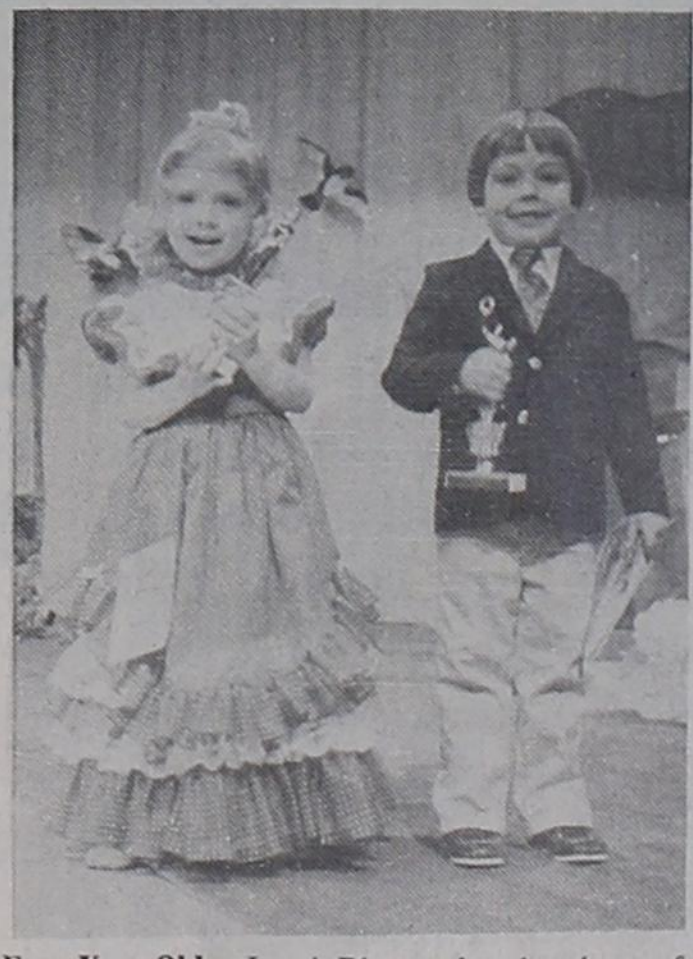

Incubator Fund Near \$1000

Both of these units will be kept at Parkview. One is designed for transporting, such as in an ambulance. Parkview does have an incubator at the present time, but it is not designed for transporting. Also this unit does not have some of the features that are so desirable, such as alarms that react before a crisis can arise. This is an audio and visual alarm system that have thermosensors that shut the heater down if an environmental overtemperature occurs.

The present incubator does the job that it was intended and is safe to use. However, if we are able to raise the entire \$10,000.00, we would like to replace this unit with a more up to date model.

Ceiling Fans Promise Big Spring-Summer Savings
This year, many people will buy more ceiling fans for homes and businesses, and from all expectations, they'll make a big difference in energy savings for spring and summer.

Families will be setting thermostats from 76-80 and turning on the fans -- to find they're still comfortable and instructions on installation.

of from 18-25 percent. Houston Lighting and Power Company says the best reason for a fan is money. They say a one-ton air conditioner costs about 10 cents per hour to operate. A fan costs less than a penny per hour to operate. You don't have to be a whiz in math to figure the difference -- 10 hours of one or the other can add up to either a

dollar or a dime. Of course, fans don't actually lower room temperature, but the constant breeze makes you feel cooler. Check Installation Costs For greatest savings, check on installation cost. Cost of having a ceiling fan installed can sometimes run as much as the actual cost of the fan, so be sure to consider this before buying.

Install It Yourself?
Some fans have only a few instructions on installation, but others are complete with pictures, so it's possible to install the fan yourself. Be sure to pick up instructions when you buy the fans, and read them carefully. Manufacturers will tell you if fans can be installed on ceilings as low as eight feet. They usually say mount the fan to a standard three or four-inch junction box securely anchored to support 45 pounds.

How To Hang Fan
A ceiling fixture already in place is the easiest place to hang a ceiling fan. This gives you ready access to electricity and puts you near a ceiling joist, since the ceiling box (the metal box up in the ceiling that contains the electrical wiring) is attached to a joist.

Another way to hang the fan simply involves placing a new ceiling box to the underside of a joist and running power to it. In most cities, however, residents should know that a permit is necessary (and these are issued only to licensed electricians) for all but very simple home wiring.

So have a professional do the electrical part and save yourself a possible injurious shock and/or a fine.

A third way to get power to the fan is to hang the fan as if it were a swag lamp, draping the power cord through a chain to the nearest wall, then down the wall to a plug. There are swag kits available for this purpose.

In deciding which way to go, remember that the first method mentioned really is the easiest way -- using an existing ceiling fixture. With this method, the competent do-it-yourselfer can easily install a ceiling fan in an hour or two. Educational programs con-

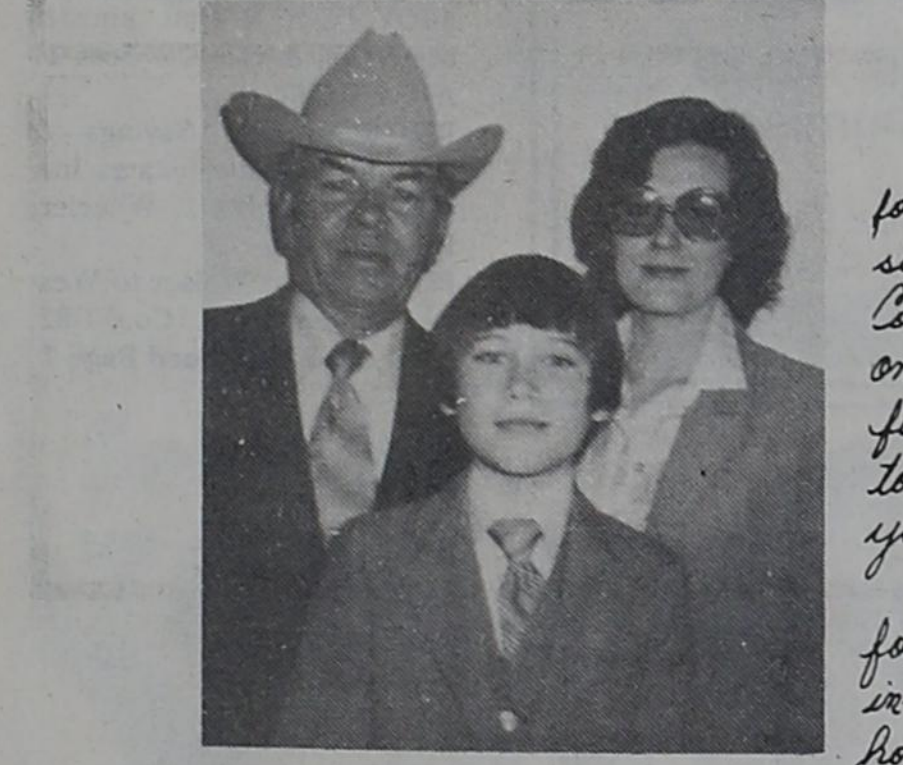
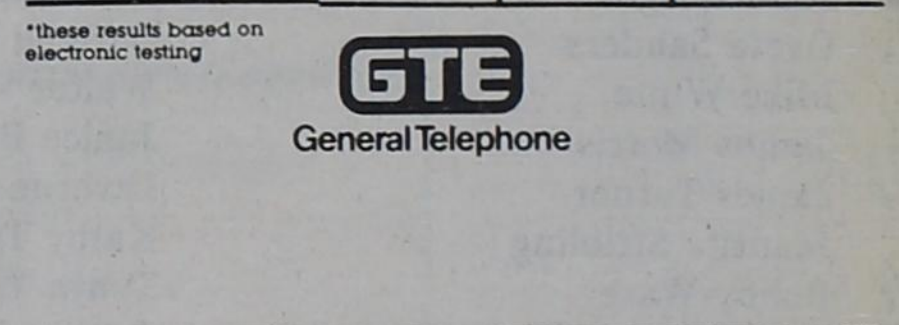

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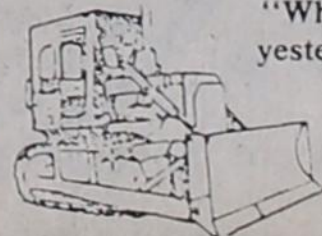

Co. Agent's Column

WEATHER AFFECTS DISEASE CAUSING ORGANISMS

Weather is not directly responsible for plant diseases, though it does influence disease-causing organisms and may increase or decrease certain diseases.

The fungi, bacteria, nematodes and viruses that cause plant diseases are influenced by weather conditions.

Knowing what conditions favor disease-causing organisms will make it easier to know when to expect plant diseases and how to control them.

By carefully watching for plant symptoms, it's possible to determine whether these microscopic organisms are present in the plant. However, early recognition is necessary to prevent serious disease attacks. Once a disease problem is progressed, little can be done to control it.

Some disease organisms cause more plant damage in cold soils than in warm ones. Damping-off is a particular problem in beans, peas, okra and cotton in cold soils. Waiting until the soil is approximately 70 degrees F. will help prevent this condition.

Other organisms require hot conditions to grow and thrive. Charcoal rot and cotton root rot can completely kill healthy plants by damaging stems and root systems.

Becoming familiar with crop diseases and the conditions under which they occur will allow one to plan control strategies.

Weather is not the only factor necessary for disease to occur. The pathogen or disease-causing agent must be present along with a susceptible host plant. If any of these factors are altered, control is possible. Disease-resistant varieties are one way to combat disease problems.

Knowing crop diseases, conditions necessary for their growth, and preventive measures can lead to a successful crop yield without major losses.

HOME LAWN WEED CONTROL

Home lawn weed control can be very frustrating. Following a good maintenance program will help a lot in building a dense turf that will discourage the invasion of weeds. On the other hand, a weak, thin turf will allow weed seed germination and establishment.

Once a weed is established, it can either be removed physically by digging or it can be removed chemically. Physical digging is fine if the weeds are few and if they do not have underground reproduction organs. The dallisgrass plant is a good example of just such a plant. You can

dig it up but the chances are it will just regrow from the underground parts that you don't get.

When considering chemical weed control, it might be well to remember that you are trying to remove an undesirable plant that is growing among desirable plants and many times it is not an easy task.

Generally, lawn weeds may be divided into two groups, those that have broad leaves such as chickenweed, henbit, spurge, etc. and those that have grassy type leaves such as dallisgrass, crabgrass, goosegrass, etc.

Grassy type weeds may be controlled in bermuda lawns with either MSMA (monosodium methanearsonate) or DSMA (disodium methanearsonate). Several applications may be necessary and the bermuda may turn yellow, but it should recover. Grassy type weeds cannot be selectively controlled in a St. Augustine lawn. They may be removed by spot treating just the indi-

vidual weed with either of the above chemicals or with glyphosate (trade name - Round-up of Kleenup).

Broad leaf weeds are usually controlled with products containing 2, 4-D MCPP and dicamba. These chemicals are not safe for every lawn or for every situation. The only way to be sure is to check the label on the container. Be sure the chemical will control the weed you are after, is safe to use on the type of lawn you have and will not injure nearby ornamental plants.

For best results, apply the herbicide only when the weeds are actively growing. The hardest time to kill a weed is when it is hot and dry and the weed is under moisture stress. Try to pick a cooler day with little wind movement and when soil moisture levels are fairly high.

Always follow the directions on the label.

Fortunately, scientists are now initiating investigations involving Texas Longhorns in many major universities. Furthermore, ranchers all over the nation, are taking a closer look at the potential of the Texas Longhorn for registering a genetic impact on our beef industry through crossbreeding. Crosses have been made successfully with every major beef breed. Results are interesting and encouraging.

Thus after nearly three-quarters of a century during which cattlemen have worked toward removing all traces of Texas Longhorn type and breeding from their herds, the Longhorn is becoming fashionable again! There is a strong, growing movement to gain full breed recognition for the once nearly extinct Texas Longhorn, while putting its forgotten genes to work cutting costs and increasing profits in our modern beef industry.
