## LOCAL ABSENTEE VOTING UNDERWAY

Absentee voting is underway locally for City, School and Hospital officials. The election is set for Saturday, April 3. Absentee voting began Monday, March 15, if you are going to be gone on election day, take the time to go to the city office, school or hospital and vote.

Voters have a choice in the City of Wheeler election and many of the area school elections. Consider the candidates and vote for the person of your choice.

### CITY OF WHEELER

The Mayor and two councilmen are to be elected in the City of Wheeler election. Louis Stas is the only candidate for Mayor and David Cross is the only candidate for Place 2. Two men, Donald Rives and Joe Montgomery have filed for Place 4 on the council; Place 4 is presently held by Stas.

### PARKVIEW HOSPITAL BOARD

The Wheeler and Kelton representatives for North Wheeler County Hospital District are to be elected this year. The seats are presently held by John C. Vise and Paula Britt; each are running unopposed for re-election as the Wheeler and Kelton representatives respectively.

### WHEELER I.S.D.

Two positions are to be filled on the Wheeler board of Trustees. This election has

five individuals named on the ballot; two have filed for position 4 and three have filed for position 5. As they appear on the ballot, Bobby Hill and Richard Wallace are running for position 4 and Larry Jennings, (incumbent), Cecil Pierce and Gail Ledbetter are candidates for position 5.

### ELECTION

#### CITY OF MOBEETIE

Six candidates have placed their names on the ballot for Alderman for the City of Mobeeite to be decided on, Saturday, April 3, 1982. Three places are to be filled, with incumbents, Don Moore, Robert Hogan and Kay Hamilton up for re-election. Other candidates for Alderman are Walter Coward, Glen Sherrell and B. R. James, Sr.

The polls shall be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at the Mobeeite City Office Building, and the place of Absentee voting shall remain open from 8:50 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. except Saturdays, Sundays and Official Holidays, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election.

#### ALLISON SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

School Superintendent John Sollis, Jr. said that there are

seven candidates seeking the three places on the Allison School Board.

Voters of the Allison School District will elect the trustees to serve three-year terms. The election shall take place on April 3 within the classroom of the vocational agricultural building.

Candidates for the three places are Tom Reames, Larry Elmore-incumbent-, Danny Rhodes, Junior Coulter, Barbara Williams, Hiram Begert-incumbent-, and Gary Hall.

## AGREEMENT SIGNED FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF WATER SYSTEM

An agreement dated March 19, 1982 between the City of Mobeeite, Wheeler County, Texas, a Public Corporation Organized and Operating under General Law as a Municipal Government and the United States of America, through Farmers Home Administration Department of Agriculture, was signed in connection with a project of acquisition for Construction of a water system to serve the area of Mobeeite, under its jurisdiction at an estimated cost of \$200,000.00. 152,000 for the development costs are available with Grantor agreeing to grant a sum not to exceed \$48,000, or 25% of said development provided by Grantor.

Grantor agrees that it will:

1. Cause said project to be constructed within the total sum available to it.
2. Permit periodic inspection of Construction by representatives of Grantor.
3. Manage, operate and maintain the water system in an efficient and economical manner.
4. Make services if this system available without discrimination to race, color or creed. The initial rate schedule will be approved by the Grantor, thereafter Grantee may make such modifications as long as the rate schedule remains reasonable and non-discriminatory.
5. Adjust its operation cost when deemed necessary.
6. Expand its system to meet anticipated growth.
7. Provide Grantor with reports as may be required.
8. Execute "Equal Oppor-

tunity Agreement" and "Non-Discrimination Agreement".

Upon Default, Grantee, at the demand of Grantor will repay the Original principal amount.

The Grant agreement covers the following described real property: New water well, stand pipe, chlorinator location and replaced water lines. When the grantee no longer needs any property held, the property may be used for other activities as approved by the Grantor.

An Audit report will be prepared each twelve months. The Grantee Shall Report All Suspected or Reported Violations to the Grantor. Grantor Agrees that it will:

Make available to Grantee for purpose of this agreement not to exceed \$48,000.

Will assist Grantee with such assistance as Grantor deems appropriate.

Termination for convenience

will occur when both the Grantee and the Grantor agree that the Continuation of the project will not produce beneficial results commensurate with the further expenditure of funds.

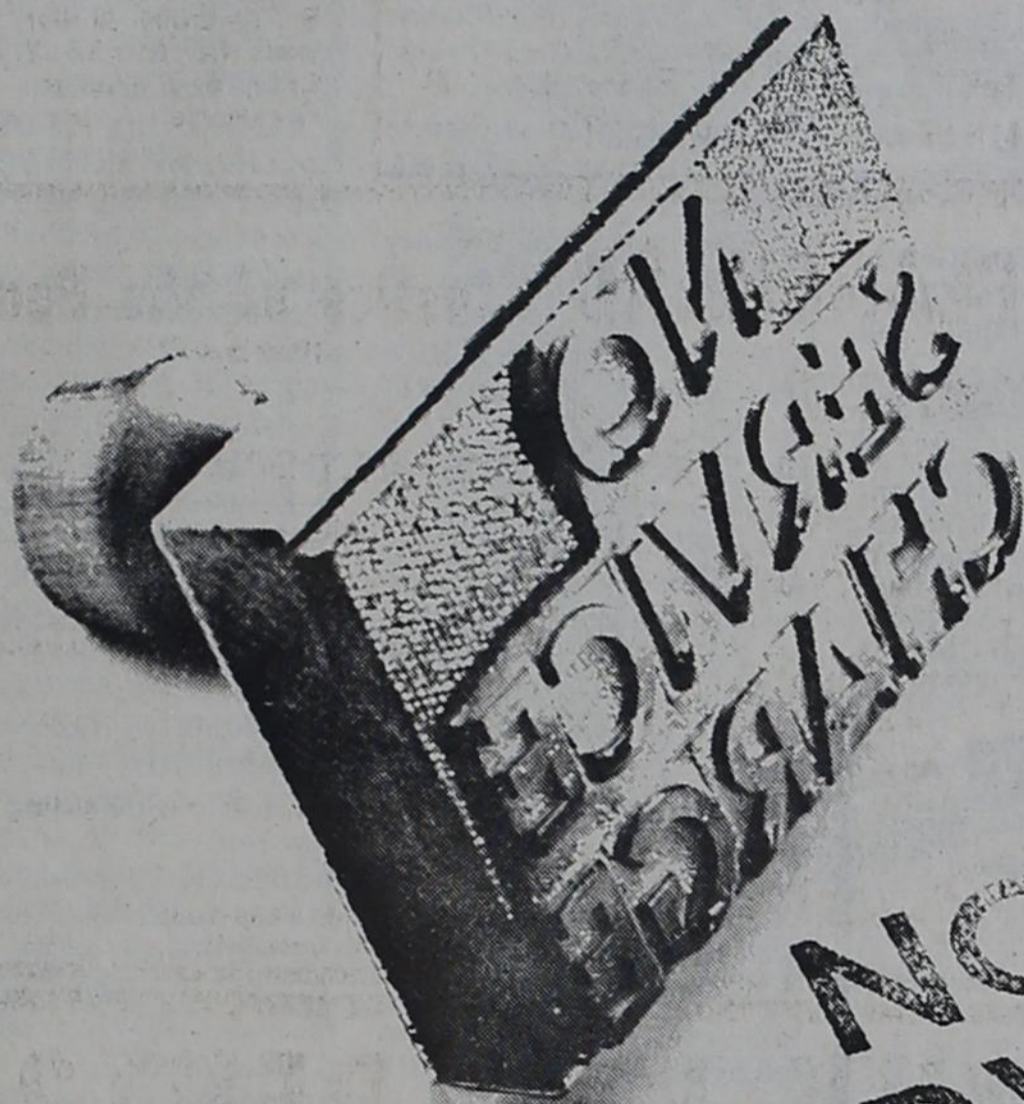

## Lines from Linda

### HOME RESTORATION: DANGER!

Don't let it be health costly. Along with the joys of saving money and creating beautiful surroundings, the do-it-yourself home restorer faces danger to his health -- and even his life in some cases.

**THE 'FINISH LINE'**  
Finish removal is probably the most dangerous restoration activity -- posing possible damage to lungs, skin, liver and even the heart, along with fire hazards.

**THE CULPRITS**  
Paint removers and the paints being removed are the culprits in most cases. Prolonged exposure to many

commercial paint removers can damage the lung tissue. Even more serious, methylene chloride -- the active ingredient in many removers -- can kill. When inhaled, methylene chloride is broken down in the body to form carbon monoxide, a poisonous substance which can place stress on the cardio-vascular system during prolonged exposure.

More culprits are strippers that contain benzene and acetone.

Benzene can be absorbed through the skin, and it can cause burns to the skin.

If ingested in sufficient amounts, benzene also can cause central-nervous system depression (respiratory failure), ventricular fibrillation (irregular heartbeats) and bone-marrow damage.

As few as 25 parts per million in the air is considered dangerous.

Benzene has been linked to some forms of liver cancer and to bone-marrow disorders.

**THE FIGHT BACK**  
Do-it-yourself renovators can fight back and reduce risks by:

- 1) having adequate ventilation to avoid breathing chemical fumes, and by
- 2) wearing rubber gloves to prevent absorption of solvents through the skin and to prevent burns to the skin.

### THE BIG BURN

Special hazards can lead to burning the whole house down if the do-it-yourself renovator fails to take special precautions against fire.

Flammable paint removers and organic solvents, such as alcohol and mineral spirits, present special fire hazards.

In addition to the more obvious danger that comes from working with a lighted cigarette around these materials, there's also the danger of vapors from such solvents gathering at floor level and easily igniting -- a single spark, a water heater or a pilot

light can do it.

Along that same line, another lethal team consists of steel wool, electrical outlets and flammable remover.

Steel wool rubbing against an electrical outlet during paint removal can create sparks that may ignite any flammable remover nearby.

**THE GREAT DOUSE**  
To avoid fire hazards, take these precautions to douse the chance of fire before it happens: 1) use only NONFLAMMABLE removers when possible.

If you must use a flammable remover or solvent inside, work with open windows and use a fan blowing to avoid buildup of combustible vapors at floor level.

2) cut off electrical power if working with steel wool and flammable materials near electrical outlets.

**THE LEAD LAMBAST**  
A virtual lambast of lead poisoning is yours if you aren't careful to prevent it. Here's how it feels: dizziness, nausea, general sick feeling and, later with prolonged exposure, possible damage to vital organs and the central nervous system.

Lead poisoning is the result of working with old paint -- including removal of any containing lead.

Any house built before 1940 probably is covered with paints containing lead.

Every old-house owner should know that lead can be absorbed both from the DUST created by sanding and scraping lead paint and from VAPORS created by burning paint off with a blowtorch or propane torch.

**THE ANTI-LEAD ATTACK**  
To remove lead-containing paints safely and most easily, use a safe chemical remover.

Remember, lead paints adhering tight to wall surfaces present no hazard; it's the removal that poses the danger -- whether removal means paint that is peeling off the wall or active removal procedures.

**THE OTHER SPOILERS**  
In addition to fumes and lead-poisoning problems, other "spoilors" in home restoration include rusty metals and nails and asbestos fibers in older dry-wall finishing materials.

Rusty metals and nails are constant threats to the remo-

delier and renovator, posing danger of puncture wounds and the possibility of lockjaw.

Many professional renovators keep their tetanus shots current as a precaution. After the basic childhood immunization schedule is complete, tetanus (and diphtheria) boosters are recommended at age 14-16 and every 10 years thereafter.

Asbestos has been linked to some forms of cancer.

Many older dry-wall finishing compounds contained asbestos fibers, which, when sanded, can be inhaled into the lungs.

It's no longer legal to manufacture these products with asbestos, but they may already be on the walls or lurking in old supplies at home. Be sure any "new" products you use say "no asbestos."

If you're unsure about asbestos content, play it safe and smooth by "wet sanding" -- smoothing with a damp sponge or cloth to avoid breathing asbestos-containing dust.

Also, wear a good-quality, snug-fitting dust mask every time you sand or work in heavy dust, especially plaster dust. Otherwise, you risk serious

damage to lungs.

**THE BOTTOM LINE**  
While renovation can save "big bucks", it presents many very serious hazards.

The renovator who knows the possible dangers will accomplish many desirable restorations without jeopardizing his own health and safety.

tion for greatest yield response is an important question.

Research conducted at Bushland and Etter indicates that a late boot to flowering stage irrigation provides a

greater yield response than at any other time in the development of a wheat plant. It contributes 45 to 55% of the yield that might be obtained under full irrigation or about 4 applications. Early spring and even early jointing irrigations promote excessive vegetative

growth which utilizes a lot of water. Thus early irrigation makes it almost mandatory to apply additional irrigations to prevent severe moisture stress at flowering. Research indicates that late winter or early spring irrigations are not advisable unless the excess forage is needed for grazing. The increased forage production also makes the crop more susceptible to foliage diseases and utilizes nutrients needed later for grain production. Wheat irrigated in late winter and not grazed grows too tall and frequently lodges with little or no enhancement of grain yield. If a producer plans two irrigations one should be applied at the jointing stage which in the Panhandle usually occurs around April 10. The second irrigation should then be applied at late boot or flowering or about May 5. These stages may occur somewhat earlier following a favorable fall and a relatively mild winter such as we are having this year.

A grain fill irrigation in May usually contributes less to yield than either the joint or flowering irrigations. It is advisable only if the soil is bone dry by the end of the milk stage of kernel development. In recent years this area has had cool temperatures and normal to above rainfall in May. A grain fill irrigation may be good insurance, however, in the event that hot drying winds occur to cause shrivelling and rapid ripening of wheat fields that are low in

## 'WHO EATS WHAT' IMPORTANT TO GROWERS

Farmers like to shoot for numbers when it comes to marketing. The more people who like and eat their products

the better. Numbers will always be important, yet producers should start paying more attention to the types of people who eat what they produce, says Don King, county Extension agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Texas A&M University System.

"Actually foods are like people -- they are known by the friends they make and keep. Over time, they don't keep all their friends, so every product has a continuing job of making friends. Who these friends are makes a lot of difference," King contends.

If a food product is popular with a segment of people who will become more numerous in the future, then its prospects are bright. If it is popular among people who will make up a small part of the future population, its future is then less favorable Kings says.

Indications are that there will be more large cities in the future. Urban people don't necessarily buy the same things that smaller city residents and farmers buy. But, as people move to the larger cities, they tend to adopt food habits of the people already living there. This is true regardless of where people come from, the agent adds.

If foods are popular among people with a lot of educations, they are likely to be less popular among people with little or no education.

The kinds of friends a product has can determine whether that product will be around in the future, Don King says. Unless some products are remodeled to catch the attention of more people, they are apt to fade into oblivion, the agent says.

**Paula Britt Organizing McDonald House Support**

Paula Britt, of Wheeler, a member of the Board of Directors of Children's Oncology Services of the Texas Panhandle - the not-for-profit organization that will build and operate the Ronald McDonald House in Amarillo, is spearheading support in the Wheeler area for the House.  
 Britt said that the Ronald McDonald House concept is a dream come true for families in our area. "Nothing could be more traumatic than to have to travel to a distant city to receive medical treatment for a critically ill child. Not only is the family under a great emotional strain, but for many, the cost of long-term medical treatment can wipe out a family's savings. The Ronald McDonald House provides an alternative to some of

the hardships faced by giving these families both emotional and financial support."  
 Helping families through the devastating reality of a child being treated for cancer, leukemia, heart disease and other serious illnesses is what a Ronald McDonald House is all about. This "Home Away From Home" provides temporary lodging for families of critically ill children during periods of hospitalization or outpatient treatment.  
 The history of the first Ronald McDonald House began with Fred Hill, a football player with the Philadelphia Eagles. His child had been stricken with leukemia, and he discovered the need for such a facility near the Children's Hospital in Philadelphia, where his child was being treated.  
 Few hospitals provide sufficient live-in accommodations for families. Hill's dilemma was the catalyst that inspired the Eagles and the McDonald's owner/operators around Philadelphia to launch a fund-raising drive to establish the first Ronald McDonald House. Today there are over 37 such Houses across the United States and Canada, with another 20 in the building or planning stages.  
 The proposed \$1 million Ronald McDonald House in Amarillo will house up to ten families when completed. Families will receive use of a private bedroom, plus use of common living areas, kitchen, playrooms, and laundry facilities. Each family staying at the House will be a temporary volunteer, responsible for the maintenance of their own room and other areas they use in the House. Although the House will ask for a nominal donation of about \$10 a night per family to cover costs of operation, this fee is waived in hardship cases. Referrals for use of the House will come from Amarillo hospitals and medical treatment centers.

**Post Office Regulations**

Effective immediately, we must abide by Postal regulations and policy requiring complete and correct addresses on all mail. Mail addressed to Post Office boxes must have P.O. box numbers, Wheeler, Texas, and Zip Code. Mail addressed to routes must have the route number and box number. General delivery mail must be so addressed. Mail not bearing correct and complete address is to be returned to the sender. Mail not addressed and not bearing a return address is to be forwarded to the Dead Letter office.  
 Also, we must abide by section 945.1 of the Domestic Mail Manual which states that a charge will be made for correction of mailing lists. The minimum charge is \$1.00. For a list of more than seven names or addresses, the charge is \$.13 per name or street address.  
 Businesses or persons desiring to keep their mailing lists current should write or print "Address correction requested" on the front of the envelope. When there is a change in the addressee's address, a form 3547 will be returned to the mailer with the correct address for a fee of \$.25.  
 We have the cheapest postage in the free world at \$.20. To keep it that way, we must have correct addresses so we can handle the mail more efficiently and give better service.

**Wheeler Band Places Second**

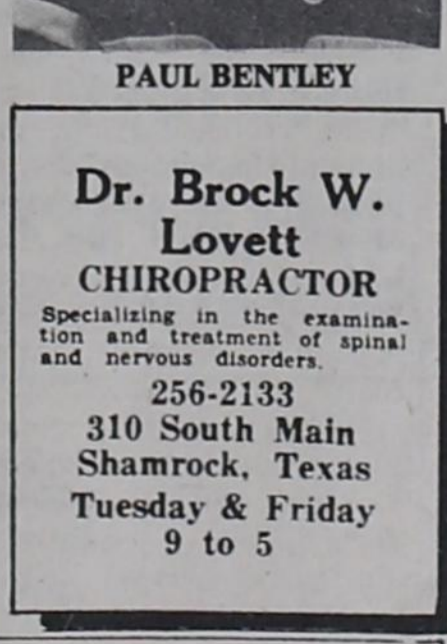
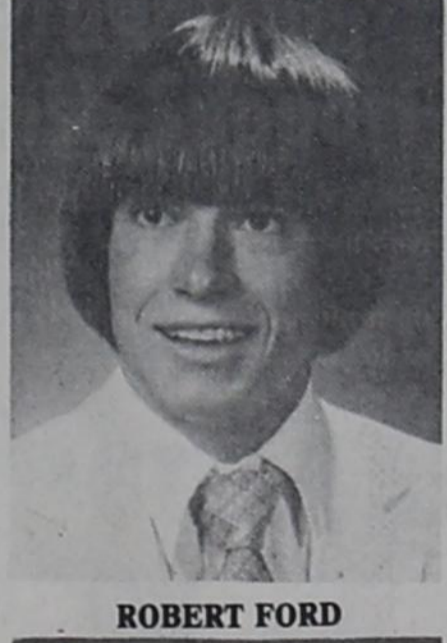

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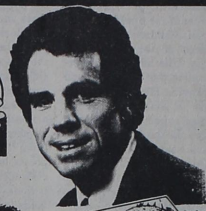
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
