Letter to the Editor

A Reply To Concerned Citizen & Glen Sherrell

To Wheeler Times Editor:
In reply to the letter that came out in the paper, Jan. 27, 1982, we would like to add some information that was left out.

As for the statement that elderly people have to walk across highways to get to their dumpsters, we feel that the reason the dumpster was put across the street, is that the people wouldn't have wanted it in their front yard. If these people will let the council know, surely they will have the dumpsters moved where they are more convenient, if possible.

As for the cost of the dumpsters, the State Board of Health has come in and said that the dump ground will be shut down and has given so many days for it to be one. It would cost more than the price of the dumpsters to hire someone to run the dump ground and keep it up like the Board of Health says it has to be kept.

In regard to the 3 accounts mentioned by the concerned citizen, please contact a council member or the city secretary and we are sure they will be glad to show you the books at the next city council meeting. Regrettably, they can't show the old records because they have been lost or not turned over -- we are a little vague on the facts about these records.

The inference that the city council is lazy seems to be rather childish and doesn't deserve to be answered. The street signs were bought by a previous city council with money that could have been used for other, we feel more useful purposes. All of the city council members have businesses to run or a job to keep and seem to be trying to use the city's money to update the city services instead of hiring someone to put up the signs.

Mr. Sherrell stated in his letter that the members of the council seem to be well off. All of the council members work every day and most have their own businesses. They are just like all of the other people of the town, however, they are in the limelight because they are council members. They donate free time to the city that could be used for other purposes. The council's salary is pretty low --- \$0.00.

As for the city being in the rental business, the only way a deputy could be moved here was to provide a house. The city members felt that a deputy was needed, as some of the citizens were being harassed and windows broken out of downtown businesses. This goes to show that the council has the best interests of the citizen in mind. The house is not rented to the deputy, it was an agreement between the

county and the city that a house would be furnished.

If the concerned citizen would check into the price of a dozer and the upkeep of one, she/he would find part of the reason for the cost of cleaning up the dump ground. That combined with the fact that the dump hadn't been cleaned up for some time, made the price what it was. The job was let for bid, and the other dozer companies in the area did not seem to be interested in doing a small nasty job like cleaning up a dump ground when they could build a location for an oil company and make more money.

Mr. Sherrell, we would like to inform you that the city has no choice in the matter of a new water system. The State Board of Health has decreed that a new system has to be put in. The old water system violates 62 regulations and will be shut down if it is not fixed. We feel that all of these problems would not have come into being if a select group of citizens had not petitioned to have the town of Mobeetie incorporated and made into a Texas city. If the water system had been voted in when the town was incorporated, we would already have a new water system at a lot cheaper rate. Now, it is going to cost more to fix so that it meets all of the rules and regulations.

We think the city council is doing a fine job with all the problems that they were handed. It is the right of the people of Mobeetie to elect the council and since these people were duly elected, it seems that the majority of the people thought they would do a good job.

It seems to us that the way to air your feelings is to get out and go to the city council meetings and discuss them with the council. (It meets the first Monday of every month.) We have seen several people corner one council member at a time to gripe about something and that is not the way it should be done. One member does not comprise the council. Several city meetings were called for the explicit purpose of discussing the dump and water, but only ten or less people cared enough to come. Now, it's too late to change anything and several people aren't satisfied.

We noticed that at least Mr. Sherrell had the decency to sign his name. It seems that a truly "concerned citizen" would have too.

Tehological Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky.

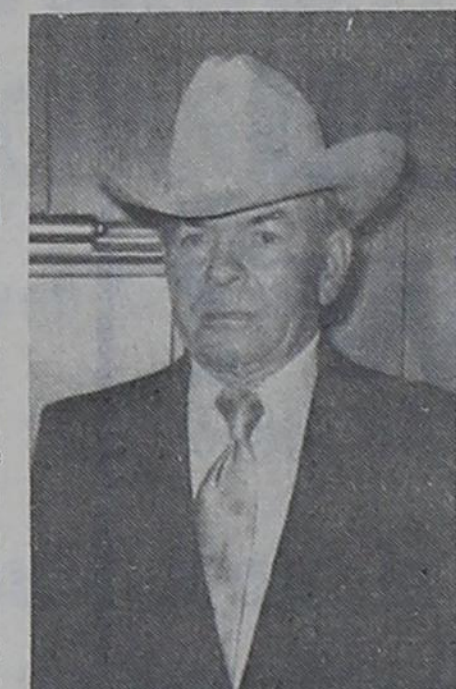
Ken Blanchard J.P. Candidate

Service Answers 20 Calls In Jan.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service answered twenty calls for the month of January.

These calls involved the following: four rig accidents, four breaks of either legs, arms or hands, two severe wounds, one burn, three heart problems, one stroke, one possible hip fractures, two sick calls and three cancer patients.

Ten patients were transferred, one to Elk City, one to Shattuck and eight to Amarillo.

Two of the calls were code three emergencies. Also one call to a rig accident was a DOS.

The number of calls and number of hours volunteered are as follows: Louis Stas, 8 calls, 20 hours; Mary K. Christner, 15 calls, 38 hours; David Cross, 7 calls, 13 hours; Lee Hibler, 5 calls, 12 hours; Pam Hibler, 2 calls, 8 hours; Frankie Jackson, 2 calls, 8 hours; Tommie Puryear, 5 calls, 17 hours; Dwight Tipps, 5 calls, 13 hours.

A total of 130 hours were spent by these attendants in patient care.

Earl Williams, old-timer from Mobeetie who moved to Pampa is very ill again and is in the hospital at Amarillo.

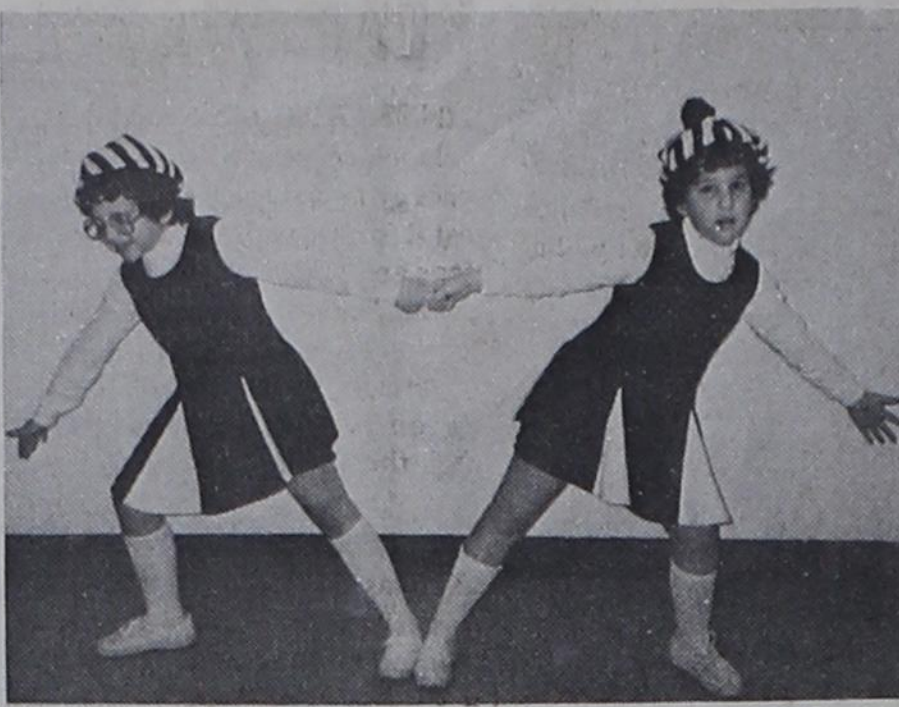
Bessie Galmor was admitted to the Coronado Community Hospital in Pampa Sunday. We hope this finds her much better.

These hazards will vary according to the heater design

Dramatic increases in home heating costs have developed a demand for small portable heaters to provide spot heating. The agent points out, however, that many challenging questions are being asked by consumers about the safety of the kerosene type heating units.

Hazards associated with kerosene heaters include: 1. The lowering of available oxygen and a possible increase in carbon monoxide; 2. The threat of burns from direct contact with the unit; 3. An increase in the risk of fires.

and the use of good judgement regarding its operation.

The agent explains that users should use kerosene heaters only during waking hours and always have a window open about one inch or keep a door ajar during operation.

Only clear white kerosene should be used in kerosene heaters. Other fuels including regular yellow kerosene should not be used as these fuels will smoke and interfere with operation.

Heaters should always be placed away from curtains and other combustibles and the use of smoke detectors in areas where heaters are used is recommended.

Consumers wanting more information about the hazards of kerosene heaters and recommended safe operating procedures can request the data sheet entitled "Portable Kerosene Heaters" by writing to Linda Daughtry, County Extension Agent, Box 505, Wheeler, Texas 79096 or calling 826-5243.

Decided to save money and energy by lowering the thermostat setting -- but now your feet are cold?

Don't blame the thermostat or your feet or your socks!

Comfort also depends on clothing, radiant heating, humidity, activities, drafts, each different room and your own physical fitness -- all working against each other or together,

1) THERMOSTAT SETTING can work for you ONLY IF the area in which the thermostat is actually located has the same conditions as the room(s) you want heated, housing experts tell us. Check each room's temperature. Close off unused rooms to enhance the heating of in-use

rooms, if necessary.

2) CLOTHING offers an insulative value, so take advantage of this. Wear layers of relatively thin clothing. Air will be trapped between the layers and warmed by body heat. As you warm up, remove a layer or two. As you cool off, add some.

3) RADIANT HEAT is heat from sun rays or heat that bounces off the bricks in your fireplace. Work where you can get the benefit of this "extra" economical heat.

4) HUMIDITY can undo all the good you've done with

other methods of comfort creation, so control it. High humidity -- lots of moisture in the house -- causes already-cool temperatures to feel even cooler.

5) ACTIVITIES generate heat, especially when the large muscles of legs and arms are involved, so stay active.

6) DRAFTS have a cooling effect, of course, so stop them. Locate them and minimize their power or stay out of draft areas.

7) YOUR PHYSICAL FITNESS is the final key -- those who are physically fit and active can better adapt to temperature changes than those who are not fit.

Remember, you can control what you wear and what you do.

During cold periods, increase your physical activities and change clothing whenever necessary to maintain comfort. If you've followed the seven-point plan, a simple solution to changing comfort problems may be as close as your closet.

Pointers Given On Disconnection

General Telephone now gives its customers three options on what to do with their telephones when having service discontinued.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas, in its rate order granting General Telephone \$2.1 million, approved a policy which gives customers the options of paying a charge for the company to pick up the instruments, retaining the instruments and paying the associated costs for the instruments retained, or returning the phones to the company.

Customers terminating service who return their phones to their telephone company business office or GTE Phone Mart are not charged a pick-up fee. However, if the company picks up the instruments, a \$10 charge is applied for residential customers and \$13 for business one-party customers. Another option is for the customer to purchase the phones, paying the commission-approved charges for particular instruments. Under this option the instruments become the property of the customer. A schedule of rates for particular instruments is available from the business office or GTE Phone Mart.

The new policy applies to all residential customers and one-party business customers.

Customers who return or retain their phones can unplug the instruments if they have GTE Phone Mart jacks, or if wired into the old style wall block, can simply cut the wires near the block. The company urges customers cutting wires to avoid cutting wires which carry household electrical current.

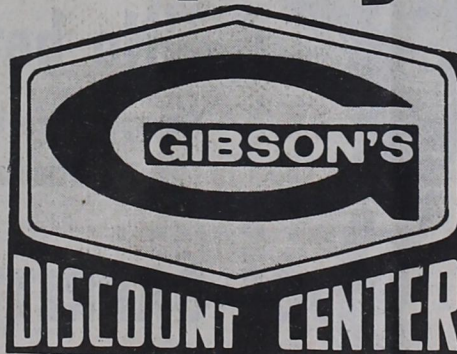

CONCERNING DEATH

[Part 3]

There are many ideas that people have about death that are as foreign to the Bible as can be. Whenever someone dies, it is very common to hear these things. People say things like this, "Well, God's ways are hard to understand," or "You just have to accept it as being God's will," or "It was just his time to go," or "God works in mysterious ways His wonders to perform." Another common notion is, "God just decided He wanted him up there with Him." One that is used a lot by preachers is, "The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away."

I have discovered that the majority of people would rather believe one of these traditional false ideas than accept what the Bible actually says. But there are some folks (including myself) that want to know the truth even if it goes against every traditional teaching they ever had.

To answer some of this, it should be recognized first that death is not God's ways. God's Word says that death is an enemy, not a wonder or mysterious way of God. Death entered the world because of sin, not because of God. God doesn't take our loved ones, death does. The Word of God teaches that there is a "destroyer" in the earth, but that it is not God. It also teaches, by the way, that the destroyer can't take us until we live out our time if we live by the Bible and believe His promises pertaining to long life. Anyone God ever "took" went without dying (Enoch, Elijah, and those that Jesus will take alive when the Rapture takes place -- these are the only ones mentioned as escaping death and are also the only ones that the Bible refers to as being taken by God). Don't misunderstand -- at death, a Christian goes to be with the Lord, but the Lord did not take them. Death took them.

I will take the other quotations given in the first paragraph and answer them next week. I also will gladly furnish the Scriptures to support this teaching. My ideas do not matter any more than anybody else's. The Word of God is what counts. But, as I have said before, space prohibits me from giving the Scripture quotations and the teaching too. A list of verses is available upon request however. One verse I will leave with you here is John 10:10, "The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill and to destroy: I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

Tax Statement

by Charles Buzzard

There are a couple of items I failed to mention last week about Agricultural-Use and Open-Space Land Valuations. Persons who receive either the Agricultural-Use Valuation or the Open-Space Land Valuation must be aware that a possibility exists that additional taxes will become due in the future.

This additional tax, or rollback, is measured by the difference between the taxes which would have been paid had the land been valued at market value. This recapture of lost taxes extends back three years on land designated for agricultural use under Article 8, Section 1-d. For land receiving open-space designation under Article 8, Section 1-d-1, this recapture extends back five years. The additional tax is imposed under Article 8, Section 1-d-1, if the land is sold or if the land is changed to a use other than an agricultural use. For land under Article 8, Section 1-d-1, the additional tax is imposed only if the use of the land changes.

If you qualify for productivity valuation under either provision, two factors should be considered in deciding which to choose.

First, you should inquire at the appraisal district office whether the valuation of your property under both provisions would be the same. While this productivity value under either provision should be the same, in some areas it may not be. This difference may be sufficient to help you decide which provision to choose.

If there is no difference in value, then the other factor to consider is the rollback provision. If you anticipate selling your property, you may want to apply for open-space land valuation because, as noted above, no rollback is triggered in the event of a sale.

Two other exemptions that are for farmers passed during the last legislative session are farm products and implements of farming and ranching.

Farm products, including livestock and poultry, still in the hands of the producer are exempt from property taxation and no application for exemption is required.

Implements of farming and ranching are exempt from taxation if owned by an individual who uses them in the production of farm or ranch products. The property must be individually owned; corporate or partnership ownership will not qualify. This exemption must be applied for annually.

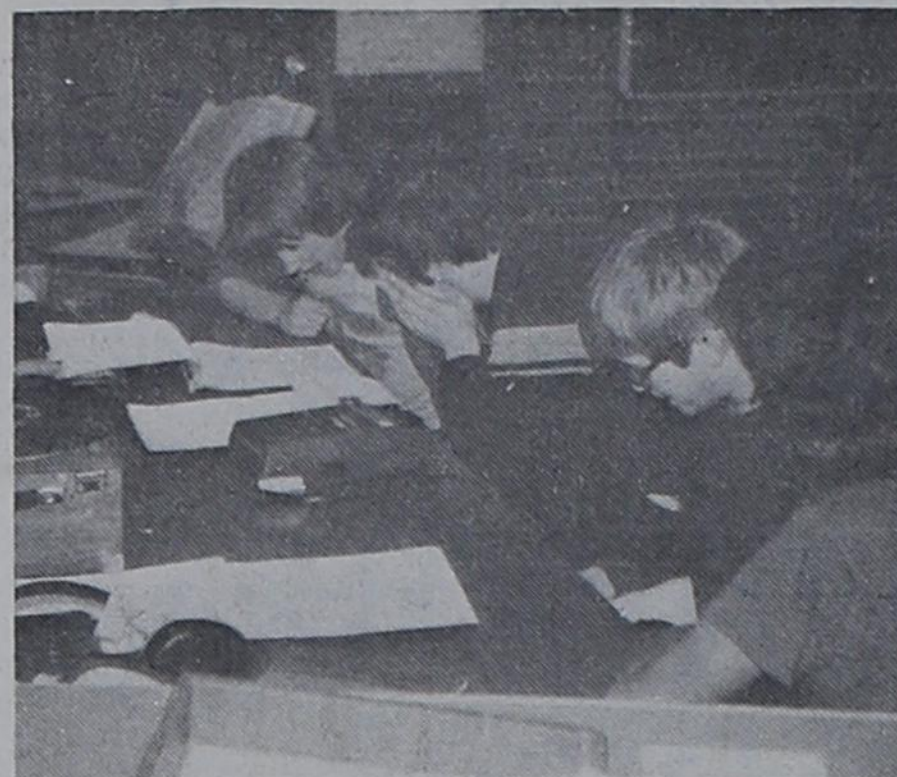

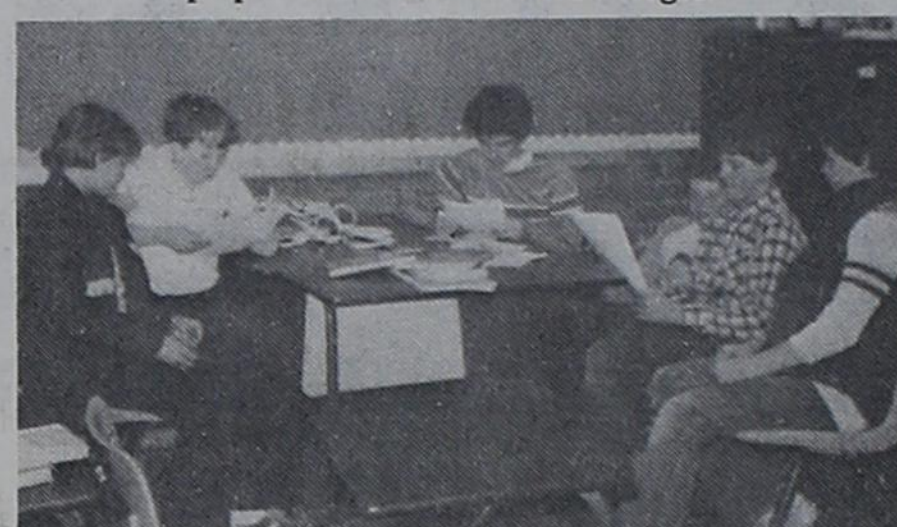
