A family will auto- 2-18 matically qualify if they qualify under any of the following programs: Aid for Dependent Children (AFDC), Food Stamps, Free School Lunch Program, Age 60 and above 2-21 and in financial need, Medicaid, Rental Subsidy, Social 2-22 Security as only income, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), unemployed or collecting Worker's Compensation.

Those not meeting any of the above qualifications can qualify by self determination if their income is below:


Services Held **For Jim Clemens**

WHEELER ISD ATTENDANCE **ACCOUNTABILITY POLICY**

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

PROPER STUDY

Give diligence (study-KJV) to present thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, handling aright (rightly dividing-KJV) the word of (2 Timothy 2:15)

Last week we talked of the need according to the Bible for us to know the will of God, if we hope to live pleasingly in his sight. Now, let's talk about how the scriptures tell us to go about obtaining that knowledge. As we saw last week, under the old covenant the priests were charged with a large part of the responsibility of keeping the people informed concerning the law. But they weren't the sole source of such knowledge. In Deut. 6:6-9, we find that parents (specifically fathers) were charged with the responsibility of teaching their children to know and respect the law. We find that responsibility repeated under Christ. In Eph. 6:4, we find these words:

And ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but nurture them in the chastening and

aumonition of the Lord. But, as we noticed last week, the ultimate responsibility for coming to a knowledge of God's will rests with each individual. Paul gives this notice in his exhortation to the young evangelist, Timothy. Timothy had been the recipient of the excellent teaching of both his mother and grandmother (2 Tim. 1:5; 3:14-15) and then by the apostle himself. But, in 2 Tim. 2:15, Paul placed the final responsibility squarely upon Timothy. He urged him to "give diligence" or "study" that he might present himself to God as one who did not need to be ashamed, but one who handled the word of God properly. If Timothy is urged to work hard to handle God's word properly, it must follow that it is altogether too possible to misshandle it; as Peter says, to our own destruction (2 Peter 3:15-16)


