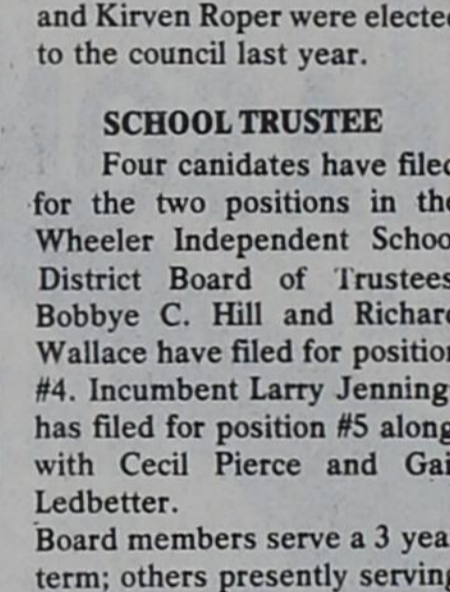

19 Ambulance Calls In Feb.

The Wheeler Vol. Ambulance Service answered 19 calls for the month of February.

These calls involved the following; one rig accident, seven fractures of arms, legs, ankles, or hands, one infant, one respiratory, two heart patients, two strokes, one severe wound with hemorrhaging, three auto accidents and two sick calls.

Ten patients were transfers, eight to Amarillo, one to Pampa and one from Oklahoma City to Wheeler.

Three of these calls answered were code three emergencies.

The number of calls answered and the number of hours volunteered are as follows: Louis Stas, 8 calls, 23 hours, M.K. Christner, 12 calls, 30 hours, David Cross, 8 calls, 14 hours, Lee Hibler 7 calls, 23 hours, Tommie Puryear, 4 calls, 11 hours, Dwight Tipps, 3 calls, 8 hours.

A total of one hundred and nine hours were spent by these people in patient care. This brings the total hours spent in 1982 to two hundred and thirty three hours.

FIRES: The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department was called to two house fires Monday. An estimated \$20,000 damage was the result of a fire at the home of the Delbert Newmans in Mobeetie, Monday morning. \$10,000 to the house and \$10,000 to the contents. The fire at Mobeetie is believed to have started with an electrical short in old wiring. Mobeetie Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene and requested the help of the Wheeler Department. The firemen were called out in the afternoon to the Ned Hernandez home at 1105 S. Main; damage resulting from this fire was estimated at \$2000. Some burning of grass in the yard was underway at the time the fire started; it is believed the fire went up the wall between the stucco and the wall and ignited the wall. The home owned by Buster Callen. Gary Davis, training officer with the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department, urged local citizens to use caution in burning grass near buildings; "Do not burn the grass up next to the structure" stated Davis.

Any qualified taxpayer from the Wheeler or Keltion Districts desiring their name placed on the ballot must file a petition signed by five qualified voters from their district, prior to 5 p.m. March 9, 1982. Directors are elected for a two-year term.

Both Vise and Britt have filed for re-election.

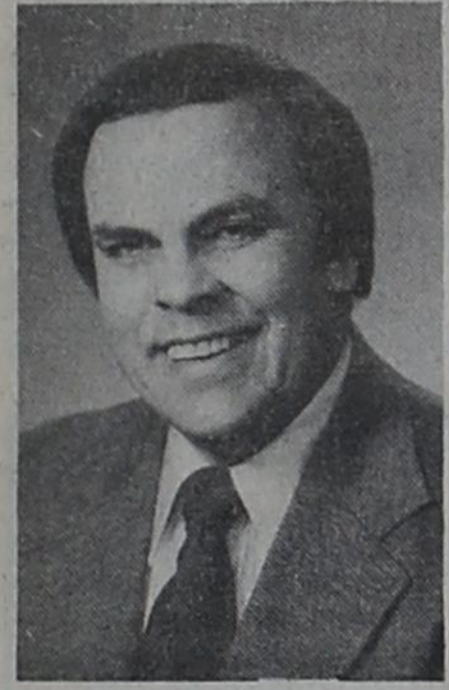

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HOW TO MEASURE
Measure the headboard and buy enough fabric -- plus at least four inches on all sides -- to cover it.

UPHOLSTERED LOOK
If you want an upholstered look, buy the same measurements of foam or padding as you do fabric, and follow the steps below to install it.

CUTTING FABRIC
In order to cut the fabric in the headboard's shape, lay the fabric on the floor, pattern side down. Lay the headboard on top of the fabric.

Make a pencil outline of the headboard. Then, allowing four inches extra fabric outside of the original line, draw another line -- to indicate the actual cutting line.

Cut the fabric on this second line.

TACKING FABRIC
Lay the fabric face down on the floor again, and lay the headboard facedown on top of it.

Make sure the fabric is smooth beneath the headboard, and be sure the board is centered on the fabric.

Staple one side of the fabric to the headboard. Leave the corner for last.

Now staple the opposite side, pulling the fabric as tight as you can.

After that, staple the fabric at the bottom of the board to the underside of the board, cutting out holes for the legs, if necessary.

Then staple the fabric at the top of the board over the job.

If the top is straight, the job is simple.

If the top is curved, slit the curved areas so that the fabric turns over the back, and staple each slit separately to achieve smooth curves.


Make your slit inward from the edge just far enough to let the fabric turn easily.

Cut unneeded fabric from the corners, and then pleat and fold the corners smoothly. Staple them in place.

If you wish, you can glue on decorative tape or ribbon.

CONCERNING DEATH

[Part 7]

The Scriptures reveal that there is more than one kind of death. There is (1) spiritual death, (2) eternal death, and (3) physical death. Another word that can be used for death in all three instances is "separation".

Many people who we meet on the street are dead. I Timothy 5:6, "But she that liveth in pleasure is dead while she liveth." Ephesians 2:1 says that all of us have been dead in sins, but some of us are now alive. How could living people be dead? Isaiah 59:2, "But your iniquities have separated between you and your God." All men are dead spiritually until they become born again by receiving Jesus Christ. That means their spirit is "separated" from God. Adam died spiritually the very moment that he sinned. Neither of the other two deaths could have ever happened if spiritual death had not first occurred. So, spiritual death is "separation of man's spirit from God." Many people who we meet on the street are spiritually dead.

Eternal death is not an eternal state of dying as some people think. Neither is it eternal annihilation as others believe. Both of these ideas stem from an ignorance of what death is. None of the three kinds of deaths means "ceasing to exist". A spiritually dead man still has his spirit inside his body, but he is separated from God. His spirit doesn't come into existence when he is saved; it is put into right standing and fellowship with God. Eternal death is "eternal separation" from God. The lake of fire is the place where people who reject God in this life will exist forever separated from God. Revelation 20:14, "And death and hell were cast into the lake of fire. This is the second death."

Physical death is simply "separation of the spirit from the body". One reference is James 2:26. This is the death we are most familiar with though there are many misunderstandings about it. This has been the discussion of these articles for the past six weeks. Therefore, I will not address it further today.

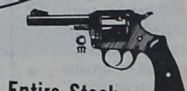

I was blessed to be with my always beautiful sister Barbara Bell for the last three weeks of her life in M.D. Anderson Cancer and Tumor Hospital in Houston. On Saturday, January 16th, the day of my Barbara's death, after another fitful night without sleep with her gentle voice asking the same question "Deanie, are you still here?" Softly, I assured her I was. Suddenly I was aware of an impending feeling of apprehension in her speech as she would ask me to say the 23rd Psalm time and again.

At approximately 5 a.m. she was taking her daily shower. At 5:30 I was not far from being hypnotized watching her apply her make-up on a not typical face, but one without blemish, without a flaw, purely perfection as God had

created her. At 6:05 I was helping her with her I.V.'s, plus seven antibiotics she had been taking through an incision in the right sub-clavian with a tube going to the heart. Barbara's lymphoma, a malignant cancer, started in her stomach four and 1/2 years ago, further complicated by her congenital absence of a left ventricle, unknown to M.D. Anderson staff until some six months ago.

As I was helping her back to bed I could feel an oppressive heat from her body almost burning my leg through my robe. I called a nurse to have

her temperature taken. It was 104.8 degrees. The nurse was busy with another emergency, so I told Barbara not to get excited while I rushed to their station to get a deep pan filled with ice and water. I quickly took her gown off and put ice packs in a pair of surgical gloves, one under each arm pit, and other pressure points, as behind her knees and legs. Then I started bathing her all over with a large ice-cold towel. All this time Barbara was in a semi-coma, with each passing 15 minutes, she would say "Deanie, I don't know what you're doing to me, but please don't stop." It took me approximately one hour and ten minutes to get her temperature down to 100 degrees. By this time she looked up at me with those "big brown eyes" and asked, "Have I wet the bed?" Then we both began to laugh and I told her "No, hon, I wet your bed." With this she started struggling to move over and said "You sure look tired, come on in this cool bed and keep me warm." I have always compared my sister with a chameleon. She could be so sick, so weak and in 20 minutes she would be as calm, vigorous and blooming again. The nurses came in and changed her bed and all was well. We later remembered we had not even slept in the same room since we were working our way through high school in Marlin, Texas back in the year 1943 and 44. We both realized we had come full cycle, yet unaware as to the sequence the day held for these two orphan girls. (She at age 4, I at age 6, eldest sister, Doris of Houston, age 9).

It was 8 o'clock some same morning when Dr. Fred Conrad, Director of Hematology at M.D. came by to see Barbara. He was not smiling this day when he learned that she had suffered more severe chills and high temperature. For the first time I had been there she cried and asked him "If this was to be her last day to live?" My heart had almost ceased to beat, yet I knew I could not let go, yet As I looked at this educated, intelligent, learned man, with a deep understanding of the human capacity for pain, and very briefly his eyes looked at me, then with both hands he held on to Barbara and replied: "You have been a brave fighter, and I am praying this last treatment we give you this afternoon will free you of this cancer, better yet to condemn it, for all time." He added, "Only God has the answer to your question." Shaking his head he left the room. I'm sure he knew she could not survive another night of harsh, almost inhuman pain she had endured. To further complicate her treatments, she was allergic to morphine, codeine and demerol, three of the most commonly used drugs of choice for

She simply sighed wearily and with my hands drawn tightly to her heart and with tears and prayers she told the devil he could take her abused and worn body, but her immortal soul belonged to God! In a matter of minutes her stomach stopped making those deep troubled, almost growls. You could almost hear him snarl as he left her body. Praise the Lord!

The fluid on her stomach stopped collecting. Her girth that morning had measured at 72" around the waist. By the time her anxious husband Julian got to the hospital approximately 4:45 p.m. She had been asleep with a beautiful smile and stomach had gone down to 40". Another miracle had happened. Her worried, distressed daughter, Lisa got there from Corsicana at approximately 7:30. It concerned Lisa because her mother was crying when she arrived. Our brother-in-law, Walt Currie of Houston and Oakhurst, Texas had just visited with Barbara and as we were walking to the elevator, both holding onto each other, I told him Barbara could not live through the night. He replied, "Now, Sis, Barbara is a fighter, you and my wife Doris know that. She has got to make it, you see that she does." When I got back to the room, Barbara had already planned our evening in Houston. She gave her faithful husband the love of her life, orders to go to a motel nearby, approximately three minutes from the hospital. She ordered Lisa's sweet husband, James to take me out to eat a decent meal and Lisa would stay with her and eat later. Then they would check in motel with adjoining room to Julian Bell. And I would remain with my Barbara. As it were things have a way of bubbling and going unfit and not always our way.

While James and I tried to eat, somehow the oysters on the half-shell held no appeal to me. The hot tea was fine, but something or someone, God I'm sure, told me to get back to the hospital in a hurry. We were gone approximately one hour and ten minutes. During that time God had embraced my almost perfect sister to heaven. And oh what a void, wanting, vacant, barren vacuum it has placed me in.

I must conclude this lengthy tribute to a lovely lady, not on a sad note because my sister Barbara was brimful of life. She loved giving and sharing and loving. So, she left me with a legacy of love in the number four. Her four children, "A" Paul moms Humphries married, yes to Mr. Julian Bell's daughter, Judy, has two "too pretty to describe children," employed with insurance, co. in Houston and he is a professional photographer. A Alan Douglas Humphries married Christmas Day of 1981 to an enchanting lovely blonde, where else but the wedding came to sister Barbara's hospital wing as Dr. McGary her Corsicana doctor called it. He is a plant manager for Thompson's Industries at City of Industry, California, also a pro. outdoor photographer. Now for a sweet copy of her mother, Mrs. James W. Ward has no children unless we can count "Yorkie's". She still has "Ima Punkin", the mother of the pup she gave Barbara and Julian. His name, what else: BJ. Lisa kept the tiny pup named Bonnie. I renamed her Boney Bonnie. But she still likes me. She (Lisa) is an X-ray technician at Navarro Co. Hospital in Corsicana. Number four must be for the baby. A Dana Walton Humphries, age 21 and single. He is a freelance male model for Foley's and Joskie's of Houston. Dana is also a professional skater.

Look back with me for a minute. I was at M.D. on the weekend of the 28th of Dec. also the following Monday, January 4th, again on Monday January 11th plus all the day inbetween. has mucho apo (grandchildren) in me casa" To wit they looked rather puzzled and asked "You IKAW AY LOLO-LO-LO-LO great grandmother, HUUWAG or NO! NO! Barbara spent the next 30 minutes laughing tears. I excused myself and went to the bathroom. January 11th, Dr. Riggs introduced me as Barbara's sister, two years and two days older than her. Sel!

Now the torch has been passed to me. So be it! P.S. This includes those who might be thinking "Does she kid herself into thinking she is the only person alive who has lost

a sister to cancer." I say no, but I am unique by being the only person I know of whose name is Mrs. Dorothy Dean Walton Nicholson Lane, sister to Mrs. Barbara Inez Walton Humphries Bell who died on January 16, last at age 53. We lived our lives with same numbers of letters in our names. That being 33. Our mother was 33 when she died in 1933. A paradox? The Mona Lisa has an enigmatic smile, so did Sister Barbara! I would welcome hearing from a number of my friends. Please help me to understand me!!!

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

HOW DO YOU FEEL ABOUT THE BIBLE?

We've been discussing the need to know the will of God. Last week, I suggested that the only way we can truly know His will for our lives is through a thorough study of his word, the Bible. Now, let me ask a question just here, if I might, in order to get you to think seriously about it. How do you feel about the Bible. What kind of an approach do you take to it when you study? It is important because I have found that the attitude we take toward the Bible colors both our study of it and our response to it's teachings.

There are a great number of attitudes held concerning the Bible, but the following are some broad categories into which most will usually fall.

1. Myth - one attitude that is quite prevalent among men is the idea that assigns the Bible to the realm of Mythology and legend. As such, parts of it might be true. For example, modern archeology has established that many places and events mentioned in the Bible actually existed and happened whereas it was once held that the Bible was wrong about them. But men still reject the Genesis account of Creation. They reject the miracles of both the Old and New Testaments. They reject much the Bible says as being only imaginary. For them the Bible might make a good source book for ancient history, but it carries no

moral or real religious significance.

2. Thought inspiration - a second attitude is actually somewhat akin to the first. It is tragic that it is an attitude held by a great many religionists, many of whom claim to be followers of Jesus Christ. This attitude says that the Bible contains the word of God but it is not the word of God. By this they deny the verbal infallible inspiration by God of the scriptures as they were given to the original writers and say that God inspired them with the idea but they wrote about it in their own words. Perhaps one writer received only a partial picture of God's true intention and another received a different view. Many well intentioned people use this approach to try to avoid what they consider or have been told are inconsistencies and contradictions in the Bible. The real problem with both these views is that they place man, the creature, in the position of passing judgement upon the Word of God, the creator, by picking and choosing which parts of the Bible they will accept and what parts they will discard. Can we do that? We have, but who among us is right? Think about it.


