They also received a second division in the sight reading competition. Adjudicators for the contest were Jim Duggan of Pampa, Gary Laramore of Canyon and Roger Edwards, who awarded a composite first division to the Wheeler Band. Sam Watson judged sight reading and awarded the Wheeler group a second division.

Several Wheeler Band students participated successfully in the instrumental solo com-

petition. They returned to Wheeler with 15 first division medals, four second division certificates and one first division trophy. Chris Kosterman, director of Wheeler Bands said, "This is a really great way to

end the school year. The junior high band has not been to contest for several years, and quite frankly, I was delighted and a bit surprised at the success they experienced on Saturday." He went on to say, "These seventh graders will be moving up to the high school band next year, and if they continue working and practicing over the summer, they will be a tremendous addition to our half time and contest shows next fall."

The band left Wheeler at 11:00 a.m. Saturday and participated in the solo competition from 1:30 to 3:00 p.m. Concert and sight reading competition began at 5:00 p.m. Following the announcement of ratings, they returned to Wheeler at 7:45 p.m.

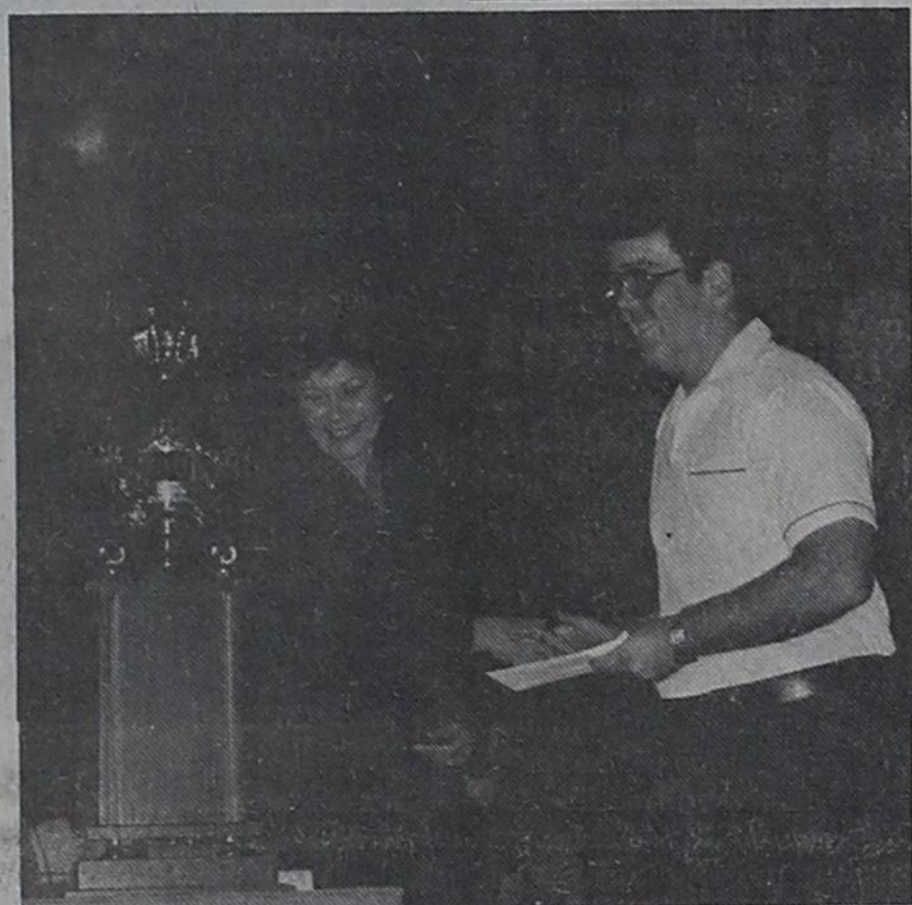
Brotherton Receives Scholarship

JENNINGS WINS THIRD IN STATE GOLF MEET

Mona Jennings placed third in the Class 2A medalist race with a total of 173 at the UIL State Girls Golf Tournament May 6 & 7, at the Lions Municipal Course.

Janet Robbins of Three Rivers fired a 162 to take first place while Margaret Rice of Bullard had a 169 to place second.

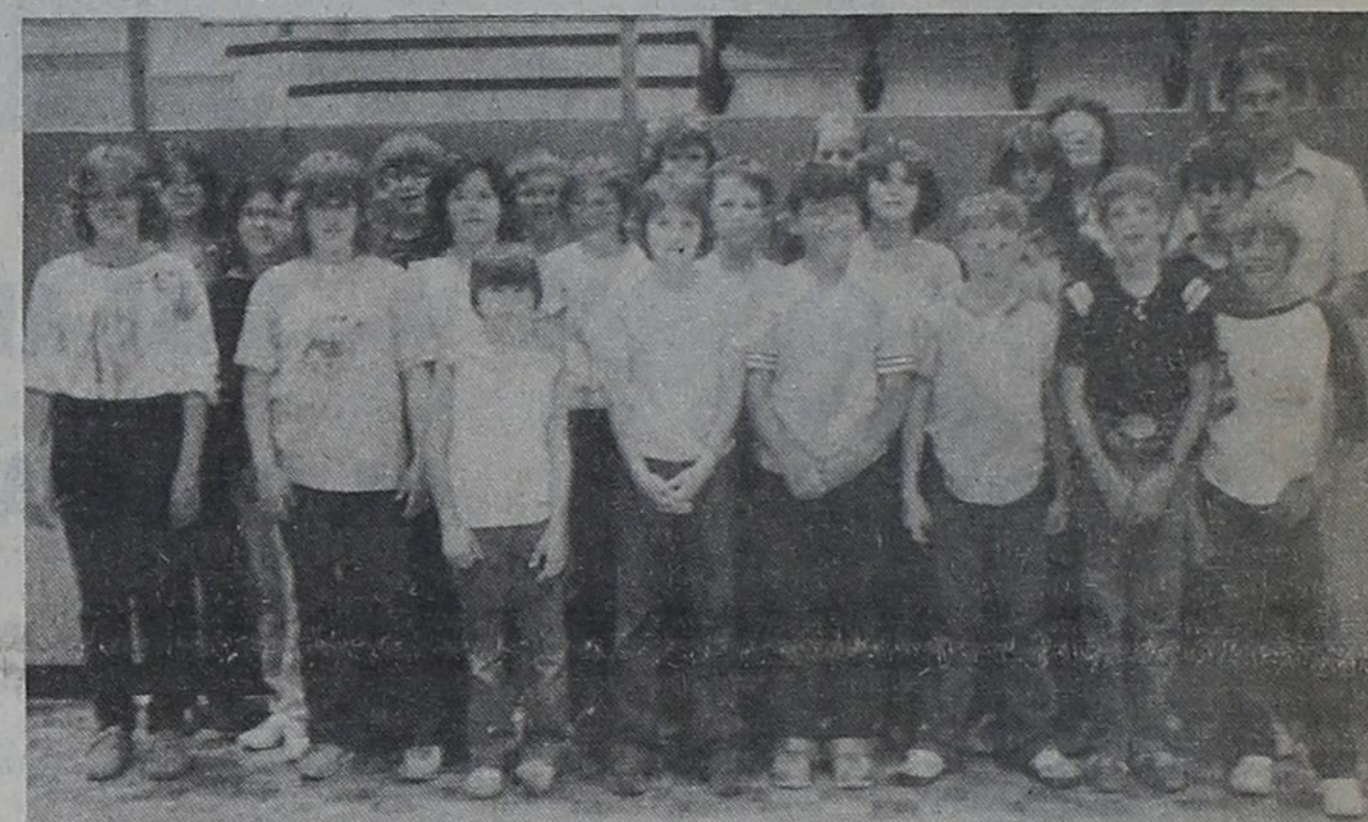
Miss Jennings was deadlocked with Paducah's Paula Weddle for third place going into Friday's final round. This was the first trip to the state tournament for Miss Jennings, who was fourth in the Class 2A regionals as a sophomore and third in the Class B regionals as a freshman.

This year she finished run-

nerup in the regional tournament to qualify for the Austin trip. She gained a measure of revenge in the state tournament against Miss Weddle, who won the regional title. Miss Weddle had a total of 174 to finish one behind Miss Jennings at the state meet.

Ganado shot a 725 to win the Class 2A team championship. Big Lake and Paducah both finished with a total of 789. However, Big Lake won the playoff and Paducah finished in third place.

Other team winners were: Salado, Class 1A; Boling, Class 3A; Jasper, Class 4A; and Round Rock Westwood, Class 5A.

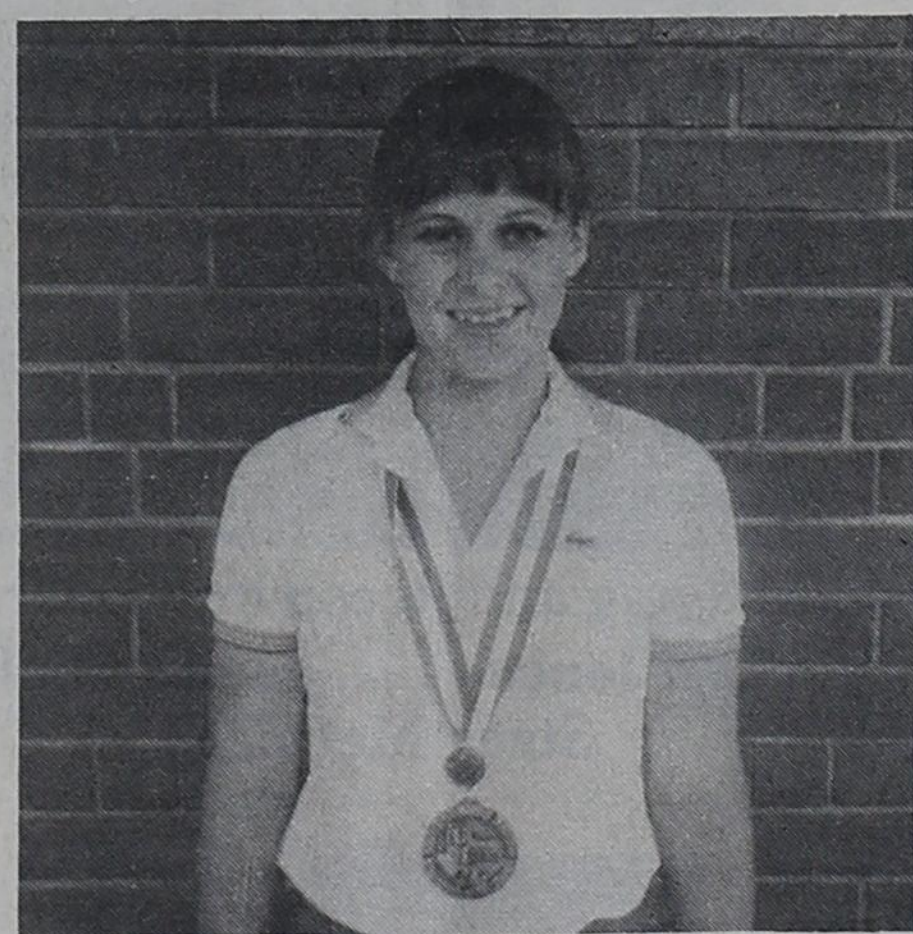

BOND WINS SECOND TO QUALIFY FOR STATE

Ricky Bond tossed the shot 52'2" for second place Friday at the regionals to qualify for the Class 2A boys' UIL state track meet.

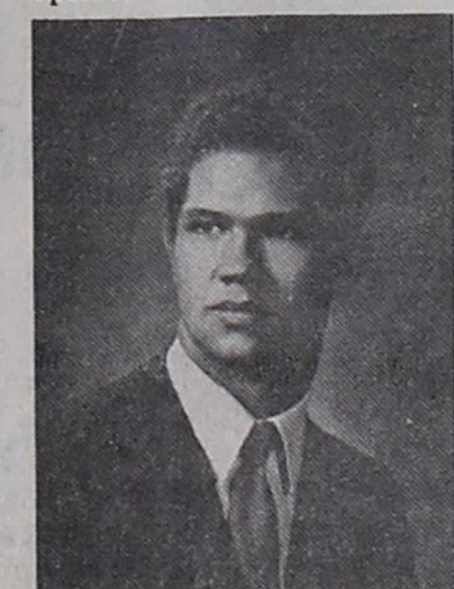
Ricky Defosses of Baird beat Bond out with a 57'11" toss. Tim Grissom placed fifth in the shot with a 46'5" throw.

Panhandle, another Pampa area team, qualified well enough to contend for the team title when action resumed Saturday. The Panthers qualified both relay teams (43.63 and 3:22.17), the latter the fastest of the day, Stacy Rusk in the 200 (22.65), Jody Wood in the intermediate

hurdles (39.21), fastest among qualifiers and quartermiler David Hawley (51.19).

In team standings, Baird grabbed the first-day lead with 20 points, while Jim Ned was second with 14. Panhandle scored eight points on the strength of Wood's second-place finish in the vault.

Wheeler was in a fourth-place tie with Stinnett and Seagraves with 10 points apiece.

STORM ALERT

Do you have your place of safety picked out in case a storm is spotted heading in the direction of Wheeler? If the answer is no, it would be wise to make a plan of action if it becomes necessary to take shelter.

Wheeler has been fortunate so far this year in not having had a cloud which appeared severe enough to sound the alert. Each year the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department divides their men into storm watch crews; these men go on duty each time Wheeler is placed under storm alert. The crews position themselves at different locations around Wheeler and watch the clouds for threatening conditions. Radio contact with the fire station allows the immediate sounding of the siren if they feel it is necessary.

The alarm will be sounded when the men feel the citizens should take shelter. The warning, as it has been for a number of years, will be two 30-second blasts of the fire siren; this is not to be confused with the fire whistle which is a series of 10-second blasts. (Note: in case of fire during severe weather, it is the policy to not sound the fire siren; the firemen are notified of the fire with their individual scanners.) In threatening weather,

Where should you go for shelter? Storm cellars are all over Wheeler; check if the neighbors have a cellar and ask permission to use it in case of a storm. Your second choice would be the basement of the

Clouds Watched Tuesday Evening

Wheeler County Law officers and Volunteer Firemen were kept busy most of the night Tuesday watching the clouds as they formed and passed over the county. Several "tails" were spotted in the area, but none touched down.

The sirens were sounded in Shamrock for residents to take cover. A number of funnels were spotted over and around Shamrock early in the evening, but no damage was reported.

Wheeler businesses closed early Tuesday evening. Hail was reported in Mobeetie around 4:30 and heavy clouds formed in the sky over Wheeler. As darkness approached that of early evening the businessmen and their employees headed home. The cloud apparently traveled to the north of Wheeler, as only a light rain was received from that cloud.

Mobeetie received a reported 2.85" rain with some hail in the first rain Tuesday afternoon.

The Briscoe area gave reports of three and four inches Tuesday afternoon. Wheeler had received 0.68" their total at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday morning. Most of the moisture for Wheeler fell between 6:30 and 7:15 a.m.

If the storm alert sounds during school hours, DO NOT GO TO THE SCHOOL AFTER YOUR CHILD! The school has a plan for the protection of your children and they are safer at the school than in car or on the grounds trying to take shelter elsewhere. The basement of the gym will provide shelter for the entire school—students and faculty.

Again, you are advised to plan now and don't wait until the alarm is sounded to look for shelter; this plan of action may save your life. If the neighbors have a cellar; don't be afraid to ask permission to use it; time spent in the cellar away from TV and phones is a good time to get to know your neighbor.

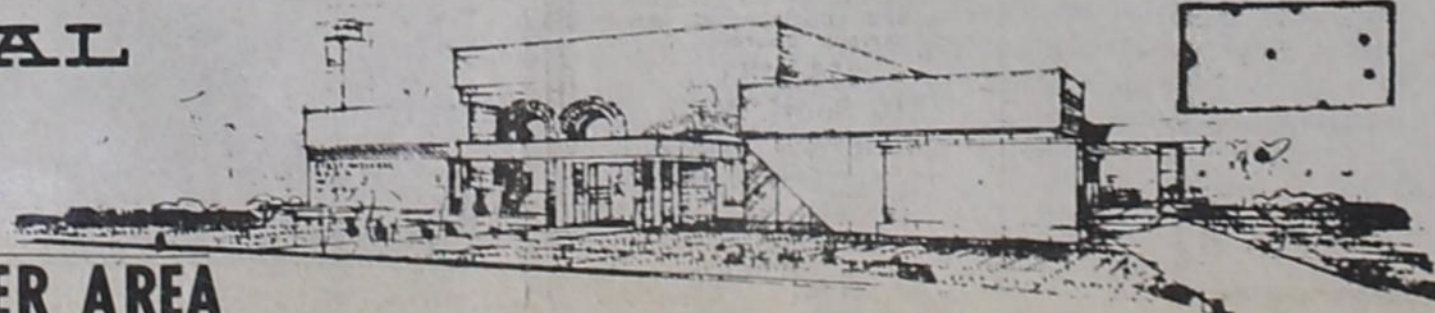

Life without stress—it is possible?

No way. Without stress, life would be drab and unstimulating. Stress itself is not bad.

It's how you respond to it that may create problems or motivate positive action.

Stress is not created by any one event. Your own way of viewing the event, its important in your life or its anticipated outcome can cause stress. This, in turn, can depress behavior or stimulate behavior—depending on you.

Stress is personal. Since you create it, you must find a way to live with it or remove the source.

First of all, listen to your body. It will let you know when you're working too hard.

Learn your personal responses to stress—headaches, stomach knots, neck cricks, nail biting, withdrawal, incessant talking or insomnia.

Next, decide what you plan to do to relieve the stress.

Set priorities by dividing tasks into essential, important and trivial.

In addition, be satisfied with a less than perfect job if the alternative is not getting the job done.

Focus on enjoying the activities themselves rather than worrying about your performance or what rewards will result.

Also, organizing your time will help remove some frustration if time is limited.

It may mean leaving office work undone to help reduce conflicts at home.

Some good principles for minimizing the effects of stress will help you adjust: get enough sleep, take care of yourself physically, allow yourself regular vacations, try to deal with stress realistically, organize your life, allow yourself to relax, talk about problems and cultivate and utilize your personal strengths and faith.

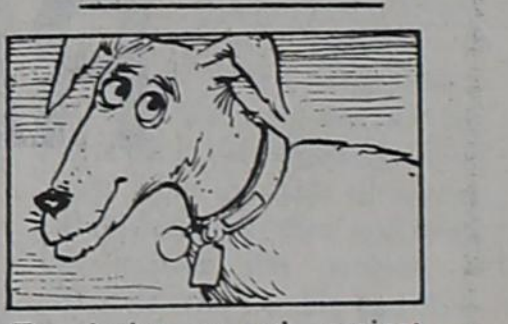

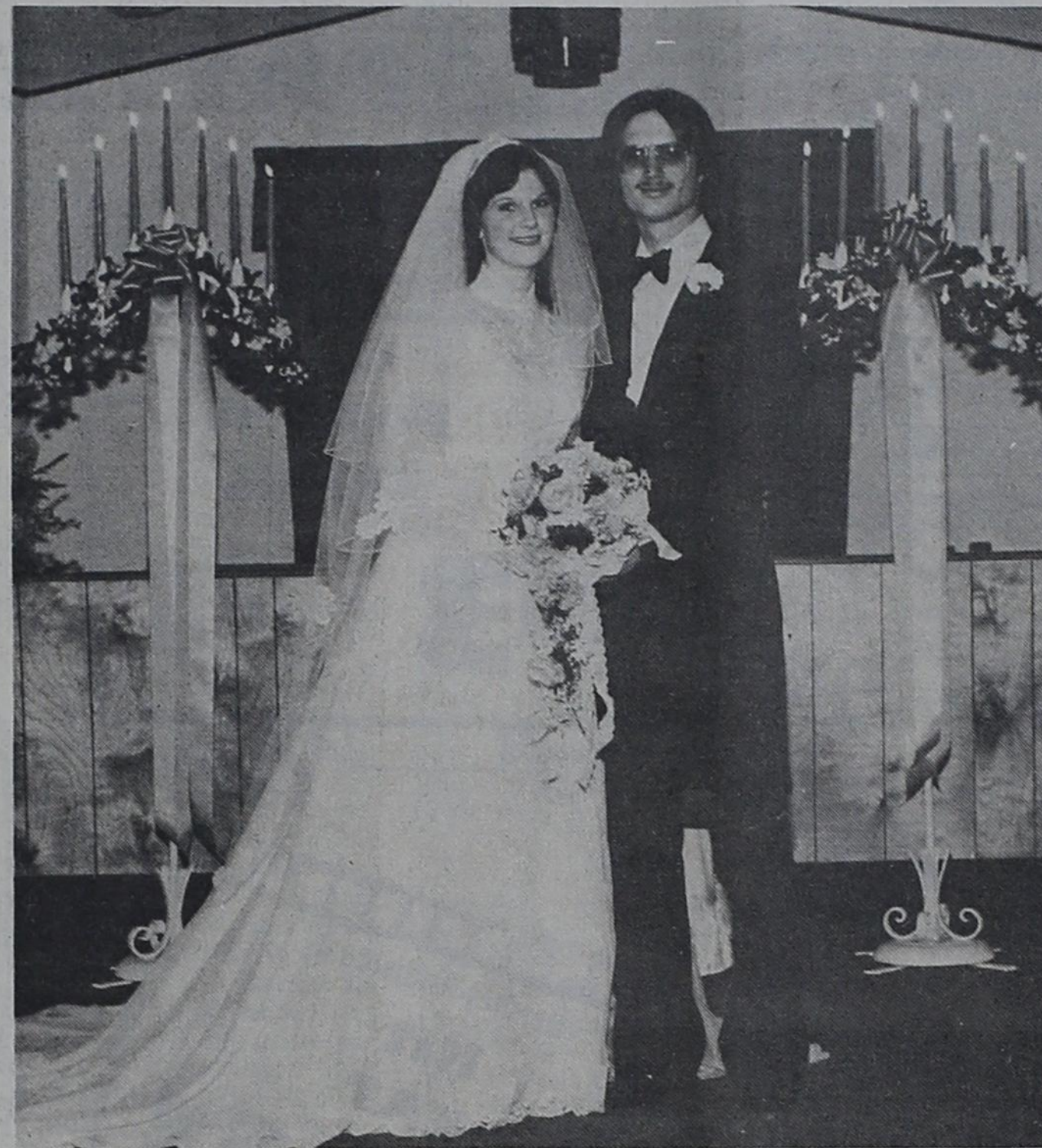

The couple are making their home in Allison.

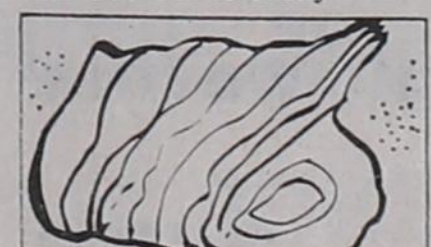

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life. Jn.3:16
ETERNAL LIFE! How longingly we speak of it, and yet how many of us stop to think of everything that this term conveys in the pages of the New Testament. For most of us it speaks only in terms of duration. We think of eternal life lasting forever and our mind fails to comprehend such infinity. But I would suggest to you that there are other elements that we need to think about as we contemplate "eternal life" in addition to how long it lasts.

Perhaps it would be better if we examined just the word "life" for a moment. Life is the direct opposite of death. Death occurs when the spirit is separated from the body. (James 2:26) Therefore, as long as the body and spirit are together a person is said to be alive. And just as there are two deaths mentioned in scripture, there are also two lives. Physical life, we have just explained. But there is a spiritual life, which the scriptures call eternal life. Eternal life has as much to do with a certain condition, or relationship, as it does duration. If spiritual death is the separation of a man, the spirit of a man, from God, his creator; then spiritual life is the bringing together again of man and God. Eternal life is spiritual life.
 Now, contrary to some people's opinions, eternal life does not begin at the point of physical death. The apostle, Paul, told the Corinthians that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto himself. Then he said that they were, as ambassadors, beseeching them to be reconciled to God. To 'be reconciled' means to be 'rejoined' or to be "at one with again". He further urged them that "now is the acceptable time, now is the day of salvation". (2 Cor. 5:20-6:3) Jesus' definition of eternal life is found in Jn. 17:3.
 And this is life eternal, that they should know thee the only true God, and him whom thou didst send, even Jesus Christ.
 Sure, it is forever. But it is also knowing, acknowledging, and being reconciled to God. And it can, in fact it must, begin now, in this life, by ones coming to be reconciled through his Son, Jesus Christ.

The Young Farmers have organized an outstanding new chapter in Area 1 for everyone.



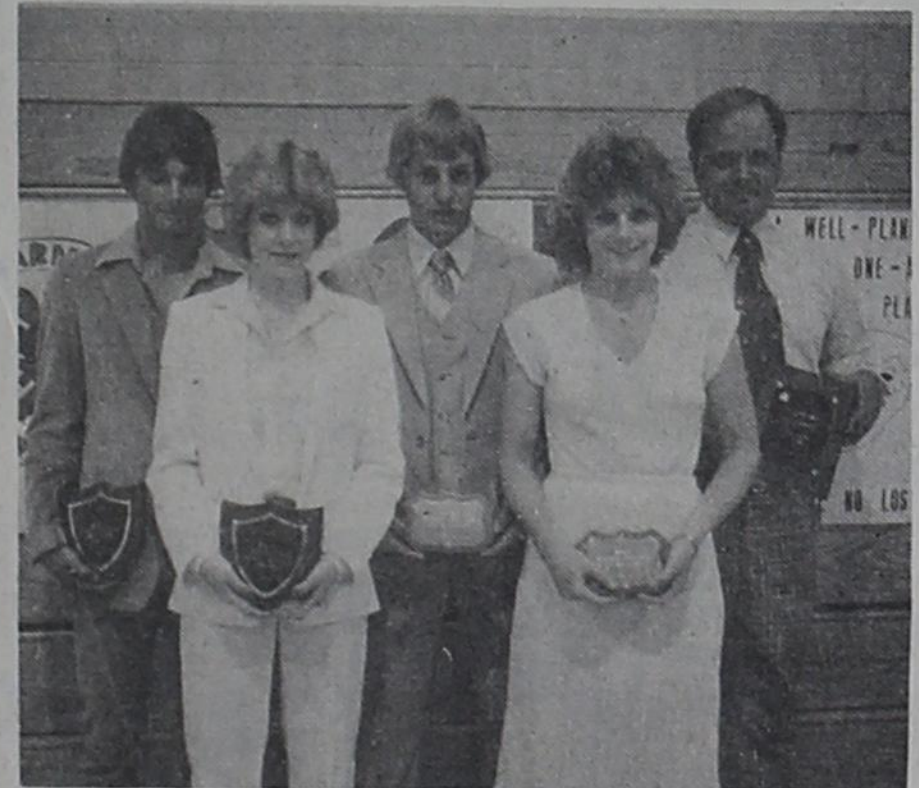

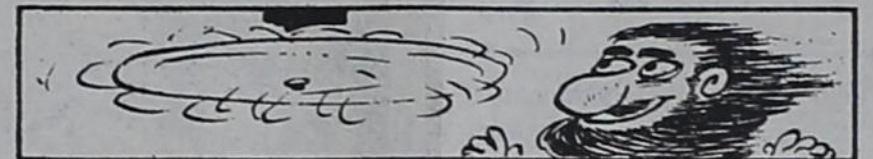
Next Year's Kindergarten Class

TAKE CARE OF YOUR HEALTH--AND YOUR HEALTH COSTS

Take care of your health -- and your health costs. Americans spent \$943 each

in 1979 for health care, a total of \$200 billion, or one-tenth of the Gross National Product.

Consumers can help control these staggering costs in several ways with one basic idea

in mind: it pays to stay healthy.

Six major steps can go a long way toward economical health care. 1) Stay fit; 2) Recognize early warning signs of disease; 3) Learn about low-cost or free health care; 4) Provide your own home care; 5) Consider buying "generic name" drugs; 6) Follow your doctor's orders.

CLIFFHANGER ANNOUNCED BY SIX FLAGS OVER TEXAS PARK

The world's first total freefall ride, the Texas Cliffhanger, will debut late this spring at Six Flags Over Texas.

The Arlington theme park's general manager, Ray Williams, said the towering, 2.1 million dollar ride will give thrillseekers "the same falling sensation they would feel if they stepped off the top of a nine-story building."

Williams said the ride has no precedent in the industry. "Even our loop coaster," he said, "had 'ancestors' that were built around the turn of the century, but there's nothing in amusement ride history which resembles the Texas Cliffhanger."

Williams, who recently rode the prototype model of the ride at the Intamin AG factory near Geneva, Switzerland, said, "The sensation is unlike anything developed up to now. There's no way to compare it to even the biggest of roller coasters, or any existing ride."

The "L-shaped" ride tower juts 128 feet into the air. Passengers board the Texas Cliffhanger on the underside of the tower. They will be seated four abreast in sleek, padded gondolas. The gondolas rise one at a time to the top of the tower, with the trip up taking only ten seconds.

At the top, the gondolas move into "drop position" and will be held at that point for ten seconds. Riders, protected by over-the-shoulder "lap bars," have an unobstructed view of the area in front of them.

After the pause, the gondolas -- weighing 1,500 pounds without passengers -- drop at

freefall speed, guided by tracks.

Near the bottom of the drop, the track curves and riders will suddenly find themselves on their backs looking straight up at the sky.

A computer controlled braking system will stop the gondolas near the end of an 86-foot-long horizontal track. Then the gondolas will be slowly turned upright and lowered to the bottom of the structure for unloading.

During the freefall drop, riders will experience a 3.5 G force. The ride accelerates from zero to 55 miles per hour in the first 1.3 seconds of the plunge.

Williams said the computer safety systems engineered into the ride are "state of the art" devices.

He said 103 electronic sensors send messages to the computer during each ride cycle.

Some of the sensors detect the ride's speed. Others give the computer information on the exact location of each gondola.

"If the computer isn't satisfied with the ride's operation, it will temporarily close it down," Williams commented.

Williams said the ride is currently on its way by ship from Europe to Texas. Foundations for the 110-ton structure have already been poured.

After construction is completed, extensive tests will be conducted before the ride is opened to the public in late April.

The Texas Cliffhanger will occupy a site on the edge of Six Flags' Boomtown section.

STAY FIT

Staying fit is your best "no-cost" health insurance. This involves eliminating cigarette smoking, getting moderate exercise, eating sensibly, reducing alcohol consumption, obeying speed laws and using seat belts in vehicles.

When possible, care for a convalescing family member at home. It's much more pleasant and less expensive than a hospital or nursing facility.

Most communities have home health-care services to provide you with backup support.

GENERIC DRUGS

Consider buying drugs by their generic name. Generic-name prescription drugs are usually cheaper to buy than brand-name prescription drugs, so when your doctor prescribes a drug, talk to him or your pharmacist about the least expensive way to buy the drug.

DOCTOR'S ORDERS

Follow your doctor's orders -- all of them, not just the ones you "like".
