## Former Wheeler County Woman Dies In Accident

A Stratford woman was killed Thursday, January 7 when she stepped into the path of a semi-trailer tractor rig at a street intersection in downtown Dumas.

Mrs. Viola Mae Thomason, 57, was killed at 2 p.m. in the accident that occurred at the corner of Sixth and Dumas Avenue.

She and a daughter were walking across Dumas Avenue from east to west when they were caught by the changing traffic light and stopped in the center of the street, according to investigating officers.

Two 18-wheelers were headed south on the street (the city route of U.S. 287) and one of the big rigs passed through the intersection. Mrs. Thomason's daughter continued to wait on traffic, but Mrs. Thomason started to proceed across the street and stepped directly into the path of the second rig.

Sandy Scroggins, 25, of Nevada, Mo., driver of the rig, suffered no physical injury in the accident but was taken to Dumas Memorial Hospital for treatment of shock.

Officers said no charges will be filed in connection with the accident.

Mrs. Thomason and her husband, S.W. Thomason, were owner-operators of the Sunset Motel in Stratford, where they had lived for four years. She was born in Wheeler and had lived in Amarillo for 30 years before moving to Stratford. She was a member of the Assembly of God Church in Stratford.

Funeral arrangements will be announced by Morrison Funeral Directors of Stratford.

Survivors, in addition to the husband, are four daughters, Lola Thomason and Mrs. Diane Pfeil, both of Wheeler, Julie Thomason of Stratford and Mrs. Linda Shaffer of Twitty; a son, Jeff Thomason of Odessa; three brothers, three sisters and five grandchildren.

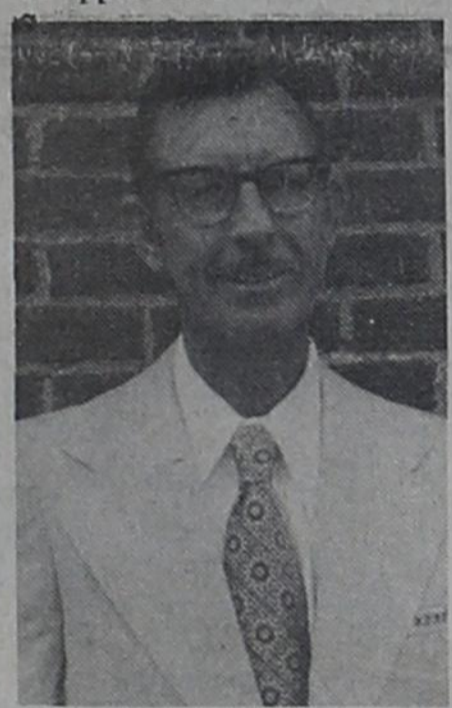

Paul E. ## Tax Statements

If you are disabled and qualify for the Residence Homestead Exemption, you are entitled to receive an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value for your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only.

"Disabled" for purposes of this exemption means either that, because of physical or mental disability, you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work; or that you are 55 years of age or older and blind, and by reason of the blindness you are unable to engage in your previous work.

If you are receiving disability benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Program administered by the Social Security Administration, you will qualify as long as you apply on time.

If you are receiving disability benefits under any other program, you will not automatically qualify. You must still meet the definition of disability state previously and apply before April 30.

You may not receive both Over-65 Exemption and the Disability Exemption. You must choose one or the other.

In addition to receiving the \$10,000 exemption from your school district, you may also receive an additional exemption of not less than \$3,000 off the market value of your residence homestead, if your jurisdiction offers this exemption.

Any county, city, school district, special district may, by a vote of its governing body, offer this local option Disability Exemption. Or, 20 percent of the voters of any jurisdiction can sign a petition requiring that an election be held which would force the governing body to grant the exemption. The same qualifications for this exemption is the same as the \$10,000 exemption.

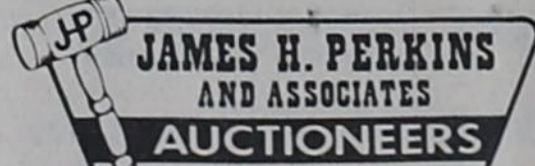

Windmills Are Saving Engery

Down on the windy flatlands of the Texas Panhandle it's not at all unusual to see a windmill or two on the landscape.

The first ever to be erected on a postal site, the windmill represents a small, but unique contribution to a major, nationwide Postal Service effort

Since installation in September of this year, the age-old energy-producer has been converting the fast-blowing winds of the region's flat terrain into heating and cooling for the three-year-old postal facility.

Borger was chosen for a one-year test of the windmill because the Panhandle has the highest wind energy in the continental United States.

Winds average 14 m.p.h. during the entire year. And a 26 m.p.h. wind is commonplace in the town, located about 50 miles northeast of Amarillo.

"We need a little less than an eight-mile-an-hour wind to generate power," Borger Postmaster W.T. (Dub) Riley says.

"During our first month of operation, we used one-third fewer kilowatts than normal. And, overall we expect the windmill to provide about 40 percent of our electricity."

Energy that is not used, particularly during the hours the post office is closed, will be sold to the area's electric utility company.

Two meters are used, one automatically diverting the unused energy to the utility.

But by a small business firm in Burkburnett, Texas, the windmill cost about \$25,000 plus \$4,000 for installation.

Postal officials expect it to pay for itself within eight and a half years through lower electric bills.

The wind generator has a maximum output of 30,000 watts of electricity in a 30 to 40 m.p.h. wind.

The blades are 32 feet across and basically constructed of fiberglass.

They are strong, yet flexible and can survive 125 m.p.h. winds by bending to an angle up to 45 degrees without damage.

Postmaster Riley reports that maintenance of the windmill is no problem.

"About every two to three months, one of our employees cleans and lubricates it. A half hour later, it's raised back up and ready to whirl," he said.
