

A long-range program about Wheeler County has been developed and published, according to Wendell Morgan of Shamrock chairman of the County Program Building Committee.

"The document, developed by committee members, contains detailed description and analysis of county situations, points out problems and program areas of concern, and provides long-range objectives for continued growth and de-

velopment in economic and social areas important to county citizens," Mr. Morgan said.

Morgan urges all interested individuals and groups to become familiar with the Long-Range Extension Program and to support the Wheeler County Program Building Committee in helping achieve the longrange objectives. The document will serve as the blueprint for the program building committee in developing annual educational programs. through the local office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Program Building Committee is composed of 47 county citizens who work closely with the County Extension Agents to develop and carry out educational prorams needed, accourding to







# NOTICE **APRIL 30, 1982 DEADLINE**

### **Homestead Exemptions:**

If you owned your home and used it as your principal residence on January 1, you may claim it as your residence homestead and receive a tax exemption.

If you are 65 years of age or older as of January 1, you are entitled to an additional exemption off the market value of your residence homestead.

Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to a partial exemption from property taxes. This exemption can be applied to any property that is owned on January 1.

# "Open-Space Land"

#### Ag use 1-d-1

Open-space land is to be taxed at its productivity value instead of market value. This exemption is effective only if applications are filed with the appraisal district office.

# **Special Exemptions For Farmers**

An exemption form will need to be filed with the farm equipment rendition.

# **GAMBLING IS MORALLY WRONG**

The Christian cannot point to a "prooftext" for a position on gambling. It might be helpful if there were a commandment, "Thou shalt not gamble." There is no such passage. The Bible often speaks to moral issues in principles rather than prohibitions. The spirit or basic intent of the Scriptures reveals that gambling is morally indefensible.

The spirit of the Scriptures as it applies to gambling is indicated in the following statements:

1. God's Word demands love of God and neighbor (Matthew

# **Some Facts About Legalized Gambling**

1. Neighboring states which permit pari-mutel have never grossed an amount that exceeded 7/10 of 1% of their state budget. The argument of increased revenue for the state is therefore a camouflage.

2. The record shows that legalized gambling always brings an influx of criminal elements into a state.

3. The National Gambling Commission states that "participation in illegal gambling is greater in states where legal gambling is available than in states where no form of gambling is legal."

4. Gambling nets tremendous profits for organized crime. This was confirmed by testimony of an active member of the Florida underworld before a U.S. Senate Committee. He said, "Bookmakers, connected with organized crime, frequent every south Florida thoroughbred racetrack and often handle as much wagering as authorized tellers working in thelegal pari-mutel booths."

# **GAMBLING AND CHARITY**

Advocates of gambling are often found in churches and civic organizations. They see it as an easy way to raise money for good causes. The fact that bingo games and raffles are often illegal should solve the problem for Christians. It is not enough, however, to contend for keeping the law. Because "it's for a good cause," communities often stretch the law a little and sponsor such activities anyway. Such events should be avoided by Christians because (1) they precondition communities and individuals to more damaging kinds of gambling, (2) they undermine the integrity of honest law enforcement officers who must look the other way because of the good cause and the urgings of community leadership, and (3) they exploit the covetousness of man in the name of a good cause in the community. This contaminates the good in the good cause. For churches to do this is blasphemous.

22:37-40). Gambling contradicts such love.

2. God's Word condemns covetousness and materialism (Matthew 6:24-34) which is at the heart of the gambling process.

3. God's Word repudiated theft (Matthew 19:18) while gambling is theft by mutual consent just as dueling is murder by mutual consent.

4. God's Word encourages honest work (Ephesians 4(28; II Thessalonians 3:10-12) while gambling encourages an attitude of something for nothing.

5. God's Word demands stewardship of life as well as of possessions (Matthew 6:33; Romans 14:12; Colossians 3:17) while gambling rejects the concept of stewardship.

6. God's Word demands the worship of God alone (Exodus 20:3) and recognition of his sovereignty (Matthew 10:29-30) while gambling is the worship of luck.

5. Gambling vicimizes those who devote themselves to it. Compulsive gamblers have less restraint upon their impulses to try to beat the pari-mutel betting machines. If gambling is legal, these type of people are much more likely to use money which should have gone towards paying grocery bills, rent, and other necessities.

6. In gambling, only the operator consistently wins. To legalize an activity that victimizes the people is one of the worst errors a government can make. The overwhelming majority of the "investors" must eventually lose their money in order for the gambling enterprise to survive.

7. While the Republican referendum this Saturday is non-binding, be sure that a favorable vote would result in continued pressure by racetrack gambling interests on legislators in the next legislative session.



# THE BIBLE SPEAKS

For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life. Jn. 3:16 Whosover believeth ...

The phrase "whosoever believeth" represents both the universal appeal of the gospel and the limited nature of its practical application. The sacrifice of Jesus was for all men. It was for the sins of all mankind. If you will read the book of Hebrews carefully, you will find that the shedding of Jesus's blood was the only appropriate sacrifice for the sins of mankind for all time. The blood of bulls and goats could not take away sin. (Heb. 10:4) But Christ entered into the sanctuary not made with hands, once for all, and offered, not animal sacrifice, but his own blood; "once for all". (Heb. 9:24-28) So we see that the salvation of God is offered to all men. As Paul told the young man, Timothy: This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior (meaning that praying for all men-see Vs. 1-2), who would have all men to be saved, and to come to a knowledge of the truth. (ITim. 2:3-4)

Note: paranthesis mine.

But, because salvation is offered to all men, it does not necessarily mean that all men will receive it. The phrase taken in its entirety places a condition upon man's salvation. It says, "whosoever believeth might not perish." So, although it is offered to all, it is given only to those who meet the condition of believing upon him. Now, the word "believeth" encompasses much more than some would like us to think. By a careful study of the entire book of John, not to

Testament, we find out that,



I think it is a disgrace to a beautiful little town to see such rot right downtown. You would at least think that a theatre that would show such sewage would move out to the dump ground where the other trash is.

Do you pay any attention to the advertisements about these R-rated movies? It seems that most of these movies contain either explicit sex or extreme violence. I suppose all of them contain profane and vulgar language. It grieves me to see that parents don't think enough of their own children to guard their minds from such pollution. It is appalling to observe the number of teenagers and small children that attend these corruptive movies. Add to all of this the beer, the rock music, and the profanity that the young people are allowed to engage in (and openly at that, right on the square) and it makes you wonder if some parents even have a brain. Certainly, they don't love their children. The Bible clearly tells us that people who will not restrain their children, hate them.

Call me anything you like-I warn you there is a judgment day coming when the great Judge of the Universe will personally call each individual before His throne where an account will be given for failing to assume responsibility. He has given us a book called the Bible where He spells out very vividly exactly how to produce godly offspring, but you can choose to ignore it. However, Hosea 4:6 says if you do, He will forget your children. What will you do when the day comes that you need Him on your child's behalf? Time will reveal which of us is a fool.

with sickness in order to bless and teach the sick one something. They say that sickness brings you closer to God. If that is true, why don't we check into the hospital instead of school for our learning? You don't check into the hospital to learn, but to be treated by the doctor in an attempt to get well. Jesus said in Luke 10:9 that into whatever city His followers entered, they were to heal the sick and say to them, "The kingdom of God is COME NIGH unto you." According to Jesus the HEALING gets you NIGH or CLOSE to the kingdom of God, not SICKNESS. Sickness pertains to the kingdom of the devil. Jesus healed multitudes and, as mentioned above, Acts 10:38 says they were all oppressed of the devil, not blessed of God.

The truth is that Jesus Christ wants you to be well so much that He came down from Heaven to become your Substitute. Scriptures say that He bore, in order to remove, our sins and our sicknesses (Isaiah 53:4-5, I Peter 2:24, Matthew 8:17). When you receive Christ as Saviour, you are born again. When you receive Christ as Healer, you are healed. Exodus 15:26 says He is the Lord that healeth thee. Exodus 23:25 says He will take sickness away from you. Psalm 103:3 says He heals ALL thy (THAT'S YOUR) diseases.

Then, to top it all off, Jesus instructed His followers just before He ascended to Heaven to go into all the world and preach the gospel until the end of the age and that they were to lay hands on the sick folks and that they would recover.

It is so sad that the majority of Jesus followers today don't believe Him. They think laying hands on somebody is fanatical. They believe strongly in sickness, but usually not at all in healing. I mean they believe that He could heal if He wanted to, but usually doesn't. That is a far cry from what He Himself said. He wants people to be well so much that He bore their sicknesses for them and then instructed His followers to involve themselves in healing the sick after He left. He wants you to be healed so much so that He ordained it as a sign that SHALL FOLLOW THEM THAT BELIEVE, not just a few faith preachers. Everybody that is a believer can lay hands on the sick and they will recover. You may say, "I just don't believe that." It's not for you. It said it was for believers.







#### **TORNADO SAFETY RULES**

When a tornado approaches-your immediate action may mean life or death. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. Stay away from the windows. Also, do not attempt to outdrive the tornado in your automobile. You are much safer in a reinforced building or at home than in your vehicle.

In office buildings-go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to the designated sheltered area.

In factories- workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans. Plant managers should consult with civil defense and plant engineering personnel to locate the safest possible shelter areas.

In shopping centers-go to a designated shelter area-not to your parked car.

In homes-the basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Recent research indicates that it is not necessary to open windows and doors stay away from them.

Mobil homes- mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds. Proper tie-downs to prevent overturning will minimize
