

SWEETWATER DAM PROJECT IS MEETING TOPIC

Fred Parkey with Red River Authority in Wichita Falls met with the Wheeler County Commissioners Monday morning, May 3. Mr. Parkey made his trip to Wheeler to discuss with the Commissioners and City of

Shamrock and Wheeler the correct approach to bring about the construction of the Sweetwater Creek Dam. Mr. Parkey has been working on the Sweetwater project for the past 21 years. Both Wheeler and Sham-

rock obtain their water supplies from underground reservoirs; this underground water is predicted to be exhausted in 15 years. A project of the size of Sweetwater dam would require two years for construction

and 5-8 years before water would be available for use. Other surrounding towns will feel the need for water about the same time; Wellington and Canadian rely on underground water for their cities. Pampa has also

expressed an interest in the water from Sweetwater creek.

With inflation the cost of the dam has increased, but the need greater.

The Sweetwater Creek Project was started in 1961. In 1963 Red River Authority applied for a permit for a reservoir to hold 65,000 acre feet of water. 16,000 acre feet would be dead storage and 50,000 acre feet would be available for use. This project would be larger than Greenbelt. Through core drilling it was determined the site was suitable for the dam. The estimated cost of the dam in 1963 was \$5-6 million, including lake filters and lines to town which would be using the water. Six-seven million gallon of water would be available per day; this is twice the amount needed by Wheeler and Shamrock in their peak period at this time.

The Interstate Water Compact delayed the construction of the dam. Texas and Oklahoma could not agree on which state had a right to the water. This has now been settled; Texas has a right to 60% of the water

in Sweetwater Creek and Oklahoma claims 40%. A dam at the proposed location—7 miles east of Wheeler—would provide adequate division of the water. Today's cost of the dam, filters and lines would be \$20 million.

"The proposed project may be the last site of good palatable water in the Panhandle," stated Parkey. Additional facts were made available to those in attendance at the meeting. An estimated 7 million gallons of water would be available per day from the drainage area of 300 square miles. The average depth at the dam would be 45' with the overall average depth of 26'. The shoreline would measure approximately 32 miles and stretch 7 miles from the dam. The dam would be 102' high at the highest point; it would be 68' thick at the bottom and 20' wide at the top.

The citizens of Wheeler County need to be thinking of the future generations and make sure they have the water they will need to live on the land they inherited from us.

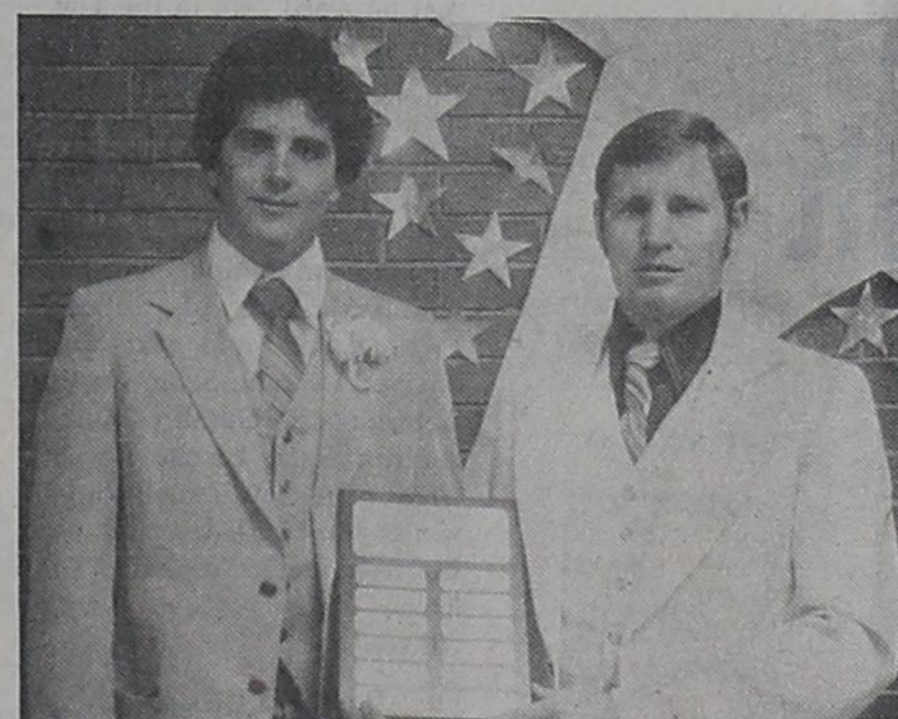

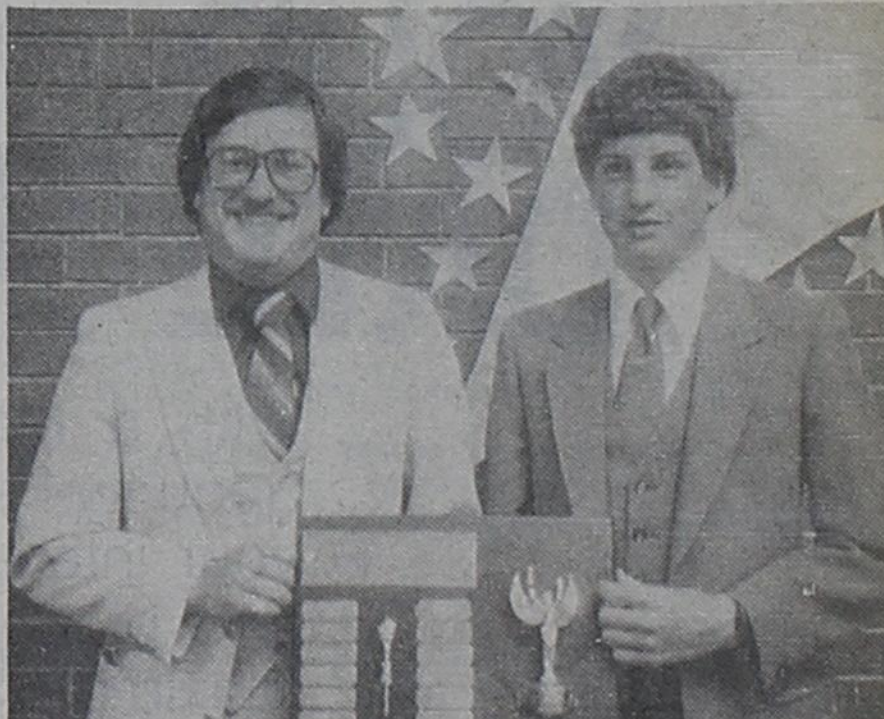

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SEWING NOTIONS FOR A MORE PROFESSIONAL LOOKING GARMENT

Got a notion? Don't take these sewing aids for granted when constructing garments. Use them to your advantage.

Sewing notions, such as needles, pins, shears and marking, measuring and sewing aids, can be used in various ways to achieve a more professional-looking garment.

PINS—Using appropriate pins and pin sizes on various fabrics can save time during pattern layout and cutting.

Use extra-long, large-head pins for bulky heavyweight fabrics, such as wool, corduroy and heavy-weight denim.

Ball-point pins should be used on knits, while most others fabrics, such as cotton-polyester blends, silks and light weight linens, can take size 17 fine silk pins.

Larger glass or plastic-head pins are easier to handle and work with. To identify pin types, store them in different size or color pin cushions.

SHEARS—Cutting down on time means cutting with the right pair of shears. Eight-inch bent-handle shears offer the best performance for most fabrics.

Light-weight shears are compatible to light and medium weight fabrics, and metal shears are best suited for heavier weight or thicker fabrics, such as wool blends and denim.

Pinking shears, those with the notched blades, have a "built-in" seam finisher for fabrics that tend to ravel or fray easily.

MARKING AIDS — Selecting the proper marking and tracing aids depends primarily on fabric type.

Use a serrated tracing wheel and tracing paper on fabrics with smooth, flat surfaces.

You may also choose to pin-mark fabrics using tailor's

chalk or a tailor tacker aid which marks each side of the fabric in a single motion.

Threaded tailor tacks are best suited for textured or tweedy fabrics, such as raw silks and wool blends.

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THREADS—The best buy in thread is a long-staple 100 percent polyester or cotton-wrapped polyester thread.

These threads perform better than short-staple 100 percent polyester threads.

Specialty threads, such as silk thread, add luster and brilliance to a garment but are often difficult to find.

Mercerized cotton threads lack strength and elasticity needed for today's fabrics.

When topstitching, use two strands of regular size thread when heavier, top-stitching thread in a particular color cannot be found.

If your machine doesn't have a dual spool holder, wind two bobbins or use two spools of thread and extend the spool holder with a plastic drinking straw.

NEEDLES—The needle is the strongest influence in stitch formation and thread performance. Different styles and sizes of machine needles are designed for specific fabrics.

The needle package will tell you which fabrics to use with which needles.

Always keep needles sharp and clean by placing them on an emery-filled strawberry on the pin cushion. Dull or blunt needles may cause poor stitch performance.

April Ambulance Report

The Wheeler Ambulance Service answered twenty-four calls for the month of April.

The nature of these calls were: five rig calls, four sick calls, five cardiac calls, one fall, two auto accidents, one horse fell on rider and one motorcycle. Of these calls, two were hip fractures, seven were fractures of legs, hands or arms, one abdominal, one internal injury with severe bleeding, one back injury, two head injuries, and one DOA.

Eight patients were transferred to Amarillo and three went to Pampa.

Seven of these calls were code 3 emergencies.

The individual number of calls and hours given in patient care were: Louis Stas 12 calls, 27 hours, M.K. Christner 18 calls, 40 hours, David Cross 4 calls, 5 hours, Lee Hibler 3 calls, 5 hours, Tommie Puryear 2 calls, 4 hours, Dwight Tipps 5 calls, 18 hours, Frank Coates 1 call 2 hours, Mimi Boedeker 1 call 3 hours, Pam Hibler 2 calls, 3 hours.

A total of 110 hours were given in patient care, bringing the number of hours volunteered for this year to 520. Ninety calls have been answered in 1982.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life. Jn. 3:16
 "Should not perish..."
 The great curse of man from the day Adam's sin in the garden has been the curse of death. But most people, when the word death is mentioned, tend to think of it only in terms of the physical. But like so many other passages in John's book where Jesus spoke of spiritual things and his hearers understood only in terms of the earthly, if you understand this passage oly in terms of physical death, you have missed the point.
 Death is a term which means a separation. In the Bible, it is used in two senses: 1. It is used to refer to the separation of the body and the spirit, at which point our physical, worldly existence is over. James 2:26 uses it for a comparison with faith without works: For as the body apart from the spirit is dead, even so faith apart from works is dead.
 But there is another separation that is far more devastating than even physical death. And this is the death that is most often talked about in the New Testament when it is mentioned in relation to sin. It is the separation of a man from his Creator.
 Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save; neither his ear heavy, that it cannot hear; but your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid his face from you that he will not hear.
 Isaiah 59:1-2
 You see, the man who is caught up in sin, and who isn't it they are responsible and accountable for themselves (Rom. 3:23), is already dead spiritually because of sin. Hence the necessity of the sending of the Son. And the great opportunity of Christ's coming is that a man need not continue in sin, but through this gift of God, can have eternal life. Paul wrote these words to the Christians at Ephesus:
 And you did he make alive, when you were dead through your trespasses and sins, Eph. 2:1

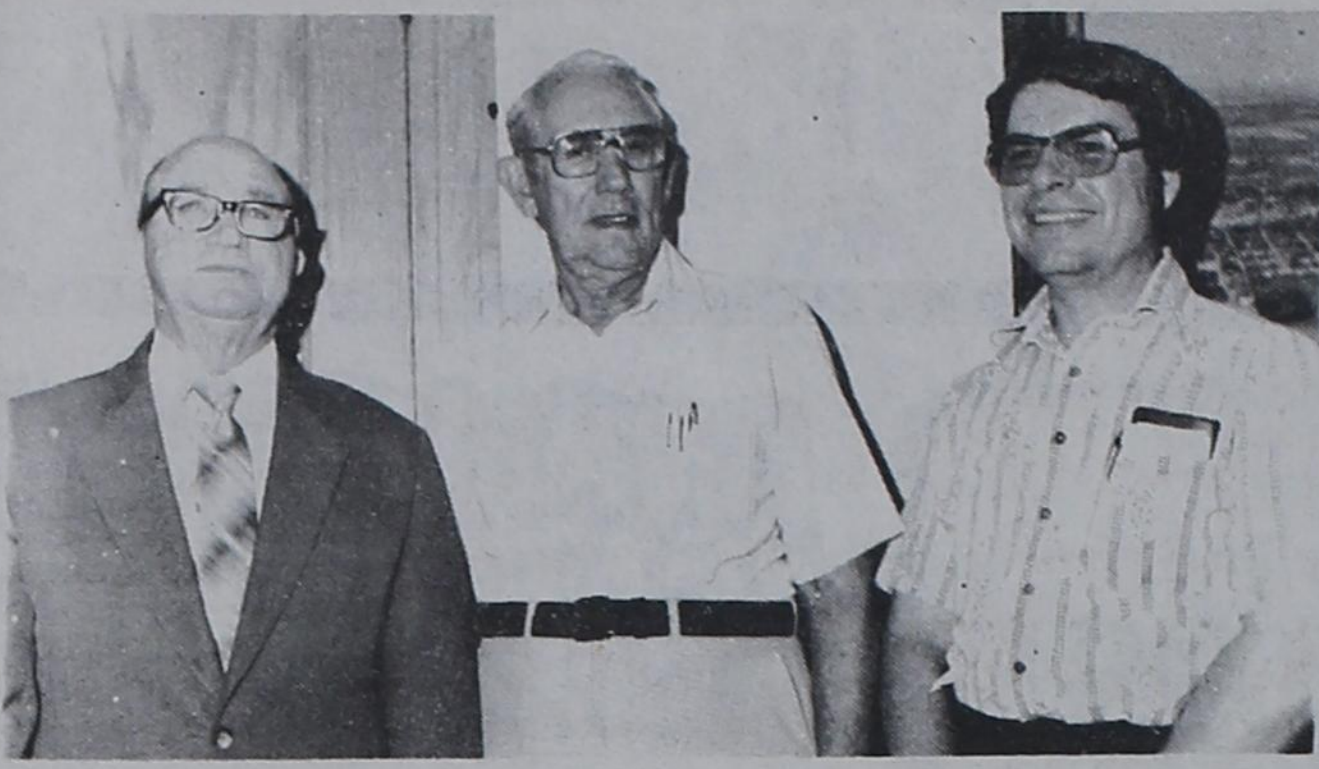
Rites Read For Ruth DeWolf

A.S.C.S. Announces Deadline

May 15, 1982 is the deadline to certify.

All farmers are urged to certify their planted acres of wheat, oats and barley, and their Conservation Use Acres that are seeded to small grains. We can accept volunteer wheat as planted before January 29, the same as seeded acres for Conservation Use Acres. It is important that a full certification of all acres on each farm is made by the final reporting date as this will

ffect your 1983 bases. Even if you are over planted and not participating in the acreage reduction program, we still need your certification of all acres as this will affect your 1983 bases.

All grains need to be certified on a field by field acreage and as either dryland or irrigated. If you had none of these small grains seeded, then a "zero" certification will protect your bases for 1983.

Remember that May 31, 1982 is the final date to put 1981 cotton or grain sorghum in the Government loan.
