afternoon program will include Dr. Kirby W. Huffman, Extension agronomist; Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist; and Allen E. Knutson, Castro County Extension agent-entomology, who will discuss corn and sorghum pests.

The June 2 session, beginning at 9 a.m., will focus on scouting procedures and reports. Instructors will be county Extension agents-entomology Greg Cronholm of Hale County and Allen Knutson.

During the afternoon, participants will receive practical training on insect identification and scouting procedures during a field session. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

WHEELER COUNTY ASCS News

PROTECT CROP ACREAGE BASES
Certification of acres is necessary to assure eligibility of program benefits and to protect 1983 crop bases. Farmers who signed up to participate and non-participants need to report crop acres.

Acres bases for participating crops will not be reduced in 1983 according to Hartman. This means that the 1983 acreage base for program crops will equal the 1982 crop base. The 1983 crops with a zero certification will equal the 1982 crop acreage base.

To protect their 1983 crop bases, it is important for farmers who are not participating in the 1982 Acreage Reduction Program to report their acres stated Albert Hartman, C.E.D.

Final reporting date is August 1, 1982 for all spring-seeded crops (cotton, grain sorghum, corn) and conservation use acres. The acreage report must be accurate. Measuring service is available at a nominal charge to all producers who are unsure of their acreage.

CONSERVATION USE ACRES

Conservation use acres must be cropland that was planted to a small grain or row crop within one of the last two years, or devoted to hay in rotation with small grains or row crops according to Albert Hartman, County Executive Director.

Harvesting of any crop on these acres is prohibited and so is grazing from May 1 thru October 31. The only exception to this rule is that wheat, oats, and barley acres planted before January 29, 1982 may be grazed or harvested for hay or silage but not for grain.

Conservation use acres must be protected from water and wind erosion by either plantof an approved cover or land tillage practices that will control this such as stubble mulching, chiseling, or minimal tillage. Weeds may be controlled by chemicals.

LOANS

Wheat and Barley Reserve V Provisions
1. Wheat and barley are eligible for loan. For 1982 only those who are participating in the Acreage Reduction Program will be eligible for loan benefits.

2. Wheat and barley under regular loan may be converted to Reserve V.

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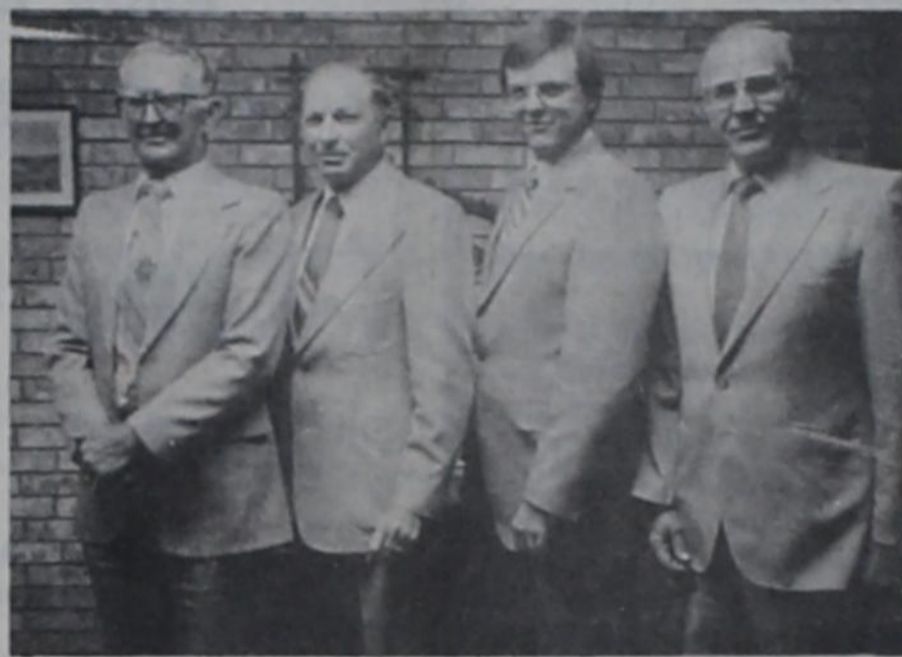
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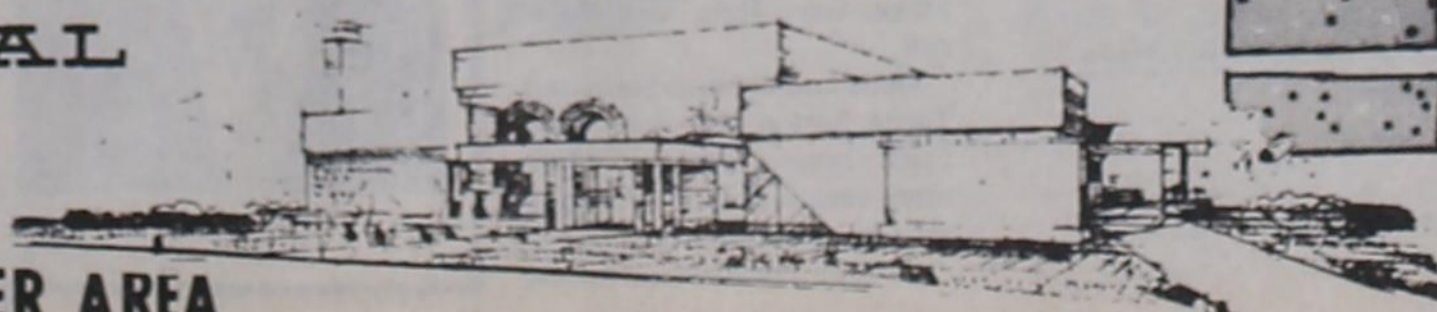


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Briscoe News

HANDLE CREDIT HISTORY 'WITH CARE'

Operating on credit has become a way of life with today's high cost of goods and services and the dangers of carrying large sums of money. So handle your credit history 'with care'—investigate it and keep it up to date.

This is especially important if you're planning to apply for new credit or have been turned down for credit unexpectedly.

Start with local credit-reporting agencies, such as the credit bureau. These agencies keep a record of how consumers use credit or misuse it.

If you've ever used credit, a local or nearby credit bureau probably has a file on you. This file is the major source of your credit history, unless you live in a small town where you've established credibility and intend to apply only for local credit.

Your credit bureau is important because most potential creditors don't send separate inquiries to each creditor—they merely request information from the credit bureau.

You have a right to see your file, or at least a summary of the information in it.

If you have been denied credit within the last 30 days, this service is free. If not, a fee will be charged for the report. Fee amounts vary from bureau to bureau.

Understanding the credit bureau's job is important, too. They are privately owned agencies who do not determine credit worthiness. That is the job of the creditor—only the creditor decides to grant or deny credit.

Credit bureaus simply provide the facts in your file—and they charge the potential creditor for the service.

If you have no credit history, some creditors may interpret the lack of credit history almost as negatively as they would poor credit use. So it's a good idea to establish credit and be sure the record is on file with the bureau.

Once credit history has begun—and you've checked with the credit bureau to make sure, don't ignore it from then on. Keep your record up to date.

This will ensure a satisfactory credit record just when you need it most—and it will prevent your record from doing a 'Disappearing act' in today's complex system of record-keeping.

For example, if you move, your credit history may be on file in your old 'home' town.

If there is no credit bureau locally, your files may be kept by a bureau in the nearest city.

To find out, ask a local loan officer or store manager who they send reports to.

In updating your credit history, it's helpful to understand that creditors whose records are computerized send reports to bureaus about every 30 days. They generally send both 'good' and 'bad' reports. Loan agencies usually report new loans. However, some noncomputerized stores may send only 'bad'-credit information.

If you marry, the bureau may have two files on you—one in your own name and a joint record with your spouse. You and potential creditors receive information from both files in that case.

If you find an error in your file, point out the fallacy to the bureau. They are obligated to investigate the issue in question. If they find the information is not correct, they will send the correction to every creditor who has received information about you in the last six months—if you request them to send it.

If the bureau finds no error, you may place a written record of 'your side of the story' in the file and request that this be added to information sent to creditors who have asked for your credit history within the last six months—and to potential creditors in the future.

If your file is incomplete because some of your creditors have not reported, or if you've moved recently, you may want to update your files, especially if the new information will help you obtain credit.

Again, if you've been denied credit recently, the bureau will update your file without charge if you provide appropriate names, addresses and other necessary information.

Otherwise, most bureaus will charge a fee for each creditor contacted to update the record.

Or you can personally contact your creditors and ask that they send a record of your credit use to the appropriate bureau.

When you move, your records are generally transferred to the bureau servicing your new area. If the transfer is not automatic, the bureau usually will write for your records when it receives an inquiry on you.

Finally, in keeping your credit history updated, remember that information the bureau provides potential creditors can include the following: how much you owe each creditor, the largest amount charged, past-due amounts, how often and for how long accounts are past due and if accounts are paid on time.

Creditors who usually report to bureaus include utility companies, telephone companies, department stores, specialty shops, banks, savings-and-loan associations, finance companies, mail-order stores, gasoline companies and bank-card companies.

For as I passed along, and observed the objects of your worship, I found an altar with this inscription, TO AN UNKNOWN GOD.

Acts 17:23
The apostle, Paul, in the city of Athens, standing before the philosophers in the Areopagus, observed that they were very religious. But he told them that there was indeed a God whom they did not know, for all of their temples and shrines. He is, of course, the Living God, the God of Heaven, the God of the Bible. He is God. (John 17:3) James tells us that if we receive with meekness the implanted word (that is the word of God), it is able to save our souls. (James 1:21) Peter tells us that God has given us all things that pertain to life and godliness through the knowledge of him that called us. (2 Peter 1:3)

The church of Christ is a group of Christians seeking to worship Him according to the knowledge He has given us in his word; nothing more, nothing less.
