Wheeler County **Sheriff Report**

Paul E. McCurley of McLean, who received a 10 year sentence on October 22, 1981 for the theft of condensate from a well site NW of Wheeler, had his appeal bond revoked after a hearing before Judge Grainger McIlhany, in Wheeler on January 7. Since receiving the 10 year sentence, McCurley has been charged in Collingsworth County with the theft of gasoline from a pipe line located SW of Shamrock. In testimony presented before Judge McIlhany, McCurley was also accused of taking condensate from a well site in NW Wheeler County and selling it to a service station in Alanreed. McIlhany ordered McCurley to be held by the Wheeler County Sheriff until his appeal is either affirmed or reversed. The law allows an appeal bond to be revoked if it is shown that the person may commit another crime if al-







If you are disabled and qualify for the Residence Homestead Exemption, you week were not feeling well are entitled to receive an with the flu. Earl Whitten is in additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value for your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only.

"Disabled" for purposes of this exemption means either that, because of physical or mental disability, you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work; or that you are 55 years of age or older and blind, and by reason of the blindness you are unable to engage in your previous work.

If you are receiving disability benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Program administered by the Social Security Administration, you will qualify as long as you apply on time.

If you are receiving disability benefits under any other program, you will not automatically qualify. You must still meet the definition of disability state previously and apply before April 30.

You may not receive both Over-65 Exemption and the Disability Exemption. You must choose one or the other. In addition to receiving the \$10,000 exemption from your school district, you may also receive an additional exemption of not less than \$3,000 off the market value of your residence homestead, if your

jurisdiction offers this exemp-

tion. Any county, city, school district, special district may, by a vote of its governing body, offer this local option Disability Exemption. Or, 20 percent of the voters of any jurisdiction can sign a petition requiring that an election be held which would force the governing body to grant the exemption. The same qualifications for this exemption is the same as the \$10,000 ex-

Are you a Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor? If so, you may qualify for the Disabled Veteran Exemption. More about this exemption next week.

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



Down on the windy flatlands of the Texas Panhandle it's not at all unusual to see a windmill or two on the landscape. But the latest addition to the area's skyline -- a windmill in the parking lot of the Borger, Texas Post Office -- might be cause for a double take.

The first ever to be erected on a postal site, the windmill represents a small, but unique contribution to a major, nationwide Postal Service effort to utilize alternative energy sources and save money.
