OUR HOME BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD

Many unexpected guests stopped for help at our house by the side of the road during the past thirty-seven years. Some stand out in my memory more than others. I think during that thirty-seven years, we had visitors every hour of the day and night. Most were pleasant experiences.

The first I recall was before we built the house on the hill. We lived in a small two-room house. We were eating supper early one Saturday afternoon, so we could go to town. Everyone went to town on Saturday night in those days. Most of the children went to the show. We parents did also part of the time. Our Saturday nights in Wheeler were usually spent visiting friends from surrounding areas. Many friendships were made on Saturday nights that have last through the years for me and I'm sure for many others. Just as we finished our evening meal, we heard a timid knock on the door. This was early March and still cold. My husband opened the door. We were all amazed as we saw the tiny little man. I'm sure ne was not over five feet tall. The long dirty grey beard came almost down to his waist. Hair of the same color came past his shoulders. A huge overcoat almost touched the doorsteps where he stood.

"Please," he said, "Could I get something to eat?" His English was anything but perfect, so we all listened closely to understand what he said. I think we were all wondering if he was at least a hundred years old. The skin on his face was burned a deep, dark brown, with deep furrows in it. It spoke of the hot sun of summer and the cold, cold winds of winter. We could tell at a glance he had spent his life in the open. His eyes were almost black and looked tired. My husband asked him in at once and I quickly sat another plate and glass of milk on the table. He ate slowly and talked as he ate. In his broken speech, he told us he was eight-three years old. He had no idea when his birthday was. He had been on his own since he was seven years old. He had no family, not even a close friend. He had been herding sheep for seventy-five years in northern New Mexico. Now his health was failing, he was trying to get to eastern Oklahoma, where he thought had

We told them of several places. The children were all playing. Time passed quickly as we sat in the shade of the house and talked. Before we realized it, it was almost noon. We were all enjoying visiting so much I asked them to stay for lunch. She came in my kitchen, like an old friend, and helped me finish a Sunday dinner of fried chicken, gravy and hot biscuits.

After the dishes were washed, they went on their way. We never heard of them again or never knew their name, but talked for years about that nice family that ate dinner with us.

One hot Sunday afternoon, an old car drove up to the back of the house. A young couple carrying a tiny baby came to the back door. We could hear it crying before they reached

"Could we please mix the baby's formula and warm it in your kitchen?" they asked.

"She is so hungry." "Of course, come on in," I told her. The young man, just a boy really, stayed outside with my husband and boys. I quickly put a pan bowl and measuring cup on the cabinet as the tired and frantic little mother tried to keep the baby

"Would you like me to hold her while you fix the bottle?" I asked.

"Would you please?" she exclaimed. I took the precious little baby, only a month old. As I talked to her she quit crying to listen to the strange voice. Our little girl hurried to get a damp cloth so I could wipe the hot little face and make her more comfortable. The concerned father came to the door to see if his wife needed help. "No, she is helping me," she answered with a smile as she looked at me. The baby was so hungry she kept whimpering till the bottle was ready. I gave it to her, while her mother washed the things she had used. She explained they had car trouble and were on the road longer than expected. They soon left with a happy baby, and many thanks of appreciation. I decided the poet was right. It does take a heap of living and a little bit of everything to

make a house a home. We were awakened one Sunday morning between two and three o'clock by a loud pounding on the door and a girl's voice calling, "Mr. Turner." They were only about two miles from town, but didn't realize this. They thought our house was just over the hill, so they had


