## Jack Hightower Asks Support

Congressman Jack Hightower (D-Vernon), who has represented the 13th District since 1975, has announced he will seek a fifth two-year term. He has filed officially as a candidate in the Democratic Primary.

"I believe my conservative philosophy and common-sense approach to the complex national problems we face represent the views of the vast majority of the people of this area," Hightower said.

Hightower was a founding member of the Conservative Democratic Forum in the House, which advocates conservative tax and budget policies. He joined other conservative Democrats in supporting the major elements of the Administration's budget and tax reduction program in 1981. "President Reagan received a nationwide mandate to reverse spending policies which have driven the nation into excessive debt while imposing high taxation on the people," he said. "This is a bipartisan program and I believe it is imperative that Democrats and Republicans work together to restore our economic strength.

At the same time, Hightower pointed out that "I disagree with the disastrous agricultural policies of the Reagan Administration just as I disagreed with the Carter Administration." He also said he will continue to oppose any effort by the administration to reduce Social Security retirement benefits.

He added: "This indicates how important it is to have a Congressman who is independent from partisan pressures. I've never asked the President how to vote and I've never asked Speaker O'Neill how to vote. I make up my own mind based on what is good for this district and the nation. I do not think the people of our district want a rubber-stamp Congressman for any President or political party."

Hightower said his experience in local, state and national government, his seniority in Congress and his key committee assignments have enabled him to effectively influence decisions in Washington. He is a ranking member of the powerful House Appropriations Committee which played a central role in reducing government spending this year. He also serves on the appropriations subcommittees for the Agriculture, Commerce, Justice and State Departments and the Judiciary.

Hightower listed interest rates, crime, immigration, social security and farm problems among his 1982 priorities.

"One of the keys to bringing down interest rates is to reduce the impending budget deficit in the next few years," he said. Hightower pledged he "will continue to fight to make the government serve the people and not the other way around."

## FmHA To Assist Farm Financing

Although many farmers are facing financial difficulty because of today's cost-price squeeze, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) intends to do all it can to help its borrowers stay in farming, FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said today.

"We recognize there are problems, problems with high interest rates, inflation, a grain embargo, adverse weather and other causes," Futch said. "And these have been intensified by overall bumper crops that have affected prices."

"As Secretary of Agriculture John Block said recently, our farm economy is in a valley right now and needs some help to move on up the hill on the other side."

Futch said Block had instructed FmHA to explore the use of private credit to supplement its own lending resources whenever possible. In addition, existing legal authority to reschedule or defer payments is to be used where practicable.

"We intend to be reasonable, just as Secretary Block ordered," Futch said. "Our objective is to keep farmers in business. That isn't to say there won't be some who go out of business, because there will be, but we are going to use the best judgment we can and reasonable criteria in making our loan decisions."

Secretary Block said that borrowers who have made good faith efforts to pay their loans, who have maintained their loan security in good condition, who follow sound, recognized management practices, and who have a reasonable chance to succeed can reasonably expect FmHA to stay with them.

"We will be working with our borrowers and with the commercial institutions to overcome these temporary problems," Futch said. "Agriculture is basically healthy, just as the Secretary said; there is no question about it. We just have to move out of the present situation and dig in for the long run."

Hornets took an unexpected 50-40 loss to Kelton to give Kelton the edge in the district race. Having some injuries and one player gone, the Hornets continuity fell short of past performances. The team managed to shoot only 30% from the field and 50% from the free throw line to give Kelton a sure advantage in taking the victory. Scoring for the Hornets were Danny Hilburn 19, Wade Hathaway 9, Mike Kelsey 6, Ray Estes 3, and Donald Farrar 2. The Hornets are 2-1 this half of district play. The Hornets travel to Briscoe Tuesday, Feb. 9, 1982, and travel to Allison Sat., Feb. 13, 1982 for a make-up game.

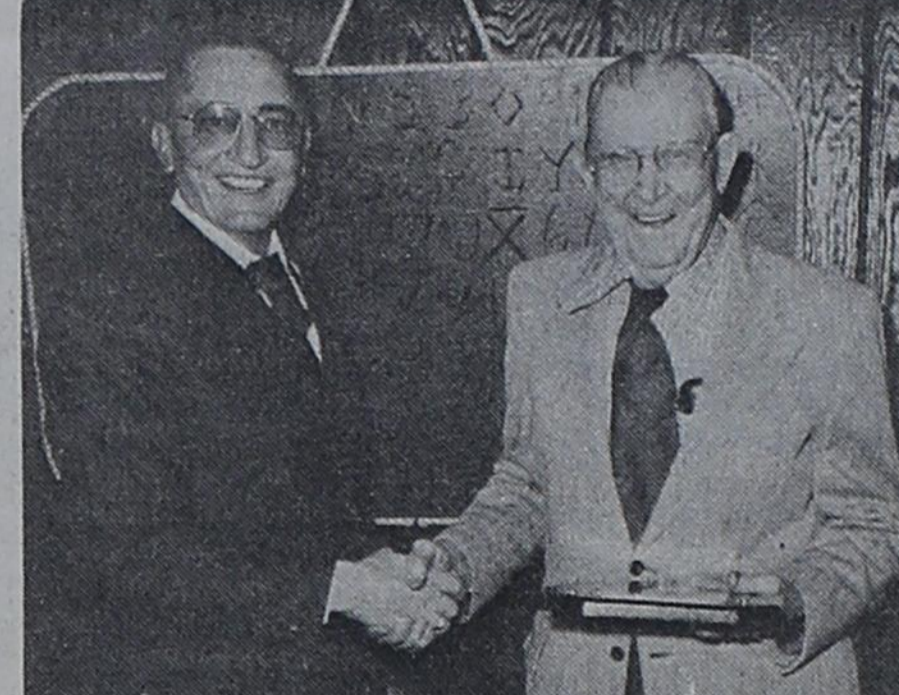
## MOBETTIE 4-H & FFA STOCK SHOW

Saturday, April 3 will be election day; the City of Wheeler, Wheeler Independent School District and North Wheeler County Hospital District will share the polls for the purpose of electing the individuals to serve on the respective boards.

The Mayor and two councilmen are to be elected this year. Presently serving are Mayor Pete Burton and aldermen David Cross and Louis C. Stas. Any individual who is a qualified voter and a resident of the City of Wheeler is eligible to place their name on the ballot for anyone of the afore mentioned Positions. Members of the council serve a two-year term and see to the management of city affairs. Those interested in serving on the council may file at the city office for their name to be placed on the ballot. Berniece Hall, Jimmy Hill and Kirven Roper were elected to the council last year.

Wheeler Independent School District will have two places to be filled in the election April 3. The teams of Larry Jennings and Tom Christner will expire. Any qualified voter who resides within the Wheeler ISD is eligible to serve on the board of trustees. Candidates for the two positions must file an application for a place on the ballot with Vida Brown, secretary of the Board prior to midnight, March 3, 1982. Board members serve a 3 year term; others presently serving are Vida Brown, Richard Brown, Mike Smith, Don Whiteley.

The representative for the Wheeler and Kelton communities are to be elected in the North Wheeler County Hospital District election. Presently serving are John C. Vise of Wheeler and Paula Britt from Kelton. Any qualified taxpayer from the Wheeler or Kelton Districts desiring their name placed on the ballot must file a petition signed by five qualified voters from their district, prior to 5 p.m. March 9, 1982. Directors are elected for a two-year term.

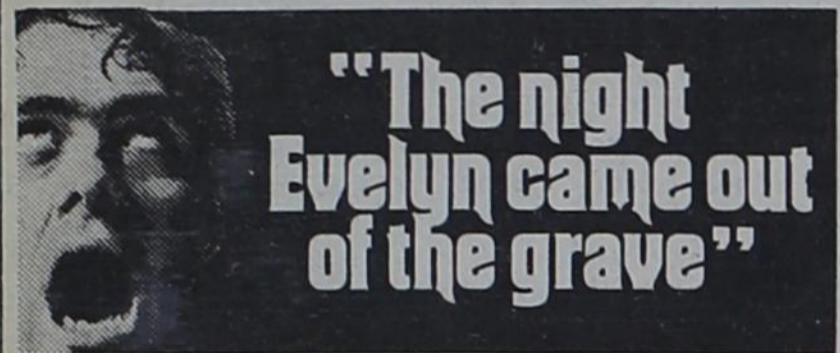

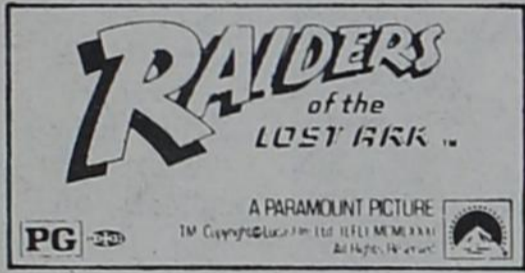

**Tax Statement**  
by Charles Buzzard

If you have applied and qualified for the over-65 homestead exemption, your school district tax bill cannot increase as long as the property qualifies for the exemption. While your property may increase in value through the years, the taxes which you owe in any year cannot be greater than the amount you owed in 1979 or the first year you qualified for this exemption, whichever is later. Should you make an addition to your property after qualifying for a school tax ceiling, the chief appraiser must calculate a new higher ceiling based on the value added by the improvements, other than normal maintenance.

If you would have qualified for the over-65 homestead exemption in 1979, but failed to apply, you have an opportunity to have your tax ceiling adjusted to the amount it would have been if you had applied for the exemption in 1979. You must make application with the appraisal district office before May 1, 1982, in order to receive this adjustment. The chief appraiser will publish a notice of the provisions of the exemption in a newspaper once a week for three weeks prior to the deadline.

There is another form of tax relief available to persons who are 65 years of age or older. If you qualify for an over-65 homestead exemption, you can postpone paying the property taxes on your residence homestead. In order to postpone or defer paying your taxes in any given year, you must file an affidavit with the chief appraiser in the county where your residence homestead is located.

The taxes will become delinquent and penalty and interest will accrue, but there can be no lawsuit to collect the taxes as long as you own and occupy the homestead. If you do not file the affidavit and a delinquent tax suit is brought against you, you can assert your age and ownership of the homestead and the lawsuit will be abated.

This tax deferral applies to all taxing jurisdictions. Remember, however, that the tax deferred are still owed and must be paid when your property is sold or when its title passes to others through gift or transfer as part of your estate.

Note: Wheeler County Appraisal District is still taking applications for residential homestead, over-65, disabled veterans, productive value, and farm and ranch implement exemptions. If you have not applied, please call 826-5900 or come by our office. With the re-evaluation of all property this year, these exemptions are more important than ever.

they were enabled to break that pattern by abiding in him and his word would they be truly free.

We can see the extent of their bondage when we examine some of the encounters that Jesus had with the Jews elsewhere. In Matt. 15 and Mark 7 we have the record of Jesus when he was asked by the Pharisees why his disciples transgressed the traditions of the fathers. He accused them of having transgressed the commands of God by allowing their traditions to supercede them. And he said to them, "Well did Isaiah prophecy of you, saying This people honoreth me with their lips; But their heart is far from me. But in vain do they worship me, Teaching for doctrine the commandments of men." (Mt. 15:8,9). They had set aside God's commandment in order that they might keep the traditions of men, and in so doing had surrendered to sin. Their bondage was so great as to cause them to hang him on a tree, and finally receive God's judgment and be rejected as the exclusive covenant people of God.

To bring it down to our day and age, we live in a country which allows what we call religious freedom; that is freedom to worship God in whatever way we might choose, even to not worshipping him at all. So far, this atmosphere has given rise to literally hundreds of different religions, each claiming to be following Christ. But, the question is, are all of us really free? Does the fact that we can worship the way we might choose mean that we are actually free from sin. Sin is defined in the scriptures as the transgression of or disobedience to the will of God the Father as given to us by Jesus Christ, the Son, and his chosen apostles in the New Testament. Are we really free if we choose to disregard that will; even in one point? Think about it.

## CONCERNING DEATH

Death is one of the most misunderstood things there is. Instead of going to the Bible to find out from God's Word what it is all about, the majority of people make unscriptural assumptions about it or hold to teaching given by people who didn't know anything about what the Bible said either.

I was dealing with commonly held ideas about death in last week's article. One statement that is almost always made at someone's death is, "Well, we just have to accept this as being God's will." I ask you, "Why do we have to accept something as God's will just because we may not know the answer to a particular situation?" I mean if it is in reality NOT God's will, all that this reasoning does is serve as a pacifier. It doesn't help anybody. It certainly doesn't make people feel good toward God. If you honestly believe it is God's will being done when a beloved toddler dies or when a mother with dependent children dies leaving them without a maternal parent, how could you love Him or trust Him? We wouldn't trust a human that would kill a toddler or a mother or anybody else, would we? Of course not. And God is better than we are. I know it is improper grammar, but GOD IS GOODER than we are. Nobody would honestly be considered good that would strike people down in death, not even God.

I repeat what I have said before. DEATH IS NOT OF GOD. HE DOESN'T TAKE PEOPLE AWAY FROM US. DEATH IS CALLED AN ENEMY BY GOD. Have you ever heard this Scripture -- Psalm 116:15, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints?" The word precious doesn't mean "lovely" or "dear". Check it out in the Hebrew word that was translated precious in the King James Version was translated more clearly. ("Precious" is an acceptable translation if you know the correct definition of it instead of just thinking you know.) The word means "costly" or "of not light matter". In other words, it is costly in the sight of the Lord for one of His saints to die. It is not light matter to Him. It is not something He likes. Do you think that He takes pleasure in something that is hurting those of us who are left when a loved one dies? 1000 times NO. God cares about us. When we hurt, He is not pleased with that. He has planned a day when this awful enemy, DEATH, will be destroyed. It was never His plan in the first place. It was the consequence of DISOBEDIENCE.

So, it is not God's will. We do not have to accept it as God's will. We do need to accept it as it really is, the result of sin entering the world. We need to treat it as an enemy. If we really believe that stuff that it is God's will or His way, we wouldn't praise the doctors so vigorously for their efforts to keep it from happening, would we? No, we would fight them for rebelling against God's will. So, don't ever be guilty again of saying, "It was just God's will." There is no comfort in that anyway. Lets just face the facts and say, "I hate death. It's our enemy. But God knows how to comfort us, and praise God someday it will be destroyed." Paid adv.

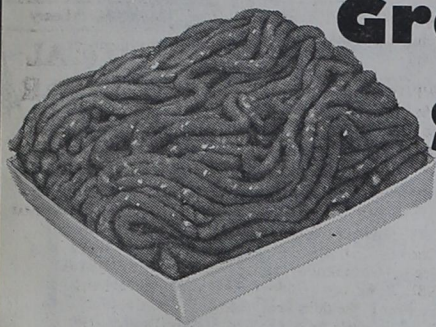

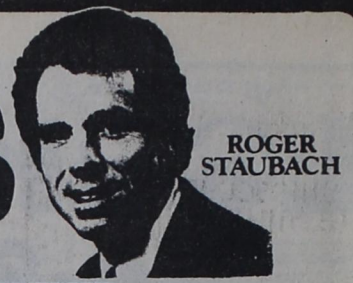
